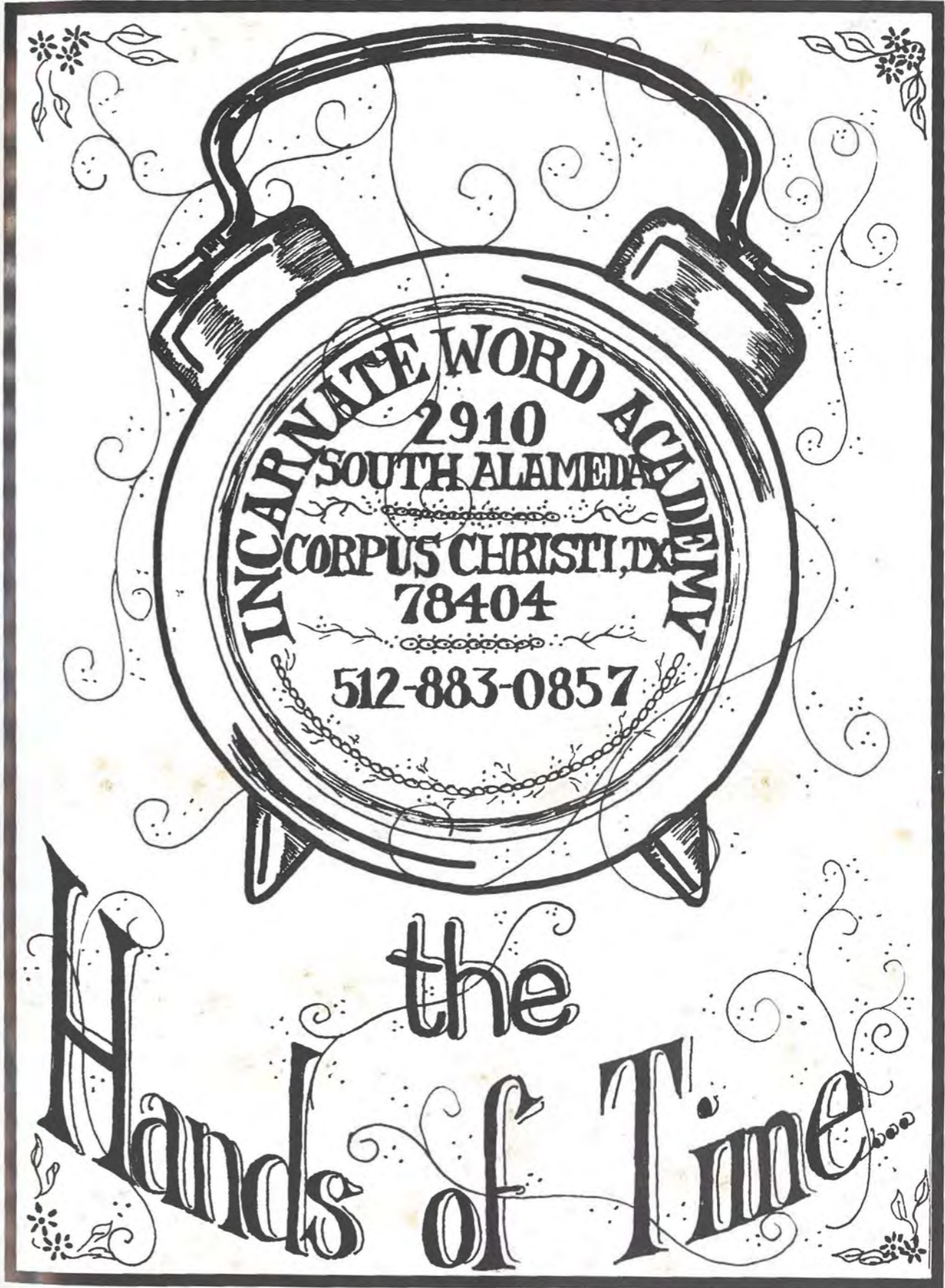

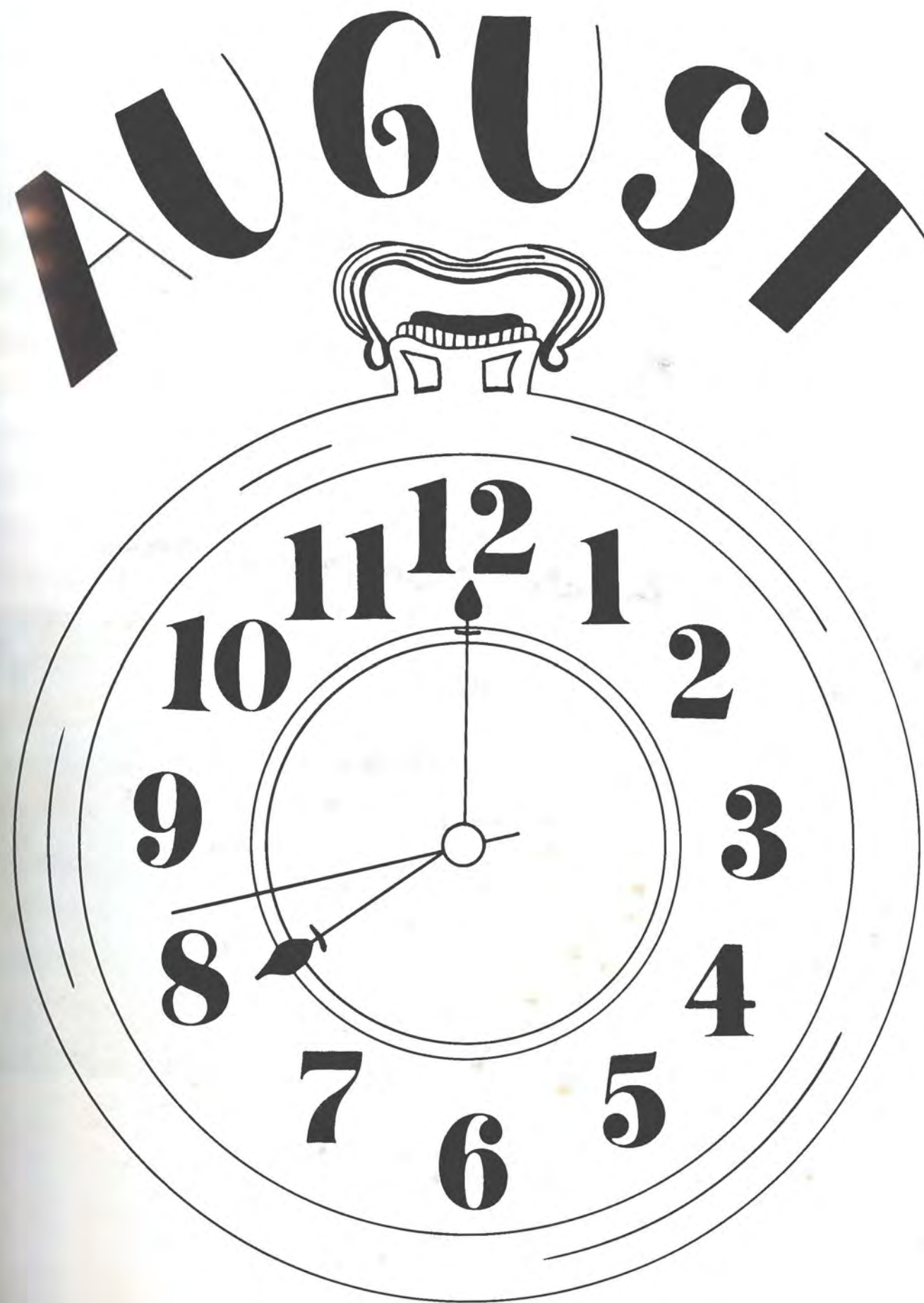
Hands the of Time

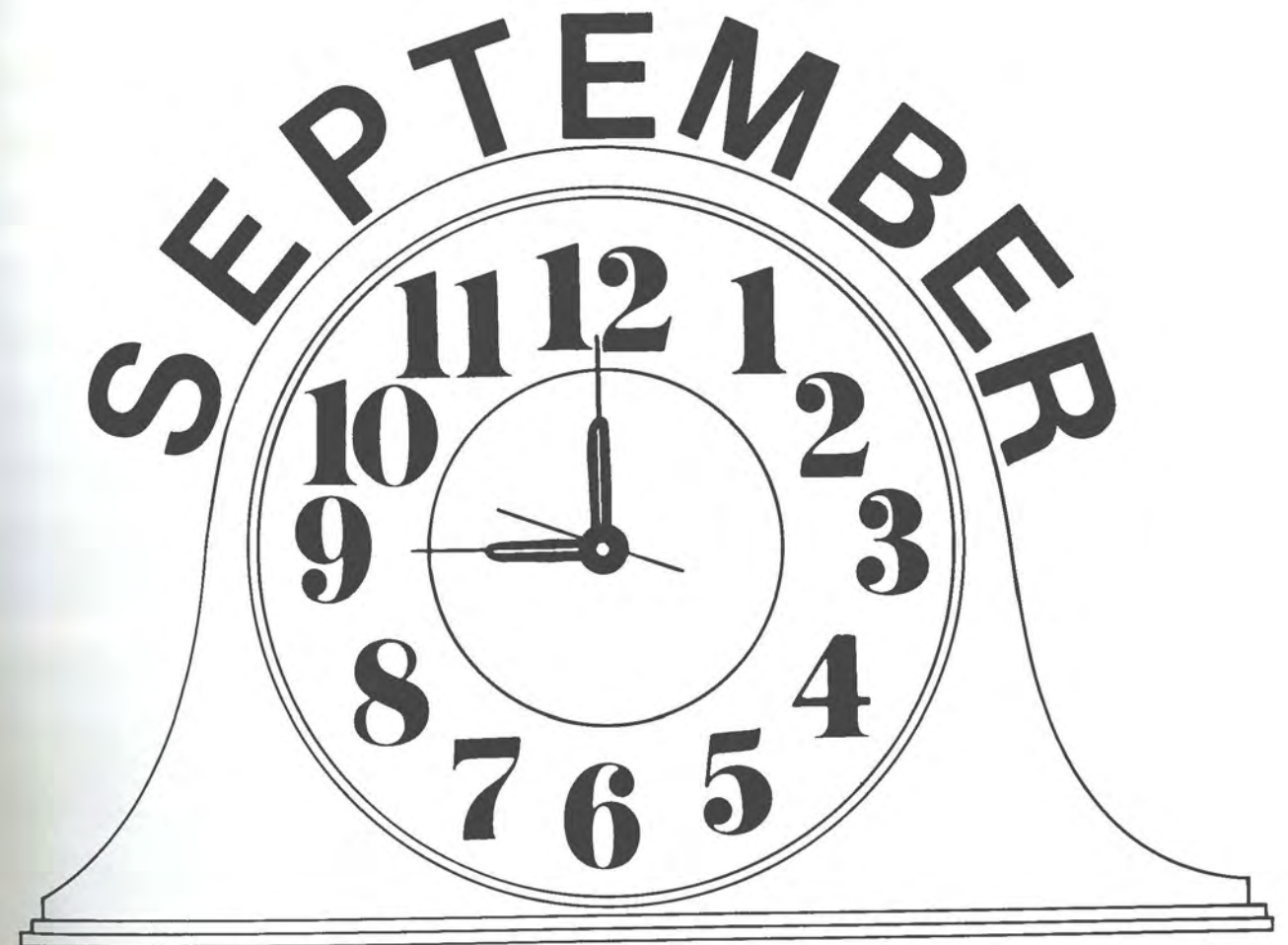

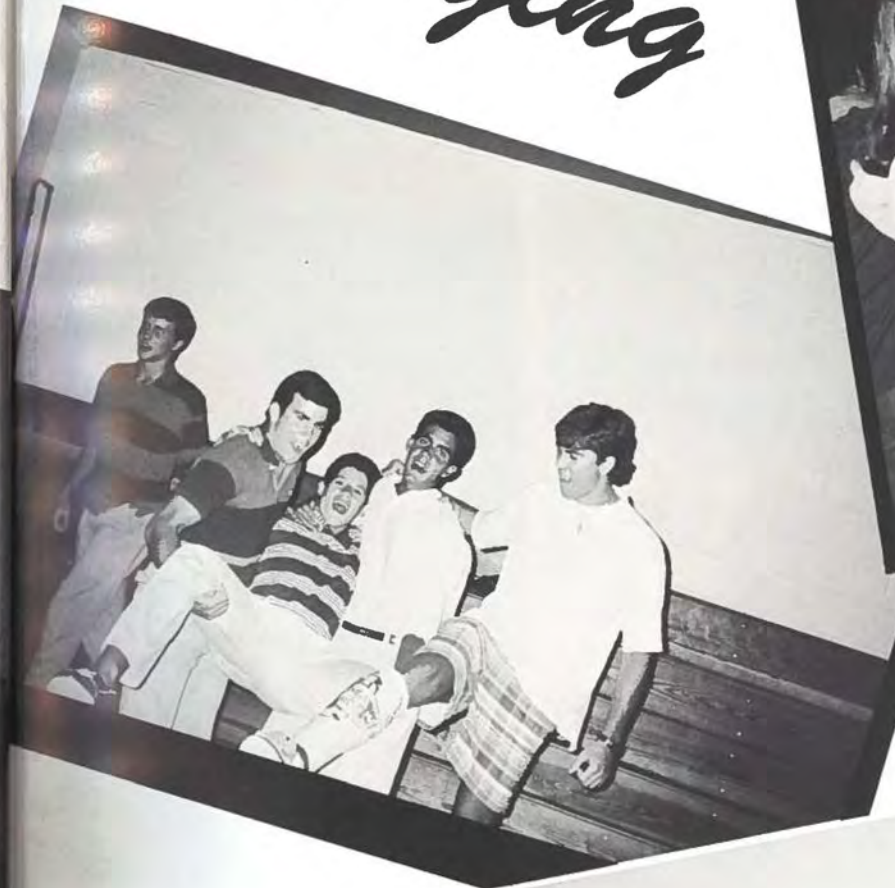

# SOCIAL STUDIES WEEK

Incarinate Word students joined with millions of other students across the United States in celebrating the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution September 15-18 during IWA's Social Studies Week.

Local attorneys Andrew Lehrman, David Bright, and Paula Waddle; Del Mar professor Elizabeth Flores; County Judge Hilda Tagle; and Sister Martha Ann Snapka were invited to speak to Social Studies classes about the American legal system and its effect on citizens. Also, students in Honors U.S. History class and Sister Philomena McCormack decorated the school halls to honor the U.S. Constitution.

Fourth period journalism, practicing the Bill of Rights granted Freedom of

Press, directed the signing these posters. Students and teachers who signed these posters were reaffirming their belief in the U.S. Constitution and the freedoms that it protects.

Sister Brenda Thompson and the Nike Club, together with the Social Studies Department, hosted the Corpus Christi Council and Mayor Betty Turner at a special breakfast September 15.

The celebration was highlighted by ringing the convent bell 200 times at 3 p.m. September 17, joining with thousands of schools, churches, and businesses across the country in a tribute to the Constitution.

