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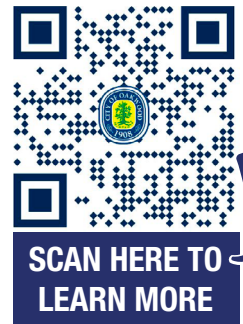

Far Hills Storm Sewer Reconstruction Project

A large storm sewer replacement project is underway in Oakwood. Over the next few months, work will take place on Far Hills Avenue at Greenmount Boulevard; on Dellwood Avenue from Far Hills Avenue to E. Schantz Avenue; Forrer Boulevard from Far Hills Avenue to E. Schantz Avenue; and along a section of Devereux Drive north of Forrer Road. Traffic flow will be impacted along Far Hills Avenue and on the other project streets. Information about the project is posted to the city website where you can sign up to receive email updates as construction unfolds.

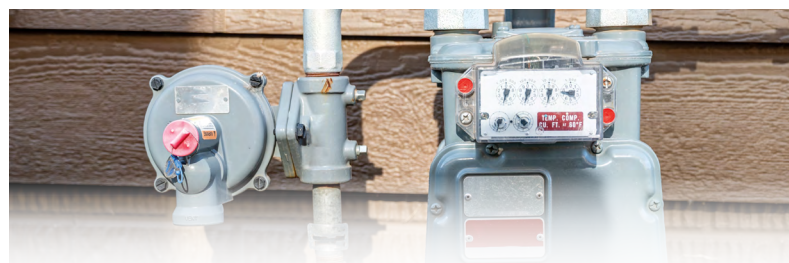


2023 Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Project

The 2023 Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Repair Project is taking place in the southwest quadrant of the city, including all areas of Oakwood west of Far Hills Avenue, south of Park Road. Work is also taking place around Harman Elementary School. The purpose of the project is to maintain the concrete structures located within the city rights-of-way in a good, safe condition. City staff has inspected the areas and marked sections of concrete requiring repairs. Residents affected by the work received personal notification regarding their responsibilities. August/September Council Meetings

City Council will meet in regular sessions at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, August 7 and Monday, September 18. Both meetings will take place at the city building, 30 Park Avenue. The regular sessions are preceded by an open work session beginning at 6:30 p.m. The regular sessions are televised live on the city website at www.oakwoodohio.gov, and on cable TV (Spectrum Ch. 6, TV Tuner Ch. 5.203 and AT&T U-verse Ch. 99). The meetings are also accessible via the Zoom remote meeting platform. Links to the meeting will be posted to the city website at 4 p.m. on the meeting date. CenterPoint Gas Line Improvements

CenterPoint (formerly Vectren) continues replacing underground gas distribution pipes and home service lines in Oakwood neighborhoods. Maps on the city website identify work programmed for 2023. In all work areas, CenterPoint is installing new polyethylene pipes in place of old steel and cast iron pipes and is moving indoor gas meters to outside wall locations. This is the continuation of a multi-year CenterPoint infrastructure replacement project in Oakwood scheduled to be completed in 2023. Oakwood residents personally affected by the work will receive detailed information from CenterPoint. Orange Notices on Trash Cans and/or Recycling Containers

