HPL: Helping students become 'Life Ready'

Since 2019, the College has adopted an approach to teaching called High Performance Learning (HPL) and in July 2021, after a rigorous accreditation process, became a member of the Fellowship of World Class Schools.

This places Ellesmere at the heart of an international network of ambitious and innovative schools and ensures that teachers can liaise with colleagues around the globe through a network of online Teachmeets. Last summer, six of our students addressed the annual HPL conference at the University of Warwick and we have been invited to this year's conference as guest speakers once more.

HPL itself is a straightforward approach and is founded on the belief that all students can do better if they are given the chance to become more empathetic, hard-working and mentally agile. If opportunities to develop empathy, hardwork and agility - known as Values, Attributes and Attitudes - are offered in a systematic, coherent manner from Lower School to the Sixth Form, then all students will benefit as they become more resilient, better suited to thinking on their feet and better equipped to work in a team whether that be within or without the classroom; after all, hard work and agility are as important on the playing field as they are in the classroom. Alongside giving students the chance to have a more positive outlook, HPL also focusses on systematically developing skills that are central to academic success such as analysis, linking, meta-thinking and creativity. When these skills - labelled by academic researchers as Advanced Cognitive Performance Characteristics - are taught explicitly across the College, then students can begin to see patterns in their learning and apply skills learnt in one area when confronted by a challenge in another. Thus, the approach to teaching encouraged by HPL helps students become better equipped to deal with life's challenges.

Being part of the Fellowship of World Class Schools requires self-reflection and the accreditation process served to highlight just how many opportunities were already in place to develop agility, hard-work and empathy. Duke of Edinburgh, CCF, English Speaking Board, Arts Award, the extensive sporting provision, Model United Nations to name but a few, give Ellesmerians so many ways of developing a positive approach. Few students emerge from expos without a tale or two of thinking on their feet and overcoming adversity!



What HPL has done though, is place these opportunities in a framework to ensure that all students across the College have the chance to challenge and push themselves.

Over the past two and a half years, a lot has changed in our classrooms but the HPL approach to teaching meant that the resilience and hard work that remote learning demands were already central to departments' planning. With the return to in-person lessons, so the impact of HPL can be seen across the campus. Displays remind students of the HPL terminology, lessons are tailored to develop analysis and foster creativity and weekly HPL prize-draws, as pioneered by the Economics Department, are held to recognise specific examples of HPL success. Certificates are awarded in assemblies too and members of Common Room meet in HPL Cluster Groups that see teachers from many different departments coming together to share ideas and plan activities. In lessons, the creativity that HPL encourages manifests itself in all manner of ways with students often taking the chance to respond to seemingly dry academic content in wonderfully diverse ways.

All told, HPL is a simple, sensible and powerful approach that will equip our students for success so that when they leave Ellesmere for their bright futures they are 'life ready'.

UK Maths Challenge

The UKMT Maths Challenges are a series of fun mathematical competitions that are set up by the UK Maths Trust. The organisation was founded in 1996 with the aim of advancing the education of young people in Mathematics.

There are three main solo challenges that College students participate in, these attract over 700,00 entrants each year;

- The Senior Maths Challenge is for students in Year 12 and takes place in November
- The Intermediate Maths Challenge is for students in Years 10 and 11 (and sometimes some Year 9) and takes place in February
- The Junior Maths Challenge is for students in Years 7 and 8 and takes place in April

Since the Pandemic began in 2020, the challenges have been held online but are carried out in the same way with students being allowed only some plain paper and a pen with no measuring implements permitted.

In November, 30 of our esteemed Year 12 students sat the paper with 15 students achieving Bronze Silver or Gold:

Leadership

Leadership and Management Qualification



In 2018 we introduced the ILM Level 3 in Leadership and Management, an internationally recognised qualification for line managers, team leaders and supervisors which offers the perfect development opportunity for aspiring team leaders in whatever context they will be operating.

An ILM level 3 in Leadership and Management is unit-based and, at Ellesmere, we have produced a bespoke scheme that suits our particular cohort, with the focus being on establishing effective teams, looking at leadership theory and using this in practice, and on leading and motivating a team effectively. Students produce ten short written assignments based on their understanding of leadership theory and their practical application of it.

A key part of the course is taking advice and guidance from more senior leaders and applying it to their own situations, as well as reflecting on their competencies and ways to further develop. Generally, we take students who are NCOs in the CCF, sports coaches and leaders and Scouts / Girl Guiding leaders, but are open to those youngsters working in any level of responsibility for leading others.

We have designed the course as part of the activities programme, with sessions delivered across two Thursday afternoons, split between sessions (CCF etc) where they are using the skills learned and then reflecting on them. Support is available from Mr Garratt who delivers the taught element of the course and guides completion, though students do generally complete the process with impressive levels of independence.

