# **SENIORS:**

We are off and running for your senior year, Class of 2024! Hang on to your hats, because it goes by FAST! Seniors, you'll be getting lots of support with with your college admissions process and other needs senior related. However, if you do not pay attention to the information that is being shared with you, well, you can get lost or miss out on opportunities. Therefore, please pay attention and read all communications that come from me and your advisors this year. Let's make it an awesome year and a smooth ride into your post-secondary plans.

I've attached a quick reference guide to you to keep track of your college admissions timeline throughout the year. It included some important dates if you are applying to CNM, UNM or NMSU. Helpful events and tools for seniors and families:

<u>Senior Advisory</u> will be an important time for you this year. Please attend so that you don't get behind in senior events and information that can help make a smooth year for you. I'll have UNM, NMSU, ENMU and CNM on campus during your senior advisories for presentations over the next few months.

Check your <u>SENIOR GOOGLE CLASSROOM</u> This will be a primary source of communication for scholarship postings, deadlines, senior events and opportunities.

#### FOLLOW THE ECA ELEMENTS INSTAGRAM

**POSTINGS-** This is another place to find quick reminders about senior events, financial aid, scholarships. Local information events and important details for your college admissions timeline.

**Required Senior Meetings**- Ms. Alicia will be meeting individually with every senior to review their transcript and to discuss post-secondary plans and to provide resources and answer

questions. Meetings will be starting in the last week of August. The link to schedule your senior meeting is:

https://calendar.app.google/BNR5SBZzYpmPJNsk7. You can schedule your meeting at the time slots available from August 28- Nov 2. Schedule now! You will get a calendar invite and a 2 reminder emails.

**FINANCIAL AID NIGHT- THURSDAY, OCTOBER 26**<sup>TH</sup>, **6-7PM, VIRTUAL EVENT**- This event will be hosted by FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) Experts from the NMEAF (New Mexico Education Assistance Foundation). They will go into detail about the different kinds of Federal Student Aid that are available for students and how to fill out the FAFSA. They will be able to answer some individual questions about individual FAFSA situations. The presentation will be followed by family assistance in creating individual FSA ID's. This is the first step before completing the FAFSA.

The <u>FAFSA 2024 Application does not open until</u> <u>DECEMBER</u> this year (has been October 1 for many years) Do not fill out an application before the posted opening date (we don't have the exact date yet but it won't be until December!). You would be filling out an application for the 2023 college year if you fill it out before December.

<u>October 20th-</u> These will be scheduled with your Senior Advisor

Starting a scholarship search: I recommend using the APS google sheet of scholarships. LINK TO APS SCHOLARSHIP GOOGLE SHEET It is a wealth of scholarship opportunities organized by who the scholarships are intended for and their deadlines. It's VERY easy to navigate which makes it very easy for you to organize your search. It lists local to national scholarships. There are other links on this page to check out as well. I will be posting individual scholarship opportunities in the announcement feed throughout the year in the Senior Google Classroom.

Tips:

- 1. Start with the colleges to which you are applying. This is where most of the scholarship \$ will come from.
- 2. Search and prioritize LOCAL and regional scholarships (national, save for last), these are less competitive, meaning you have a better shot at

getting one.

3. FILL OUT THE FAFSA even if you think you will not qualify for financial aid. Many college scholarships require that you have filled this out to receive the scholarship. The FAFSA application has been updated and has new financial qualifying measures, so you may be surprised!

Reminders of all events for seniors and families will be sent via email and posted on Instagram and in the google classroom.

# **About The Gates Scholarship**

The Gates Scholarship (TGS) is a highly selective, last-dollar scholarship for outstanding, minority, high school seniors from low-income households. Each year, the scholarship is awarded to exceptional student leaders, with the intent of helping them realize their maximum potential.

Selected Scholars will receive funding for the full cost of attendance to earn a bachelor's degree, that is not already covered by other financial aid and the expected family contribution, as determined by the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), or the methodology used by a Scholar's college or university. Costs covered include tuition, fees, books, and room and board, and may include additional personal costs. TGS also provides Scholars with various online support services designed to help them excel in their degree programs, graduate, and make a successful transition to their chosen careers. These include career services, mentoring, leadership development, wellness, and knowledge building.

#### **Basic Eligibility**

To apply, students must be:

- A high school senior
- From at least one of the following ethnicities:
   African-American, American

Indian/Alaska Native\*, Asian & Pacific Islander American, and/or Hispanic American

- Pell-eligible
- A US citizen, national, or permanent resident
- In good academic standing with a minimum cumulative weighted GPA of 3.3 on a 4.0 scale (or equivalent)

Additionally, a student must plan to enroll full-time, in a four-year degree program, at a US accredited, not-for-profit, private or public college or university.

\*For American Indian/Alaska Native, proof of tribal enrollment will be required.

## Ideal Candidate

An ideal candidate will have:

- An outstanding academic record in high school (in the top 10% of his/her graduating class)
- Demonstrated leadership ability (e.g., as shown through participation in community service, extracurricular, or other activities)
- Exceptional personal success skills (e.g., emotional maturity, motivation, perseverance, etc.)

Application deadline: Phase I of the application opened July 15, with a submission deadline of Friday, September 15, 2023, 5:00 PM PT.





# **CAREER PATHWAYS**

Career pathways are a structured approach to education and career planning that guide students through a series of courses, experiences, and opportunities aligned with their interests and goals. 
