The office becomes a popular gathering place for juniors and seniors and everyone knows the year has begun.



Freshmen were amazed at the amount of homework given in class and the crowded halls. As the year went on, many adaptations were made and things started running smoothly.


Seniors could often be spied standing around the office joking while taking time out from the three R's.

After class comes homework and after that even more homework. Sometimes the stream of work seems endless. But somehow we all manage to get by. With another another day, we make another step toward the future.





Bottom right: Class work was often surprisingly hard for freshmen, not to mention the loads of homework each night.





A GLIMPSE OF . . . ACTIVITIES




A unique event took place this year; Violet Price, the 1969 queen, was welcomed back to crown the 1979 queen. Emotion was overflowing as this special event came to an end.

The floats were judged before the parade and the winners announced at half time during the homecoming game.




Week-All Fun And Games?

A GLIMPSE OF . . .


Being a senior holds many promises and is a shining goal everyone wants to reach. However, there are sides to being a senior that people never see.

It seemed to take a lifetime to become a senior, but now time races forward, ticking closer and closer to graduation. All the classes and hours spent at school seem so far away.


The future is upon us, and many decisions must be made about how we will spend our time to come. Going to college, getting married, or even becoming a politician become new goals to reach for.





Falcons End Season Undefeated!!







Well-skilled players full of determination led the varsity volleyball season to a 8-12 win loss record.













Lots Of Athletic Ability






Since so many Falcon students are starting their experience now, outlooks for future employment look better, along with prospects of being leaders in tomorrow's business world.









Mapleton faculty members are working hard to refine potential of students from diamonds in the rough to priceless gems, and leaders who will benefit the future world.




Leadership And Devotion



Reading, Writing, And Arithmetic



These women are very qualified in their areas, and when they combine their talents with those of the veterans in each of these departments, the results are a superb display of their exceptional ability and skill.





These teachers do a fine job and their work is greatly appreciated.




Finals bring loads of studying for rests (below middle), but senior Jeff Wayland doesn't seem to mind.

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
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
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
As the end of the year drew near, Mapleton was plagued by many epidemics, such as, "senioritis", "skip class attack", and the "Rotella Park blues."
