



Baldy View ROP Total Enrollment Data for 2016-2017


Percentages of Baldy View ROP students enrolled in the various course sectors we offer





SPOTLIGHT ON THE STUDENTS

Welding Technology

One look at the Baldy View ROP Welding Technology course taught by Instructor Jessica Carter and it is easy to see what hands-on, Career Technical Education looks like. What might not be as immediately visible however, is that the course also prepares students for college. Welding Technology is one of Baldy View ROP's many articulated courses and shares an articulation agreement with Mt. San Antonio College for their welding program.

Chaffey High School senior, Andrew Abrego, shared that while he is taking the Welding Technology course at Chaffey, he enrolled in the course at Upland High School as well due to the articulation agreement it offers.

"A few of us in here are from Chaffey and are taking both courses. When we found out that we could get college credit for this course, we wanted to take it too," he said. "I'm really passionate about this, making things out of metal with all the fire and sparks and everything. To be able to make a career out of this is exactly what I want to do. A course like this is important because there are new jobs coming up out there that are going to need young welders. The earlier we start the more beneficial it is to us and the workforce."

Students who take both Welding Technology 1 and 2 will walk away with considerable experience in various types of welding, including gas and arc.

Upland High School senior, Crystal Lara, also credits the course with introducing her to her passion and has opened her eyes to a line of work she never considered previously.

"I took this course because I really like cars and wanted to be an auto mechanic, so I thought that working with metal would be good for me," she said. "Now that I'm here, I have fallen in love with welding."

Crystal's plan is to continue on to Mt. San Antonio College, and later transfer to CSU San Diego for their underwater welding, skills she would like to eventually use in the Navy.

"Welding is rewarding. It takes steady hands and consistency, and it also takes determination. Mrs. Carter is so encouraging. Sometimes people tell me I'm taking welding too seriously, but she helps me to brush it off and keep working hard to achieve my dreams."

SPOTLIGHT ON THE STUDENTS



After encouragement from her fellow Registered Dental Assistant (RDA) classmates, Rancho Cucamonga High School senior Ressa Moss decided to apply for the HPC 2017 conference emcee contest.

Eleven takes later, Ressa had the 30 second video she submitted to the Inland Health Coalition that would ultimately win her the token of Master of Ceremonies at the Conference in March. Ressa anticipates the days leading up to the conference, and is excited to fulfill her role at the event where she will get to introduce speakers and keep the crowd entertained! The Health

Professions Conference is held each year and gives high school and adult students, from San Bernardino and Riverside counties, an opportunity to meet healthcare professionals. This conference also provides students with resources to complete and begin their careers in healthcare.


Ressa made it a priority to try as many programs as possible including, choir, art, and music to have an idea of what she wanted to do for her career after high school. “After joining the RDA class, I was introduced to new skills and realized that I wanted to be a dental lab technician.”

Aside from making many friends in the RDA program, Ressa said she loves the hands-on-experience and her favorite days are when she gets to do lab work.

“It sometimes can seem overwhelming, but I always have to remember that we are being trained for a career. ROP introduces you to your career and can alleviate the process of trying to find out what you want to do for a living later on in life. Being able to find something you could want to do for a career while still in high school is a great opportunity.”

With her senior year coming to an end later this year, Ressa is already preparing for her future in Dentistry. She has been accepted to the Dental Lab Tech class at Pasadena City College.

ADVANCING DIVERSITY AND EDUCATION IN THE HEALTH PROFESSIONS

New Baldy View ROP Course



The Careers in Public Service and Safety course at San Antonio High School taught by Instructor Joe Nash teaches students about a variety of careers and their corresponding procedures. Careers include bailiffs, arson investigators, campus police, FBI special agents, fingerprint technicians, and polygraph operators.

San Antonio High School Principal Sean Delgado shared that the course corresponds well to a government course that all San Antonio High School students are required to take.

"Careers in Public Service and Safety is the practical application of what students learn in their government course. Together, these two courses complement each other to make the whole picture of justice come alive," he said.

Instructor Nash shared that early in the semester students have engaged in hands-on activities such as learning about and assuming field investigation stances.

