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Introduction

Felsted offers a range of Scholarships and Awards which recognise and celebrate outstanding commitment and potential in a range of disciplines. We offer pupils significant opportunities to develop their skills and knowledge through specialist enrichment programmes. Scholarship and Award assessments take place for entry years 7, 9, and 12, although there may be some exceptions to this.

Gaining a Felsted Scholarship or Award offers opportunities and challenges, as well as the responsibility to set and maintain the highest standards at all times. In conferring awards, we look for gifted individuals who will be a credit to themselves and to the School.

Through our partnership with the Junior Department of the Guildhall School of Music in London, we are also able to offer joint Junior Guildhall / Felsted Music Scholarships for outstanding young musicians for entry at Year 7, 9, or Year 12.

We are very proud of the achievements of our past Scholars and Award-holders and we welcome applications from young people who will draw great benefit from, and contribute significantly to the life of the School.

Scholarships and Awards are valid throughout a pupil's time at Felsted and are subject to continuous assessment and an annual review for satisfactory effort and progress. Pupils in receipt of a Scholarship or Award are eligible to apply for a top-up bursary, which is subject to means testing and an annual review. Please note that there is no guarantee of bursarial support as demand normally exceeds the funding that is available.

Mary Skill Awards (MSA) are named after a Felsted benefactor, called Mary Skill, in recognition of her family's contribution to Felsted. Mary Skill Awards are offered to pupils who may not have achieved Scholarship level yet, but who can demonstrate real skill, enthusiasm, commitment in one or more disciplines. Although there is no fee discount for holders of a Mary Skill Award, this Award may be converted into a Scholarship at Year 9 or Year 12 if significant progress is made. Mary Skill Award holders have access to enrichment activities relevant to their discipline and genuine opportunities to develop talent, as well as mentoring and feedback from specialist staff and coaches.

Benefits

- Access to specialist enrichment programmes and events, such as those offered by the More Academically Able (MAA) and Enrichment and Challenge Programmes, Andrew Society and Roberts Society (Academic Societies in the Senior part of the School)
- Genuine opportunities to develop talent
- Mentoring and feedback from specialist staff and coaches
- Recognition all Award holders are presented with a framed certificate. Scholarship Award holders also receive a tie or badge denoting their Scholarship status
- Annual review of progress and achievements
- Mary Skill Awards may be converted to a Scholarship if significant progress is made

- Fee discount for Scholarship Award Holders, which is applied equally to day or boarding fees (with the exception of flexi boarding in the Prep School)
- All Award holders are eligible to apply for means-tested bursarial support
- Music award holders have the benefit of up to two free music lessons per week
- Drama award holders have the benefit of a free LAMDA lesson per week

Pupils identified through the scholarships and awards process will be encouraged to meaningfully act as leaders and role models to their peers and to younger pupils, thereby also contributing to their all round character development and skills. Pupils will benefit from the guidance of highly experienced staff who will encourage, acknowledge, challenge and extend pupils' learning in a variety of ways, in readiness for competitive applications and elite pathways beyond school age.

Duration of Awards

Awards are valid throughout a pupil's time at Felsted and are subject to continuous assessment and an annual review for satisfactory effort and progress. The Award may lapse where the reason for the Award is no longer relevant; for example, where a skill or interest is no longer pursued by the pupil.

All Felsted Scholars and Award holders are expected to uphold the highest standards of effort, attitude and behaviour and they are required to complete an Award Holder form agreeing to these standards on receipt of an Award. Awards may be removed from any pupils who fall below the required level of commitment.

How are Awards decided?

The assessments are carried out by specialist subject staff / coaches and award levels are determined by a combination of factors including:

- Performance in the assessments
- Demonstration of commitment, passion and potential in the chosen discipline(s)
- Previous experience and achievements
- Interview (this may be with the Head of Department and / or a member of the Senior Leadership Team)

In order to manage expectations, please ensure that you read the Entry and Assessment Criteria for each discipline prior to submitting an application and that your child meets these criteria. The criteria can be found in this document. Please contact the Admissions Office if you would like to discuss anything.

