

Since joining Ellesmere in Lower School I have involved myself in the wide range of activities that the College has to offer, ranging from acting in school plays to joining the CCF in Year 9. My highlights, however, have to be competing with the school orchestra and choir in several competitions, even getting to perform at the Notre Dame and playing for the 1st Hockey team since Year 11. Playing hockey at Ellesmere gave me the opportunity to represent my county for the last five years, which has been a great experience.

I am studying Biology, Chemistry and History at A Level and am hoping to pursue Medicine at university next year.

During my tenure as Head Girl I intend to help and support our students through this very strange time, this is a year like no other and I would like to play my part in bringing everyone together in true Ellesmerian spirit.

#### Academic

#### **Examination Results**

The summer of 2020 was a stressful time for all students expecting examination results. All exams were cancelled nationwide due to the closure of schools with teaching staff using a set of criteria to set suggested grades for each student. The grades were then processed through an algorithm set by the government and grades set from this. Upon the release of the A Level results it was apparent that the system was unfair and illogical and didn't reflect the students' capabilities accurately.



The government decided fairly quickly that the grades would be replaced by those that teachers had suggested but during the time this took, some students had already lost their places at first choice universities. However, the reversal of grades was very much welcomed and students once again celebrated an excellent year of results.

The 2020 Ellesmere International Baccalaureate (IB) results saw 100% pass rate with 57% achieving 30 or more points. The pass level to gain the full diploma is 24 points, with an award over 30 points being equivalent of A\*AA grades at A Level.

The BTEC group of six students, who opted to complete the Extended Diploma - equal to 3 A Levels – also achieved a 100% pass rate. Over 50% of grades achieved were at Distinction star or Distinction with one student attaining the highest mark possible, three Distinction Stars. The average outcome for the BTEC Extended Diploma by Ellesmere students is equivalent to ABB at A level.

The A level results were equally impressive with 100% pass rate and routes secured to university by those who chose it. A number of students secured impressive A\*/A in all subjects and destinations include Music at Cambridge (Homerton College), Medicine at Birmingham, Chemistry at Birmingham, Classics at Durham, Law at Cardiff, Mathematics at Imperial College London and Bath, Music at the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama, Physiotherapy at Liverpool, Philosophy at Newcastle, and Product Design Engineering at Nottingham University.

GCSE results saw a 94% pass rate with 46% of grades in the top 9-7 range (A\*/A). There were some particularly impressive performances in the 9/8 (A\*/A) band.

#### Cambridge University place is music to Amber's ears



Recent Year 13 Leaver, Amber Coxill, has won a place at Cambridge University to pursue her dream of a career in Music. Amber's dream of studying at Cambridge was briefly put on hold, however, after the recent A Level controversy saw her results marked down and her Cambridge place rejected a situation which was resolved after an anxious seven day wait.

"I'm so happy to be going to Cambridge, it's been my dream for a long time. I visited the university on a trip when I was in Year 10 and ever since I've been desperate to go, I'm over the moon," she said. "There was a concern over my A Level results but I finally got the correct CAG grades and was accepted into Homerton College - it was a horrible time but I'm glad it all got sorted out."

Over the summer Amber also celebrated winning third place in the National Flash Fiction Youth Competition organised by the University of Chester with her composition 'Thursday' - an emotive story about a couple's life journey after their chance meeting in a cafe.

Ellesmere College featured strongly in this year's competition with two students being Highly Commended - Leo Buckle, Year 12, for his composition 'Shopping' and Alixandra Heasmer-Jones, Year 11, for her story 'The Games'.

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## High Performance Learning – The English department gets in touch with the future

For the past eighteen months, Ellesmere College has followed an exciting, evidence-based approach to teaching called High Performance Learning (HPL), focusing on a more creative and holistic view of learning in order to develop advanced cognitive performance, and a set of behaviours and attitudes that will create a more rounded work- and lifeready student.

'Tomorrow's schools will need to help students think for themselves and join others, with empathy, in work and citizenship. They will need to help students develop a strong sense of right and wrong, and sensitivity to the claims




that others make'. These are the words of Andreas Schleicher, Director for Education and Skills at the OECD. He suggests that schools must shift rapidly from the transmission of knowledge as an end in itself to the development of what have become known as '21st Century skills', something that HPL consciously encourages.

