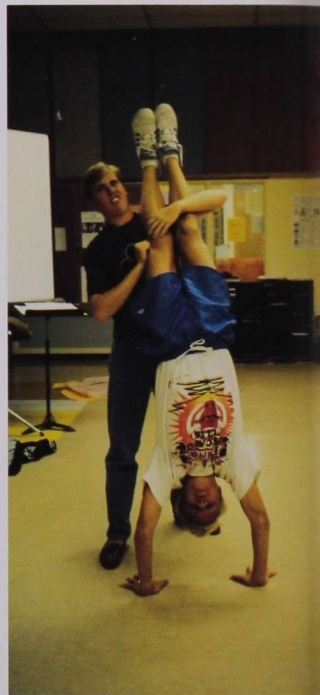

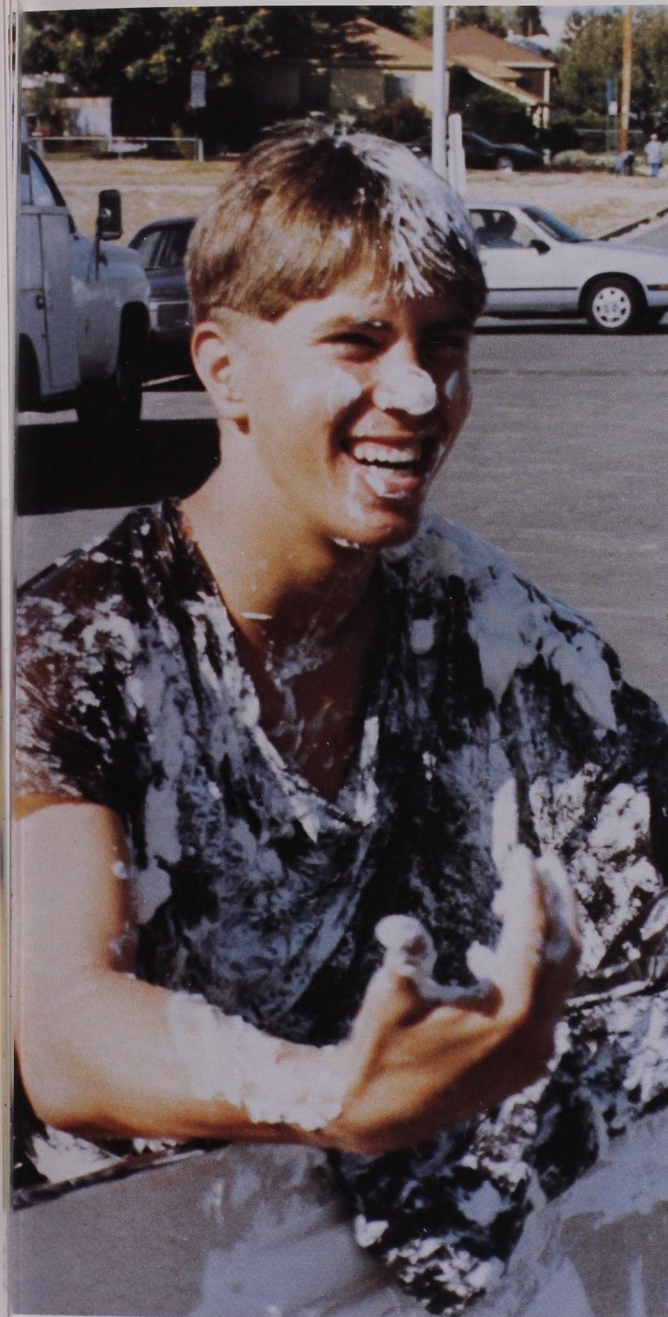

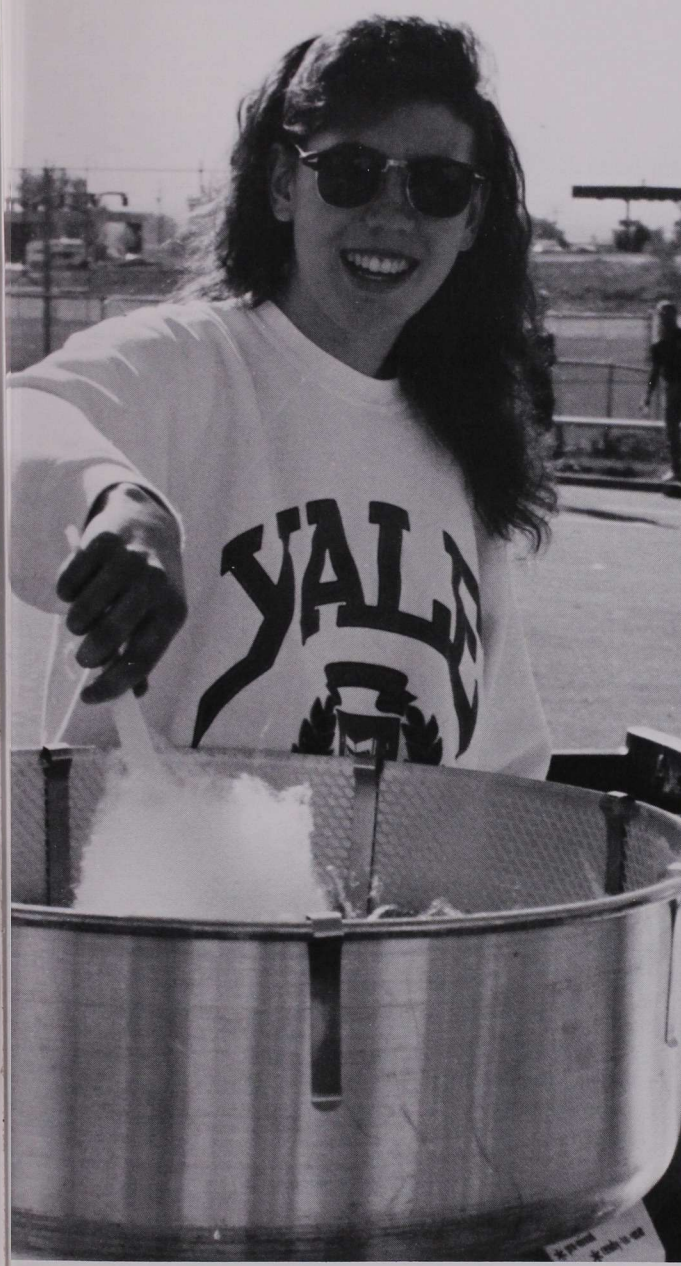

THE HEAT IS ON

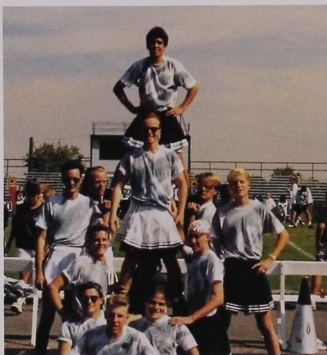

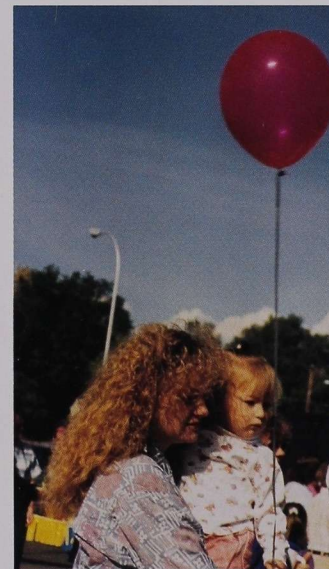

"It was about time we did something with Alternative, after all they are part of our school." **Heather Dixon**

