Themes of the Governor's 2023-24 Budget Proposals

- Governor Gavin Newsom released his proposal for the 2023-24 State Budget today, January 10 that focuses on addressing five essential threats:
- California seems to have turned the page in State Budget development: from COVID-19 pandemic budgeting since May 2020 to more business as usual
 - Unfortunately, business as usual comes with a softening economy
 - Fortunately, California is better prepared to weather the proverbial storm due to investments made and reserves built up during the good years
- The Governor's Budget is focused on maintaining programs where possible while trimming others
 - As the COVID-19 crisis recedes, other crises receive more attention homelessness, housing, and extreme weather
 - All of which affect our students and educators

Proposition 98 and the Education Budget

- Proposition 98 resources grow leaner in the Governor's Budget, as do the proposed investments for K-12 schools and community colleges
 - Maintaining the purchasing power of the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) takes center stage with the cost-of-living adjustment (COLA)
 - Governor Newsom remains committed to key priorities in transitional kindergarten (TK) and expanded learning
 - The budget furthers educational equity to address persistent learning and achievement gaps
 - Governor Newsom surprises K-12 with a "sweep" of funding for the Arts, Music and Instructional Materials Block Grant

Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), COLA, and ADA

- The Governor's Budget proposal includes an estimated statutory cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) of 8.13% for the LCFF—an increase of 2.75% from the projected COLA of 5.38% that was part of the 2022 Enacted State Budget.
- WPUSD COLA funding increase in LCFF Base Funds = \$2.1M
 - Funding may be effected by attendance percentage (ADA) rate changes
 - Budgeted ADA Rates (at 2022/23 1st Interim)
 - 2022/23 94.0% (P-1 December 2022 92% ADA rate)
 - 2023/24 94.5%
 - 2024/25 95.0%

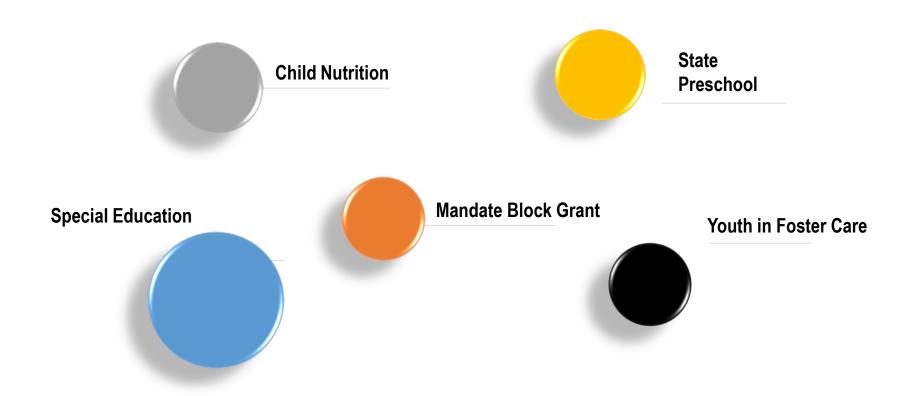

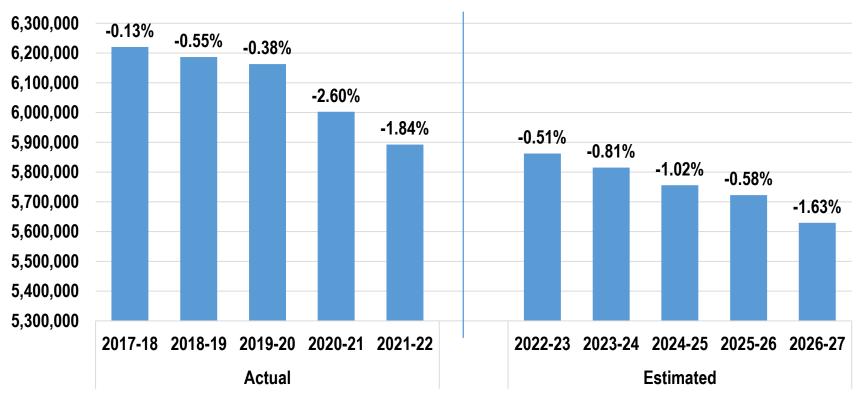
Categorical Program COLA

The Governor's Budget includes an additional \$669 million in Proposition 98 funding for a 8.13% COLA for multiple programs outside of the LCFF

