Kids Club Lemonade Stand Earns \$1,000 to Donate to SoWashCo CARES

Lemonade stands are a summertime staple for kids. Not only do they get to have fun selling a refreshing drink on a hot day, but they also learn a number of valuable skills.

A group of big-hearted kids participating in South Washington County (SoWashCo) Community Education's summer Kids Club at Liberty Ridge Elementary School (LRES) built on those skills and also learned another very important one; how to give back to their community.

The kids shared their idea of having a lemonade stand with the Kids Club supervisors and said they wanted to donate any money they made to SoWashCo CARES Education Foundation, a community-led nonprofit that supports the SoWashCo Schools community.

"SoWashCo CARES is 'Our community helping our community!' This lemonade stand is the perfect example of that," gushed Cheryl Jogger, the founder of SoWashCo CARES.

"It was fun making a lot of money to give back to the community," said 9-year-old Aiden, who will be going into fourth grade at LRES this year.

"These kids are shining examples of what it takes to be amazing! It makes me so proud to see our students wanting to not only do a fun summer activity but to be so selfless and donate all of their earnings to a foundation that will, in turn, help their peers," said SoWashCo Schools' Superintendent Julie Nielsen.

The kids led the whole project from making signs and lemonade to setting everything up and selling cups of lemonade to community members.

"My favorite customers were the ones that donated \$20 to SoWashCo CARES," said 10-year-old Ibrahim who will be going into fifth grade at LRES.

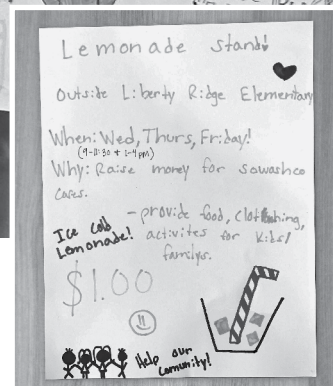
"My parents came and then I came once because I had the day off," said 8-year-old Mila who is going into third grade at Middleton Elementary School (MES).

Back to School

Immunizations and Physicals for the Upcoming School Year

The State of Minnesota requires all students enrolled in school to be protected from childhood diseases by receiving immunizations. This includes all students enrolled in PreK-12 schools and/or programs, Kids Club, preschool and alternative programs. Medical exemptions must be signed by a healthcare provider. Non-medical exemptions must be signed by a parent/guardian and notarized.

All students participating in middle school, high school and/or Minnesota State High School League (MSHSL) sports are required to have a physical exam on file that was performed within the last three years. SoWashCo Schools encourages all students to have periodic physical exams. It is recommended that students see their healthcare provider for physicals before entering kindergarten, grade 4, grade 7 and grade 10.

Age 3 Time to Screen

Early Childhood screening is recommended at age 3 and is a quick and simple check of how your child is growing, developing and learning. Screening can connect families to early learning opportunities and resources.

If your child has not yet been screened and is between the ages of 3 and 5, please call the Early Learning office to schedule an appointment at 651-425-6175 or visit sowashco.org/screening.

Early Childhood screening is required by the State of Minnesota for any child entering kindergarten in a public school and is provided free of charge.

NOTE: High school students will be informed during the first week of school of any supplies needed for class.

Submit an Educational Benefits Application Today!

Every South Washington County Schools (SoWashCo Schools) family is encouraged to submit an Educational Benefit application, formerly known as Free and Reduced Meals. **Families must submit a new application every year.**

Although school meals are now free under state law, Educational Benefits offer so much more to families such as reduced or free field trip fees, athletic and activity fees, school fees, device protection plans, instrument rentals, Community Education classes and more. **A completed application could also provide funding to your child's school, even if you don't qualify for the above benefits.**

Eagle Scout Grows Vegetables to Donate to Skoolie

Robert Denesen partnered with South Washington County (SoWashCo) Community Education to give away homegrown vegetables to community members at summer Skoolie events. Denesen, who will be entering 10th grade at Woodbury High School, was inspired by his church's slogan "Growing Goodness" to help community members who may be suffering from food insecurity. Last year, as his Eagle Scout project, he began planning and developing a vegetable garden with the intent to donate fresh produce. "Even if it's not a lot I want to help and inspire others to help," said Denesen.

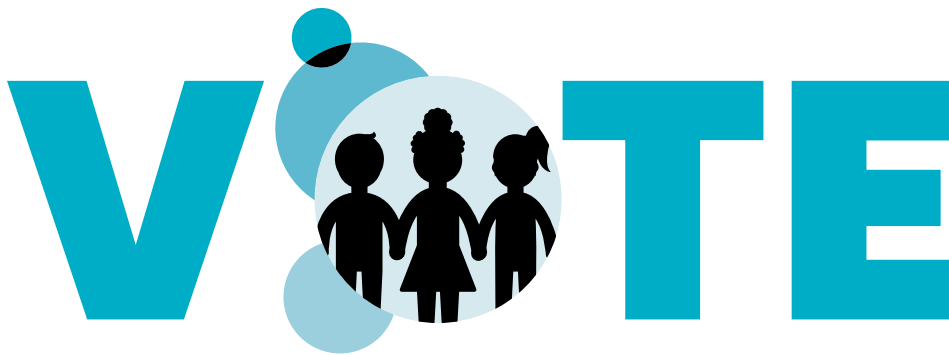
The project has taught Denesen important lessons in leadership and project management. He independently researched suppliers, created a timeline and organized a volunteer team to build, plant and maintain two raised garden beds. Denesen sold flowers, wreaths and popcorn to raise money to help fund the project. He also presented his plan to his troop committee



and district troop leader for approval, as well as seeking permission from The Grove Church in Woodbury to build the garden on their grounds.