Taking part in an assessment does not guarantee an award; however, we hope that it is an enjoyable and rewarding experience and an excellent opportunity for candidates to demonstrate their skills and gain valuable feedback.

Decisions on all awards are made by the Head based upon assessment by the relevant Head of Department and specialist staff. These decisions are final.

Application Process

The Admissions Office will confirm details of the application process at the start of the Autumn term.

APPLICATION DEADLINE: <u>5PM FRIDAY 20 OCTOBER 2023</u>

Before applying, please ensure that your child meets the Entry and Assessment Criteria to avoid unnecessary disappointment. If you are unsure of your eligibility, we recommend that you discuss your application with the Admissions Office before submission.

Please note that candidates for Art and Design, Technology & Engineering (DTE) will need to prepare a portfolio and candidates for Drama will need to prepare two short contrasting monologues (one will be provided by Felsted).

Candidates typically apply for a maximum of <u>two disciplines</u>, which should be their strongest fields of study. Where candidates are genuinely excelling in more than two disciplines, please contact the Admissions Office to discuss before submitting your application.

Applications will be assessed against the entry criteria and pupils who do not meet the minimum requirements will not be invited for assessment.

All candidates who are invited for assessment take part in subject-specific assessments with specialist staff and attend an interview with a member of the Senior Leadership Team and/or the Head of Department. Applications are invited from both current Felsted pupils as well as external candidates who are applying for a place at Felsted school. All candidates will be assessed together following the same assessment criteria.

Candidates do <u>not</u> need to provide references as part of their award application; however we ask you to provide relevant contact details in case we need further information. If we need additional information, we will contact the relevant person directly. Due to the number of applicants, we may not contact every referee, particularly where we are satisfied that the candidate meets the entry criteria and has provided sufficient evidence of achievements, alongside their award assessments.

Current Felsted pupils moving from Year 8 into Year 9

Please see notes below if you are a current Felsted pupil moving from Year 8 into Year 9:

- If you currently hold a Felsted Scholarship, you do not need to reapply.
- If you currently hold a Mary Skill Award and would like to maintain your award at the current level, you do not need to reapply
- If you currently hold a Mary Skill Award and would like to be considered for a Scholarship, please submit a new application
- If you do not currently hold a Scholarship or Mary Skill Award but would like to be assessed for an award, please submit a new application (you may have been unsuccessful in a previous assessment, did not apply at that time or you may have joined the school since the last assessment)

Support For Learning

We are fully supportive of those with additional requirements and will make reasonable adjustments for candidates wishing to sit the assessments who have specific needs. Arrangements will normally be the same as candidates receive for their school examinations and should follow the normal way of working for the candidate. This could include:

- Provision of extra time (usually 25%)
- Use of designated space or workstation
- Use of assistive technologies (including P.C. but not including internet access)
- Provision of a reader and/or scribe
- Rest breaks

This is not an exhaustive list as arrangements are intended to be responsive to individual needs and some candidates may require a combination of arrangements. We ask that any SFL needs are identified on the application form and are accompanied by confirmation of normal working practice from the candidate's school.

All dates are prior to September of the Year of Entry. The Admissions Office will advise you of the actual dates for the relevant year of entry and candidates will receive an individual timetable. Depending on the disciplines being assessed (including individual sports), candidates may be required to attend assessments on several different dates.

Due to the number of candidates and the total number of assessments, we are unable to offer alternative dates for assessments unless in exceptional circumstances (e.g. illness or injury).

Financial Assistance

Felsted has a long tradition of providing assistance with the cost of school fees to pupils whose families do not have the resources to cover the cost of their education, but who would gain great benefit from the educational experience that Felsted can offer.

All bursaries are means-tested and are subject to an annual review. There is no guarantee of financial assistance as demands for support are usually in excess of the funds available. In the first instance, we recommend that you contact the Admissions Office with any questions and that you familiarise yourself with our <u>Fees</u>. Please also see our <u>Bursaries</u> page for more information.

