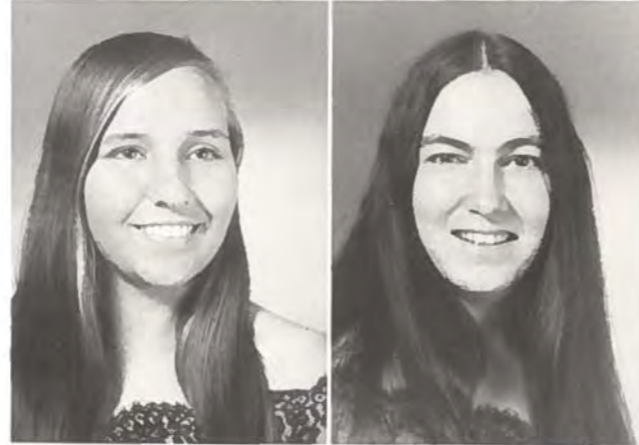

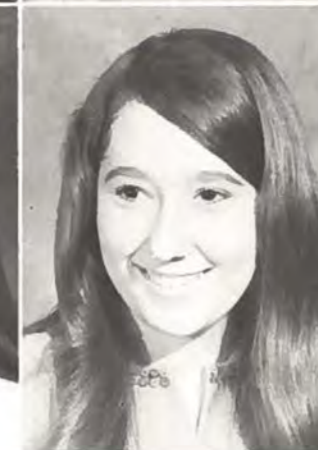

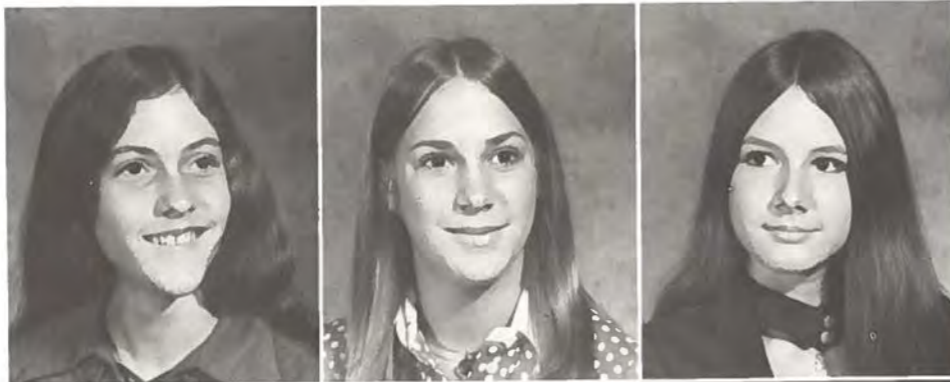

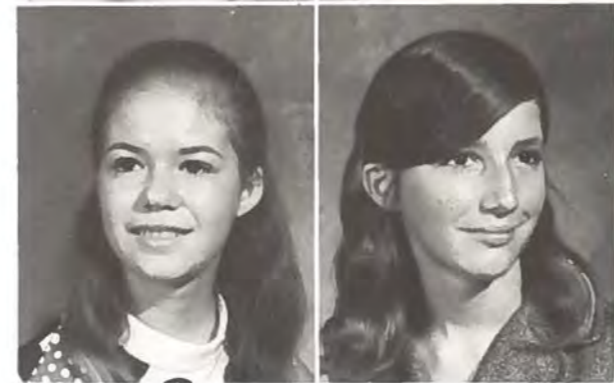

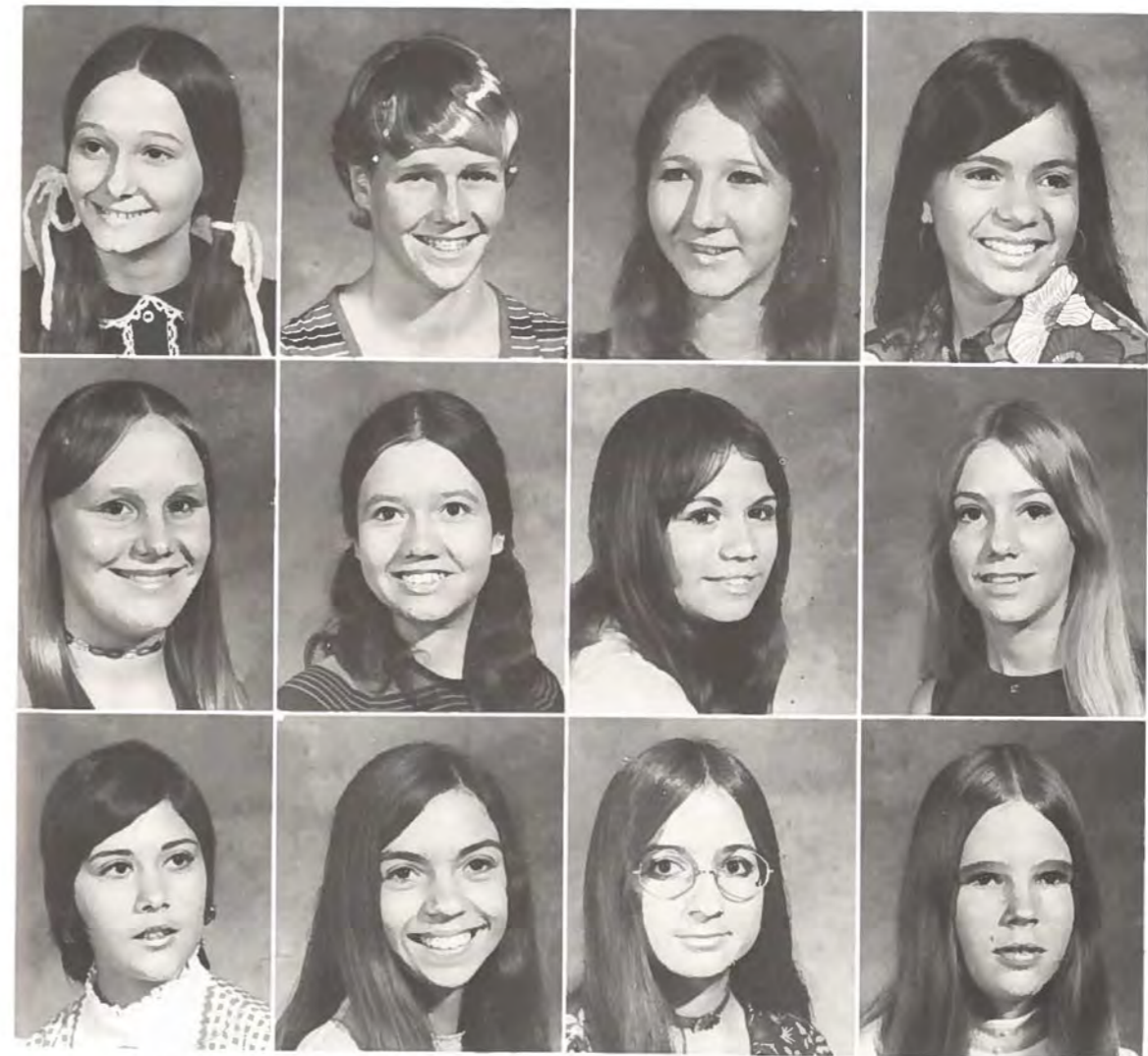

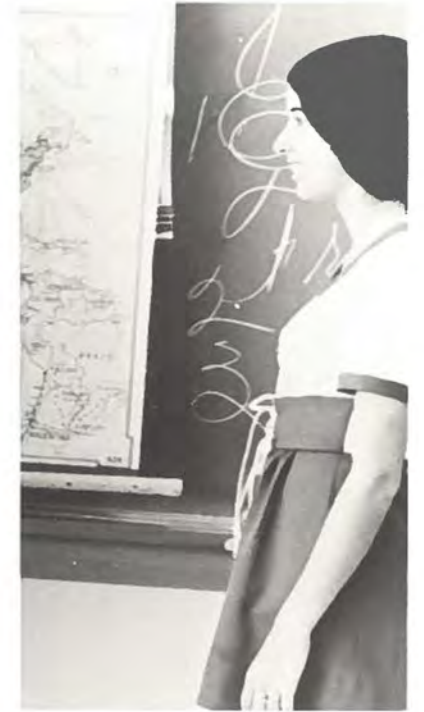

ENGLISH CLASSES USE POINT SYSTEM

English classes were graded on the point system during the second semester. Points are accumulated by the students for scheduled and unscheduled activities relating to English.