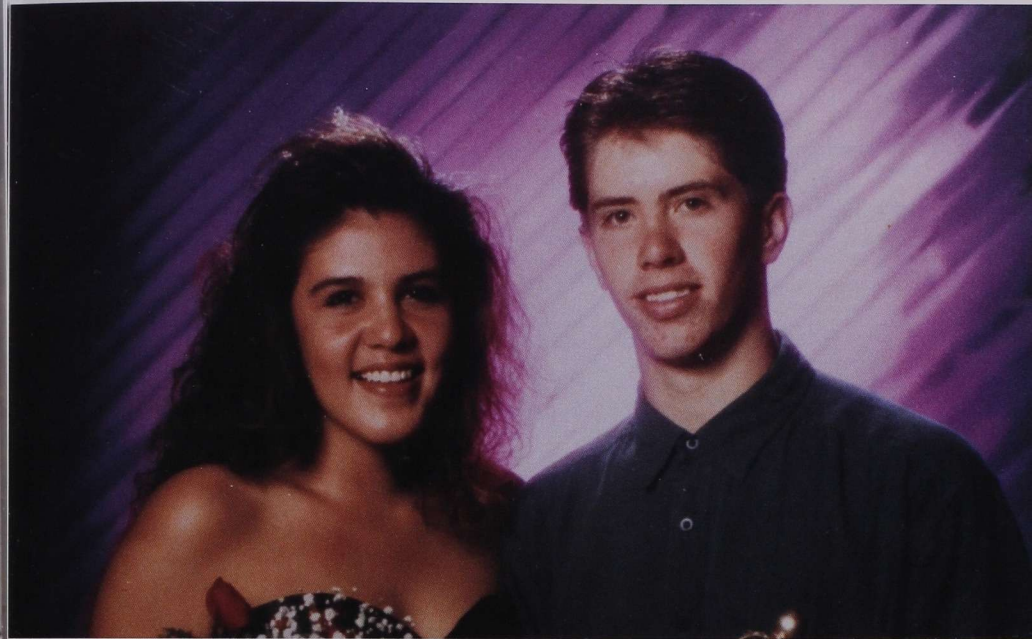

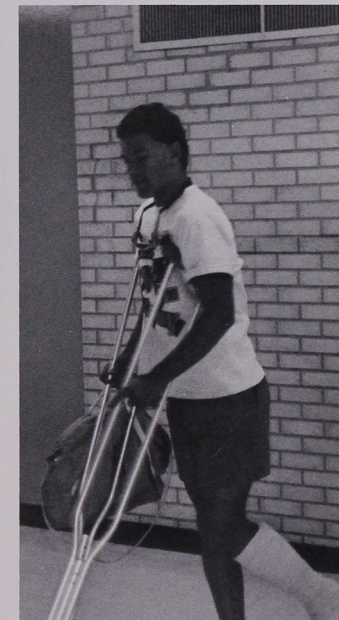

AFTER THOUGHTS

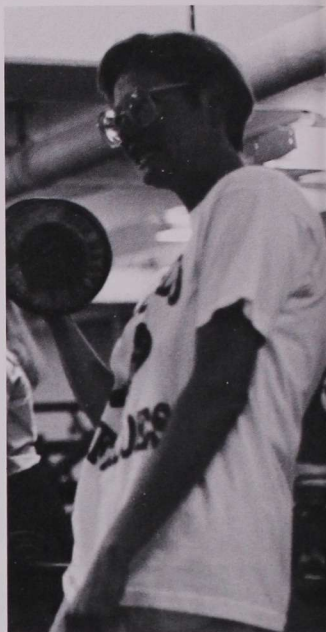
Everybody has good and bad memories of their high school years. Some more memorable than others!! Here are a few afterthoughts to jog your memory.

Do you think you could be friends with a student who has AIDS? Could you be friends with a person who your friends

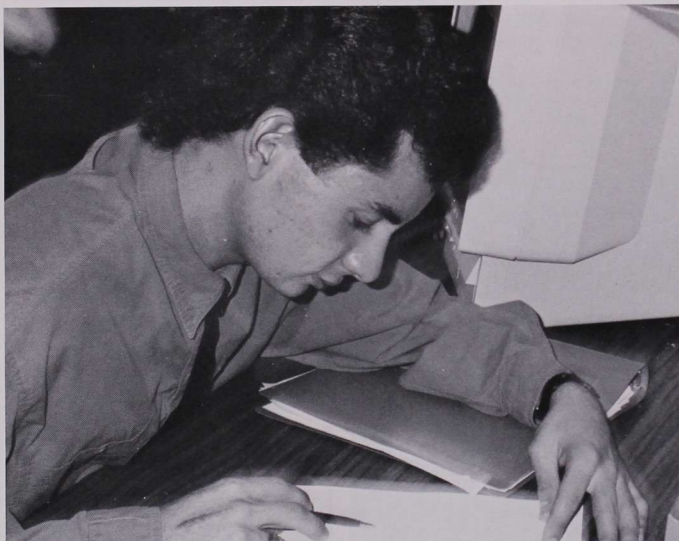

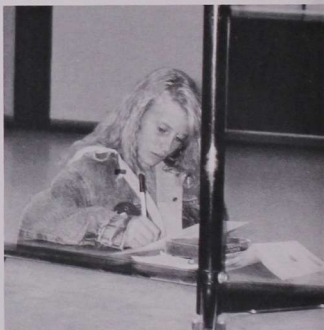
again, become a high profile topic because of Magic Johnson's announcement that he is HIV Positive.