Most applications for financial assistance fall into one of the following categories.

Top-Up Bursary

For applicants who have been awarded a Felsted Scholarship or Mary Skill Award and whose family can make *some* contribution to the fees but who are unable to afford the full fees. All bursaries are means-tested and subject to an annual review. We are not able to guarantee the required level of bursarial support for all applicants as demand normally exceeds the funding that is available.

Candidates who are invited to take part in award assessments may submit a bursary application once a Standard Place has been offered, however the Bursar will not make final decisions until all assessments have taken place and awards have been offered. The final deadline for bursary applications will be advised by the Admissions Office. Please contact the Admissions Office if you need a bursary application form.

Please note that we are not able to offer financial assistance to applicants who have **not** been awarded a Scholarship or Mary Skill Award and full fees apply to these places.

Open Bursary

This is a transformational award for applicants whose families would otherwise be unable to consider the School due to their financial circumstances. Families are typically unable to make *any* contribution to the fees and require 100% assistance.

Up to **TWO** Open Bursaries may be offered each year to day or boarding pupils entering Year 7, 9 or 12, who we consider will benefit most from the opportunity and who are in the greatest financial need. Demand for these awards greatly exceeds the funding available and parents will be asked to complete a confidential preliminary enquiry form so that we can advise eligibility to apply.

Families who are able to make some contribution to the fees and whose child meets the criteria for an award assessment should apply for a Top-Up Bursary and NOT for the Open Bursary. Please contact the Admissions Office to discuss if you are not sure which option may apply.

Applications for the Open Bursary should be submitted after entrance assessments and

once a formal offer has been made. The deadline for Open Bursary applications is **31 January** for entry in the following September. The Admissions Office will keep you informed of all relevant deadlines.

A decision will be made after consultation with the Heads and the Bursar and after a full review of all applicants. This process takes time and a decision will be made in February. You should be aware that we receive many applications for the Open Bursary and success cannot be guaranteed. We recommend that you have an alternative plan in case your application for financial assistance is not successful.

Entry & Assessment Criteria

11+ Entry

Academic

The expectation of Academic Candidates is high. The Academic Scholarship assessments take place in mid-January of the year of entry. Papers are set in English, Mathematics (comparable with 11+ or Scholarship papers) and Problem Solving (to test logic and deduction).

Applicants will need to evidence outstanding academic ability through school reports and the highest achievements in a range of subject areas. Pupils are expected to be at "exceeding" level in both English and Maths. Academic leadership within school or outside of school and evidence of a proactive and conscientious approach to learning will also be expected.

Art

Applicants must demonstrate:

- Strong observational drawing skills with accurate use of line and a good understanding of tonal value
- A willingness to work outside their comfort zone and try new techniques or materials
- An ability to link different ideas together and develop into a cohesive outcome
- A basic knowledge of art movements and established artists
- Evidence of working in a variety of media and varied scale
- A good understanding of composition and use of colour
- A commitment to pursuing Art at GCSE or equivalent

In addition to a practical assessment, **applicants are asked to prepare a well-presented portfolio**. This should include four pieces of their best work in whichever medium they prefer. In addition, the Head of Department would like to see two observational drawings of still life in different mediums — one colour and one tonal, together with any models the applicant has made. 3D work may also be included in the portfolio. Candidates should bring their portfolios with them on the day of the assessment, unless advised otherwise.

Design, Technology & Engineering (DTE)

Applicants must demonstrate:

- An ability to present ideas freely on paper, preferably in 3D
- An ability to respond to a design brief with a good variety of ideas and not fixate on one concept
- A keen interest in how things work and an understanding of how products are made.
 This can be shown with models made with card, paper, wood and other simple materials as well as with mechanical type kits such as Knex, Lego etc
- Insightful responses when faced with product analysis type questions
- A commitment to pursuing Design & Technology at GCSE or equivalent

Pupils applying for a DTE Award will be expected to submit a portfolio of evidence to support the above statements at interview. The portfolio should include details of design and make projects that candidates have undertaken, showing evidence of their graphics skills as well as photographs of products/models they have manufactured. Evidence of the use of CAD/CAM would be advantageous and knowledge of their favourite designers and/or design movements is suggested. Candidates must be able to discuss their achievements to date along with their future ambitions. During the interview process, students will complete a series of questions on paper to allow them to show off their graphics abilities to respond to design questions. Candidates should bring their portfolios with them on the day of the assessment, unless advised otherwise.