Now in its fourth year, this innovative course has enabled over 50 students to gain a range of key management skills that can be put into practice, build leadership capabilities and bring out leadership potential, which may be of benefit in College roles such as stepping forward to be a Prefect or a sports team captain. It also strengthens employment applications, supports and enhances UCAS and other course applications, professional development and career progression, and increases self-confidence. The course results in official accreditation which is useful across a range of employment, career and educational settings.

We are proud of our commitment to provide a wealth of opportunities for students, both inside and outside the classroom. This provides another option for students to add to their accomplishments, as part of the extra suite of co-curricular offerings we have at the College.

Golf Academy in top 5 ISGA ranking



A team of our young esteemed golfers have put on a great performance to reach the area final of a national ISGA matchplay competition.

The team, part of the school's successful Golfing Academy, will now play in the final in January and, if successful there, will move on to take on some of the country's top young golfers in the national finals in April.

Ellesmere College is ranked fifth as a team nationally and have two players who recently finished in the top five in the ISGA Team Championships - Charlie Ashbrook, 17, ranked 5th individual gross, and Marcus Wildblood, 16, who is fourth individual nett.

The team, Charlie, Jonjo and Marcus, recently beat Birkenhead and Kirkham to reach the area final of the Independent Schools Golf Association (ISGA) Matchplay Tournament, a knockout competition which is split into 20 UK areas. Three students make up each team under a scratch matchplay format.

The ISGA was formed in 2006 and runs a series of events each year involving independent schools across the UK.

Tennis Academy players leading the way

Tennis is stronger than ever at Ellesmere College thanks to a pool of growing talent, a blossoming reputation and state-of-the-art facilities. We have an increasing number of high level players and are putting on more tournaments than ever before.

The Tennis Academy showcases players on a national level, many of whom are aiming for World Ranking and becoming professional players after they finish their studies. In recent competitions nine students were crowned winners in their categories, as well as the Year 7 to 8 Boys and Girls teams' reaching the Regional Final of the National Schools' Competition, just one step away from the National Final:

- Sofie Glinos became the under 12 singles champion in Herefordshire
- Tom Parr is the under 14 singles champion in Shropshire, as well as being named Shropshire improver of the year.
- Jemimah Choi was crowned the under 16 and ladies singles champion and under 18 and ladies double champion in Wales.
- Emily Males and Skye Thomas became the under 11 singles champions in Shropshire and Cheshire respectively.
- Guy Welti became the under 16 doubles champion in Shropshire
- Alfie Edwards became the under 11 champion and under 12 champion for singles and doubles in Shropshire.
- Aditi Chezhian was named the under 18 and ladies doubles champion in Wales.

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- Owen Critchell and Jemimah Choi became the under 18 mixed doubles champions in Wales.
- Jacob Popplewell won the Cheshire U16 Doubles.

Stephen Welti, Director of Tennis, said, "This year we have seen an increase in the number of people playing at a much higher level. Rather than one or two outstanding players, we have got a whole squad of them. It is better than we have ever had and it is fantastic to watch. As a developing sport in the school we have just climbed a big step and many students are showing incredible dedication, improvement and talent in their tennis."

Students are selected for scholarships through entry procedures organised in their own countries by nationally accredited agencies and interviews conducted in English in national capitals by members of the HMC Projects. Selection is based on results in the entry tests, a strong academic record and good references from the students' own schools, proficiency in written and spoken English and performance at interview. An important criterion is the evident readiness of the student to adapt to different country and to contribute through his or her own interests and enthusiasm to the life of the British school.

Ever since Middle School I have admired the UK educational system because of its rigour and high teaching standards, so, when a friend of mine from high school told me about the opportunity to apply for a scholarship to do my Sixth Form years here, I immediately jumped at the opportunity.

Lizzie Martin - Meynell 2019



After leaving Ellesmere College Sixth Form in 2019, I was invited to work for Jenny Sterlin, Actress and Creative Director of DoubleDeckerProductions, in New York City. Living in America for the first time and mixing with a current artistic circle was an unforgettable experience. The purpose for my trip abroad was to help Turlough McConell's production of 'Eugene O'Neill: An Irish American Boyhood' come to fruition for the Origin 1st Irish Theatre Festival, held across the many islands of the state. The opportunities offered to me during my time in the States are ones I shall not forget quickly, and I hope to build upon relationships forged there after my degree at university.