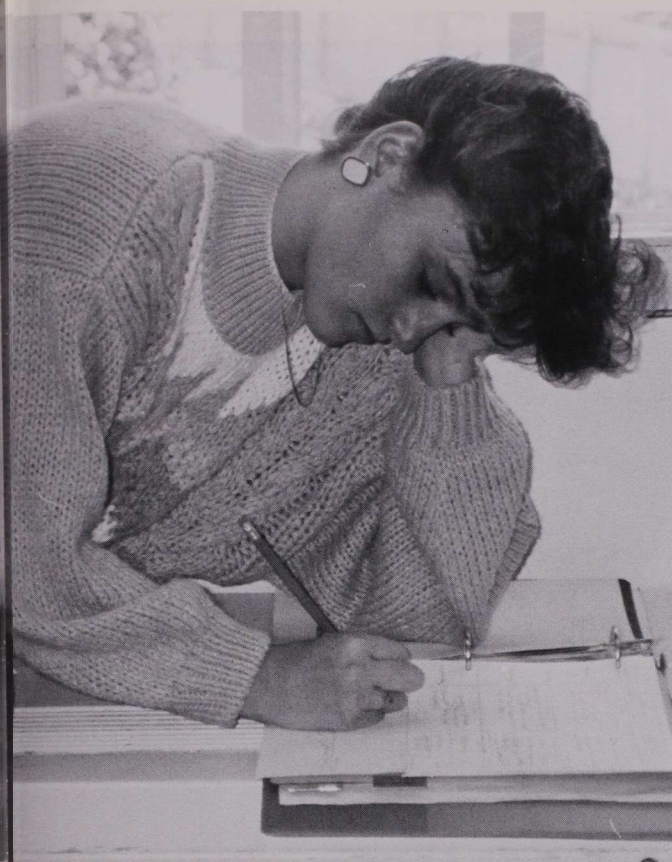

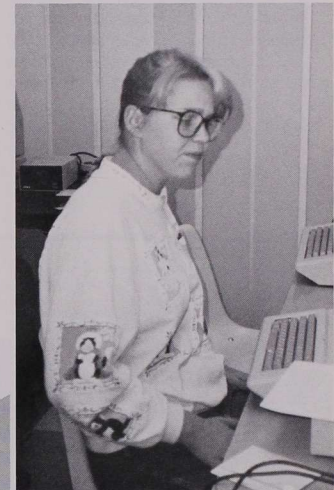

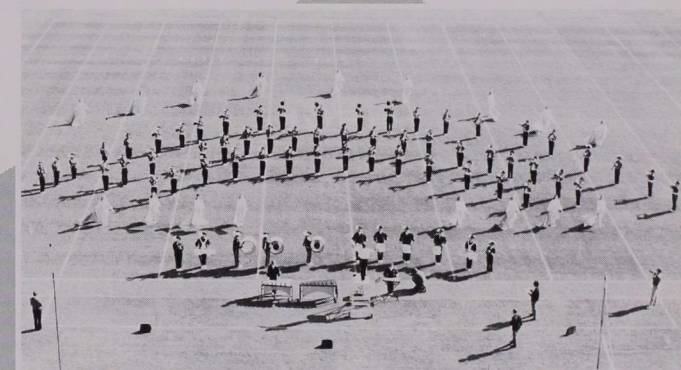
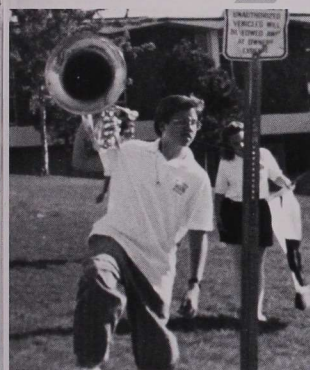
Band And Guard Skyrocket To 14th Place!

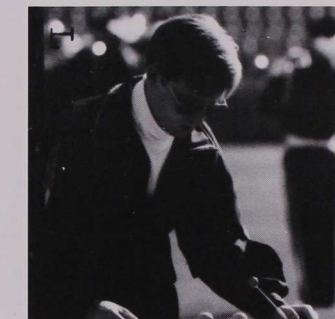

Art is like a light bulb turned on in your head. As **Clark Jones** explains, "I could be walking down the street, see something, and boom! I've got an idea!"