Drama

Applicants must demonstrate:

- Acting that demonstrates commendable vocal / physical skill, and versatility
- Perceptive understanding of text and a clear sense of interpretation is starting to be implemented in performance work
- Detailed analysis and evaluation skills of their own performance and that of others (it is desirable that pupils should have a wide range of theatre experiences)
- Must have previous performance experiences
- Willingness to respond and modify their acting in light of direction
- A commitment to pursuing Drama at GCSE or equivalent

Applicants will be expected to have an active interest in Drama and, where appropriate, have played leading roles in school and / or other productions. They will be expected to make a significant contribution at Felsted.

Applicants will take part in an audition where they will be required to **present two contrasting monologues** (approximately 5 minutes in total for both monologues). One monologue will be provided by Felsted School, the other should be chosen by the candidate.

Music

The Music Department operates a two-tier award system:

- Mary Skill Award for a single instrument (or voice). This honorary award includes the benefits of regular co-curricular opportunities, a music award holders session for extra theory and musicianship, and free individual music lessons on their given instrument.
- Music Scholarship for two instruments (or voice). Applicants need to be showing real promise on their first study instrument (or voice), in line with the guidance below. Promise and progress on a second study instrument also needs to be demonstrated. Potential Music Scholars will be expected to demonstrate commitment and passion for Music. This award includes the benefits of regular co-curricular opportunities, a music award holders session for extra theory and musicianship, free individual music lessons on up to two instruments and a Scholarship-linked fee reduction. Exceptional candidates may also be invited to audition for a joint Junior Guildhall / Felsted Scholarship.

Applicants who possess genuine musical potential are encouraged to apply for a Music award. Applications are welcomed from all musically talented children, irrespective of formal examinations taken.

As a guideline, the standard should be roughly equivalent to **ABRSM Grade 3/4**, however pupils near this level but making quick progress should not be deterred from applying.

Candidates should demonstrate a commitment to pursuing Music at GCSE or equivalent

Applicants will be invited to an audition, during which they will:

- Play two contrasting pieces on their main instrument / voice, and one piece on their other instruments (as applicable).
- Play at sight on main instrument
- Answer questions relating to their instrument and pieces performed
- Interview with the Director of Music

An accompanist will be available and school percussion can be used for auditions.

Junior Guildhall / Felsted Music Scholarships

The Guildhall School of Music and Drama is one of the world's leading conservatoires; Junior Guildhall is a specialist Music School offering advanced training to young people between the ages of 4 and 18. Through the School's partnership with Junior Guildhall, joint scholarships for outstanding musicians are offered.

Applications are made to Felsted as for traditional scholarships. If a pupil's audition and potential are considered exceptional, they will be invited to audition in London for the Junior Guildhall. If accepted, a Junior Guildhall / Felsted Scholar will attend the Junior Guildhall on Saturdays during term-time. Felsted staff will work with each Scholar to ensure that no academic work is missed.

Sport

Sports assessments are highly competitive and Awards are offered to pupils demonstrating excellence and potential in their nominated sports. More commonly pupils follow a carefully balanced multi-sport programme and this would be reflected in their application.

Candidates should offer **TWO** Felsted Core Sports from the list below.

Candidates will be assessed in two sports ONLY and should therefore choose their two strongest sports when applying; candidates may offer more than two sports but we will only assess the strongest two. Other sports may be taken into consideration alongside the core disciplines, but not in isolation. If a candidate offers a sport outside of our core sports, we would still hope to assess in two core sports, in order to ensure that they will contribute as widely as possible to the school's sporting programme.