In the English Department, HPL means that familiar works of prose, drama and poetry are approached in innovative and imaginative ways. Adult visitors to the English classrooms will encounter an approach that is quite different to their own school days. As in the world beyond, how we learn is as important as what we learn.

To develop a student's creativity, it is not an uncommon sight to witness a Shakespearean comedy re-worked into a silent movie, a gritty novel about 1930's America re-imagined in play dough, or the heart-rending tale of a woman watching narwhal being hunted in the Arctic being depicted in a stop-motion animation. In fact, one of the key tenets of HPL, that students need the space to fail in order to learn from their mistakes, means that they are given a lot of freedom when it comes to how they respond to a literary piece. Since the advent of HPL, A-Level Literature and International Baccalaureate students have become familiar with blogs and digital notebooks as they choose how to record their learning in the medium that will best allow them to revise.

Another area where HPL has changed things, is the classroom space itself. All of our English rooms have been equipped with cutting-edge touchscreen plasma displays, which have been kindly funded by Enhance Ellesmere donations. In the strange times caused by the coronavirus, live performances are becoming uncomfortably distant memories, but watching 'The Duchess of Malfi' reach its shocking denouement on a wide screen is still a visceral experience and leads to profound debate about the nature of justice and revenge, thereby developing students' concern for society. Taking a Year 10 class on a



tour of the various settings they will encounter in the course is made possible by Google Earth and sees us visit California as we trace Lennie and George's footsteps in 'Of Mice and Men', before heading back across the Atlantic and north of the border for 'The Scottish Play', then to the Midlands for 'An Inspector Calls' and across to Ypres and Sarajevo for war poetry. We then head east as we look at literary nonfiction and stop off in Bhutan, Pakistan and Hong Kong before crossing the Pacific and reaching Greenland, then heading south to Somalia and Nigeria. A simple tour like this shows students how the texts they study span the globe.

From hi-tech to low-tech, play dough to plasma screens, English lessons cover the familiar literature from the past, but do so with an eye to preparing students for the future.

#### Mariella heads for the limelight



A Drama and Music Scholar is living her dream after being accepted by both the National Youth Theatre and the British Youth Musical Theatre companies.

Acceptance to the National Youth Theatre (NYT) opens the door for Year 12 student, Mariella Steele, to the possibility of performing in London's West End, the Edinburgh Fringe Festival and on the company's continental tours. The British Youth Musical Theatre (BYMT) place will see Mariella appear in an innovative all-female production of Cabaret Macabre in Plymouth later this year - depending on the Covid-19 situation. Both theatre companies are difficult to get into as competition for places is tough and standards are extremely high. "I have auditioned for the NYT for the last three years - so you might say it's third time lucky," said Mariella, "I did my first audition at 15, and this made me realise that there is a lot of competition and it's difficult to be offered a place. Some people have had several attempts to get in and many never make it at all.

"I'm really excited about it but disappointed that the three-week course due to take place in London won't be happening as planned because of the Covid-19 pandemic. There will be a week's Zoom course which I will be 'attending' and hopefully the physical course will go ahead later.

"The NYT put on productions in the West End, at Edinburgh Fringe and on continental tours, offering great opportunities - it's all very exciting.

"Being accepted by the BYMT is also a great honour and I'm hoping Cabaret Macabre will be able to go ahead as planned in Plymouth later in the year. It's a creative new show with an all-female cast and is being staged as part of Mayflower 400 - celebrations marking the 400th anniversary of the Mayflower's historic voyage to the New World."

Rachel Schubert, Director of Drama, said: "This is fantastic news. I am delighted for Mariella and know there will be exciting times ahead in relation to both NYT and BYMT. Both are very difficult to get into and competition for places is very high, Mariella has done very well indeed - she should be very proud of herself."

#### Top award received for Arts provision

We are delighted to have been re-accredited with our second Artsmark Platinum Award for our continued commitment to providing high quality arts and cultural experiences for pupils in and around the community.

Hello, my name is Tom Webb and I am the new Arts Centre Manager at Ellesmere.





I've been working in the theatre industry for a little over eight years, starting my 'theatrical journey' as the Personal Assistant to a disabled Stage Manager at Latitude Festival, working with the Almeida Theatre. The experience pushed me towards technical theatre, where I started my education at Lewisham Southwark College in London, studying Production Arts and Stage Management. I showed an immediate interest in stage and production management and threw myself into my course which included a vast variety; from making a Halloween scare event on a shoe string budget, to the end of term show, 'The Last Days of Judas Iscariot', which led to me achieving a Distinction.

