

SPOTLIGHT ON THE STUDENTS

Sports Medicine

The Sports Medicine course has long been a popular choice for BVROP students throughout our partnering school districts, and for the first time is now being offered at Upland High School. The course lays the foundation for students interested in sports medicine and its related fields of study such as physical therapy and kinesiology. The course also provides students with hands-on training in injury prevention and treatment.

Sports Medicine is taught at Upland High School as an embedded course during the school day and also features an after-school lab component that gets students involved with Upland High School varsity football and varsity volleyball games. Students rotate through home games as they job-shadow student trainers to gain a field and court-level look at live sports and the potential injuries that can take place within competition.

Instructor Jimmy Morin also works at Upland High School as an athletic trainer and will be working with his students during all of the games they attend.

"Being close to the action gives the students a great perspective on how we as athletic trainers see the game. Through the

job-shadowing they do, they are able to observe game set-ups and injury

management as it takes place within the games," Instructor Morin shared.

Students taking the course this semester have diverse career goals and interests. Upland High School junior Taygan Kennedy, who comes from a family full of nurses and doctors, wants to pursue a career in healthcare but is not sure in what capacity yet. She is also taking the BVROP Healthcare Occupations course at Upland High School.

"Both of my ROP courses give me hands-on experience and an idea about what my future may hold. It's a good opportunity for kids who have an interest in something to explore what that job might be like for them," she said.

Upland High School sophomore, George Estranga, has the goal of eventually working for the FBI. He sees his Sports Medicine course as being a good first step.

"We learn the anatomy of the human body, such as identifying different bones, learning how different joints function, and how to repair them. It's knowledge that could help me understand things like autopsies and information taken from crime scenes down the road," he said, adding that the BVROP Crime Scene Investigation course also at Upland High School will be "the next ROP course I take."

For its first semester, Sports Medicine is off to a great start and we are happy to be able to provide this versatile and emerging course of study at Upland High School!

Baldy View ROP Course

The new Baldy View ROP Computer Programming and Informatics course taught at Claremont High School immerses students in the crucial programming language, C++, by teaching them how to create their own computer games. Instructor Brent Gilson started the students off in their programming education by teaching them how to use Scratch, a type of coding software that allows them to learn the mechanics of writing computer code through a graphically enriched and easy-to-follow way.

"C++ is one of the most common languages used in game development and software engineering. It is also very common for college students majoring in computer science and related subjects to work with this language," Instructor Gilson explained. "The students begin with Scratch because it is easier to use than C++ and gets them used to what coding looks like and how it works. They'll use it at first but then will move on to using only C++ for the rest of the semester."

Students began the course by using Scratch for the first few weeks and analyzing the functions of various games. Students then used Scratch to create replicas of games that already exist, such as the retro classic Pac Man, or to borrow elements from pre-existing games to create their own.

Claremont High School senior Thomas Aguirre shared that he is interested in studying either game design or artificial intelligence in college, and feels that the course is preparing him for either field.

"I think it's really important to be exposed to a career that you're interested in and ROP courses are a really good way to do that," Thomas said. "I love how every task in this course is like a mini puzzle. The entire class period involves lots of problem solving and is a great way to learn coding in a structured and formal way. I had some experience with coding a little on my own, but not like this."

Claremont High School junior John Horgan echoed a similar line of thought in terms of being able to take the course and learn more advanced aspects of a subject he has already explored outside of school.

"I've done lots of self-teaching so I was really happy to be able to have this option in school. I wanted to finally take my first steps towards a career in coding and this is the first time I've had any proper teaching in the subject," John said.

When asked about the most important lessons he's learned so far, John shared, "I like to tell stories through games and I also want to be able to create software that will impact people in their daily lives. This course is teaching me more efficient ways to code, like the ways that you can store data in variable places so you can reference it again later and not have to keep retyping it. It's been a great course so far and something I'd recommend to anyone."

