



Freshmen were amazed at the amount of homework given in class and the crowded halls. As the year went on, many adaptations were made and things started running smoothly.


Seniors could often be spied standing around the office joking while taking time out from the three R's.

Opposite page: Carpools became more evident as gas rose to almost a dollar a gallon.








## Homecoming Royalty Elected

Mapleton students were proud to have such an outstanding couple to represent them for homecoming.










## Assembly And Dance Add Memories To Homecoming




## Float Competition Tough

The floats were judged before the parade and the winners announced at halftime during the homecoming game.














## Week-All Fun And Games?

The game proved to be a lot of fun, and both teams ended up winners for the pride they showed on and off the field.







"This year was a rebuilding season for the team. I am confident that the team will do well next year," stated Coach Janssen.













## Thinking Of The Future






Staff members enjoy working with each other, and get along very well together. As a ream they find it challenging to race against the clock in order to get the newspaper out by the monthly deadline.


### A Select Few

Mapleton faculty members are working hard to refine potential of students from diamonds in the rough to priceless gems, and leaders who will benefit the future world.







These reachers do a fine job and their work is greatly appreciated.



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
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
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## Spring Fever — Or Just Plain Craziness?