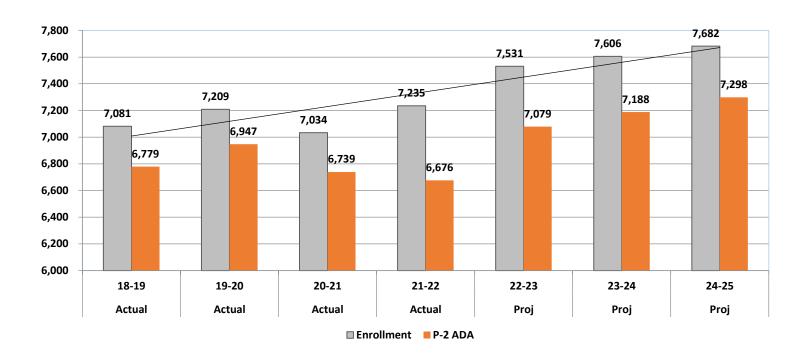


Statewide Enrollment Trends—Ongoing Enrollment Loss

WPUSD projecting a 1% increase in enrollment for 2023/24 (94.5% ADA rate) and 2024/25 (95.0% ADA rate)

CalPERS Employer Contribution Rates

- Governor Newsom did not propose providing California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) relief for LEAs
- Based on the latest information from CalPERS, the employer contribution rate for 2023-24 would increase from the current rate of 25.37% to 27.00%

¹Projected rates reflect an investment loss for 2021-22 based on preliminary investment returns, as well as an anticipated decrease in normal cost due to new hires entering lower cost benefit tiers

CalSTRS Employer Contribution Rates

- Similar to the CalPERS, the Governor does not include any new funding towards California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS) relief for LEAs
- CalSTRS projects an employer contribution rate of 19.10% for the next several years

Mandate Block Grant

- All school districts, charter schools, and COEs are eligible to participate in the Mandate Block Grant (MBG), notwithstanding the applicability of state mandates on their operations
- The 8.13% statutory COLA will be applied to the MBG, therefore, the 2023-24 rates are as follows:

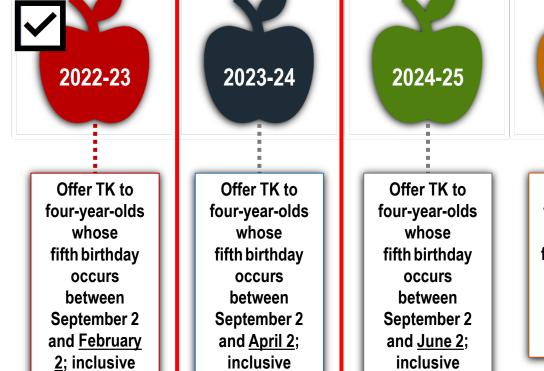
Arts, Music, and Instructional Material Block Grant—Proposed 2022/23 Funding Reduction

The Governor's Budget proposes a \$1.2 billion reduction in the \$3.5 billion one-time funding provided in the 2022-23 Enacted Budget package, bringing the appropriation down to \$2.3 billion

Original funding allocation for WPUSD = \$4.1M

Estimated Reduction in 2022/23 Funding to WPUSD = \$1.5M

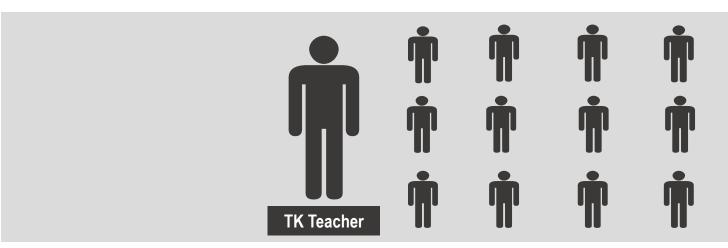
Universal Transitional Kindergarten Implementation



- 2025-26 Offer TK to four-year-olds whose fourth birthday occurs by September 1; inclusive
- The Governor continues to prioritize implementation of universal transitional kindergarten (UTK)
- The Governor's Budget provides an additional investment of \$690 million ongoing General Fund to implement second year of UTK expansion