SPOTLIGHT ON THE STUDENTS


Commercial Photography

Students taking the Baldy View ROP Commercial Photography course at Etiwanda High School this year are gaining valuable professional experience as they have been getting involved with their school's varsity football program. Throughout the season, students' work is being featured as the

cover art for home game programs. By having their work featured, students are gaining first hand experience in producing work specific to a client's needs while also developing their own professional portfolios.

Instructor Derrick Williams emphasizes students' ability to use cameras the same way professional photographers do. Instead of relying on automatic settings to take pictures, his students are only allowed to shoot in manual settings, forcing them to make camera adjustments based on factors such as light and motion on their own. In addition, students become well-versed in working with the highly-used photo editing software, Adobe Photoshop, a standard program not only in the photography business but also in marketing and communications departments across many various industries.

Etiwanda High School senior Nick Garcia had his work featured for a pre-season home game program on September 2nd, and says taking the course has already influenced his future career.

"My parents own a bridal company in Fontana, which I've been working at for most of my life and will operate when I'm older. Thanks to this class, I'm going to be able to expand our photography component, which is something we've really never had before," he shared.

Regarding the selection of his artwork for a football game program, Nick said that he was proud, as were his parents regarding the news.

"I was surprised to hear it, but excited. Everything I know in photography is because of Mr. Williams. He really opened up the world of photography to me."

Don Lugo High School senior Kaya Flores is putting the training she received in her Baldy View ROP Sports Medicine course to quick use. Kaya took the course with Instructor Kim Hansen at Don Lugo High School last school year as a junior and was enrolled in both the embedded course as well as the after-school lab section. She passed her articulation exams in the subject, allowing her to earn college credit, and is currently working as a student athletic trainer with Ms. Hansen at her high school as well.

"Taking the ROP Sports Medicine course was a huge advantage for me because I get to practice on the field what I learned in class," Kaya shared.

Kaya credits the course with preparing her for employment. As part of the curriculum, Kaya learned about the protocol involved in various aspects of treating injuries and how to administer first aid treatment. She says she initially enrolled in the course out of an interest in the subject matter, but learned much more than she expected she would.

"I was interested in learning about the recovery process from sports-related injuries. I took the class expecting to just learn about the subject, but I also gained training to get a job in this field," she said. "The lessons you can learn through this ROP course are essential if you are trying to obtain a job."

Kaya's current responsibilities as a student trainer are to assist Ms. Hansen, who also serves as an athletic trainer for Don Lugo High School, in working with student athletes and addressing basic injuries and providing treatment not only for injuries but also to help prevent them from taking place. Kaya wants to continue her education in sports medicine and is planning on majoring in kinesiology in college so she can continue to work professionally as an athletic trainer.



CTE Incentive Grant Flash

A newly modernized and renovated medical skills lab will be up and running in October at the Baldy View ROP Career Training Center. The lab is updated with a variety of state-of-the-art medical equipment to be utilized by students taking Health Science and

Medical Technology courses including Medical Assistant, Sports Medicine, Healthcare Occupations, Licensed Vocational Nursing, and more!

The lab's renovations are made possible through the funds awarded to Baldy View ROP and our partnering districts, Chaffey Joint Union High School District, Chino Valley, Claremont, and Upland Unified School Districts, through the state-funded CTE Incentive Grant (CTEIG).

The lab features various sections designed to emulate settings found within the healthcare industry. These include hospital exam rooms, doctors' offices, and trainers' stations. Newly purchased equipment includes hospital beds, life-size training mannequins, sports medicine training tables, visual aids and

anatomical models, ultrasound equipment, and an electronic medicine dispensing unit!



IVN Program Introduces NCLEX Test Prep System

Baldy View ROP is introducing a new e-learning system to help further prepare our nursing students for the National Council Licensure Exam (NCLEX). BVROP's Licensed Vocational Nursing program is top-ranked by Practical Nursing based upon the NCLEX pass rates

among its students, which are historically higher than both the state and national averages.

The new e-learning system offered through Assessment Technology Institute (ATI) enables students to take tests and review learning outcomes throughout their LVN course so they can consistently assess their progress and target areas of the exam where they may need to improve their scores. The program also allows instructors the opportunity to augment curriculum and revamp course topics as they address students' testing outcomes.