Garden volunteers help water and harvest the vegetables, which include lettuce, bell peppers, tomatoes, green beans, cucumbers and zucchini. In July, the first harvest was ready and

Denesen began supplying vegetables to Skoolie on Monday evenings at Royal Oaks. When summer Skoolie events end, he plans to donate the remaining harvests to a local food shelf. Next year Denesen hopes to expand the project to grow even more goodness.

A Look at What's on the Ballot for SoWashCo Schools in November

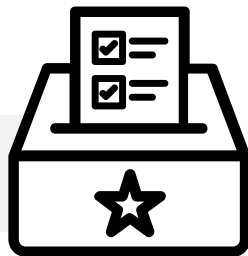
South Washington County Schools (SoWashCo Schools) is holding a special election on Nov. 7, 2023.

Taking staff and community feedback and input into consideration, the School Board in June approved a plan to present the district's new 5-year facility plan (Securing Our Future. Supporting Our Students.) to the community with two bond questions on the November ballot.

Pending School Board approval, a third request will ask the community to approve a Capital Projects Levy (Technology Projects Levy) to address safety and security relating to technology. At the time of this publication, the School Board had discussed the question during the July business meeting and August 3 workshop meeting. The School Board voted on whether or not to include a levy question on the ballot during the Aug. 17 business meeting. The Technology Projects Levy would ask voters to increase the current \$2.8 million levy to \$5 million.

If all three questions are approved by voters, it would result in a tax increase of about \$10 a month for families living in a median valued home (\$409,000) within the SoWashCo Schools boundary.

Three seats for the SoWashCo School Board are also up for election this fall. A candidate forum hosted by the League of Women Voters is set for 7-8:30 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 19 at the District Service Center, 7368 East Point Douglas Road S. in Cottage Grove. Bonds for Buildings

What is a bond election?

- A bond referendum gives voters the opportunity to authorized the district to raise construction funding through the sale of bonds.
- Bonds allow the district to borrow money that it then pays back over time.
- This is the only method to raise enough funds for new construction.

QUESTION 1

Safety and security enhancements and expansions and renovations at secondary schools. (\$160 million)

- Construct new secure entry at Park and Woodbury high schools, and Cottage Grove, Lake and Woodbury middle schools
- Planned addition at East Ridge High School and renovations at Park and Woodbury high schools
- Planned expansion of Oltman Middle School and renovations at Woodbury Middle School

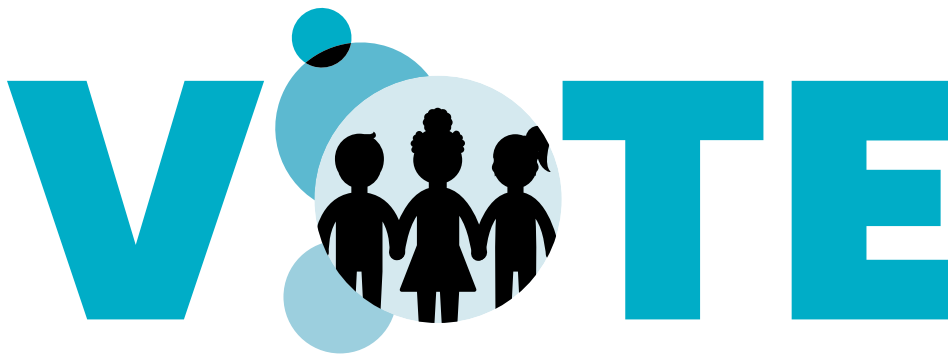
QUESTION 2

Addresses elementary school space at schools projected to exceed capacity; renovations for bathrooms at five elementary schools. (\$40 Million)

- Elementary school additions at Bailey, Grey Cloud, Pine Hill and Red Rock elementary schools
- Construction of additional bathrooms at schools only containing a single set/four stalls (Crestview, Hillside, Pine Hill, Pullman and Royal Oaks elementary schools)

The second bond question addressing elementary school space and bathroom renovations is contingent on the passage of Question 1, meaning Question 2 cannot pass without the approval of Question 1. If Question 2 fails, elementary school attendance boundary changes will be implemented for the 2024-25 school year.

Technology Projects Levy

As SoWashCo leaders connected with community members for feedback about the upcoming bond referendum, safety and security rose to the top of the list of priorities. The proposed Technology Projects Levy that may be on the ballot be on the ballot in November addresses safety and security relating to technology.

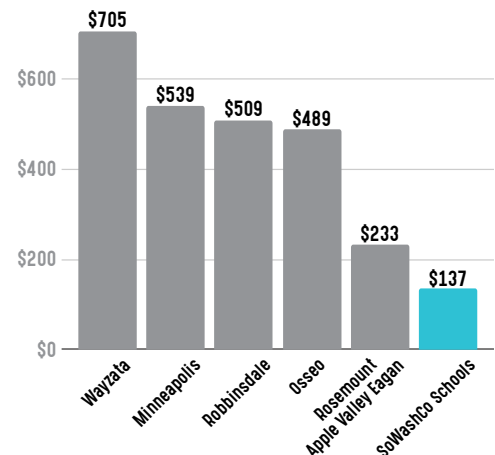
If approved, the Technology Projects Levy would:

- **Enhance Cybersecurity**
- **Maintain technology infrastructure** (wifi, server hardware, firewall hardware, data storage, email security, network equipment, etc.)
- **Upgrade security cameras**
- **Expand digital access** to curriculum and learning tools
- **Update educational and business** software licensing
- **Maintain the devices** distributed to students and staff during the pandemic with a refresh cycle to keep devices updated

If approved, the technology levy would have a tax impact of \$3 per month on a median valued home in the district.