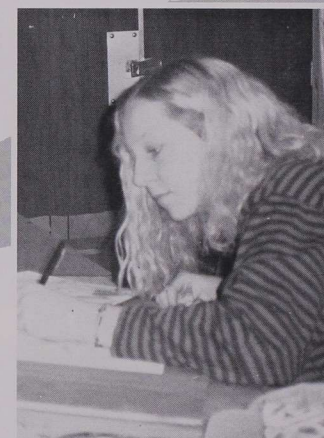
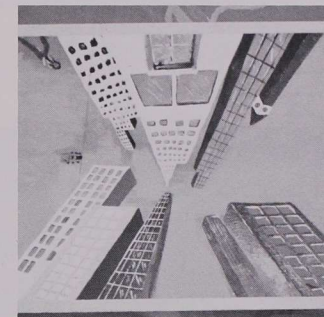

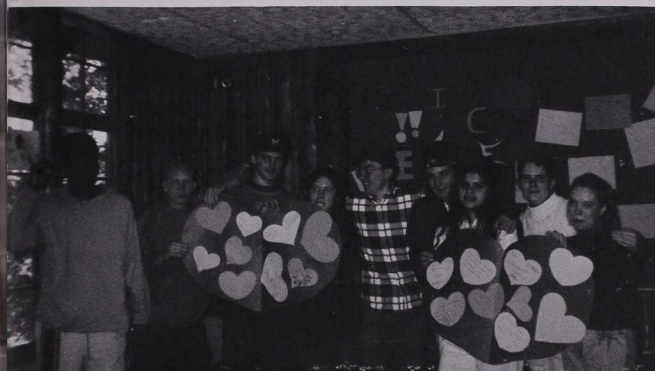
Learning It Right, Differently

Something else that New Choices gives its students is Lodge. Lodge is in Estes Park and some students get

