We are at the halfway point of the 2022-23 school year and I could not be more proud of the learning and leadership I've seen firsthand in our schools. There is much to be excited about for the 2023 year.

The theme for this school year is "Ray of Hope: Happiness, Opportunity, Purpose, Excellence." There are Rays of Hope all around us. 2023 No Tax Increase Bond





Raytown Quality Schools is asking voters to consider a \$35 million no tax increase bond in the April 2023 ballot.

Approval of the \$35 million no tax increase bond would allow the district to address the immediate needs at Raytown South High School and Raytown High School.

The Why

Updated arts and activities spaces for district high school students is fundamental to their academic success and educational journey.

The What

If passed, bond funds would allow the district to move forward with providing up-to-date, state of the art facilities for high school students that would set the district programs on par with school districts in the metropolitan area.

At RSHS, bond funds would support the district in moving forward with a two-part plan to raze the existing performing arts center and turn it into an auxiliary gym. Bond funding would also allow for the construction of a new, modern performing arts center at RSHS.

Additionally, bond funds would allow the district to build a much-needed auxiliary gym at RHS. Auxiliary gyms at both high schools would provide spaces to host sports tournaments, and room for various school groups and activities to meet and host practices.

Zero Tax Increase Levy

The April 2023 ballot will also include a levy issue. While bond funds must be dedicated to the construction and renovation of buildings, levies are dedicated for learning.

The proposed zero tax increase levy transfer would authorize the transfer

of 18 cents in excess levy from the districts debt service fund into the districts school operating fund. This would allow the district to address some important needs and continue to pay debts on time with zero increase to the total tax rate.

Herndon Career Center's Student - Led Restaurant, Cinder, Successful Pop-Up Dinner Events



Cinder is the Herndon Career Center's Institute of Culinary Arts student operated restaurant, led by Instructor Chef Mike Chrostowski. The restaurant first opened its doors in 2020 with a soft opening to the public.

to provide an elevated dining experience to the Raytown community.

Challenge Team Spring 2022 Win Continues Supporting Students this School Year

A team of students in the RQS Challenge Program, housed at Westridge Elementary, won the Burns & McDonnell's Battle of the Brains competition in April 2022 for their "Riveting Robotics" design. The win earned the students a \$50,000 grant and the chance to work with Burns & McDonnell's engineers to turn their design into a real, one-million-dollar exhibit in Science City.

The win continues providing many opportunities for students throughout the 2022-23 school year, including hands-on experiences with engineers at Burns & McDonnell with visits to their offices and meeting with several members of their team responsible for building the exhibit. It provided for a second trip to the district's Raytown Schools Education & Conference Center, where students met with architects to learn about their careers. Two more trips will be held following Winter Break.

The \$50,000 awarded grant has benefited students on numerous levels, including funding a student trip to the Cosmosphere in Hutchinson, KS at the start of the school year. The grant will continue to support more student activities, including the purchase of various STEM items for the challenge program, professional learning opportunities for challenge teachers, coordinating educational speakers for student assemblies, and so much more.

Raytown Quality Schools is proud to share that the district has once again been named as one of the "Healthiest 100 Workplaces in America" by Healthiest Employers for 2022.