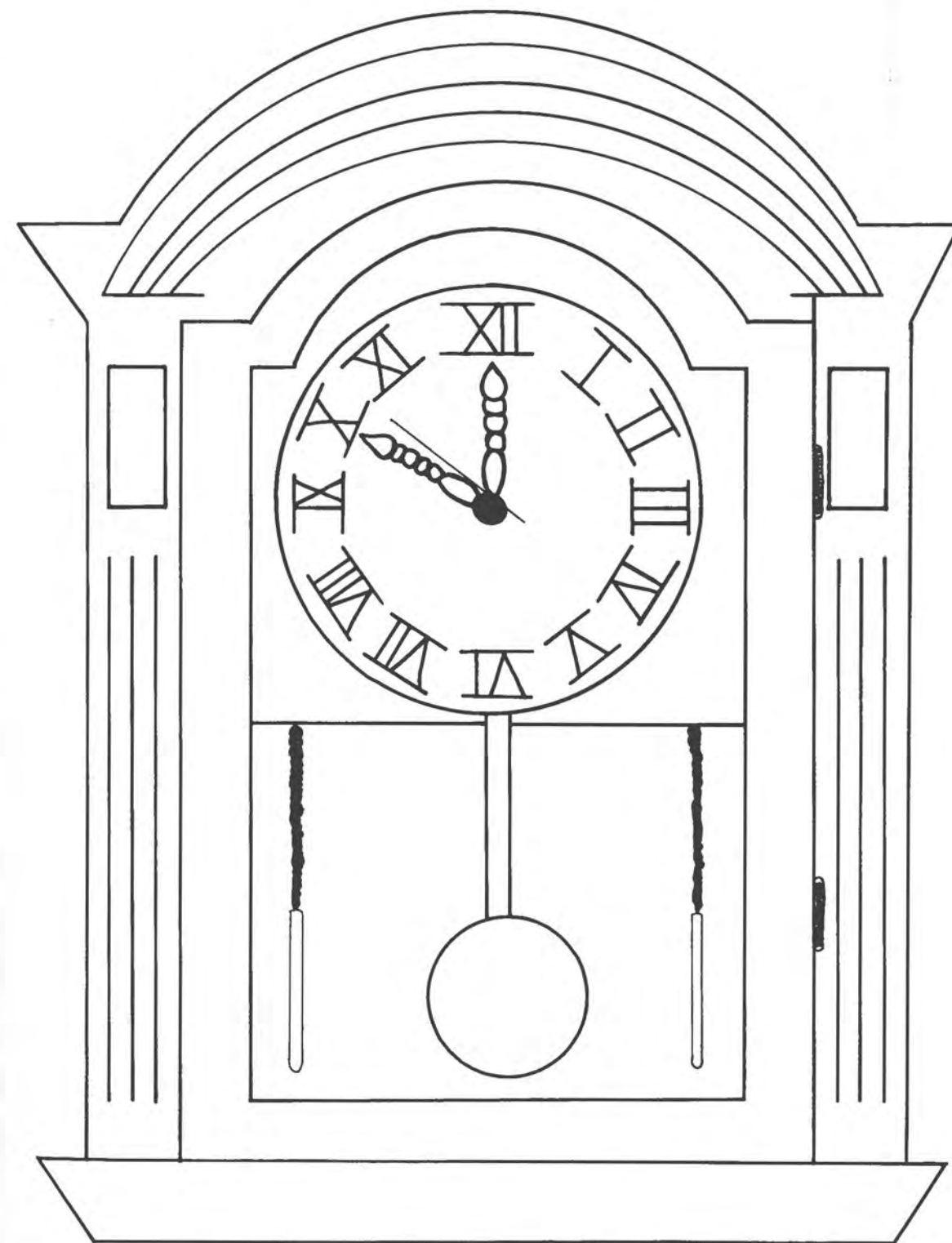

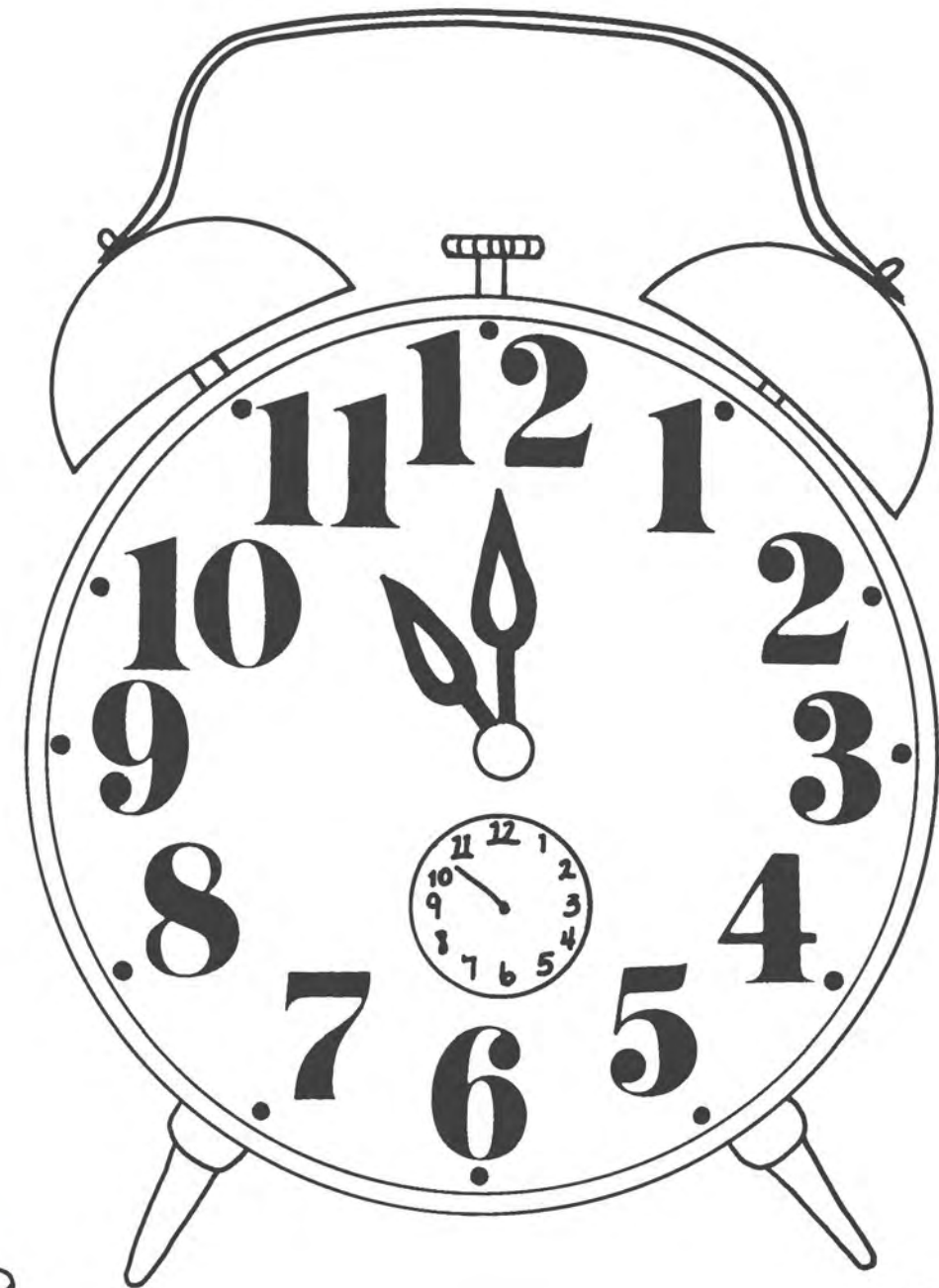

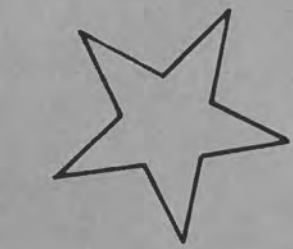


# HOMECOMING '87

The Mad Scientists Club supported the Science Department in putting on several activities during National Science and Technology Week, starting April 24th. Highlights included a poster contest, guest speakers and several tours to laboratories in the city vicinity. All science students submitted a poster on a life or physical science theme. Winning first prize gift certificates were Cindy Padron in Chemistry I, Marco Castillo in Physical Science and Andrea Gutierrez in Biology I. The top ten posters in each category were of exceptional quality, calling for close voting by the senior physics students who did the judging. The Hoechst-Celanese research laboratory sponsored a county-wide essay contest on the theme of social effects of recent technical discoveries. From over 30 entries, three I.W.A. students won prizes of U.S. Savings Bonds. Julianne Akers and Fred Seip won \$200 bonds, and Ronnie Fritz won a \$100 bond. Guest speakers addressed most of the science classes that week on a variety of subjects. Area firms supplying these speakers were Hoechst-Celanese, Champlin Refining, Spohn Hospital, and the NAS-Army Depot lab. The seniors in the honors science classes went on several field trips to see commercial laboratory operations and their equipment. The Army Depot Lab demonstrated micro-analysis used in criminal investigation. The Spohn Hospital labs illustrated the techniques of blood analysis, which is the most informative test done on a sick patient. Students also were tested for pulmonary function on Spohn's new computerized lung testing machine. The tour of the Celanese lab showed several things such as their electron microscope, the Nylon rope trick butadien rubber "bombs", and the computerized design of race cars.
