At Woodlands Christian, we strive to equip leaders - spiritually, intellectually, creatively, physically and socially - to fulfill God's purpose for each of their lives. Through His transforming power, we believe that students can find their unique gifts and talents and reach their highest potential. Thus, we offer a rigorous Christian college-preparatory curriculum taught by an engaging faculty that delivers the personal mentoring and encouragement necessary to help our students succeed and develop a love of learning. Whether in the classroom, at an athletic competition, on the stage or in the mission field, we challenge our students to become servant-leaders for Christ, capable of making an eternal impact for His kingdom.

This was another exciting year at Woodlands Christian as we achieved record student enrollment, graduated the largest senior class in our school's history, and completed a capital campaign for a Fine Arts Education Building and Outdoor Amphitheater. Our students attained top scores on standardized exams with our seniors receiving outstanding college acceptances and merit-based college scholarship offers. They competed well in athletic, academic and STEAM competitions, and our students amazed us with their talents in fine arts and hearts for serving others.

We are also pleased to report that we passed our review with the Council of Educational Standards and Accountability (CESA) with flying colors this year, maintaining our Member of Council status and



accreditation from Cognia. This in-depth review takes place every five years. The Woodlands Christian Academy is one of 50 CESA Member of Council schools nationwide.

We value our responsibility as financial stewards. Tuition and fees cover 100% of our operating expenses, enabling us to use additional fundraising dollars to enhance our campus and programs. We have received clean, unqualified audits for each of the past 17 years, and debt service is less than 1% of our operating expenses.

We hope you enjoy this annual report with a focus on our previous year's achievements and the annual report of gifts. We are, as always, grateful for the contributions of time, talent and treasure that we receive from the families and friends of The Woodlands Christian Academy.



**Our Student Ambassador** teams are full of energetic students who enjoy sharing with others, what they love about TWCA. The Student Ambassador program aims to cultivate student leaders who can share the Warrior experience with prospective students, families, and community members. These students welcome and host potential students on shadow visits, join campus tours, and volunteer at school events. Students apply for this opportunity and serve for the duration of the year. Our hope is that our Ambassadors will continue in this program throughout their TWCA careers.

God asks big things of small people too! The Mighty Warrior Ambassadors program was brand new in lower school this year. It's mission is to equip our littlest Warriors to be faithful servants, teaching leadership skills with Christian principles to help grow leaders who walk The Warrior Way.



# CROSS-CAMPUS COLLABORATION

Having three schools on one campus has its advantages. We love finding ways to bridge the gap between lower, middle and high school, forming a close-knit community. Lower school and middle school students have access to amenities not common in most elementary and middle schools, and they get to take part in sporting events and traditions with the high school.

Opportunities to build relationships across campus is what makes Woodlands Christian so special. Students can collaborate across different schools, adding to our unique campus culture! Older and younger students are able to exchange ideas and serve one another. This is one of the many advantages of being at a PreK - 12 school!

**1. Using augmented reality,** 5th and 6th graders created a tall tale or fractured fairy tale character. They paired up with kindergartners to show them their character and then taught the little ones how to create their own. Kindergartners were excited and intrigued to see their augmented reality characters "playing" on the playground. This activity brought students closer together by giving them the opportunity to work one-on-one as opposed to a large group setting. The middle schoolers enjoyed teaching the kindergartners, much the same way as an older sibling would teach a younger sibling.





2. Nurse Jadlot visited PreK for a lesson on germs. She discussed the importance of thoroughly washing our hands to avoid spreading germs to our friends and used "glo germ" lotion and a black light to illuminate the germs on their hands. She introduced singing the "Happy Birthday" song as a way to ensure they spend enough time getting their hands clean before moving over to the hand washing station for a chance to apply what they had learned.

3. Mrs. Yee's 8th grade class was tasked with writing a story about an unconventional hero. To help them prepare, they interviewed students in Mrs. Atler Derr's 1st grade class to gather ideas for what the hero's journey may entail. This collaboration allowed the younger students a chance to contribute imaginative, meaningful insights and to learn from their older peers.