Where necessary, the Public Works Department will place orange tags to communicate why your trash and/or recycling containers could not be collected. With our unique back-door collection service, we strive to provide you the service you expect, while keeping our workers safe. The orange tags will list the reason for non-collection such as: vehicle in driveway; locked gate; refuse not out; oversize can; can exceeds 60 pounds; or more than three refuse cans. Once the marked reason is addressed, contact the Public Works Department at (937) 298-0777 so we can come back for collection. The city website provides detailed information on our refuse and recycling guidelines, and our Refuse Handbook is available on the website as well. 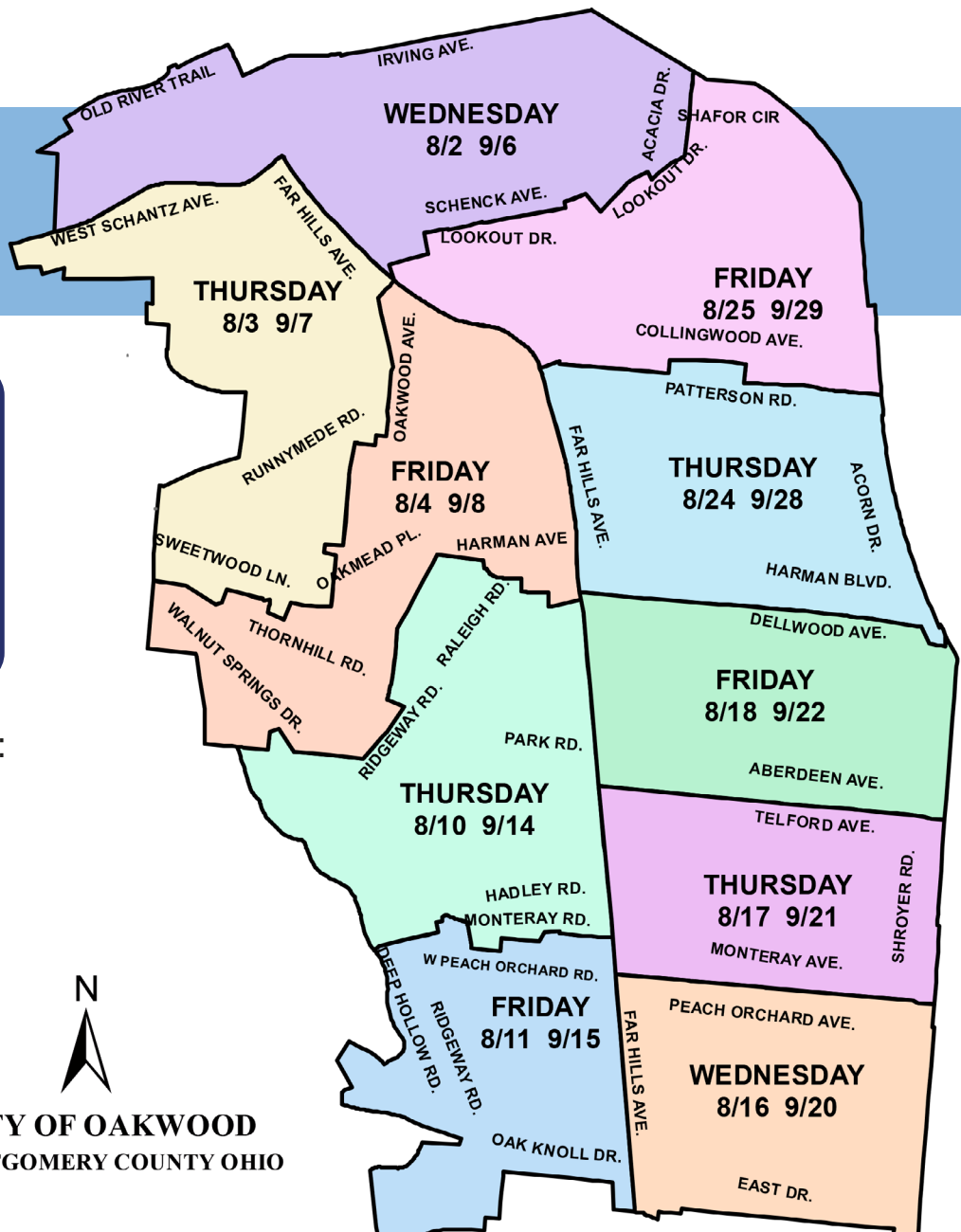

Brush and Branch Trimming

Please take a few minutes this summer to inspect the trees and shrubs on your property frontage. City ordinances require a clear height of 8 feet above the sidewalk and 14 feet above the street. Also, vegetation should be cut so that it does not restrict your view as you pull out of your driveway. If you live on a corner lot, be sure that motorists have a clear line of sight from each side of the intersection. Citizens residing near stop signs and other street signs must ensure that vegetation does not obstruct the signs.

Lawn Treatment on City-Owned Public Lawn Areas



Well-kept lawns and green spaces within the city are an important part of the health of these areas and maintaining Oakwood's ambiance. The city has used Integrated Pest Management (IPM) practices for a number of years on the city-owned public lawn areas which include parks, boulevards, athletic fields, and around public buildings. IPM is an ecosystem-based strategy that focuses on long-term prevention of pests or their damage through a combination of techniques such as biological control, habitat manipulation, modification of cultural practices, and use of resistant varieties. Pesticides are used only after monitoring indicates they are needed according to established guidelines, and treatments are made with the goal of removing only the target organism. Pest control materials are selected and applied in a manner that minimizes risks to human health, beneficial and non-target organisms, and the environment. Our practices include adherence to proper mowing heights and the use of sharp blades on mowers which helps reduce the amount of chemicals used in all of the public areas. The city requires that all lawn care contractors, whether treating for pests or weeds, are properly licensed by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, and follow all applicable laws and rules promulgated by the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

