SOCIAL STUDIES INQUIRY: WHAT TO LOOK FOR

The categories below represent best practices in inquiry-based instruction for Social Studies. QUESTIONING Students are guided through the inquiry process by an essential/compelling question that is open-ended, includes transferable ideas, requires justification, and recurs over time. Every inquiry includes opportunities for student questioning, teacher questioning, & follow up questions that reach higher levels of thinking. Students make their thinking visible through multiple modalities: writing illustrating* reading listening "Mustrating could mean analyzing a visual or creating an illustration. SOURCE ANALYSIS Students analyze primary and secondary sources from multiple perspectives and in different formats. Possible sources could include: · articles, diaries, letters, & legal documents · photos, timelines, charts, cartoons, & artwork · artifacts, objects, maps, & globes · audio, field trips, speakers, & experiential learning CIVIC & CIVIL DISCOURSE Students communicate their thoughts and take informed action using reliable evidence · constructing relevant explanations and viable claims · critiquing the credibility and relevance of their own as well as other's use of evidence, explanations, and claims · assessing the impact of their ideas and actions on a wide array of audiences DISCIPLINARY THINKING Students exercise disciplinary thinking, make claims, and support their thinking with evidence throughout the inquiry · asking questions like a historian, geographer, political scientist, economist, etc. analyzing sources/making observations to find patterns. trends. & relationships · sourcing and using multiple perspectives · establishing context and corroborating evidence · communicating using the formats and tools of the

Professional Development Needs to Address Different Instructional Strategies

Professional Development Needs to Implement Student-Centered Activities

Student-Centered Activity	Professional Development Need (Weighted Average)
Engaging students in constructing arguments and supporting claims using evidence from a variety of primary and secondary sources	3.97
Engaging students in discussion and debate	3.87
Encouraging students to become active listeners	3.55
Engaging students in asking questions	3.42

Developing effective note-taking strategies	3.04

2023-24 End of the Year Feedback

99% of participants said the Cheerleaders & Champions initiative affected *their* professional knowledge and growth "to a great extent" (53%) or "somewhat" (46%).

88% of participants said the Cheerleaders & Champions initiative affected the professional knowledge and growth of *K-12 Social Studies educators in their district/RESA* "to a great extent" (28%) or "somewhat" (60%).



2023-24 End of the Year Feedback

"I was made aware of a plethora of resources and supports that were far beyond my breadth of knowledge. This experience also inspired me to take a critical look at how I teach Social Studies and explore new and innovative ways of engaging students." "This program has prompted me to work more collaboratively with the other SS teachers in my school when we normally do not collaborate much. We have planned together and have even looked into collaborative projects we can do between 5th and 8th grade since many of the standards overlap which I did not know before. It has made me much more intentional with my teaching since I have looked at other grades' standards and know what they will be learning after they leave my class."

2023-24 End of the Year Feedback

"Having a social studies liaison has very much benefited the small systems who have no social studies coordinator. Prior to this program, the information was not being disseminated in a timely manner. It is very challenging for one system coordinator to keep current on all content happenings. I believe so many more teachers are using the social studies resources than ever before."

"Since being in this program, it has given me first-hand knowledge of different instructional strategies to bring social studies to life. The way I teach social studies now has made some improvements since learning different ways to teach the standards. I also have loved the connections I have made with other educators and organizations and being a part of a community that feels as passionately about social studies as I do."



"The Champions program provided space for me to grow in my career as a professional in education. When I finish my PhD program at Mercer, I plan to either work as a curriculum specialist or as faculty in a teacher preparation program. Furthermore, it granted me the opportunity to share knowledge and tools with my fellow educators in a district that is too small to afford a social studies specific curriculum specialist."





Corrections to the GSE

To maintain the accuracy of the GSE for Social Studies, GaDOE has made the following corrections to the standards as of the 2023-2024 school year. These changes will also be reflected on the Georgia Milestones Assessments beginning in the 2023-24 school year.

- 1. SS2H2/SS2G2/SS8H4d The American Indian nation listed in the standard as "Creek" will now be listed as "Muscogee (Creek)" as this is the accurate legal name listed in the federal registry and the name preferred by members of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation.
- 2. SS8H7b The terminology for the event listed as the "1906 Atlanta Riot" or the "1906 Atlanta Race Riot" in the standards will be changed to the "1906 Atlanta Race Massacre" to more accurately reflect the event and resources provided by statewide historical organizations.
- **3. SS8CG1e** will read "Identify wisdom, justice, moderation, **and courage** as the four principles in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Georgia Flag." The legislature passed <u>SB152</u>, modifying the state pledge to add a fourth principle "courage."




