Before we officially moved to our brand-new purpose-built campus in the Baimahu area, hundreds of students, alumni, teachers, and family members showed up to the old Dongxin campus to bid farewell to our wonderful home of twenty years. There were many tears and strong emotions felt that day, yet within just a few hours and in the days to come, the sadness was replaced by shrieks of joy and sighs of pure awe as families were welcomed to explore the spaces within our beautiful new school. While we intentionally brought young bamboo trees, plants, and sculptures from our old campus to our new campus to keep our stories connected (even buried our ceramic 'earth' sculpture into the foundation) ... 2023 ACAMIS Soccer Championships

Congratulations to our Girls Soccer Team who were crowned 2023 Gold Division Champions in Dalian, finishing their tournament undefeated and capping off a fantastic season which saw them win 11 of their 12 matches. In their Championship Match versus International School of Nansha Shenzhen (ISNS), the girls took an early lead and dominated possession in the first half but could not capitalize by scoring a few more goals. Conceding a goal early in the second half put the pressure on but the girls responded as all good teams should, continuing to execute their game plan well, resulting in 3 second-half goals to run away as convincing 4-1 winners.

The girls' roster of 12 players is very versatile, with players who are regularly called upon to play in multiple positions and execute various tactical roles from game to game. This was highlighted throughout the tournament with all 12 players taking the field in all 6 matches, 10 of the 12 players scoring goals, 3 players rotating on as Goalkeepers during the 6 matches, and 4 different players scoring each of the 4 goals in the Championship Match. Our teams bid farewell to Yuki Chan, our only senior player, in style. Yuki was our Captain on the final day and was given a triumphant and emotional send-off by her team of young up-and-coming football stars. The team includes several students still in middle school with many years of improvement ahead of them and high expectations for continued success. Coach Nogueira and Coach Edwards are incredibly proud of the way this young team has represented themselves and our school throughout the season. A special mention to Angel Li (G8), Yolcy Zhang (G9), and Jiyu Kim (G6) who were nominated in the All-Tournament Team.

A big thank you to our travelling parents who were super supportive on the sidelines and made sure the Dragon Cheer Squad was heard by all. HIS as always has the most parent support, despite the tournament being so far away!

2023 ACAMIS Badminton Championships

HIS sent 2 teams comprising of 16 student-athletes from Grades 8-11 to the ACAMIS Badminton Championships hosted by Shekou International School in Shenzhen. It was super-exciting for our team to join this event with 13 of the group going to their first ACAMIS event ever.







Despite some travel delays and a very late arrival, the students were ready to go on Day I of this 3-day event which tests Badminton ability and overall physical conditioning. Over 20 international schools from throughout China were competing and our students had a great time not only on the court, but also away from the tournament play, meeting and making friends from across the country – something which we emphasize to all our student-athletes as a highlight of these types of trips.



This event is physically grueling and the coaches have certainly identified a significant need to improve the team's physical conditioning in preparation for future events. Results were mixed, with our 8th place finishes in the Girls Doubles (Raina & Vinisha), Vicky with an 8th place in Girls Singles, and 8th place also in the Mixed Doubles (Peter & Lucia).


as mythology, escapism, feminism, psychology, and mortality.

Environmental Systems and Societies Field Trip

IBDP Grade 11 ESS students visited the Qiandaohu eco-village, a permaculture school that teaches local farmers how to use nature to design and maintain sustainable agricultural ecosystems.



The students learned about the use of soil and plants to recycle and filter water, how to build houses with soil, and the practice of intercropping. They also interviewed the people who live in the eco-village to learn about their motivations for choosing a simple life and giving back to nature.



The students were able to apply the field data collection methods they learned in class, and they said the trip was "incredibly insightful and interesting." They were impressed by the beauty of the natural environment and the people's commitment to sustainability.

The insight of a student summarizes very well the value of the experience, and why these opportunities are important for their learning experience: "The people there were friendly and happy to explain the joy they find in simple living and crop growth.



They offered comparisons between the pressures of urban life and the more basic lifestyles seen in the eco-village. Overall, the trip was an eye-opening experience that allowed for the exploration and development of crucial ESS field study techniques."