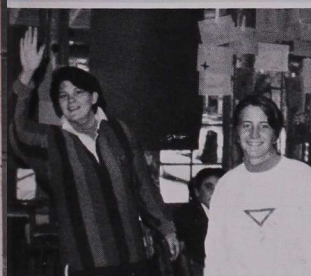

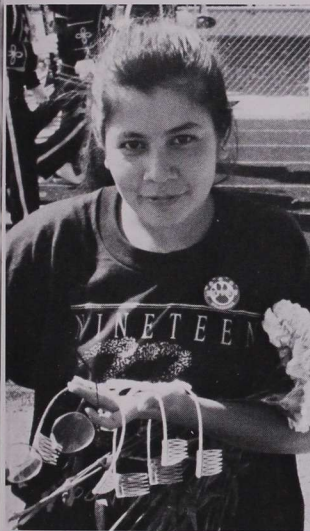

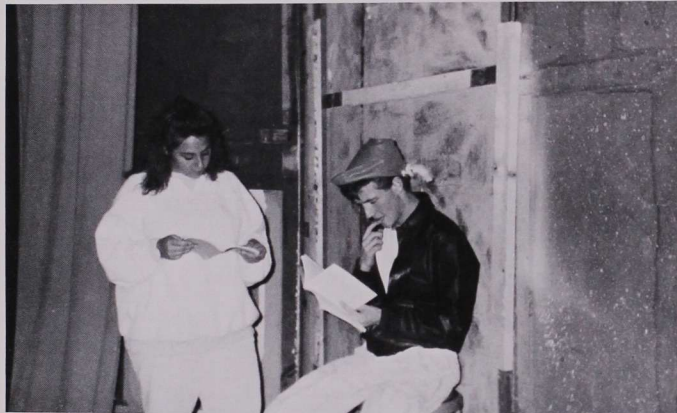

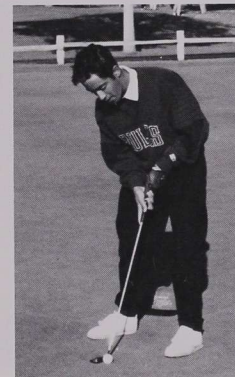

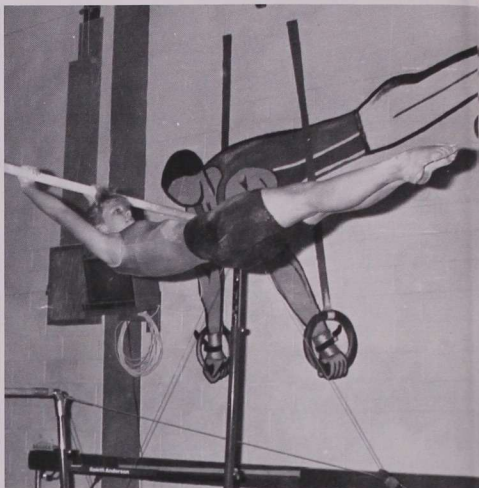

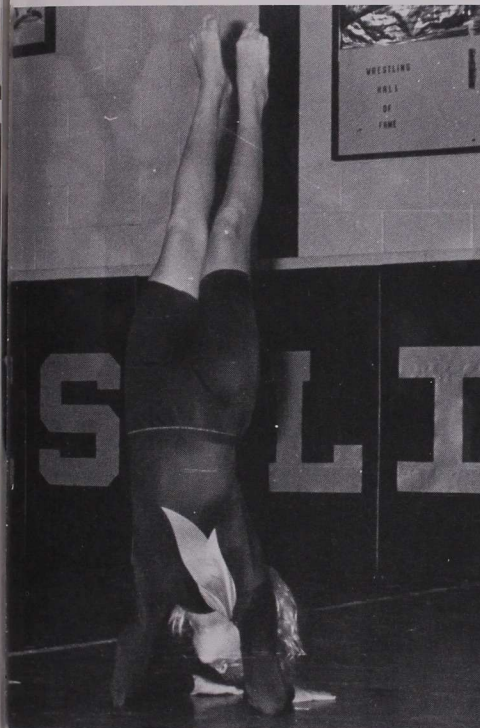

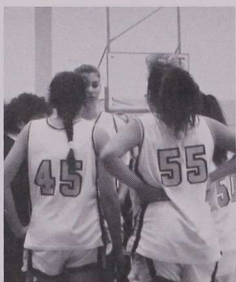

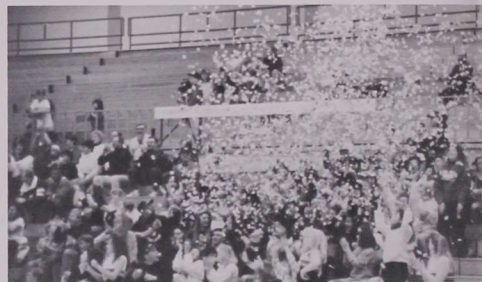

1995 will be the first in our district to graduate having taken part in O.B.E. all four years.

When learning with the O.B.E. System the student does a couple things different than he/she would do in an “old” class. First of all D's and F's are not available. Students must complete fully the first

step before going on to the second. This forces students to learn everything, and to demonstrate mastery. This also allows the student to learn at his own pace, advancing as slowly or quickly as needed.

Demonstration is also a part of Outcome Based education. Students must be able to demonstrate what they learn, whether it be visually or verbally. For example students taking part in our Renaissance class this year had to make presentations based on what they researched and learned.

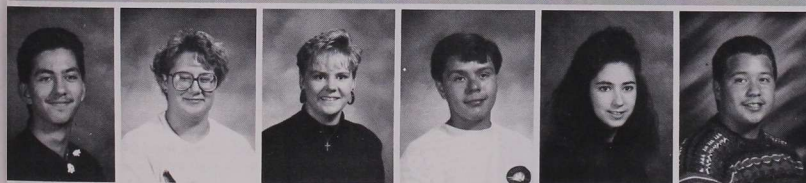

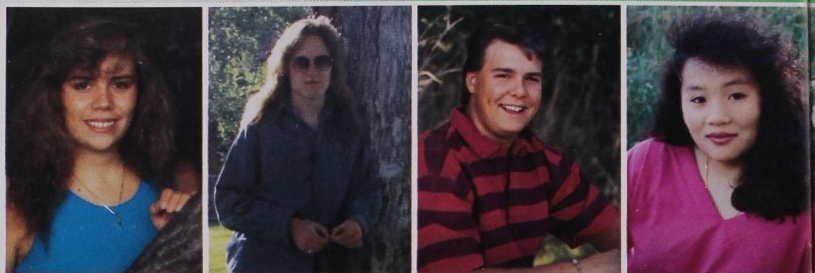
CODE 8 means: C=commitment, O=opportunity, D=diligence, E=expectations, and 8 simply means that there are 8 school wide rules.

