Program of Work:

Program reviewers should ask themselves, and those being reviewed, the following questions:

- 1. Does the program know whether it is accomplishing its goals? How does it know?
- 2. Under what circumstances a program would be modified or discontinued?
- 3. How will new initiatives or programs be launched?
- 4. Do constituents share the impressions of staff?
- 5. Are there important goals the program is not measuring and consequently is not considering adequately in planning?
- 6. If the program fails to meet its goals, does it have information to help it make improvements?

Meeting Schedule:

The advisory board meets approximately three times annually. The advisory board will
meet as a whole in early Fall. Individual program committees will meet after the general
meeting to discuss progress toward goals so that the program chairperson can provide a
report on findings to the CTE Coordinator.

The Healthcare Therapeutic program of study introduces students to occupations and educational opportunities related to diagnosing and treating acute, episodic, or chronic illness independently or as part of a healthcare team. This program of study also includes an introduction to the opportunities associated with providing treatment and counsel to patients as well as rehabilitative programs that help build or restore daily living skills to persons with disabilities or developmental delays.



CTE Travel Procedures

Overnight Trips:

- 1. All travel requests must be submitted through Eduphoria.
- 2. Upon approval from administration you will need to contact the campus secretary to complete proper paperwork for hotels, meals, and travel expenses.
- 3. Complete Travel Checklist
- 4. Reimbursement for mileage is not approved unless a school vehicle is unavailable.

Student meals:

District policy will be followed. Money for meals will be issued to the advisor prior to trip. Money for meals will be issued from the school finance department. Plan in advance. Students will be allotted the following amount for overnight trips:

- Breakfast \$6
- Lunch \$8
- Dinner \$10

Transportation for Practicums:

Students completing practicums or other courses that require students to travel to business partners during the school day will be transported via the school bus. The only exception is the 1st and 2nd periods or the 7th and 8th periods. The student must have a permission form on file and can only transport themselves to their practicum location. Teachers will complete the practicum bus route Google sheet and keep the sheet updated.

Site Visits for Practicum and Career Prep Classes:

Each student enrolled in a practicum or career prep class will receive a site visit every six weeks from the teacher who has been assigned to the course.

Transportation for Career Prep Classes:

Students completing career prep classes must have a job and work a minimum of 15 hours per week. These students will be responsible for their own transportation back and forth from work.

Purchase of Supplies or Equipment:

When purchasing supplies, you will be required to have approval from an administrator before a purchase order will be issued.

Industry Based Certification:

Students can earn multiple industry-based certifications aligned to programs of study. HISD will pay for one industry-based certification during a student's four years of high school. If a student passes and earns an IBC in high school, they will earn a performance acknowledgment for graduation. Teachers are responsible for updating the IBC spreadsheet as students earn their certifications.

Benefits of HHS Practicums and Career Preparation

(Cooperative On-the-Job Training)

For the student:

- Students have the opportunity for learning useful employment skills on real jobs under actual working conditions.
- Interest in classroom work is stimulated by the application of academic and jobrelated learning to job situations.
- As wage earners, students develop understanding, appreciation, and respect for work and workers.
- The ability to get and hold a job helps young people develop a mature and realistic concept of self.
- The transition from school to employment is made easier.
- The ability of the student to develop a post-high school pin for employment and continuing education is enhanced.

For the school:

- A school that conducts cooperative on-the-job training is able to extend educational opportunities that are beyond its own physical and financial resources.
- Interaction with training professionals outside the school is provided in the training of young people.
- Teachers, guidance counselors, and school administrators are provided with improved opportunities to keep in touch with changing employment conditions.
- Cooperative on-the-job training is a living demonstration of the concept that education is indeed a community-wide partnership.

For the community:

- The number of young people making a successful transition from school to work is increased, thereby adding to the number of economically productive members of society.
- A continuing pattern of school-community partnerships is developed.
- Cooperative on-the-job training helps improve the community's pattern of job stability by giving local students job skills and civic competence.

For the employer/training sponsor:

- Employers are assisted in analyzing jobs and developing training outlines.
- The private sector is provided with opportunities to take an active part in the education and career preparation of students in the local community.
- Students are prepared to work in their own localities, under the supervision and following the methods of a specific local employer.
- Classroom instruction gives student-learners a more thorough understanding of job-related theory and knowledge.

CTE Guest Speakers, Field Trips, and Fundraisers

Guest Speakers:

All persons not employed by the district and not here on official school business are required to register in the office and receive a Visitor's Pass.

All guest speakers will need to complete the district's volunteer form and background check form. The CTE teachers are responsible for ensuring these are completed at least one week in advance and turned in to Lorene Ownby at Central Office. The administration must approve all guest speakers.


Field Trips:

All field trips, including authorized UIL/CTE activities, must be approved by the administration. Teachers will utilize district forms in submitting their requests for field trips. The form must be submitted to the principal 30 days **before** the trip date. If the request is approved by the principal, the secretary will submit a request for transportation for an estimation of the cost for the trip. Standard district permission forms must be signed by a parent/guardian and on file with the sponsoring teacher before any student will be allowed to participate. No student shall be denied the opportunity to participate in a field trip due to his/her economic limitations.

Fundraisers:

The following procedures shall be followed when having a fundraiser:

- 1. The sponsor or students must schedule the date and type of fundraiser with the administration.
- 2. A fundraising application and financial recap form need to be filled out. This form has to be signed by the Principal/CTE Coordinator and the Business Manager before the fundraiser can begin. Forms may be picked up from Mrs. Hernandez.
- 3. All money must be turned in to Mrs. Hernandez on a daily basis. After the fundraiser is over, the financial recap section needs to be filled out by the sponsor and Mrs. Hernandez.