Scheduled activities included quizzes, lectures, written assignments, class participation and major tests. Unscheduled activities include reports, posters, notebooks, models, research projects and field trips.

Instead of grades being averaged at the end of a nine-weeks period, the points are totaled to get the grade for the term.

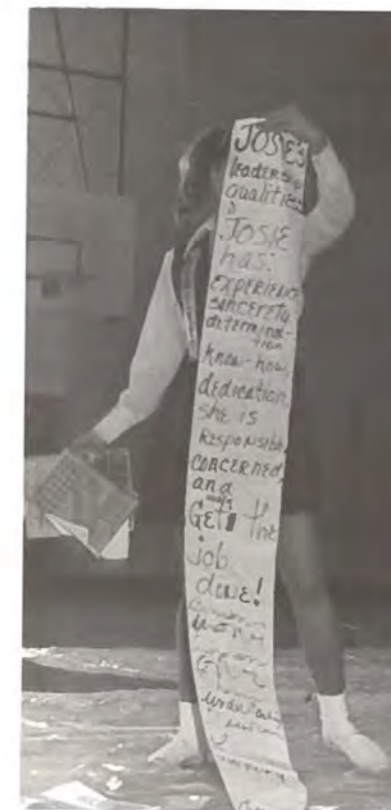

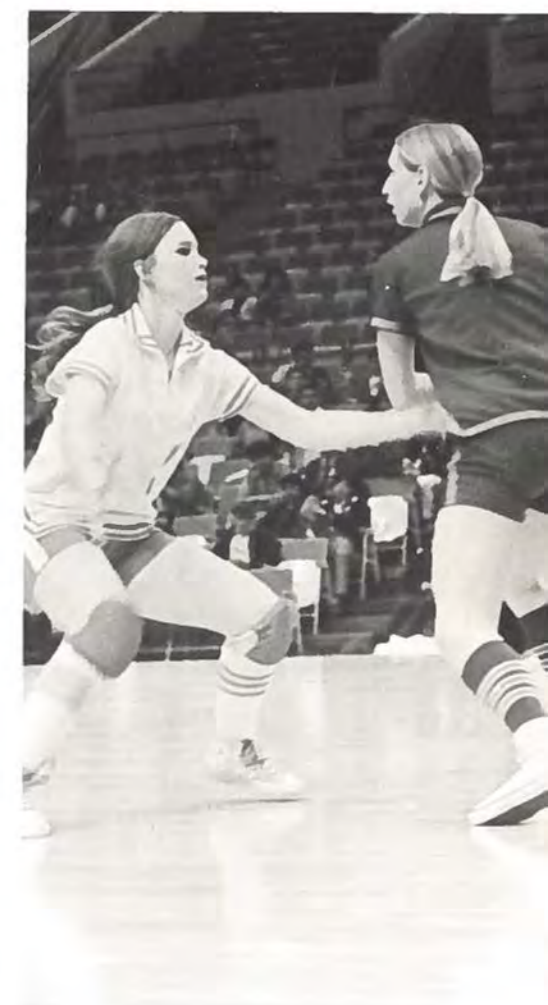

ANGELS TAKE HONORS IN BASKETBALL, TRACK

Angels ended their 1971-72 season with new records set. In their first year in the Texas Catholic Interscholastic League, they won the district basketball championship by defeating Providence High School of San Antonio and advanced to the state tournament. Angels played the first game in the Hemisfair Arena against the defending state champions, Alamo Catholic of Amarillo. The 53-38 victory put them in the finals against St. John's High School of Ennis. The Angels defeated the Crusaders 50-27 and gained the championship title. Anne Russek and Myra Tucker were elected to the all-tournament team.

