Welcome

The first month of the academic year has been very busy and productive for the DAC. We needed to fill several positions on our DAC and our DAC subcommittees. The DAC membership subcommittee received an overwhelming response from new volunteers to fill these positions. We are thankful so many people want to participate at the district level. We appreciate the time commitment all of our volunteers make.

The DAC had the pleasure of hosting the first of four SAC Training Sessions on September 26. The DAC was excited to meet and exchange information with so many SAC and administration representatives from D11 schools including several of our charter schools. We are in the process of analyzing your feedback and suggestions to better advance the communication between us. At our next session, Dr. Thomas will be giving us more information about new SAC responsibilities. We look forward to seeing more schools participate at our next SAC training session on November 7th.

The DAC Accreditation Subcommittee, in co-ordination with District personnel and full DAC, has been reviewing District and School Performance Frameworks (SPFs and DPF), 2018-19 state mandated test results, and accreditation ratings of every D11 school. Three D11 schools will file a "Request to Reconsider" regarding their Accreditation ratings. Six D11 schools are recommended to receive an Accreditation rating of Performance with Distinction from the district for posting a SPF > 80.0 %. The committee also worked on giving input for the three Priority Improvement and one Turnaround schools USIPs (School Improvement Plans).

The DAC Budget Subcommittee had its first meeting on September 10, 2019. The subcommittee focused on developing its annual charges and educating new members. In addition to its usual charges, the subcommittee expressed an interest in reviewing certain D11 academic programs (GT and GMP, AVID, ST Math, and IB as time permits).

We are continuing on our mission to open channels of communication between all District stakeholders. We thank you for your support and request your input/ feedback. If you have material that can add value to this newsletter, please share it with us. Do not hesitate to contact us with any questions, comments or concerns regarding this newsletter or your responsibilities as a SAC.

MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOL SACs TAKE NOTE:


- School District 11 is part of a new community of schools work-based learning initiative called the Pikes Peak Business & Education Alliance (PPBEA). PPBEA's mission is to "connect students' talents, interests and aptitudes to the economic landscape." PPBEA primarily serves as liaison between our community of K-12 schools and our area business partners while creating an environment where our region can "grow its own talent". PPBEA recently launched its new "MARKETPLACE" website <u>https://ppbea.org/</u> where teachers, classrooms and students connect and participate in work-based learning opportunities sponsored by our community's businesses.
- The PPBEA has partnered with more than 100 local businesses that have sponsored over 200 work-based learning opportunities in hundreds of occupational areas and dozens of career pathways. They currently have room for nearly 6,000 students to participate! Work-based learning activities include career information sessions, class presentations delivered by industry professionals, site tours/field trips, job shadows and informational interviews, internships, and youth apprenticeships or preapprenticeships.

SAC News & Updates

A *sample letter* from Joseph Mezzofante (DAC Vice Chair/Membership Chair) for Principals to send out to help with recruiting parents/guardians for their SAC committees.

Dear Parents and Guardians,

I know your child's education is important to you. For that reason, I would like to make you aware that your school has a School Accountability Committee (SAC). Do not fear the title. It isn't a formal meeting that requires a deep understanding. Look at the SAC as an opportunity to see what your school is doing and providing feedback.

Depending on the school, SACs can meet between once a month to once a semester. At max, you are looking at up to 2 hours a month. There is no cost to attend. You simply find out the SAC schedule from your school and show up.

SAC meetings are rather simple. You get to see the school's budget, attendance and discipline data, hear about new programs, and discuss upcoming events. If you want to be involved in your school but find time to be a limiting factor, your time will be wisely spent by merely investing a couple hours in your local SAC.

The first time I went to a SAC, I felt out of place until the meeting started. Once I saw how simple it was, I quickly became involved. You learn about things the school is doing that you wouldn't otherwise know. You also get to meet fellow parents. I am now on my 5th year of being a member of the Odyssey ECCO SAC. It was time well invested.

If your school doesn't have a well-established SAC, there is help. The district has SAC training to help teach you the inner workings of things like how a budget should look or what programs are out there that may assist your school. The first SAC training was held at 2560 International Circle on Thursday, September 26 at 6PM. The DAC Training and SAC Support Committee is also another tool to help get your SAC off to a good start.

If you have any questions, please ask. If you want to be connected to the DAC Training and SAC Support Committee, just let me know. Your education is something that stays with you. SAC Meeting Agenda Planning

- Every month we intend to provide a reasonable flow of SAC agenda topics for the month that meet the broad responsibilities of School District 11 SACs. This is just a reference tool and individual SACs should tailor agendas appropriate to their school needs and emphasis. The following are some of the agenda topics that are recommended for the October SAC meeting;
 - * Train SAC on USIP elements (as needed) review/finalize USIP. [Tips: For comparison, USIPs for 2018-2019 for individual schools are available at <u>http://www.cde.state.co.us/code/accountability-performancesnapshot</u>. Click on the lower right of the screen for the Unified Improvement Plan in the display for your school. Helpful background information on the USIP requirements and processes for the 19-20 school year is available from CDE at <u>http://www.cde.state.co.us/uip/uip_general_resources</u>
 - Review/discuss School Readiness plan for kindergarten and READ Act implementation, funding, and student status/results (ES only). [Note: Senate Bill 19-199, passed earlier this year, made significant changes to the READ Act (See http://www.cde.state.co.us/coloradoliteracy/sb19199updates) Ask your principal how this has changed the school's approach to meeting READ Act requirements].
 - Review school focus on Individual Career and Academic Plans (ICAPs) and new graduation requirements approved by D-11 Board of Ed. in spring 2016 (MS & HS only)
 - * Review Galileo K-12 first quarter Aligned District Benchmark results (if available) and compare against USIP targets
 - * Review Power BI Early Warning System data for the school collected since the start of school in collaboration with the principal and identify areas of concern in academics, discipline and attendance.

Howbert ES