I then attended Drama School at Rose Burford College, where I undertook my BA (Hons) in Stage Management. During my time at university I served on the Student Union as the Welfare and Disability Officer. In this role I created and ran alternative disabled friendly events, I also created the Black, Asian, Minority, Ethnic (BAME) Students' Network.

Throughout my education I have worked at various theatres around the country including Jermyn Street Theatre, as part of the stage management team on Noel Coward's 'Tonight at 8:30' - reviewed by the Independent as ''an extraordinary feat of team work''. I worked at the renowned Edinburgh Fringe Festival for eight weeks building and running venues, working with Guinness World Record holders and Russian dancers, and toured England with the Nissan Juke as a holographic technician.

My ambitions have changed over the years - when I was five I wanted to be Batman but it wasn't to be! When I left university I was drawn towards mental health and education, I decided to study a Masters Degree in Drama Therapy, using stage management as a form of therapy, I was keen to ensure that whatever I did was geared towards aiding mental health and ensuring future practitioners are as prepared mentally as they are academically.

Now that I have my feet on the ground at Ellesmere, one of my goals is to ensure that all students have the opportunity to get involved with technical theatre, understanding that there's much more to a performance than the people who appear on stage! Sport

Harriet said: "It was amazing to win at Bolesworth - a great experience. I always go in the ring with the state of mind that we are going to win but there were so many good riders there from across the country, we were competing against 17 other horses and riders on the day.

"All the nerves and excitement built up. I jumped early in the class, I think I was third in the ring, and then had to wait and watch everyone else hoping we had done enough. I was so happy with the way Annie performed.

"I'm really building up vital experience and would like showjumping to be my career. I have some amazing friends in the business, work with some brilliant trainers, and this is the biggest event we've won - so fingers crossed for the future. This win is a massive one for me.

"We won the event on the Tuesday and returned on Friday and Sunday to take part in other non-school national events. Annie competed on a bigger course and she jumped really well again. I also rode my new gelding, Galip, and we had a great week with some good placings."

Harriet has been riding since she was about four, progressing through pony classes to horses and acquired Annie from her brother about three years ago. She has two more horses and started riding more competitively when she was given Annie.



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#### Aiming High! Two Ellesmere students trial for England Hockey



Millie Forster and Harry Lloyd-Brown, both in Year 12, have been selected to trial for England Hockey and attended the England National Age Group camps over half-term.

Both students joined Ellesmere for the High Performance Hockey Programme which has produced Commonwealth Games and England international hockey players.

Millie said: "It's a great feeling to be selected for the England trial and I will be giving it everything. It's a

wonderful opportunity in an excellent programme aimed at helping young players develop. I represented my county at under 14 level and was then chosen to move into the England Hockey Player Pathway programme at the regional Performance Centre. I played there for two years. I played predominently for the ladies second team, gaining promotion to the premier division. I also had one appearance for the first team while they were in the Investec National League. Goalkeeper Harry, who has played for his Chester Club's first and second teams, said: "I was selected for the trial after working hard at the Performance Centre throughout the year, at my school and in Club hockey. It was both Mr Taylor and my Club goalkeeper coach who put me forward for the trials and I am really delighted to have been selected. I've been working hard over the past two years at Manchester Performance Centre, at Club and school to be as good as I possibly can and it means a lot to me to be chosen for England trials. The next step for me is to be successful at the trials and further my progress through the England Player Pathway programme. I would like to thank the Ellesmere coaches, especially Mr Taylor, for continuing to push and motivate me to be the best goalkeeper."

## College launches scheme to support students' mental health



A group of Sixth Form students have launched the Mental Health at Ellesmere Support System (MHESS), a support scheme that focuses on raising awareness of the importance of mental health and wellbeing, ensuring that students know how and where they can access support.

The initiative is being led by Year 13 student, Elin Jones, along with a team of Sixth Form students and Alex Murphy, Director of Rugby. It is also supported by the team of on-site medical staff. Elin and her peers felt that as well as supporting students with their overall mental health and wellbeing, the scheme would provide a safety net system to prevent potentially bad situations from escalating. The College has invested in the training of over 30 pupils and staff, demonstrating how seriously we take the emotional wellbeing of our pupils.


