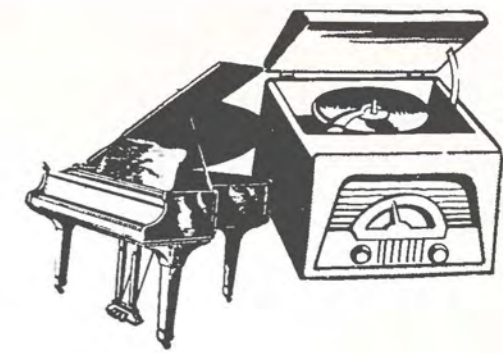

NATURAL SCIENCES

The sciences seek to lead "to God through science." Here in I.W.A. laboratories the student learns the relationship of living things to one another, and her responsibilities to created things. She gains a deeper appreciation of the world around her and a new insight into her place in a physical world. Those planning to enter college build for themselves a more solid background upon which to base advanced studies, while those who are terminating their educational experiences find themselves able to understand the complexities of a world built upon science.

Freshmen biologists, Kathleen Kennedy, Coralyn Hunt and Theresa Laudadio, analyze the pigments in chlorophyll by the paper chromatography method. Kathleen's work in chromatography and algae won for her the Grand Prize in the Junior Section of the Regional Science Fair. Kathleen and Mary Theresa Benavides both won a First Place in the FSA Science Achievements Award contest, also. Beaker Breakers science club is one of the largest at I.W.A. During the weekly meetings, lectures, career discussions and socials form a varied program. The club is affiliated with several state and national organizations, which affords science-minded students an opportunity to show their talent. Emily Vesely, club president, won Grand Prize in the Regional Science Fair, placed third in a Junior Academy of Science competition and won first place at St. Edward's University Catholic High School Science Fair. Patti Garnett, publicity co-chairman, won a blue ribbon in the Regional Fair and second place at the St. Edward's Fair.

Students work in new and modern laboratories with ample opportunity for experimental work.



I.W.A. was included in the Traveling Science Teacher program this year. Mr. Jesse Arriaga spent a week in science and math classes, demonstrating new and varied techniques in science. At the end of the week he appeared on a half-hour TV show on KZTV, using I.W.A. girls as assistants.