In regular season play the Angels defeated teams from Odem, Taft, Orange Grove, George West, Gregory-Portland, Mathis, Woodsboro, and Flour Bluff. They lost games to Tuloso-Midway and Austwell-Tivoli. Their season record was 28 wins and 5 losses.

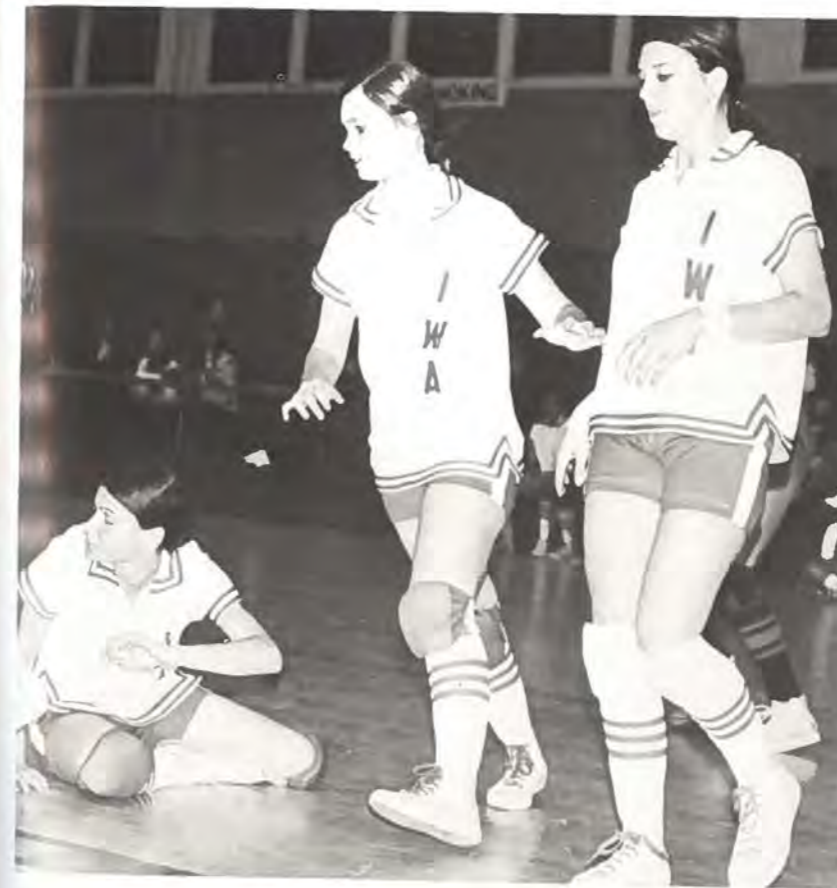
Hosting eight teams, the Angels placed second in their fifth annual Invitational Tournament in December. For the first time four public schools participated in the tourney - Mathis, Flour Bluff, Taft, and Rockport. Returning teams were Victoria Nazareth, San Antonio Providence, and San Antonio Blessed Sacrament.

The Flour Bluff Hornets and the Angels met in the finals which the Hornets won. Angels received the second place trophy, and Taft placed third. Kathryn Smith and Anne Russek received all-tournament trophies.

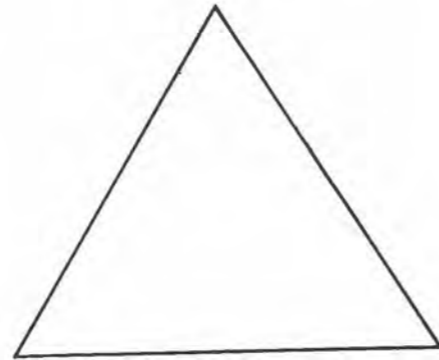
