HE West Bloomfield School District is moving to an efficient digital ticketing service, GoFan, for all home games. We strongly encourage fans and spectators to purchase home game tickets in advance to avoid delays at the gate. Tickets will be for sale at the gate through credit card payment. However, we do not recommend utilizing this method as it will cause longer lines at the gate.

Cash will NO LONGER be accepted for ticket sales, but families can still use cash to purchase concessions.

- Individual tickets are \$5.00, plus a \$1.00 service fee
- Service fees are paid by the ticket purchaser. All sales are final.

The Family Pass is \$100 and admits up to four (4) family members into district home athletic events for that school year except for self-funded sports and MHSAA tournaments. The pass can be purchased at Jump Start or in the Athletic Office at West Bloomfield High School.

SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL LEARNING IN PRE-K

child's first school experience can create a mix of emotions. Leaving their family for the first time in a new environment with unfamiliar faces builds an uneasy feeling for a four year old.

A child's early social and emotional relationships shape them for life. For young children, interactions with family members set the tone for how children see themselves, whether they feel comfortable migrating out into the world, how they get along with others, and how they begin to understand moral behavior.

While all areas of development are important in young children, West Bloomfield Preschool Academy teachers focus strongly on supporting the social and emotional aspects of their students. This helps to ensure those positive connections form between adults and peers in the classroom. Our program enhances these experiences, which deeply influence preschoolers expanding relationships and problem-solving skills at school and in the community.

Emotional learning can be defined as the knowledge and skills needed to recognize and self-regulate feelings. The West Bloomfield Preschool Academy takes pride in following the HighScope curriculum, where teachers focus on nine key developmental indicators, or KDIs, in social and emotional development in hopes to guide early learners through those significant lifelong learning opportunities.

The KDIs include self-identity, sense of competence, emotions, empathy, community, building

relationships, cooperative play, moral development, and conflict resolution (HighScope, 2014).

The goal for our students is to help children develop relationships, regulate their behavior and emotions, and talk about their feelings. When adults have appropriate expectations of children's development at preschool age, they will see greater achievements and overcome challenges in the classroom and at home. "When

parents, informal community programs, and professionally staffed early childhood services pay attention to young children's emotional and social needs, as well as to their mastery of literacy and cognitive skills, they have maximum impact on the development of sturdy brain architecture and preparation for success in school." (National Scientific Council on the Developing Child).

ANUSHKA SARKAR WBHS Class of 2014

FTER graduating from West Bloomfield High School in 2014, Anushka Sarkar went on to study at the University of Michigan, where she was elected to serve as the student body president from 2017 to 2018. In this role, Anushka represented nearly 50,000 students' interests, managed an \$800,000 budget, and led a 100-plus-person organization.

After college, Sarkar moved to Washington, D.C., where she first worked for a large global consulting firm advising the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services on communications and technology matters.

A passionate advocate at heart, Sarkar ended her tenure in the private sector and then spent a few years working for progressive economic justice campaigns across a wide range of issues. While working in this capacity, Sarkar and her colleagues unionized their workplace and successfully negotiated better compensation, benefits, and working conditions.

Anushka then left Washington, D.C. for New York City, where she spearheaded press, polling, and communications efforts for a national voting rights group. She was then named a 2022 Urban Leaders Fellow with the D.C. Justice Lab and D.C. Council, where she drafted legislation addressing police power and the school-to-prison pipeline in our nation's capital.

After several years of working on economic and democracy justice

issues, Sarkar decided to return to the classroom and is now a rising second-year law student at Fordham Law School in New York City. As a Stein Scholar in Public Interest Law & Ethics at Fordham Law, Sarkar is committed to championing workers' rights, freedom for incarcerated



people, and justice for people who cannot afford legal services. This summer, Sarkar was awarded a Peggy Browning Fund Fellowship and worked for the esteemed Washington Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights & Urban Affairs in D.C.

Sarkar has published op-eds on democracy issues ranging from state voting rights legislation to U.S. Supreme Court expansion and led national polling efforts to understand Americans' perspectives on hotbutton issues.

How has WBHS helped Anushka?

Anushka Sarkar attended both Orchard Lake Middle School and West Bloomfield High School, and she credits a great deal of her passion for advocacy to the wonderful mentors she found at both schools. At every stage of her education in the West Bloomfield School District, Sarkar benefited from generous, smart, and passionate mentorship – both in and out of the classroom.

As a member of West Bloomfield High School's Speech and Debate Team, Sarkar learned how to research and formulate a compelling argument. As a member of the high school's Law Club and the county's Teen Court program, she shadowed and learned from a wide range of public servants and leaders who instilled in her and her peers a commitment to persistent advocacy.

Access to quality public education has meant the world for Sarkar. When she attended the University of Michigan, she reaped the privileges of the many AP course credits she was able to receive thanks to WBHS's rigorous academic curriculum.

Anushka's advice for current students:

Anushka Sarkar's primary advice for current students is simple: Become who you are at heart. In high school,

students spend a great deal of energy trying to figure out who they are supposed to be – how they should carry themselves, what they should be interested in, what they should say and wear, and where they should go to college. Sarkar believes that what you should do or say or become does not matter.

Her advice? Save yourself a lifetime of chasing fulfillment by simply honoring who you are at heart. If you are someone who considers yourself a creative person, don't disregard that part of yourself to prioritize other things that are not true reflections of you. Perhaps a full-time career in the creative arts is not possible for

everyone, but there are ways to incorporate those passions into your life – do that and don't let anything keep you from becoming exactly who you are meant to be.

Her second piece of advice is to remain curious. Life after school comes at you very quickly, and suddenly brief stretches of time that feel like weeks or months turn out to actually be several years. A decade after high school, many people wake up one morning and realize they have lost their spark and curiosity. There are countless great joys and sorrows in our world to learn from, explore, and transform – no one knows this better than high school students who

spend one hour studying classic Russian literature and the next learning the theory of gravity.

Bring that curiosity and intrigue with you into adulthood and carry it through every part of your life. You will find this often daunting and bleak world is actually much brighter and riper with possibility if you hold onto this sense of curiosity. Curiosity, after all, is another form of hope.

Anushka's third piece of advice? Find mentors and lean on them as much as they will allow you to. Ask your mentors to introduce you to more mentors! Not sure who to ask? You're welcome to start with Anushka: asarkar8@fordham.edu