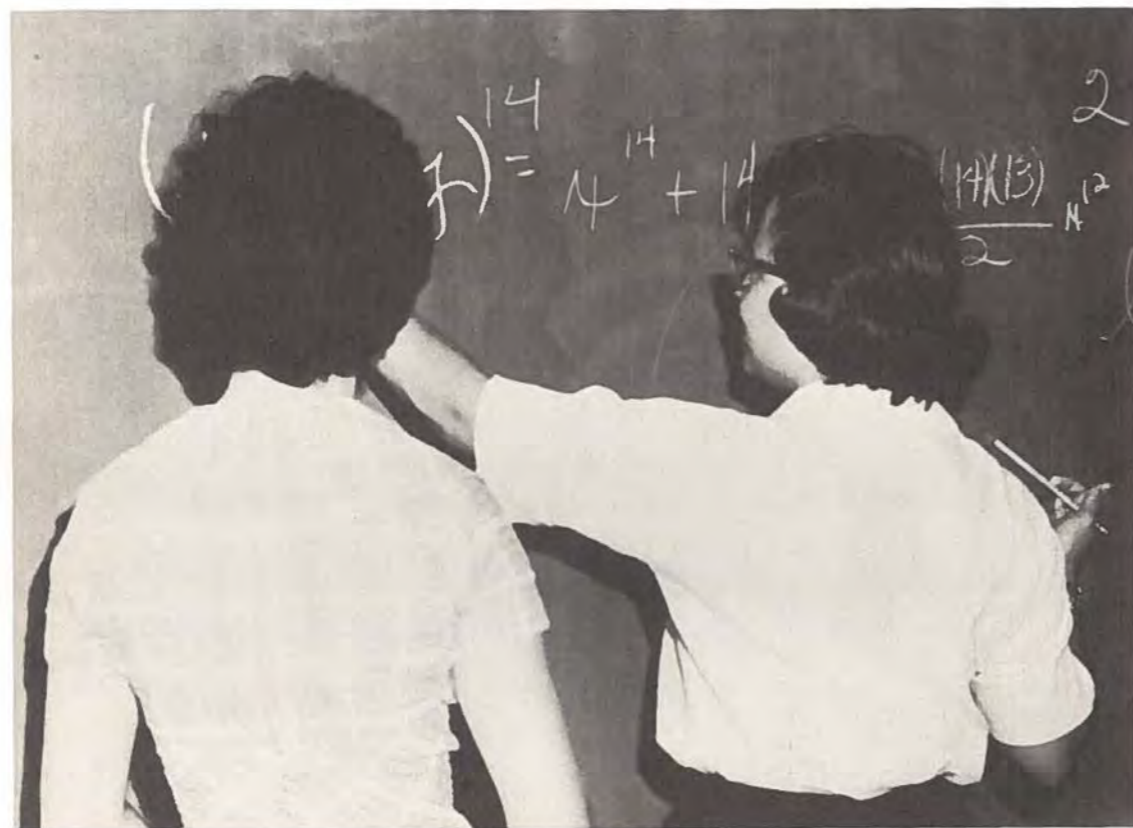

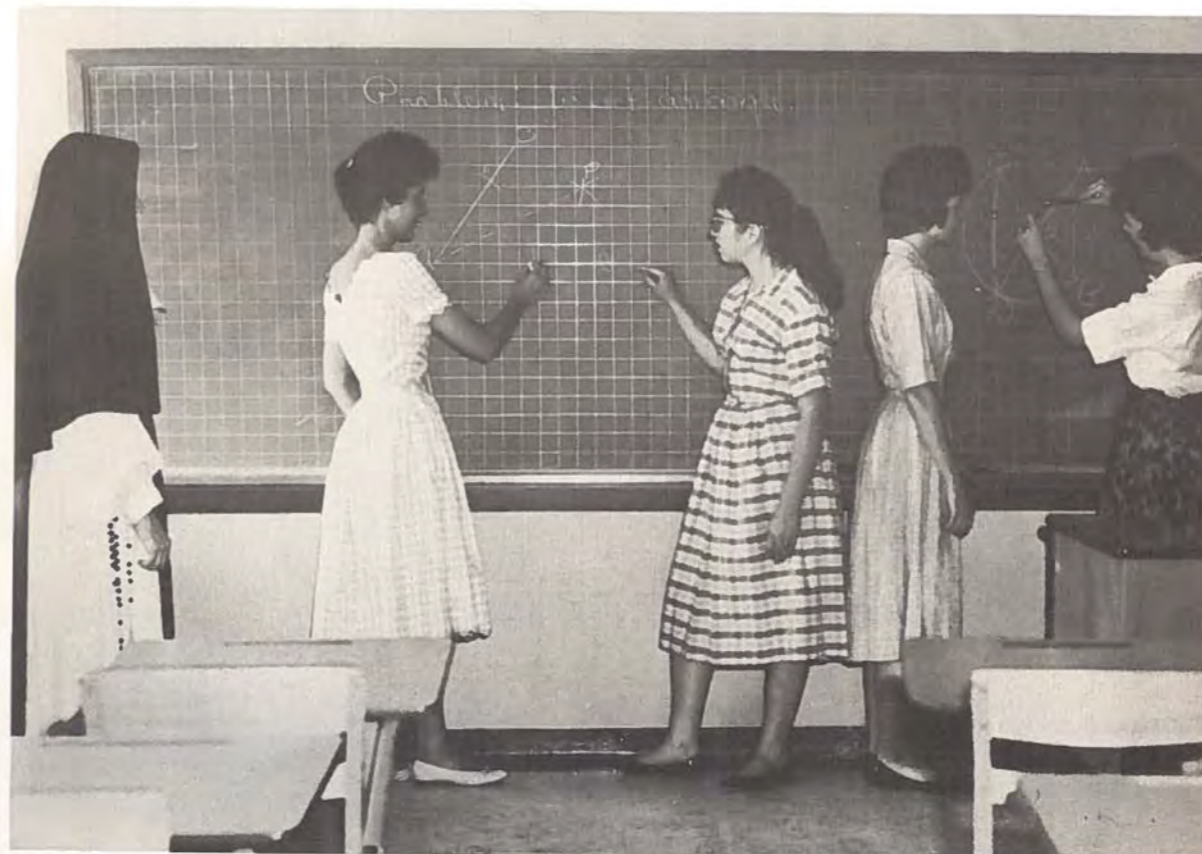

Shorthand and typing train them to become efficient stenographers and secretaries. Bookkeeping classes learn a useful skill which will serve as a career, or help them become more efficient financial managers in the home. Typing also is a useful skill