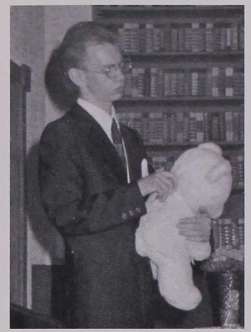
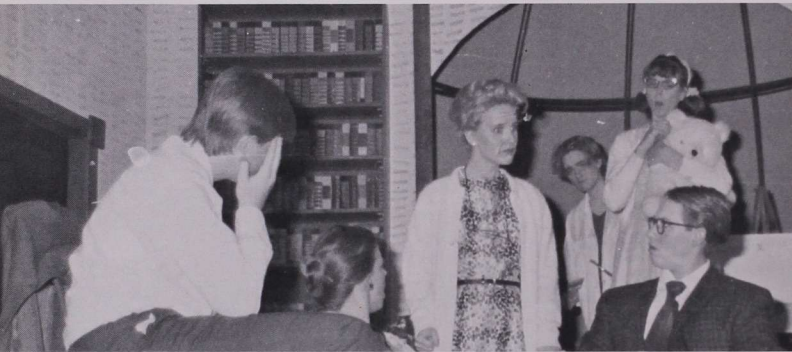


Who's Curious? What Savage?

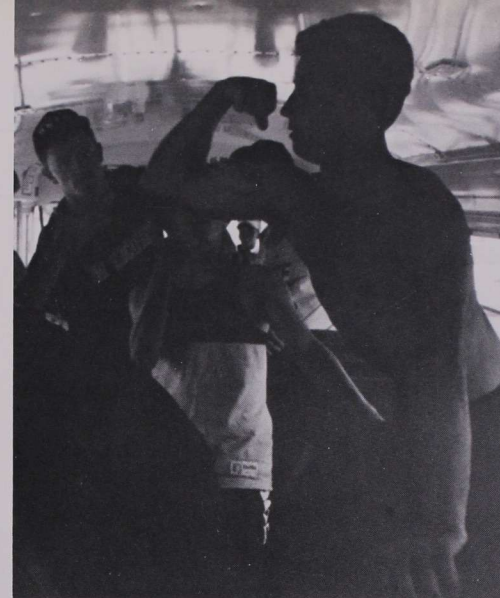

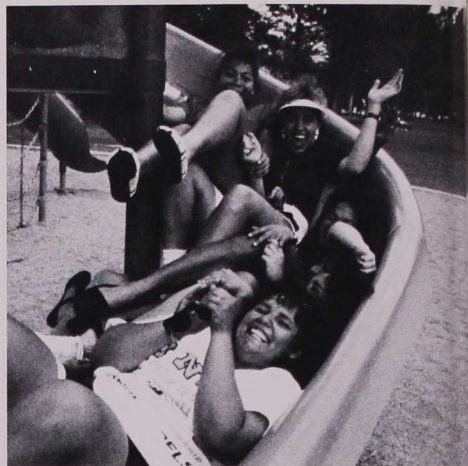

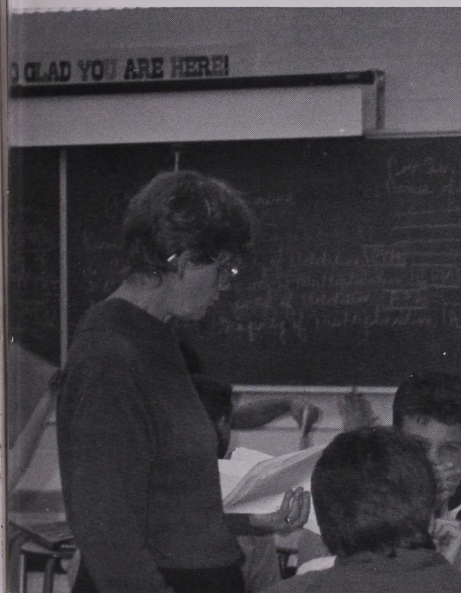


The A.P. (advanced placement) and the C.P. (College prep) classes are preparing Skyview students for college. Skyview has one C.P. class, C.P. Chemistry, and three A.P. classes, A.P. European History, English, and Calculus.

Mrs. Ruggles meets with A.P. Calculus math class at 6:30 every morning. Students must pass algebra, Geometry, trigonometry, and math analysis to get into calculus, a college level math course. A college credit is given to any student passing the A.P. test in May.