In our parks, lawn care treatments require the posting of temporary signage in conspicuous locations at least two days prior to treatment. The day of treatment, the city Horticulturist and/or Recreation Supervisor meet the contractor on-site prior to the application of any treatment. They ensure that children are not present in the area to be treated and that the area is otherwise clear for the application, before allowing the contractor to proceed with lawn treatment. Immediately following treatment, the city verifies that all signs are properly placed, and are then promptly removed 24 hours thereafter. Only areas with weeds and pests are spot sprayed, not the entire green space as this is a part of the IPM practice to limit chemical use yet still keep the community greenspace as healthy as possible. Johnny Appleseed Street Tree Planting Project

The city of Oakwood and Oakwood Beautification Committee will again offer trees for purchase through the Johnny Appleseed Street Tree Planting Project. Applications and detailed brochures describing the project and the tree species will be available in late September at the OCC and on the city website. Oakwood property owners may choose from four or five varieties of trees. The trees selected will be approximately 2 inches in diameter and will be discounted at 50%. One tree will be allocated for each approved property site at the discounted price but must be planted in the city right-of-way (property frontage). Trees will be planted in the latter part of November or early December. They will be planted by a local nursery, wrapped, staked, mulched and guaranteed for one growing season. Sunday, August 6, 2023—7:00 P.M.

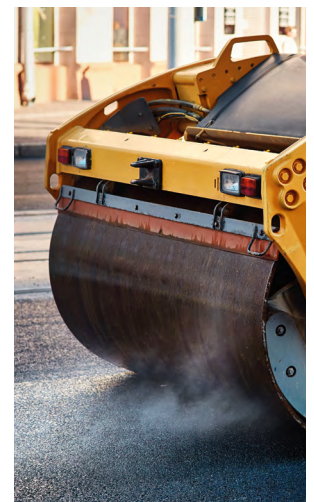


The third and final concert this year features Blue Eighty and takes place at 7 p.m. on Sunday, August 6 at Smith Gardens. In case of rain, the concert will be held in the Oakwood Community Center Great Room at 105 Patterson Road. The alternative music of the 1980s has a strong hold on so many members of Generation X. This magical era saw synthesizers go mainstream, adding a lush orchestration to guitar rock, alongside melodic, emotional, often moody vocals. Groundbreaking groups like Joy Division, The Cure, The Smiths, Psychedelic Furs, and Talking Heads announced that music had something new to say. Niche radio stations like Cincinnati's own 97x called out to the high school and college students of that era, eager to slip out of 70s rock spandex and embrace "the future of Rock N Roll." To the members of Blue Eighty, the fact that this music is so seldom heard today in live performance represented a void that needed to be filled. In 2018, five seasoned musicians came together around this shared mission, compared playlists and found hours and hours of music that made all of them feel passionate about playing. Hearing Blue Eighty live is still a unique experience, as they remain Cincinnati's ONLY 80s Alternative and New Wave band. The band have thrilled audiences at local venues such as Bogart's, The Ludlow Garage, MVP, OTR Stillhouse, Northside Tavern, and at public appearances for St. Cecilia Oktoberfest, Oakley Community Council, the Behringer-Crawford Museum and more. Roadway Resurfacing

Back to School Safety Tips

As summer comes to an end and students prepare for a new school year, the Oakwood Public Safety Department offers the following back to school safety tips.



TIPS FOR DRIVERS

Drivers need to be aware that school is back in session and students will be walking and riding their bicycles to and from school.

- Watch for children running into the street in and around intersections and always come to a complete stop at stop signs.
- Watch for children entering the street from behind parked vehicles.
- When driving your child to school, deliver and pick them up in a designated area.
- Watch your speed when entering school zones. Traffic safety is one of the cornerstones of law enforcement services provided by the Oakwood Public Safety Department and school zone speed limits are strictly enforced.

TIPS FOR WALKERS

As a walking community, Oakwood pedestrian traffic drastically increases when a new school year starts. Parents and students should be cautious of their surroundings as they commute to and from school.

- Pay attention to all traffic signals.
- If crossing Far Hills Avenue, cross at one of the four designated locations where a crossing guard is located (Far Hills Avenue & Aberdeen Avenue, Far Hills Avenue & Park Avenue, Far Hills Avenue & Patterson Road, and Five Points intersection).
- Plan a safe walking route to school. Choose the most direct route with fewest street crossings.
- Look both ways when crossing a street, even if you have a green light.



BICYCLE SAFETY TIPS

Bicycles are a popular way for students in Oakwood to commute to and from school.