Candidates who are strong athletes (track only) are invited to submit their best times in their best disciplines to strengthen their application; these times will be compared to age group regional and national standards.

In order to be considered for assessment, applicants are expected to be playing regular A-team level sport at school and / or playing regularly at a good club / regional level outside of school. Candidates are expected to show a commitment to pursuing PE at GCSE or equivalent.

For Tennis, applicants *must* have an LTA rating, which should be submitted on the application form. Candidates without an LTA ranking will not generally be assessed without additional discussion from tennis coaches.

For Squash, applicants must:

- Play squash regularly
- Be a member of a County Development Squad or higher
- Have taken part in England Squash or County run competitions
- Be able to complete the Off The Wall Squash Level 6 Skill Level Assessments

Each sport has a set of core and advanced skills which will be assessed in addition to sport-specific assessments.

Physical Tests (Core Skills):

- The physical tests data is objective
- Each pupil is ranked for their performance in eight physical fitness tests
- Ranks for the eight tests are added together to give overall rank on the day (the lower the rank the better)
- Test scores are also compared with previous Year 7 data
- Pupils will be assessed on their ability to carry out the core and advanced skills in increasingly competitive situations

The Physical Testing results show the athletic profile of a pupil (power, speed, strength, endurance, coordination) and are a great indicator of where athletes are in comparison to their peers. The Physical Testing result may be the point of difference if a pupil is between bands.

Sports Specific:

Candidates are ranked for their performance in each sport specific assessment on the day, and compared to previous Year 7 award-holders.

Candidates who meet the minimum criteria will be invited to take part in the assessments; the assessment process is the same for all candidates. Those who are offered awards would

be expected to execute all core skills to a high standard and demonstrate some of the advanced skills. Following the assessments, exceptional candidates may be offered a Sports Scholarship. Those who are not yet at scholarship level may be offered a Mary Skill Award.

Following assessment of the sport specific core and advanced skills, pupils are banded 1-4 as described below.

Band 1

The candidate demonstrates both the core and advanced skills to a consistently high standard. The skills are performed with accuracy and success when demonstrated in isolation and the quality of skill production remains high when utilised under pressure or within a competitive context.

The candidate's level of commitment and motivation are extremely high. They take on coaching points well and put them into practice.

Band 2

The candidate demonstrates the core skills to a consistently high standard. The quality of these skills remains high when utilised under pressure or within a competitive context. The candidate is also able to execute some of the advanced skills with consistency both in isolation and within a competitive context.

The candidate's level of commitment and motivation are extremely high. They take on coaching points well and put them into practice.

Band 3

The candidate demonstrates the core skills to a high standard. The consistency of these skills may decrease when utilised under pressure or within a competitive context. The candidate is also able to execute some of the advanced skills with less consistency in isolation and within a competitive context.

Band 4

The candidate demonstrates some of the core skills but lacks consistency when utilised under pressure or within a competitive context. The candidate is unable to execute the advanced skills both in isolation and in a competitive context.

13+ Entry

Academic

The expectation of Academic Candidates is high. Pupils will be asked to sit papers in English and Maths (comparable with higher level Common Entrance or Scholarship papers).

Applicants will need to evidence outstanding ability through school reports and the highest achievements in a range of subject areas. Academic leadership within school or outside of school and evidence of a proactive and conscientious approach to learning will be expected.

Art

Applicants must demonstrate:

- Strong observational drawing skills with accurate use of line and a good understanding of tonal value
- A willingness to work outside their comfort zone and try new techniques or materials
- An ability to link different ideas together and develop into a cohesive outcome, with reference to established artists
- A good knowledge of art movements and established artists
- Evidence of working successfully in a variety of media and varied scale
- A good understanding of colour theory and paint mixing
- Willingness to take creative risks and 'think outside the box
- A commitment to pursuing Art at GCSE or equivalent

In addition to a practical assessment, applicants are asked to **prepare a well-presented portfolio**. This should include four pieces of their best work in whichever medium they prefer. In addition, the Head of Department would like to see two observational drawings of still life in different mediums — one colour and one tonal, together with any models the applicant has made. 3D work may also be included in the portfolio. Art portfolios should be delivered one week prior to the assessment - these can be digital submissions in PDF format with original pieces brought in on the day of the assessment.