Students' Thoughts of Their Time in MS Science Class

In Science this Semester, the Grade 6s studied forces in "Electrostatics" and "Cells to Organisms". They learnt how to

charge objects by friction and now understand basic cell structures and can successfully compare prokaryotes to eukaryotes. They enjoyed building playdoh models, investigating organelles using simulations and presenting their research on serious bacterial diseases. The students all



learnt how to safely use a microscope, prepared wet mounts, and measured actual cell sizes.



In their "Space Systems" unit, students learnt about our Solar System, enjoyed simulations, and built models displaying the distances between planets and their scales. They even designed their own space aliens!

The Grade 8s studied "Electricity", designing, and presenting their own sustainable light display models for West Lake, after learning about the different components of an electrical circuit. Students understand the benefits of series and parallel circuits and



the need for renewable energy sources.



In their final unit on "Nutrition", the Grade 8s learnt about the value of nutritious foods; studied various macromolecules; and researched the benefits of incorporating insects into our diets. Students also gained a greater understanding of photosynthesis and cellular respiration, after conducting lab investigations.



Here are some thoughts and reflections from the students:

Science has always been fascinating for me, all the amazing experiments done throughout the year, analyzing various results, and using critical thinking and creative thinking skills to communicate the answers to questions we composed during class, much more. During this semester, we learnt how to operate microscopes and looked at bacteria in water samples, analyzed different sights we see, and learnt to put together our own slides. -Yu-Han (Allie) Chiu (Gr 6)

This year in Science I really enjoyed the microscope labs that we did. I was really thrilled to see dead objects under the microscope since it was my firsttime seeing things under the microscope. I think I learned how to use the microscope like how to hold it and how to use it. Next time I want to try looking at animals that are alive. - Seo-In Hong (Gr 6)

In science class, we get to do a lot of fun activities revolving around science. We learn lots of things in science while having lots of fun. -Alex Hardy (Gr 6)

In science class this year, I really enjoyed all the labs. Especially the lab when the yeast exploded on Zilin's shirt. Other works such as the digestive insects and sustainable cities project were very hard, but we learned a lot from it. Looking at the different cities and how science can be included when trying to make the world a better place. Overall, I think science class is the class where we can learn a lot of interesting new information and at the same time have fun and relax. 



As of this year, the Aspiration Project has completed its collection of educational equipment, and the supplies have been delivered to a rural elementary school. We all know that a single initiative is not enough to solve educational scarcity. Yet, the above truth does nothing to quench our commitment to promoting education. We hope that our efforts can help illuminate students' paths toward the future in the same way that a group of fireflies would illuminate a dark night.

Ms. Maria Alejandra, a passionate parent of two students at HIS, was instrumental in planning the process of the audit and ensuring it ran smoothly and successfully.

Waste from each classroom, floor and wing of the school was collected with labeled trash bags to prioritize determining which area of the school was producing which category of waste. The GIN Club also wanted to find out if the recycling bins were being used appropriately and if the sorting of garbage was successful.

With the data collected the GIN club wishes to suggest and hopefully implement plans for improving the recycling and waste management goals of the school, helping HIS become a greener and a more environmentally friendly school.

This project will enable the GIN Club to launch new projects branching off the audit results obtained. In the future, the audit observations can extend into new ideas for Community and Personal Projects in the MYP, and into Extended Essays and Environmental Systems and Societies studies in the DP.

HIS SOLID WASTE AUDIT **IN A FEW NUMBERS**

More than 30 participants...

Among parents, students and school staff that helped the GIN Club and HIS achive a successful solid waste audit on June 13th, 2023.

Project sponsored by Andrea Stubbs with special collaboration from Christine Shi, Albert Zhou and Ivy Ma





254 Kg of waste audited...

Or 75 big trash bags opened and sorted in 9 different categories. Projection is 44.3 tons of waste / school year

105 Kg of organic waste...

Produced at the cafeterias in one day of school. We systematically generate 2.5 times more organic waste after lunch compared to the scrap peelings produced in the preparation of our food.





Less than 300 g. per day...

compared to the 22 Kg produced daily. This is a very low adherence to our recycling plan that will need to improve.

54% of HIS waste ...

Ends up in landfills or incinerators and includes:

- 6.5 tons/year of organic waste not managed as the cafeteria's organic waste (1/4 of the total)
- 2.5 tons of recyclable paper...



The 6 Rs for waste management are ...

REFUSE to have the waste, REDUCE, REUSE, REPURPOSE, RECYCLE and ROT & compost. We all have to take action to improve how we handle our waste.