#### 4. 5th and 6th graders

in Makerspace created a Christmas Arcade as part of an engineering and problemsolving challenge. Lower and middle school students were invited to the arcade to test and play the games and then provide feedback.

5. PreK students met with Coach Brown's Warrior Way class. Freshmen Friends is a joint venture to help connect our youngest Warriors and newest high school students, and to build community between the schools. Our students loved getting to know each other and play together!

6. Mrs. Ambler stopped by 1st grade to talk about her role as the Head of School to support the lessons in citizenship that they are learning in class. The students were very engaged and asked thoughtful questions!

7. PreK students took a trip across campus to the weight room to see where our Warrior athletes train. Coach Walker talked to them about making healthy choices and the importance of exercise before taking them through a few exercises. The students were so excited to see their teacher, Ms. T. (a nationally ranked competitive power lifter) in action!











8. 3rd Graders mentored kindergarten authors by providing feedback and guidance on editing and revising their how-to pieces. It was an incredible time for both the big kids and littles. Third graders were proud to impart their knowledge and coach the littles. Kindergartners were so excited to share their writing and celebrate their hard work with the big kids.

#### 9. Middle school students

in the Game Makers class worked hard to code and perfect their video game prototypes using the app Bloxels. This STEAM project culminated in the Gamers' Showcase where other classes tested out the games and provided the programmers with feedback so that they could improve the games and take them to the next level.

10. Kindergartners and Senior Buddies had their last meet up at Urban Air! They had the best time bouncing around, and it was a great way to end the year. We love this special relationship that forms between our oldest and youngest students. Moments like these make our campus a little smaller and more of a community. The next time these students saw each other was when the seniors sent them off at Kindergarten Graduation!

According to its website, "B3rd Athletics was inspired by an ongoing conversation with Coach Field and his wife. As the parents of six children, they are in constant prayer about their future sons and daughtersin-law. With the hope being that each of their kids find Godly relationships, they were inspired to use athletics to build future husbands and wives. We recognize that young people today are going through the most challenging time in human history with regard to moral obstacles. Currently, the standards and expectations for our future leaders are at an all-time low, and we think that needs to change."

The B3rd team, along with Field, includes TWCA's Spiritual Coordinator and high school Bible teacher Aaron Marez and Brian Goll — an English teacher at Jesuit College Preparatory School in Dallas, Texas.

With three separate curriculums - one for athletes, coaches and parents - everyone in the Warrior Community can be a part of the B3rd movement. Each Monday, all high school athletes, whether they are in season or not, are invited to meet in the SLC to go over the week's topic as an entire athletic community. The following days, each sport can meet individually with their coaches to discuss the content in more depth.

Each week, the lessons are comprised of:

Monday	Biblical Lesson
Tuesday	Old Testament Reading/Reflection
Wednesday	Pray the Psalm
Thursday	New Testament Reading/Reflection
Friday	Gospel Reading/Reflection

Field's basketball program has embraced the mantra — GOD, Others, Me — and the dividends have shown on the court with three state titles in the past five seasons.

"When embraced by the entire culture (athletes, coaches and parents), the B3rd mindset frees people from the trap of individualism and creates a counter cultural environment of authentic joy for team," Field said. "We have experienced both ends of the spectrum and much prefer serving players and parents who believe in God, Others, Me! It's refreshing to coach young people when you know that you have the support of their parents, and they trust you are working hard for the entire team."




# See You **At The Pole**

#### What made you want to go to Passion?

K For years, I heard about this huge Christian conference that changed so many lives. I always dreamed of going, but never had the opportunity. I follow Sadie Robertson-Huff on Instagram and saw her posts about how life-changing this conference is. When Coach Earle emailed seniors about attending, I knew I had to jump on it because of how impactful it would be.

**J** I wanted to go to Passion because my sister has gone the past few years and told me how much she learned and how awesome it is.