Design, Technology & Engineering (DTE)

Applicants must demonstrate:

- An awareness of more than one famous designer or design movement and be able to discuss this openly
- An ability to confidently use a range of graphic techniques including 3D representation, rendering techniques & final design detail
- A good working knowledge of CAD/CAM, but not essential
- workshop practice to produce a quality outcome
- An ability to be able to evaluate common everyday products and suggest alternatives/improvements
- A commitment to pursuing Design & Technology at GCSE or equivalent

Pupils applying for a DTE Award will be expected to **submit a portfolio of evidence** to support the above statements at interview. The portfolio should include details of design and

make projects that candidates have undertaken, showing evidence of their graphics skills as well as photographs of products/models they have manufactured. Evidence of the use of CAD/CAM would be advantageous and knowledge of their favourite designers and/or design movements is suggested. Candidates must be able to discuss their achievements to date along with their future ambitions. Portfolios / models should be delivered one week prior to the assessment - these can be digital submissions in PDF format with original pieces brought in on the day of the assessment. As part of the assessment process, students will complete a written paper that includes a mathematical component along with design questions.

Drama

Applicants must demonstrate:

- Acting that demonstrates impressive vocal / physical skill, and versatility
- Excellent understanding of text and a clear sense of interpretation is implemented in performance work
- Excellent analysis and evaluation skills of their own performance and that of others (it is desirable that pupils should have a wide range of theatre experiences).
- Must have previous performance experiences
- Willingness to respond and modify their acting in light of direction
- A commitment to pursuing Drama at GCSE or equivalent

Applicants will be expected to have an active interest in Drama and, where appropriate, have played leading roles in school and / or other productions. They will be expected to make a significant contribution at Felsted.

In their audition, candidates will be asked to **perform two contrasting monologues**, one provided by Felsted and the other to be the candidate's choice.

Music

The procedure follows the same format as 11+. As a guideline the standard is near or above the standard of **ABRSM Grade 5/6**. However, an applicant should not be deterred if they have not yet achieved this level, as potential is also of great importance. Candidates should demonstrate a commitment to pursuing Music at GCSE or equivalent

Applicants will be invited to an audition, during which they will:

- Play two contrasting pieces on their main instrument / voice, and one piece on their other instruments (as applicable)
- Play at sight on main instrument
- Answer questions relating to their instrument and pieces performed
- Interview with the Director of Music

An accompanist will be available and school percussion can be used for auditions.

Junior Guildhall / Felsted Music Scholarships

The procedure is the same as for 11+ entry

Sport

Sports Awards follow the same procedure as 11+.

Pupils are **expected** to put forward a minimum of two sports from **Hockey**, **Rugby**, **Netball**, **Cricket and Tennis** *or* **Squash**, but they can offer more if desired. If only one of the above sports is put forward, candidates would need to be performing both the core and advanced skills to an exceptional standard in order to be considered for a scholarship.

In order to be considered for assessment, applicants are expected to be playing regular A-team level sport at school and / or playing regularly at a good club / regional level outside of school. For tennis, applicants must have an LTA rating, which should be submitted on the application form.

Each sport has a set of core and advanced skills which will be assessed in addition to sport-specific assessments.

Candidates are expected to show a commitment to pursuing PE at GCSE or equivalent.

16+ Entry

Academic

At Year 12, potential scholars sit papers of approximately one hour duration each in **two subjects** of their choice, to be pursued at A Level or the International Baccalaureate Diploma (higher level). Please note they should be projected grade **levels 8 - 9** (or show equivalent standard if not taking GCSE) to be able to access scholarship papers, in order to have the opportunity of being successful.