San Antonio junior Brianna Alvarado enrolled in the course given her interest in law enforcement.

"I want to be a police officer so this course is perfect for me," she said. "I've researched different parts of police work on my own so to be able to take a class in the subject in school is great."

Students in the course were recently visited by a guest speaker, San Bernardino Sheriff Sandra Whitley, who is also Baldy View ROP Coordinator Crystal Whitley's daughter. Sheriff Whitley presented about the training it took to get her job as a sheriff and what her job is like.

Sheriff Whitley described the ordeals of the Academy which include heavy physical activity as well as intense academic rigor which requires many hours of studying. Students were especially interested in her account of the most physically demanding week during Academy training, which includes trainees being tazed as well as being maced. In fact, trainees are made to run an obstacle course directly after being pepper sprayed.

"As bad as it sounds, it's actually fun. Everyone is cheering each other on, suffering it out together and making it through together," she said.

Sheriff Whitley added, "There are times in the Academy when you want to give up, but you keep pressing on and you'll make it through. It's worth it. I've had other jobs before but in this job I get to make a difference."

Mike Jones' work as a maintenance worker for the City of Chino Hills involves varied landscaping responsibilities that require technical training and experience. Mike is a certified arborist, a commercial and estate chemical applicator, and a C27 certified landscaper. His work involves various landscaping duties including the diagnosing of trees for diseases and other risk factors such as their ability to withstand inclement weather conditions such as heavy winds.

While Mike's line of work certainly involves a high degree of physical and hands-on labor, it is not without a variety of office-related functions as well.

“I have to write reports on trees and create spreadsheets to communicate data. The risks involved with trees can be unpredictable, and it's important to be able to create reports that give an idea of the different things that can happen to them so that we can act and plan properly,” he said.

The programs Mike uses most consistently are Microsoft Word and Excel, though he also uses PowerPoint when needing to put together a slideshow for a presentation. While Mike has been familiar with these particular programs for years, his experience with them did not begin until high school. While a student at Boys Republic, Mike took the Computer Software Lab ROP course at Buena Vista High School which served not only as an introduction to these programs, but to computers in general.

“Learning how to use these programs has continued to help me in what I do today, being able to make professional and usable reports and presentations. These programs also helped me to get a job in general. I was able to create a resume through Word because of the ROP class I took, which helped me to get hired.”


Mike continues to be involved with ROP as he volunteers with Instructor Derek Scott's Landscaping course taught at Boys Republic. He works with Derek to find projects for students, and is able to talk to them and offer advice.

“These kids are on the same path I was. They have certain rules they may not understand now, but that will help them later. Things like tucking in their shirts and to speak politely are simple rules, but simple rules have taken me a long way.”

Mike also assisted at an event at Boys Republic last spring where Exmark came to the campus to demonstrate and showcase various landscaping equipment. While students in the Baldy View ROP Landscaping course tested out the equipment, Mike spoke with them about his line of work as a landscaper and also shared insight to the path to employment. The event was exciting for the students as it was also attended by landscaping industry professionals who were actively hiring.

“It's a great day out here, lots of good influences for the boys, and some of the employers here have jobs available for them once they graduate and finish school. I'm happy to help out and tell them about what I do, and let them know what's possible for them to achieve,” he said at the time.

When not at work with the city, Mike is enjoying the busy days of fatherhood with his three young children and his wife Gabriana.








Partner Profile: Piping Industry Progress & Education

Staff News and Notes




We recently toured the Amazon Wish Fulfillment Center in San Bernardino. The tour relates to the developing automated supply chain pathway to be taught at Claremont High School beginning in 2018 and the Career Training Center beginning in 2019.

The Amazon team provided us with a tour of their 1.2 million square foot operation. There are a total of 150 fulfillment centers across the United States that employs 2500-6000 employees. The 7th generation building we visited allows employees to still run the center manually, however the 8th generation building has robots that move packages to employees.

The wages earned in Amazon Wish Fulfillment Centers is almost 30% higher than what employees can earn working in retail stores. On average,


employees in these centers move 15-20 million products through shipping a day!