In early 2020, there had been publicity for a new, contemporary drama to be performed at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe that summer. The play was to portray the ordeal of a young woman, attempting to write a play with her estranged childhood friend. Her strait-laced, pragmatic creative approach clashed with that of her friend Sean's 'holistic', psychedelic nature to the point of drastic action and conflict. This production was created for more mature audiences. Not only would this production take place in the world's largest art festival - the springboard for careers like that of Alan Rickman, Rowan Atkinson, and more recently Ella Hickson, but this show would take place in-person for a live audience. The thought of such an opportunity after lockdown's creative drought was enough to encourage me to pursue it, regardless of the festival's daunting prominence. After a month-long process of auditions and call-backs, executive producer Lewis Forman called to inform me that I had been selected for the main role of 'Lemon'. one in a cast of 5.

Rehearsals in a time of a pandemic meant an entirely different process than previously experienced: sessions of spontaneous, synergetic physicality, in 2020, were replaced with more structured, director-led days of distanced runthroughs. Still the play was created, the characters formed from the pages of the script, fleshed out from countless hours of internal searching and company-led exercises. It could well be a mystery for those not involved, as to how those rehearsals mutated into the final, fully developed show, yet everyone included in the production team will be aware of the time put in by the producers, stage managers, tech assistants, costume manager and more, that made it possible.

The result was not what we had anticipated. We knew we had a 50-minute play that included an rendition of 'that' dance from Pulp Fiction, a hypothetical, half-written script with sections out of a gangster movie, and the increasingly complicated, plutonic relationship between a young man and woman; but we did not know that each night we would play to a full house, receive 5 star reviews, and for myself to be shortlisted for an award (Best Individual Performance) on my debut is something I will never forget.

My performance of the role of Lemon lead me to be scouted for a principle role in Bedlam Theatre's 'Rose of Eyam', adapted and directed by Benji Sumrie. Show dates are 18th, 19th, 20th February at St. Augustine's Church, Edinburgh.

Claudia Hastings – Woodard 2021



We are delighted for Claudia Hasting who has recently signed a formal 'National Letter of Intent' (NLI) to attend Limestone University in South Carolina on a 4-year golf scholarship with the 'Saints':

It was quite daunting at first looking at Universities in America and I had calls with several University coaches to hear more about their golf programme and the facilities on offer and I worked with a specialist golf scholarship consultant who has experience in the American college sports system and a network of contacts to help find me the right fit. They guided me through the registration with the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).

The college system in the US is very structured with access to world class resources, elite facilities and respected coaches. This makes it an enormously beneficial pathway for aspiring athletes and elite amateur golfers from all over the world to compete for golf scholarships. I enjoyed an extensive junior golf career, achieving top 3 finishes in over 12 Junior Opens and claimed victory at 3 including the best gross score at Wallasey Golf Club in 2020. I won the Lancashire Girls Millennium trophy 2 years running and I was the winner of the 'Champion of champions' Junior Invitational at Lytham Green Drive Golf Club in 2019. In 2020 I qualified at Telford Golf Club to play in the Champions Week Final of the Junior European Open held at Alcaidesa golf club in Spain - which took place in November 2021 due to Covid-19. It was an amazing experience making the cut and finishing in 9th place. The tournament was televised on Sky Sports Golf and I got to meet Nick Dougherty at the presentation dinner.

I now play for the Lancashire County women's 'A' team and I am part of the ladies' scratch team at my home club, Royal Birkdale, helping them win the Lancashire interclub scratch trophy in 2020 at Royal Lytham Golf Club. In 2021 I won the Royal Birkdale Ladies Centenary Salver with the best gross of I over par. I finished 4th at the Faldo series in Wales, playing 3 rounds at Ruddlan Golf Club.... finished in the top 10 at the Comboy Scratch Trophy at Delamere Golf Club and finished T25 at the Irish Ladies Strokeplay Championships in Baltray with scores of 77 75 79.

I feel very privileged to have attended Ellesmere. The school's extensive sports facilities are exceptional and the performance programme at the Golf Academy gave me the opportunity to practice regularly and develop my game whilst undertaking my academic studies. Even during lockdown, I was able to practice every day and make use of the 9-hole golf course and the indoor swing room if bad weather. The gym was also a bonus as I built up my fitness with a strength and conditioning programme designed and supervised by one of the fitness coaches. As a team we played competitively in the ISGA at a number of different courses around the country competing against other schools. I had huge support from my teachers, who were always very helpful especially, if coursework deadlines clashed with any golf commitments.

I am so excited to have this opportunity to spend the next 4 years in the States which will provide me with the greatest opportunity to take my game to the next level. I will be coached by the Women's Head Coach Trey Taylor, in-between studying for a degree in Sports Management.

I'm sure I will miss the UK and my coaching sessions with PGA Professional Tim Hastings (Dad), who's played an important role in my development.

This summer I will be competing in England, Scotland, Ireland & Wales at the Women's Amateur Championships before heading off to America in August.

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