Specialist Scholarships are available in Mathematics (Wallis) and Science (Hunter). These Scholarships may be awarded to one high achieving candidate per subject who wishes to take Mathematics / Further Mathematics or two Sciences (chosen from Computer Science, Biology, Physics or Chemistry) at A Level or IB and **pursue the subject at university**. Likewise, they should be projected grade **levels 8 - 9** to be successful in these papers. This award may be subject to confirmed GCSE results or equivalent.

Art

Applicants must demonstrate:

- Strong observational drawing skills with accurate use of line and a good understanding of tonal value
- A good knowledge of the formal elements
- Willingness to work outside their comfort zone and try new techniques or materials
- An ability to link different ideas together and develop into a cohesive outcome, with reference to established artists
- A good knowledge of art movements and established artists
- Evidence of working successfully in a variety of media and varied scale
- A good understanding of colour theory and paint mixing
- Willingness to take creative risks and 'think outside the box'
- Evidence of good critical and conceptual thinking skills
- Should be predicted a minimum of a **level 8** for Art GCSE or equivalent qualification.

In addition to a practical assessment, applicants are asked to **prepare a well-presented portfolio**. This should include four pieces of their best work in whichever medium they prefer. In addition, the Head of Department would like to see two observational drawings of still life in different mediums — one colour and one tonal, together with any models the applicant has made. 3D work may also be included in the portfolio. Art portfolios should be delivered one week prior to the assessment - these can be digital submissions in PDF format with original pieces brought in on the day of the assessment.

Design, Technology & Engineering (DTE)

Applicants must demonstrate:

- An awareness of more than one famous designer or design movement and be able to offer a personalised opinion of the products
- An ability to confidently use a range of 3D graphic techniques, rendering drawings to show form, as well as show evidence of how to present working drawings
- A desirable feature would be to have a good working knowledge of CAD/CAM, such as 3D printing, laser cutting but not essential
- Evidence of having completed a full design project through research, design, manufacture and evaluation
- An ability to be able to evaluate common everyday products and suggest alternatives/improvements considering ergonomic principles, commercial viability, use of technologies and material properties
- Should be predicted a minimum of a **level 8** for D&T GCSE or equivalent qualification

Pupils applying for a DTE Award will be expected to **submit a portfolio of evidence** to support the above statements at interview. The portfolio should include details of design and make projects that candidates have undertaken, showing evidence of their graphics skills as well as photographs of products/models they have manufactured. Evidence of the use of CAD/CAM would be advantageous and knowledge of their favourite designers and/or design movements is suggested. Candidates must be able to discuss their achievements to date along with their future ambitions. Portfolios / models should be delivered one week prior to the assessment. As part of the assessment process, students will complete a written paper that includes a mathematical component along with design questions.

Drama

Applicants must demonstrate:

- Acting that demonstrates outstanding vocal and physical skill, range, versatility, creativity and maturity
- Exceptional understanding of text and how to interpret it for performance
- Outstanding analysis and evaluation skills of their own performance and that of others (it is desirable that pupils should have a wide range of theatre experiences)
- Must have previous performance experiences
- Willingness to respond and modify their acting in light of direction
- Should be predicted a minimum of a **level 8** for GCSE Drama or equivalent qualification / experience
- A commitment to pursuing Drama at A Level or equivalent

Applicants will be expected to have an active interest in Drama and, where appropriate, have played leading roles in school and / or other productions. They will be expected to make a significant contribution at Felsted.

In their audition, candidates will be asked to **perform two contrasting monologues** of their choice.

Music

The procedure follows the same format as 11+. As a guideline the standard is near or above the standard of **ABRSM Grade 7/8**. However, an applicant should not be deterred if they have not yet achieved this level, as potential is also of great importance.

Candidates should be predicted a minimum of a **level 8** for Music GCSE or equivalent qualification

Applicants will be invited to an audition, during which they will:

- Play two contrasting pieces on their main instrument / voice, and one piece on their other instruments (as applicable)
- Play at sight on main instrument
- Answer questions relating to their instrument and pieces performed
- Interview with the Director of Music

An accompanist will be available and school percussion can be used for auditions.
