

"It was surreal being hired and I'm so grateful to have such a strong resource behind me through being an ROP student," Antonio shared.



Isabella is a junior at Chino Hills High School in Chino Valley Unified School District who took the BVROP Pharmacy Clerk course with Instructor Mike Garcia at the BVROP Career Training Center. She dreams of pursuing a career in the healthcare field. She expressed that ROP and her participation with IHPC has provided her with insight about the various career choices available within the healthcare industry. Isabella also completed a summer internship with Kaiser Permanente Regional Reference Laboratory in Chino Hills where she was able to job shadow a clinical laboratory scientist (CLS).

SPOTLIGHT ON THE STUDENTS



Students in the Baldy View ROP Stage Technology course at Claremont High School (CHS) in Claremont Unified School District built the set for their high school's production of the play, "110 Stories." The play centers around survivors of the September 11th attacks, providing students with the technical challenge of creating a stage set to reflect the events surrounding Ground Zero. The play's story also provides the students with the opportunity to stretch their historical appreciation for an event many of them do not remember occurring in their lifetimes.

Instructor Tom Evans shared, "110 Stories' is an important challenge for a high school theatre program. Students working on this production were either toddlers or not yet born when the Twin Towers fell. Working on the production lets every student reflect and remember an event that changed and shaped their world."

The technical nature of the course is at times more reflective of a construction course than what most would typically associate with a theatre course. However, constructing stage sets along with controlling various factors such as lighting and sound effects are just as essential to any play as those who act within it. Students taking the BVROP course learn all aspects of producing plays from behind and around the stage. They also work actively with students in the CHS Drama course which focuses on the acting component of the productions.

CHS ninth grader Maya Long worked on building the towers for the production modeled after the World Trade Center and shared that she enjoys the opportunity to watch actors utilize the set she helped build.

"It's really cool seeing how sets are put together and being a part of that. It's a great experience to see actors using the stage you worked on during the show," she shared.

After high school, Maya would like to continue working in the entertainment industry as a director and noted her gratitude for being able to diversify her skillset for her future career.

"If I'm a director but set work needs done I can also help with building. Plus after taking this course I think I can totally build a treehouse!" she joked.

CHS ninth grader Robert Davis worked with Maya and enjoyed the course as well.

"I want to be a graphic designer for a living and this course really teaches us about time management and attention to detail," he said.

110 Stories will be playing December 8th-16th at the CHS Auditorium.

CONSTRUCTION & BUILDING TECHNOLOGY

Instructor Rick Sander is concluding the first semester of the new Baldy View ROP course, Construction & Building Technology, at Don Lugo High School (DLHS) in Chino Valley Unified School District. The course introduces students to various manual and power-operated tools used in the construction industry. Students consistently practice using the necessary safety equipment and proper handling techniques for all of the tools they use in order to safely work in class.

Students work together in teams

throughout the course as they build various structures. One of their projects was building sheep feeders for use on their high school's sheep farm. The project involved more than just construction as students also had to engage in cost analysis. Students tracked prices and quantities of the materials they purchased for the project.

DLHS ninth grader Brandon Alba enjoyed the math aspects of the project as it relates to his future goal of entering a sales and marketing career.

"We needed to figure out the cost of the feeder. We were able to determine the cost by looking at how much we spent on materials. This is going to help me in my future in sales because in order to sell something you need to know a product's value," he said.

DLHS junior Jose Meza is interested in working either as a welder or a carpenter

and is a group leader in his class. His favorite project so far has also been constructing the sheep feeders.

"Getting angles cut and measured properly is the hardest and most important part because if you get it wrong you have to start all over," he explained. "It's great when it works and you've built something you can use. Mr. Sander is a very talented instructor and I'd recommend this class to anyone. Even if you don't go into construction, you'll learn how to work on your own home one day."

SPOTLIGHT ON THE STUDENTS



The Baldy View ROP Game Design & Development course at Hillside High School (HHS) in Upland Unified School District teaches students how to develop computer games from drawing paper to their computer screens. Instructor Gerald Jo introduces students to the task of drawing characters on paper, including multiple profiles, and then walks them through the steps of bringing their creations to life using the animation software 3DS MAX. Students will later create game environments for their characters and import them into game engines in the creation of playable computer games.

"Being able to work with this software gets them more comfortable with technology and gives them confidence as they can tackle something complicated. They will be able to implement what they learned in this class," Instructor Jo shared. "Students may encounter a different type of software down the road like something from the Adobe suite, but they'll be able to look at it and say, 'No problem, I can learn this.'"

HHS junior Sama Khan has always had an interest in video games and is now learning first hand what it takes to make one herself.

"This class is fun and lets you be creative. At the same time, there are a lot of details involved and you have to be really meticulous about the tools you use and what you use them for when you design your characters," she said.

"This class really makes you appreciate how hard video game designers work," he said. "It's an honor to be able to work with this software and to use the same tools that professionals in the industry use."



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

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Growing Our LVN Students

Baldy View ROP's Licensed Vocational Nursing Program is known for offering exceptional theory instruction and clinical training that produces historically high NCLEX pass rates for licensure. So how is this possible year after year? By the devotion and innovation of the BVROP staff, Dr. Sally Mahmoud, and the LVN instructors! Within the last two months students and staff have participated in three amazing projects.

First, BVROP LVN students volunteered their services during a free Medical and Dental Clinic organized by the Loma Linda Chinese SDA Church and the San Bernardino Community SDA Church. The clinic was held on November 10th and 12th in San Bernardino and welcomed residents to receive free medical, dental, and optical care. BVROP LVN students assisted with blood pressure screening, nutrition and lifestyle consultations, and offered diabetes screening and education. Marcelo Sekewael, a current BVROP LVN student, said not only was he excited by the opportunity to showcase skills and knowledge he's acquired through the LVN program, but was grateful for the opportunity to work with various patients and understand the importance of serving the community while adapting to constant change in a fast-paced environment.

Second, Dr. Mahmoud and LVN instructors, Katie Sixsmith and Pat Dodd, hosted members of surrounding clinics and fellow LVN programs during an Advisory Committee held at the BVROP Career Training Center. During the meeting, Dr. Mahmoud discussed emerging teaching techniques, employer expectations, and program productivity. Since joining the program in April as the LVN Program Director, Dr. Mahmoud has dedicated herself to ensuring students have what they need to not only succeed in the classroom, but in the field as practicing LVNs. Attendees were welcomed to tour the newly enhanced Skills Lab and offered an inside look as to how students prepare and train for their clinical sites.

Finally, Dr. Mahmoud has introduced the first LVN Peer Mentoring Program that pairs student mentors