for the college-bound girl and most I.W.A. girls avail themselves of the opportunity to acquire this ability.

All phases of homemaking are studied: cooking, sewing, nutrition, budget planning, child care, interior decorating and similar subjects.

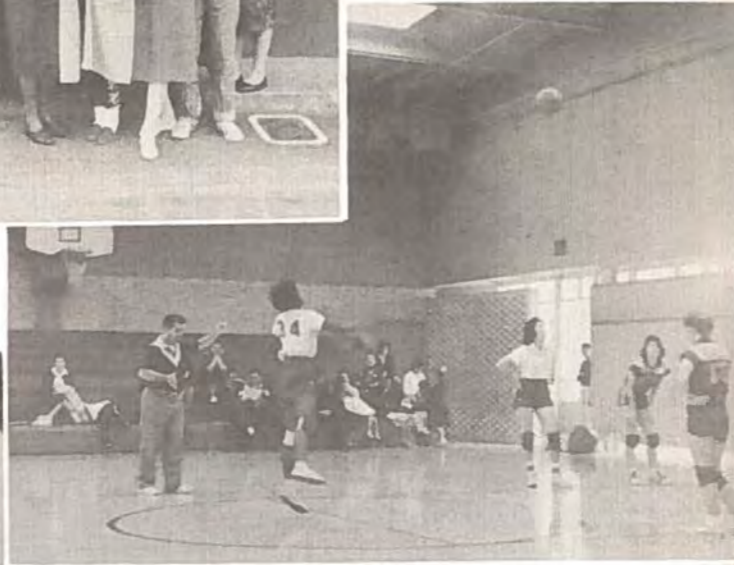

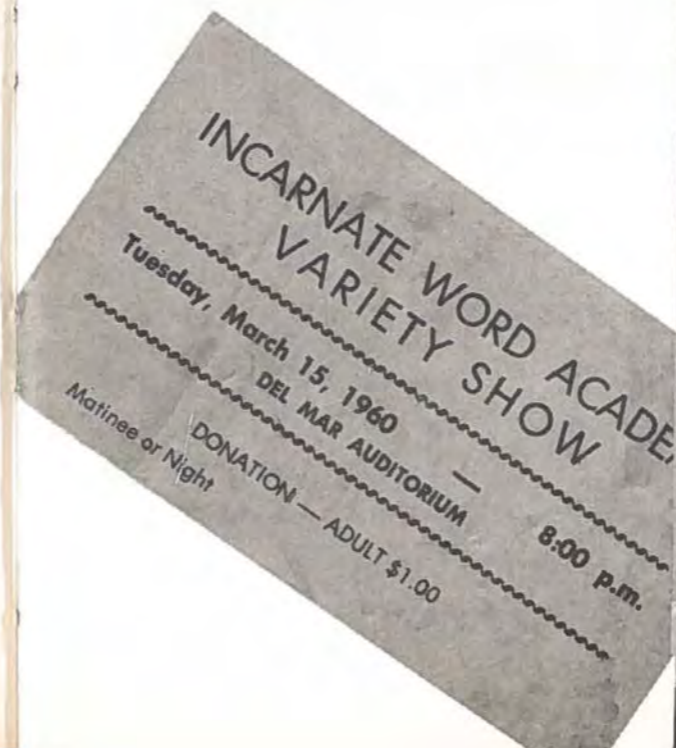