"The scheme is up and running and we are raising awareness about general mental health and wellbeing for our students." Mr Murphy said. "Training students places them in the ideal position to recognise the problems and issues faced by their contemporaries and provides them with the necessary skills to offer guidance in helping them seek support.

"People often find it difficult to identify and discuss things which are worrying them, but it's good to talk, and that is one of the most important messages we are communicating. There are many risks associated with mental health and young people can put themselves under an enormous amount of pressure with exams and day to day school life, not to mention the added stresses that the Covid-19 pandemic has contributed.

"We are in the process of creating a multi-layered support structure with lots of options for students who are unsure of where to turn to when dealing with difficult thoughts and emotions. Having a student support team provides an approachable source of guidance for students that acts as a stepping stone between pupils and staff."

#### Gulwali Passarlay: My life as an Afghan Refugee

Gulwali Passarlay, the internationally renowned author of 'The Lightless Sky' - his memoirs detailing his hazardous journey from Afghanistan to the UK - once again opened the hearts and minds of Year 8 Geography students and deepened their understanding of the plight and resilience of young refugees with an inspiring talk during his visit to the College this week.



Through telling his story to schools and through his book, Gulwali hopes his experiences will explain why refugees choose to leave their countries and families behind, battle feelings of loneliness, fear and guilt, and will allow people to see them not only as asylum seekers, but individual human beings with incredible stories.

The talk was truly eye-opening for students, and some fantastic questions were asked by the students. He concluded his talk by explaining how he hopes to end the negative stigma associated with refugees and asylum seekers, and hopes to use his passion towards social change in order to inspire young people into having a more engaged participation in politics and policy-making.





### DT team helps key workers in the Coronavirus fight

In April, during the height of the Coronavirus pandemic, a national shortage of PPE was predominant, with a vast number of medical workers and care homes unable to purchase or acquire basic Personal Protective Equipment.





In light of this, a small group of volunteers working out of the Design and Technology Department set about building visors. After sourcing scarce materials, a number of staff including Andy Lycett, Matthew Horton and Ian Williams set about making the first batch of

125 visors by hand. These were donated to Severn Hospice in Shrewsbury and were gratefully received.

Following this a JustGiving charity page was formed to fund the manufacture of 1000 visors. The target sum of  $\pounds$ 550 was set and, through the generosity of staff and friends of the College, within hours the money was raised.

With plans to produce more visors for those in need, social media was used to inform institutions in the local area that visors were available. In less than 12 hours the post had been shared 10,000 times and an overwhelming amount of responses followed. With the help of Phil Childs from the school IT department an order system was quickly created. A link was then distributed, and requests arrived in from all over the UK.

As more donations flooded our JustGiving page, we were able to purchase more material to produce a further 3000 face shields. In the next week a monumental effort was placed by a small group of staff, working in shifts to run the laser cutter around the clock to cut out parts for the visors. This needed to be done before the teaching term began again and key worker children would return to the school alongside running an online curriculum.

With further generous donations, the voluntary group were able to purchase more 3D printers to supplement the Design and Technology Departments existing machinery to continue manufacturing visors through the school term. Alongside this has been help from a number of Old Ellesmerians and particularly OE Robert Oaks owner of DKL rubber who aided in manufacturing components through term time.

To date 16,000 Visors have been distributed all over the UK and more recently, abroad to help countries that are still suffering from manufacturing shortages.

This monumental effort is testament to the compassionate ethos and collective community spirit that Ellesmere College has installed in all Ellesmerians, past and present.

A huge thank you goes to those members of staff who helped to prepare the components and assemble the visors - of which there are too many to name. Also, a large thank you must be given to the efforts of Pete Evans and Jamie-Lee Warburton for their dedication to delivering visors to places in need. And of course, a huge thank you goes to everybody who donated.

### Four generations of Ellesmerians

#### It was recently brought to our attention that one of our esteemed Sixth Form students, Alice Parton, is indeed a fourth generation Ellesmerian.

Alice's Great Grandfather, Geoffrey, was introduced to the College over 100 years ago. In 1919, Alfred Parton enrolled his son Geoffrey at Ellesmere by recommendation from a friend who had two sons at the College. Geoffrey joined as a student in the January of 1919 and attended until the summer of 1920. Geoffrey was a member of 'Conqueror' House – now known as Talbot. During his short stint at Ellesmere he represented his dorm and the 1st XV Team in Rugby and took an active interest in many sports including U15 High Jump (at 4'4''), Cricket, Football and Steeplechase. He was awarded Full Colours for his contribution to Rugby and left College to pursue a career in agriculture.





