WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Please join us in <u>naming</u> Early College High School.

You may not realize it, but "early college high school" is a legal designation for the type of institution being run. It's the same type of designation as "elementary school", "middle school" and "high school". For this reason, as we enter our 5th year, ECHS desires to have its very own name—a name that distinguishes us from every other "early college high school" throughout Colorado.

We've developed the following timeline for submitting name proposals:

- Thursday, 9/14 at 3:00 p.m.: All name suggestions and rationales for the name suggestions should be typed and will be due to Mrs. Lacey in the Principal's Office, Room 170.
- Friday, 9/15 at Phoenix Feathers: Students, parents, staff members, or community members who
 submit the suggested names will be required to present the suggested name and the rationale for
 why the proposed name should be selected—to the whole school at Phoenix Feathers.
- Thursday, 9/21 at Open House: Students, Parents, Community Members, and Early College & Career Pathway Staff will be given an opportunity to "VOTE" for the name to be presented to the Naming Committee at the end of September. The committee will then present to the District 11 Board of Education their recommendation as determined by our community.

As members of the Early College High School community ponder names, we'd like to encourage you to submit names that coincide with the mission of Early College High School and Career Pathways—as well as names that will accent our school's mascot: The Phoenix.

Our mission is: Respect. Integrity. Scholarship. Effort. At Early College High School, students RISE to meet the challenges of school and life. We practice excellence to succeed in a future not yet imagined.

Please refrain from submitting names that are already attached to other Pikes Peak area schools as our purpose is to create our own unique identity.

Finally, please be aware of Colorado Springs School District 11 Board of Education Policy FF, Naming of District Facilities, Properties and Assets Revised October 10, 2012 that states:

NAMING OF DISTRICT FACILITIES, PROPERTIES AND ASSETS

The Board of Education (Board) has the final approval authority in the naming of Colorado Springs School District 11 (District) facilities, properties and assets. This includes any space or area within any facility or property.

To aid in the recommendation and approval process, the Board establishes a standing Naming Committee (as outline below; names to be approved by the Superintendent) to accept and process written naming proposals each semester, if needed. The Naming Committee will solicit all evaluation information and data required for its deliberations through the Superintendent. The committee will designate its own chair and the committee will establish committee rules.

Proposals regarding nominations are welcomed and may be submitted by a member of the Board, the Superintendent, staff member, parent/guardian, student, consultant, civic group, any employee organization recognized as the official

representative of any group of employees or any resident of the District. A standard naming nomination proposal form will be used for all submittals (see FF-E).



All proposals will be submitted to the Naming Committee. There are two submission deadlines per year; the last day of each school semester. When a name or names are submitted by a semester deadline, the committee will meet the following semester to review those proposals. The Naming Committee may solicit additional data and/or interview individuals in the evaluation process. Nominations of living individuals will not be accepted and deceased individuals must have been deceased for at least 5 years.

Membership of the Naming Committee should consist of:

A representative from each division

Two Principals, one from Elementary and one from Secondary Schools

Two Teachers, one from Elementary and one from Secondary Schools

Two Educational Support Professional (ESP) Employees


Two representatives from the District Accountability Committee who are not employed by the District

The Superintendent will review membership annually and give membership updates to the Board as needed.



The Naming Committee will accept all input for review and evaluation. The Committee will document its evaluation and recommendation with regard to all nominations and forward to the Board for approval or disapproval. Nominations may address the renaming of existing entities and/or new ones. The Board will solicit input from the Superintendent/staff with regard to impacts (legal, physical, financial, materials, timing). Page 2 of 2 Colorado Springs School District 11 Board of Education Policy FF, Naming of District Facilities, Properties and Assets Revised October 10, 2012

The Board shall use a careful and orderly process in examining all naming proposals and facilitate the process for administrative and legal review as needed. The Board may hold a public hearing on specific Naming Proposals if desired. In selecting names, special consideration will be given to those names that will have special meaning to students and citizens of the community. Schools at any level may be named for presidents; statesmen and heroes of national fame; governors; statesmen and heroes of state fame; national and local educators; community and civic leaders; historical people, places, events; geographical locations; near-by subdivisions; or adjacent streets. No two schools in the district will be given the same name.

The Naming Committee shall review all nominations submitted, considering whether recommendations are consistent with the policy and whether deviations from the policy and guidelines, should they occur, are warranted. The committee shall make advisory recommendations to the Board at a regular scheduled meeting for non-action, then as an action item.

The Superintendent's Office shall receive all naming proposals submitted for consideration of the Naming Committee and then shall forward them to the chairperson of the Naming Committee for evaluation and recommendations.

The PPCC drop and withdraw dates are listed below. Please take special note that students who attend classes on the RJWAC campus are on a 17 week course schedule, and those students who attend the PPCC campus are on a 15 week course schedule. The critical dates will differ.

Students who attend classes on both campuses must be aware of both schedules and navigate them accordingly.

No Show Date: If the student does not show up for an enrolled class, the student will

automatically be dropped. Tuition reimbursement fees may apply.

Drop Date: The date the student must drop the class by, in order to avoid tuition

reimbursement fees.

Withdrawal Date: Student may withdrawal from the class, however tuition reimbursement fees

will apply. The student transcript will reflect that the student withdrew from

the class.

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT - UPDATE - JAMES OWINO

The department of Science at Early College and Career Pathways (ECCP) is offering the following courses during this fall semester of 2017: Introduction to Environmental Science and Honors Biology. The other course offered by the science department but is not available this semester is Soil Science. The



teaching of these courses involves lectures, laboratory and field activities. Some of the field activities involve working in the greenhouse and the school garden area. This area is important to the science department because it helps students have hands on experience and it also supplies the department with specimens for lab activities.

The latest exciting news is that Science department received a grant of \$2,500 from the Colorado FFA foundation which we intend to use to improve/renovate our greenhouse and school garden and also facilitate FFA activities such as raising of seedlings and composting making. These activities are pertinent to our Agriculture Education program and the FFA chapter. A student is considered to be a completer of the Agriculture Education program after pursuing and passing the Soil Science and the Environmental science course.

During the summer break, I was able to attend the CACTE conference in Loveland, the AVID summer institute in Denver and the Greenhouse Management workshop held on the FRCC Westminster campus.

TARDY AND ATTENDANCE EXPECTATIONS

Good Afternoon Students and Families,

I am now confident after a full week of school, that students now have a good understanding of their class schedule and how to be punctual. Starting next week, full tardy and attendance expectations will be in effect.

- Students who are tardy to class times 1-3, will fill out a post card stating the reason for the tardy and a corrective action. It will be mailed home to parents, so they may have a conversation with their child.
- Students who are tardy times 4-6 received lunch detention.
- Student who are tardy times 7-9 received after school campus beatification tasks such as cleaning desks and vacuuming carpets, etc., from 2:45-3:30 p.m.
- Student who are tardy times 10-12 will attend "Tardy School" from 2:45-3:30 p.m. (Students can test out early by passing a "Tardy School Exam.")
- Finally, when a student is tardy more than 12 times, a conference will held with a parent and/or guardian and the student and guardian/parent will be required to meet with the Restorative Justice circle to complete an attendance plan.
- These expectations are per class, per semester.


