







### **Community Trip to Kean University**



### **About the Work Readiness Academy**

The Work Readiness Academy serves students ages 18-21 with disabilities and provides a comprehensive employment training experience that incorporates both classroom-based instruction and community-based work-learning experiences. While in the training classroom, students work cooperatively with similar aged peers to learn critical skills related to employment and socialization. Students also work on career exploration and planning, including the development of a person-centered, post-secondary vision and plan with clear goals and action steps. Program staff remain on-site during the internships to provide and fade support and assistance as needed. Students also participate in field trips focused on career discovery, independent living skills, recreation and independent travel training.

We love Matthew and 105 is so proud of everything he has accomplished!




Therapy Spotlight










### Specials Report - Mr. Pat-Music


### **Student of the Month**

### Mrs. Machado, Mathematics Teacher

Mrs. Machado has been working towards preparing all her students for the 2023 Hillcrest Academy North's Annual Chess Tournament. Learning to play chess can help students acquire the cognitive skills needed to build strong math skills as well as in other subjects across the curriculum! Chess promotes higherlevel thinking skills; analyzing chess positions strengthens

problem-solving skills; it develops spatial reasoning skills and visual memory; it improves attention span and sharpens self-confidence. Chess also increases intrinsic motivation to learn and helps students find enjoyment through mentally taxing activities. To introduce the game, Machado's math classes watched the movie, *Critical Thinking*, based on the true story of the 1998 Miami Jackson High School chess team, the first inner-city team to win the U.S. National Chess Championship.

Machado's students began the lessons at the basics, learning piece's moves and abilities, then into the history and its relation to war tactics. Some students quickly advanced to becoming "Masters", having them be the teachers guiding and overlooking games. All students are engaged and motivated, looking forward to find out who is name the 2023 Chess Champion of the year.

### Mrs. Goldenberg, Social Worker

May has been a productive month in the social work office. Throughout the month, the social worker has met with Seniors to discuss academic progress – and more specifically to ensure that graduation requirements are being met. The social worker has been in regular contact with all counselors from Elizabeth to discuss this progress and to begin to prepare for graduation.



The theme of the month in May is Self-Reflection. The social worker has continued to work on SEL activities with classes. We did a review of progress this year and completed a questionnaire on the best way to end the year on a positive note. As it was teacher appreciation week, the students made cards for multiple teachers that they are thankful for. The social worker has continued to meet with students regularly for various needs: peer issues, issues within the home, and obtaining insurance to name a few. The social worker has also reached out to the truancy officer in Elizabeth multiple times to go to the homes of students. Many of these students return to school the very next day and get back on track.

Kwame discussed how his life has been since leaving Hillcrest. In the fall of 2017, Kwame was incarcerated and spent three years in prison. Almost a year after his release, Kwame was in a car accident that put him in a coma for a month and left him paralyzed from the shoulders down. After many months of physical therapy and determination to recapture his mobility, Kwame was able to regain his ability to walk. Kwame started taking classes at UCC in January 2023 and is majoring in business marketing. He also remains passionate about producing music.

While talking with Kwame, he spent time reminiscing about his years at Hillcrest. He talked about how the teachers made him excited to learn and taught him skills that he didn't learn before. Kwame went on to discuss how passionate and caring the staff was and made him feel like he finally belonged at a school and enjoyed coming to Hillcrest everyday. Kwame talked with Mr. Marquet about his favorite HAN memory, going outside on Fridays to play basketball! We wish Kwame the best and look forward to his next visit!



Greetings,

I hope this Newsletter finds you well! As the LMA Supervisor of Instruction, I am truly proud of all the activities, events, lessons and counselling session that have Mental Health Awareness month infused into them! I would like to thank all the staff members at LMA who have made this possible. While you read this newsletter



you will see all the wonderful activities that have taken place at LMA, along with all the awards LMA students have received!

Personally, I have a very soft spot for Mental Health as I've dedicated my entire professional career working in the Mental Health field. Prior to entering the world of education, I am humbled to have the opportunity to work as a Mental Health Counselor on an adult inpatient unit, and a Residence Counselor in an Adolescent Residence for 4 years after completing my college degree. Working in these settings gave me learning opportunities that resonate with me far deeper than any course I've taken. Receiving this opportunity gave me first hand experience on how to really actively listen

to individuals, have meaningful conversations, and establish firm limit setting. 