Geoffrey went on to have two sons, David and Alan, who both attended the College from the age of 10 to 16.

Alan joined Ellesmere in 1942 and was an active member of the Athletics Club. During the Lent Term of 1946 he was awarded Junior House Colours. Alan left Ellesmere in 1948, following his father's footsteps to work in farming.

David came to Ellesmere in 1946 and was a popular member of the Talbot House. Like his father before him, David was a keen sportsman, representing the College in many sports with Rugby being a firm favourite. In his final year at College, David played a Soldier in the Senior School play, 'Julius Ceasar'.

David continued his close bond with the College after leaving; he was a respected member of The Ellesmerian Club for many years and was the Club's President in 2004. He was also a member of the Old Ellesmerian Masonic Lodge and in 1978 he was installed as the Lodges Worshipful Master.

David introduced his son Paul to the College in 1980. Paul made an impression straight away and was awarded the Shell Classical Studies Prize in his first year. In true family tradition, Paul was also a talented Rugby player and represented the U16, 4th, 3rd and 1st XV teams. He played 1st XI Cricket for three years and was a member of the College's Stamp and Chess Clubs.



This brings us to the fourth generation Ellesmerian of the Parton family. Alice joined the College in Year 10 in 2017 and has completely thrown herself into College life. She was awarded Junior House Colours in 2018 and is a gifted sportswoman. Alice has represented both the College and her County in Hockey, she was

on the winning team of the UI6 National Hockey Cup and regularly played for the 1st XI team throughout Year 12. As Captain of the UI7 Shropshire Hockey team, Alice's team won the UI7 Midlands Cup for the first time ever. Alice also plays 1st team Netball and is regularly winning prizes at prestigious Horse Riding competitions, most recently coming 3rd at the Weston Park Horse Trials. In addition to her sporting successes, Alice took part in the Senior School Production of 'Little Shop of Horrors' and is a talented artist.

### Scott Phillips (Talbot 2019) takes on 'The Italian Job'

A former Ellesmere College student has landed the prestigious role of Choir Director at St Mark's 'English' Church – in Italy!



Scott Phillips, 20, from St David's, Pembrokeshire, left Ellesmere as a student last year before returning on an internship. His role as Choir Director in Florence will last a year after which he will take his place at York University.

"I was a chorister at St David's Cathedral for a number of years so the British choral tradition is in my blood. I also visited Italy on a choir tour with Ellesmere. I saw the position advertised on Church Times, applied, had a phone interview in March, then got offered the job and started on September I st - I really love it out here. The position at St Mark's is the most important role I've had to date, I head up the department, have two organists and the choir. It's a great deal of responsibility but thoroughly enjoyable, and means I have needed to defer my place at York University until next year.

I left Ellesmere in July 2019 as a student but then went back as an intern and spent most of the last year working there - it was quite a strange thing to leave as a student and then go back as a member of staff. I was also the Organ Scholar at Shrewsbury Abbey from October last year through to this July. I like to think that I take every opportunity thrown at me to get as much experience under my belt as I can.

The church plays a leading role in offering opportunities and often has intern positions for post graduate students, with a close connection with Cambridge University. St Mark's wants to give students the opportunity to push themselves but also to have the experience of being able to run a department not something many people get the chance to do. The church usually draws its singers from university campuses in the area, especially the American colleges, but Covid has brought about unprecedented challenges. It has meant we are having to rebuild the choir again because so many of the choristers had to leave the country earlier in the year, particularly the Americans and a lot of British. We have had to start recruiting and I'm keen to look more locally so if something like Covid were to happen again the church choir wouldn't be so decimated. September 6th was the first service the church has had for six months and meant completely starting things from scratch and building it back up again. The choir started with zero, now we have six and will be built up to about 20 as a standard number but the choir here can have anything up to 40 singers.

Day to day, I spend quite a bit of time in the office planning events, we are looking at doing outreach to the local schools, including the International School. My goal is to try and draw more locals into the church, it's obviously a very Catholic tradition out here and we are unique in that we are a C of E church in the middle of Florence.

My hopes for the future are in many ways to carry on doing what I'm doing now, directing music, whether in churches or possibly theatre. I love the choral tradition that church music brings and my placement year at St Mark's can only help me achieve my goals."