- Don't take short cuts; follow the same path of travel as if you were walking to and from school.
- Always wear a bike helmet that is properly sized.
- Ensure the bike is properly maintained.
- Avoid wearing headphones. Music and podcasts can be distracting and cause a person to ignore potential hazards.

PERSONAL SAFETY FOR KIDS

- Encourage your children to be alert and aware of their surroundings.
- Teach your children to report suspicious persons to you, teachers, police officers or other responsible adults.
- If encountered by a suspicious vehicle or person, children should take notice of the color and model of vehicle, license plate number, detailed description of subject including clothing, and any other distinguishing marks.

In an effort to keep everyone safe, the Oakwood Public Safety Department encourages parents to discuss these safety tips with your children. Do not assume your child knows what to do.



Labor Day Refuse Collections

City offices will be closed on Monday, September 4 in recognition of Labor Day. Refuse collection will be one day later than usual that week. Monday's route will be collected Tuesday; Tuesday's route will be collected Wednesday; Wednesday's route will be collected Thursday; and Thursday's route will be collected Friday.



Special Pickups

To arrange for a special pickup (furniture, appliances, etc.), complete the online special pickup form on the city website at www.oakwoodohio.gov or call the Public Works Department at (937) 298-0777. Items for special pickup must be placed on a driveway or other paved surface and must be accessible by city equipment. **Special pickups are not available during the fall leaf collection season from mid-October through the end of the year, so please plan your projects accordingly.**

Five Points Intersection

At the open house events, the city presented the following information:

- A video captured via drone that depicts how the existing traffic signal at Five Points functions.
- 12 display boards that provide information about: (1) the city's traffic signal system; (2) the Five Points intersection; (3) roundabouts in general; and (4) a conceptual plan on how a roundabout could be built at Five Points.
- A video that depicts how a roundabout could function at Five Points. The video shows five time of day scenarios:
 1. 8 a.m. weekday when there is heavy vehicle traffic and students crossing the street.
 2. 3:30 p.m. weekday when there is moderate vehicle traffic and students crossing the street.
 3. 5:15 p.m. weekday when there is heavy vehicle traffic.
 4. 9 a.m. Saturday when there is light vehicle traffic.
 5. Nighttime when there is light vehicle traffic.

All of the information presented at the open house events is posted to the city website at www.oakwoodohio.gov. Also included on the website is an interview with City Manager Norbert Klopsch.

The Five Points intersection is the most complex traffic intersection in Oakwood. Its design is central to the safe and efficient movement of traffic through the city. Heavy commuter and pedestrian traffic at certain times demands the safest possible intersection design.

Roundabouts have been shown to reduce crashes, particularly the type resulting in serious injury, and also serve to improve efficiency of traffic movement. Roundabouts are used successfully in many locations around the Miami Valley, throughout Ohio and all around the country.

Over the past two months, Oakwood city leaders have received citizen input about the possible construction of a roundabout at Five Points. A decision on whether to pursue the project has not yet been made, but is expected soon. If pursued, the city plans to apply for state/federal grant money to pay a majority of the project costs.

“People seem to love handmade gifts, and the rhythm of the process can be quite calming. I love sharing this craft with children and seeing them feel good about making something beautiful,” Harman fifth-grade teacher Patty Reyman said. This year, club members decided to share their talents with the community.

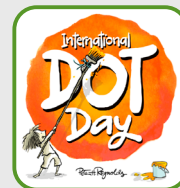

Foundation Spotlight: Teens Refuel at Wright Library During Exam Weeks

For several years, Oakwood junior high and high school students have found Wright Library to be the perfect spot to refuel and decompress during their semester exam weeks.

Knowing the stress that comes with exams, Teen Services Librarian Diane Bengson offers Teen Exam Break during the students' midday break on exam days each May and December. The library provides snacks, games, crafts, and even visits from therapy dogs.

"We couldn't go to school for lunch, so this really helped to just be able to eat something, and it was really calming," said Evvie, one of the students in attendance this spring.

Because students must leave the school buildings between exams and during lunch, an increasing number arrive at Wright Library ready to eat, relax, and do a little last minute studying. During this spring's exams, 181 students took advantage of the program.

"The Teen Exam Break has been steadily gaining in popularity, and providing enough pizzas and snacks for hungry teens over three days is a formidable task," Bengson said.

Students were also exposed to the library's ample resources for teens, including the recently renovated teen space; a diverse young adult reading collection; digital resources; and a wide-ranging video game collection.

To help serve the growing number of students, the Wright Library Foundation and its generous donors provided a \$500 grant to support the program's growing numbers.