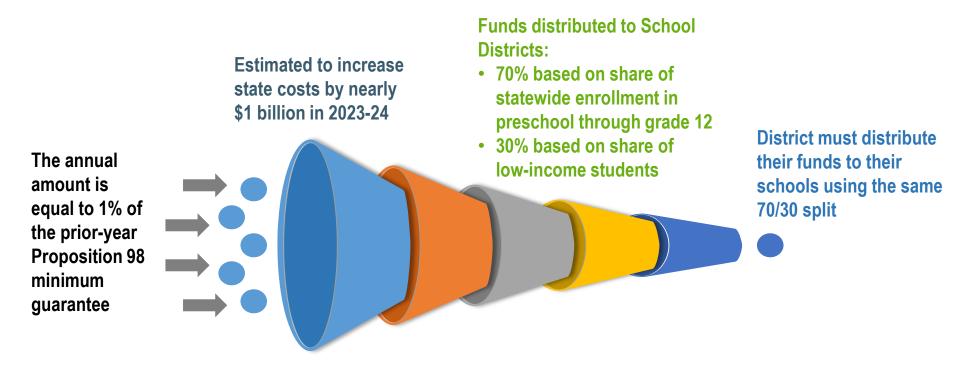
Universal TK Ratios

- Effective 2022-23, law requires a maximum of 12 students per adult
 - Investment of \$165 million ongoing Proposition 98 funds to maintain required 12:1 TK ratio for the expanded population of TK students in 2023-24
- Statute includes a provision for a 10:1 ratio starting in 2023-24, but this is subject to funding specifically for his purpose, and Governor's Budget does not include funding to further reduce the ratio



Proposition 28: Arts and Music in Schools—Funding Guarantee and Accountability Act

Beginning with the 2023-24 fiscal year, requires the state to provide additional, dedicated funding originating outside of Proposition 98 for arts and music education



Proposition 28—Program Requirements

Districts must annually:

Certify funds used to provide arts education, including a requirement to expend at least 80% of funds to employ staff for arts education instruction

- LEAs with less than 500 students are exempt from this requirement
- CDE may provide a waiver for "good cause shown" upon written request by the school principal
- Waiting for more information about this waiver process

Certify funds received are to supplement, not supplant, existing arts education programs Certify that no more than 1% of funds will be used for administrative expenses

Submit local governing boardapproved report that details:

- Type of arts education programs funded
- Number of staff
- Number of students served
- Number of schools providing arts education programs with the funds

In addition, principal of each school must develop an expenditure plan

Expanded Learning Opportunities Program

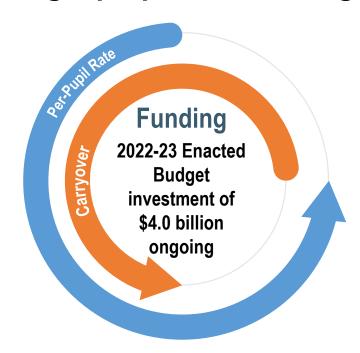
The Governor's Budget proposes no changes to the program



Per-Pupil Rate

 UPP < 75%: \$2,052 in 2022-23, but this amount will fluctuate each year depending on the amount that goes to high UPP LEAs

UPP ≥ 75%: \$2,750,
 set in statute





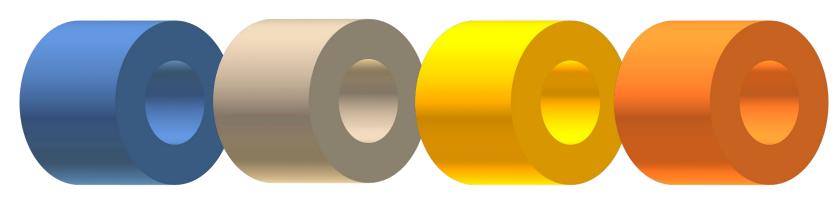
Carryover

Explicitly allowed in statute as LEAs work to implement the program

- Funds received in 2021-22 may be carried over to 2022-23 (must be spent by 6/30/23)
- Funds received in 2022-23 may be carried over to 2023-24

Home-to-School Transportation - Funding and Annual Transportation Service Plan

<u>Annual Transportation Service Plan</u>



Include priority for planned services for students in grades TK-6 and low-income students

Describe how transportation will be accessible to students with disabilities and homeless youth Describe how unduplicated students may access free transportation

Develop in consultation with staff, regional transit authorities, local air pollution control districts, air quality management districts, parents, and students

- Plan is required only for LEAs seeking reimbursement
- Adopted by governing board by April 1, 2023, in an open meeting with opportunity for in-person and remote public comment
- Updated annually

Child Nutrition Program

- The budget proposes:
 - \$596 million Proposition 98 General Fund to continue support of universal access to subsidized school meals
 - \$450 million one-time Proposition 98 General Fund, over three years, to update school kitchen infrastructure and equipment
 - \$3 million one-time Proposition 98 General Fund to support the School Breakfast and Summer Meal Start-Up and Expansion Grant Program.
 - Set-aside \$15 million of the \$600 million one-time Proposition 98
 General Fund to specifically support acquisition and installation of
 commercial dishwashers.