#### What was your favorite part of the conference?

K Every moment in and out of the arena those three days was absolutely life-changing. The worship was such an incredible thing to experience; the music and the overall vibes would give anyone chills. # One Day is Now

A Day of Spiritual Emphasis, Worship and Community

More than 1,000 middle and high school students from Houston-area schools joined together at Second Baptist to worship and learn for One Day — a full day of worship, speakers and breakout classes focused on revival. Students from various schools and faith backgrounds listened as keynote speaker Shane Pruitt proclaimed, "You are the church, right now."

He described the unique challenges facing Gen Z and issued a charge to each student in attendance to be bold, be wise, and to use their knowledge and energy to alter their community and the world for Christ.







In February, TWCA hosted LOVE Week, an annual event for high school students to focus on God's love and grow in their personal faith.

The week-long event kicked off with a powerful worship service led by Bristol House Music followed by a message from Rebelbase Ministries, that encouraged students to embrace God's love and peace.

# FAITH BAPTISMS on the FOOTBALL FIELD

**It was Wednesday** morning and the football team ended practice uncharacteristically early. The giant sports medicine water bath was on the sideline, and the entire football team gathered round as four students, one after another, stepped into the tank where they were submerged under water. Now before you think this was some sort of hazing practice taking place at The Woodlands Christian Academy, let's back up for some context.

JW Painter, senior at TWCA, transferred from The Woodlands High School with the hopes of getting more playing time. He was focused on football but quickly realized Woodlands Christian had much more to offer. Growing up, JW attended church on and off. He believed in God but didn't necessarily live out his faith. He was interested in getting more involved at church or taking more practical steps in his faith but didn't quite know how. That all changed when he attended the One Day conference at Second Baptist. After a day of worship and breakout sessions, JW made the decision to commit to learning more about God and exploring his faith.

Morgan Conejo, sophomore, was also feeling God move at One Day. Split between his mom and dad's house, he spent years vacillating in his faith. Things started to change when Morgan enrolled at Woodlands Christian. Coming from public school, he was used to walking through a metal detector and being sniffed by dogs and getting pat downs. At TWCA, he was surprised by how friendly people were and by how much the teachers care.

"You don't have to worry about watching your back. Everybody works together, and the teachers



help you. You can come from any walk of life. You could be a different skin color or act a different way, and they'll still treat you like family. In my first weeks here, I thought I was going to get jumped because everyone was so nice to me. People would come out of nowhere, come up behind me, know my name and say 'hi'. I wanted to throw my hands up and protect myself, but everyone here is just so friendly. I'm not used to that behavior!"

Diallo McMorris' journey began when he transferred from Klein Cain. Once he joined the TWCA community, his connection to God began to grow. Community events from Senior Retreat to One Day began fostering his relationship with Christ, which continued to deepen during his regular fellowship with Coach Svendsen. Diallo chose to be baptized in front of the community which had so greatly helped him.

Ava Kember is the first and only female football player on the team. She grew up in a Christian home and attended church every Sunday. Even though she received good grades in Bible class and did all the Christian "things," her faith didn't feel real. Ava started struggling with her mental health and started therapy. Over time, she realized she was not relying on God, and He was not the foundation in her life. Once she started relying on God, she experienced more joy and her mental health improved.

When Ava's family moved from Canada to Texas, she experienced growth in her faith. "Being around other Christians has helped me want to grow closer to God just like it says in Proverbs 13:20, 'He who walks with wise men will be wise.' When you choose to surround yourself with good company, these people will support and encourage you on your path towards your destiny."

Coach Svendsen spoke to the athletes about baptism and what it means to follow Christ. He offered an invitation to get baptized on the football field in front of their family and teammates. Morgan raised his hand - he was ready to get baptized. Ava had several opportunities to get baptized in the past but never felt quite ready. But when Coach Svendsen made the offer, she felt a sense of peace and knew it was the time to take the next step in obedience. JW's dad asked him if he was sure he wanted to get baptized on a football field instead of a church. He said, "I wanted to get baptized with people who care about me. It meant more to me because it was with the most important people to me."

Surrounded by family and teammates, Coach Svendsen baptized JW Painter, Morgan Conejo, Diallo McMorris and Ava Kember. He submerged them under water, not as a hazing ritual, but to signify their death to self and resurrection with Christ. Students cheered them on as they made this public declaration of faith.