Additional Categorical Funding – New Proposals

12th Grade Cultural Enrichment



\$100 million

One-time Proposition 98 funds to provide 12th grade students opportunities to visit museums, attend theater performances, or participate in enrichment activities

Opioid Overdose Reversal



\$3.5 million

Ongoing Proposition 98 funding for middle and high school sites to maintain medication to reverse opioid overdose

Federal Funding

- Just prior to the new year, Congress approved, and President signed, the "Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023," which provides federal funding through September 30, 2023
 - Includes \$79.6 billion in discretionary appropriations for education, an increase of \$3.2 billion over 2022 levels
 - Of those funds, K-12 education programs will receive \$45 billion, an increase of \$2.4 billion over 2022 levels, including:
- \$18.4 billion for Title I
- \$890 million for English language acquisition
- \$1.4 billion for Student Support and Academic Enrichment

- \$1.6 billion for ImpactAid
- \$300 million for "whole child" approaches
- \$1.3 billion for 21st
 Century Community
 Learning Centers

- \$129 million for Magnet Schools Assistance
- \$23 million for American History and Civics
- \$129 million for Education for Homeless Children and Youth

- \$1.4 billion for career technical education (CTE)
- \$32 million for CTE

 Modernization Grants
- \$729 million for Adult Education State Grants

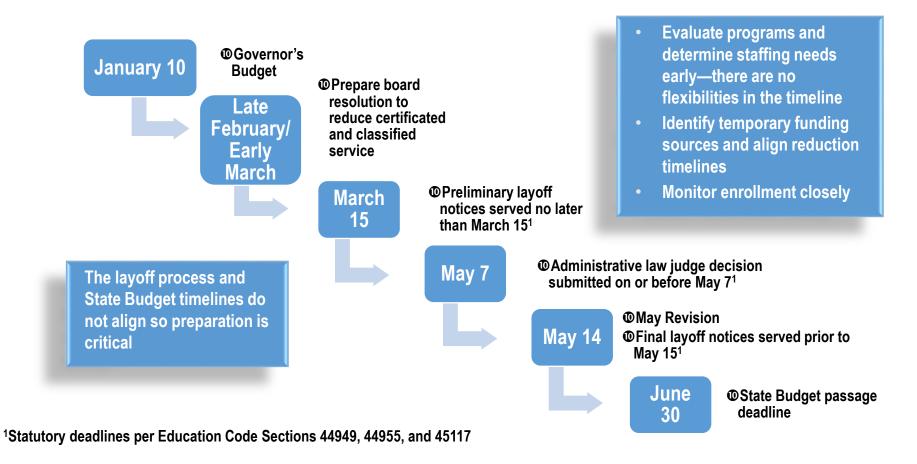
School Facility Investments

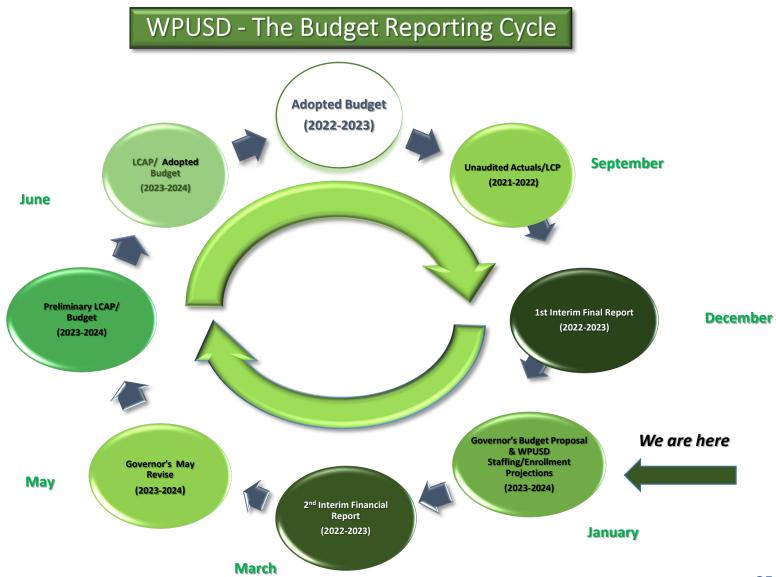
 The Governor's Budget makes changes to planned investments in school facilities, reducing some investments and delaying others

FDK Program ¹	Delays a planned \$500 million one-time General Fund investment from 2023-24 to 2024-25
School Facility Program	Reduces a planned \$2.1 billion one-time General Fund investment by \$100 million
Charter School Facility Grant Program (Senate Bill [SB] 740)	Maintains 2022-23 Enacted Budget commitment to provide \$30 million ongoing Proposition 98 funding
School Kitchen Infrastructure	Sets aside \$15 million of the 2022-23 Enacted Budget's one-time General Fund investment for commercial dishwasher

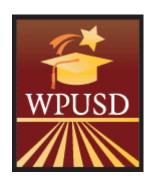