Coach Svendsen continues to meet with the students each Monday morning for a Bible study and discussion. The students have been consistent. Maybe it's the donuts and kolaches, but more likely - it's the fact that they get to ask questions about Christianity and God. During this time, they discuss the foundations of faith, important biblical principals, and learn what it means to walk with Christ. Coach Svendsen emphasizes reading the Bible and setting aside time for prayer. Students confess the challenges they are dealing with and pray for one another.

Health Occupations Skills and Assessment for Future Physicians and Healthcare Workers (HOSA) was a new course offered at TWCA in 2022-2023. Students engaged in hands-on training in health occupation skills for medical anatomy, clinical pathology, medical terminology, pharmacology, trauma and emergency response.

This new course gives students who are interested in the medical field the opportunity to start their training and certification process two years earlier than their peers. The course also instills leadership skills, interview skills, professionalism, and prevents provider burnout by equipping students with a spiritually solid foundation along with some mental health skills needed to work in the health industry.

HOSA students are developing hands-on, lifesaving skills. In the fall semester, students completed a unit on wounds and traumatic injuries that included Stop the Bleed training, Red Cross internal and external bleeding, Apprentice Doctor bleeding training, and wound closure lessons where they mastered several different types of sutures.

#### The HOSA 1 Honors course includes training in the following areas:

Splinting

for injuries

background

patients

- CPR
- AED use
- Basic lifesaving skills including intubation and airway control
- First aid for sudden illnesses
- Emergency response
- Wound care
- Wound closures
- Life-threatening bleeding
- Acute injuries for neck, head, spine, and joints

Upon completion of this course, students receive certifications from the American Red Cross in CPR/AED/First aid for infants, pediatrics, and adults, with skills boosts in asthma rescue, anaphylaxis endorsement, NARCAN overdose training, and medication administration of intramuscular injections.

Equipped with four to six medical career certifications, our HOSA students will be set apart from others applying for college and majoring in the medical field. Upon graduation from high school, these students are ready and able to find jobs working in hospitals, doctors' offices, and medical laboratories.

Our students are blessed to have such a unique learning experience as they explore career paths in healthcare. HOSA provides valuable experience in the medical field while preparing students for a career in healthcare. The future of the medical field looks promising with these Warriors!

# **Boys Golf Takes State**

It was a record-setting finale for the TWCA boys golf team, which captured its third-straight TAPPS 5A State Championship title in May. The Warriors set a program and state record, shooting a collective 39 strokes under par (537) over the two-day tournament.

Senior Aaron Pounds won the individual title with a two-day score of -16 (128), clinching the championship with a 25-foot birdie putt on the last hole. Fellow seniors Jake Maggert, Jack Usner and Sam McClure all finished inside the Top 10, and underclassmen Alex Malanga and Duke Heise each finished inside the Top 20 of the tournament. Pounds, Maggert and Usner will all be competing for the Texas A&M golf program next year, while McClure will play for Southwestern University.



A large group of students, parents, staff and community members gathered on the last Tuesday of May for a groundbreaking ceremony to mark the end of the capital campaign and the beginning of construction on the new Fine Arts Educational Building and Outdoor Amphitheater. Students led the group in prayer, and we thanked God for His goodness to our school. It was a wonderful way to end this fantastic school year and begin the summer!

A total of \$10,800,000 was raised in gifts and pledges for this project, enabling us to begin construction on the new facility. We are extremely grateful to our Campaign Chairs, Johnna and Ryan Edone, and all of our generous families who have helped us meet this goal so quickly! Our construction partner, SLI, is ready to get to work on this project. Barring any unforeseen construction delays, our students will be able to enjoy this new facility in Fall 2024.

The 22,585 square foot, one-story Fine Arts Education Building will be the latest addition to the school's 40-acre campus. The facility will accommodate fine arts specialties including theatre, band, choir, dance and the visual arts. Features include the largest black box theatre in the Houston area with the ability to seat up to 400 in a variety of configurations, an art studio, a dance studio, a choir hall, a band hall, and space to showcase student artwork.