Mrs. Woods has a 18 seniors in her A.P. English class. In this college level class the students read advanced literature. Following the reading, the students discuss what they read and write essays. Towards the end of the semester the students take a test on which they can score a 1, 2, 3, 4, or a 5. If the student scores a 3, 4, or 5 they can earn college credits — the higher the score, the more credits.

These classes are great ways to get started on college, and to choose from, seniors have a good variety for whatever field they want.

Also this year students and teachers from both schools attended a student accountability conference in Colorado Springs.

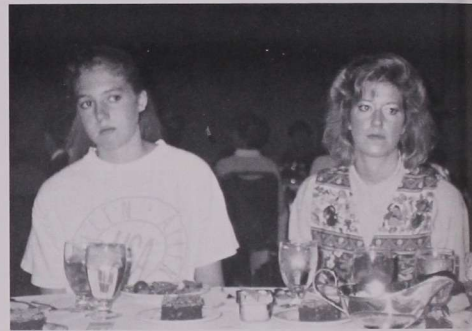

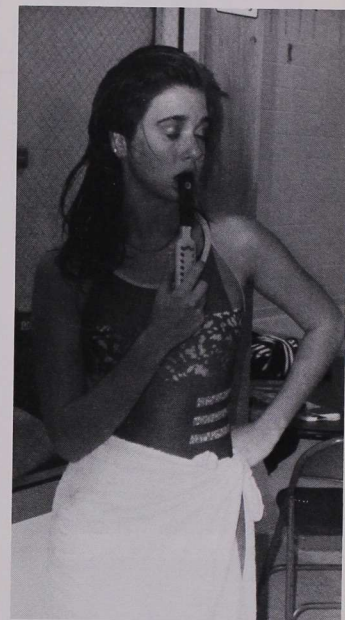

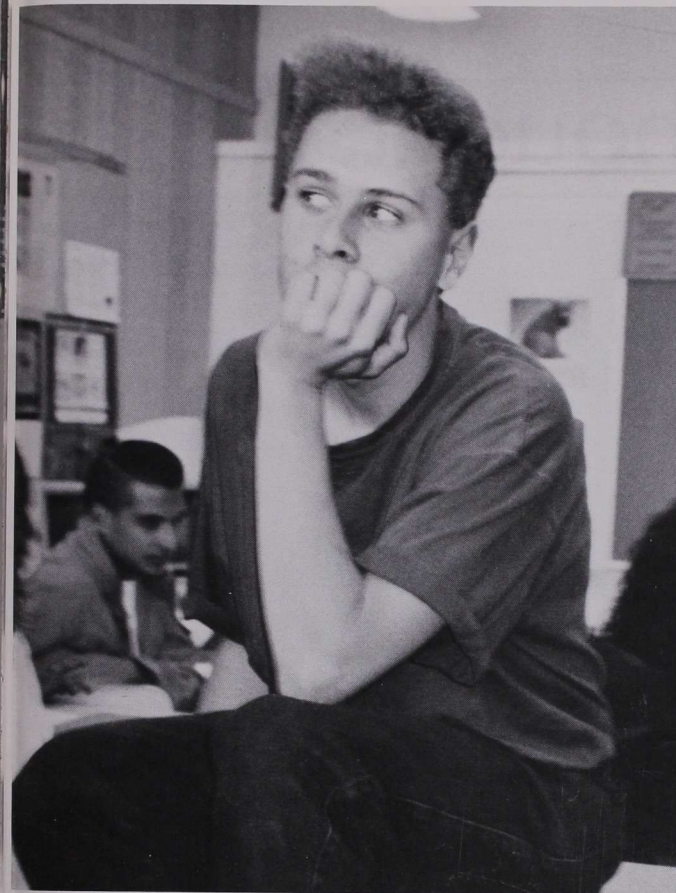

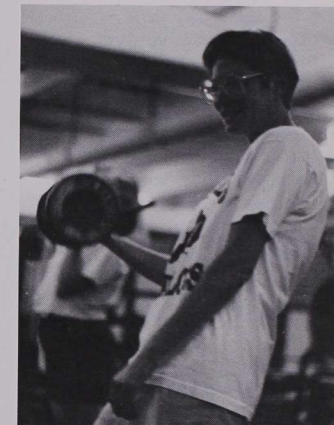

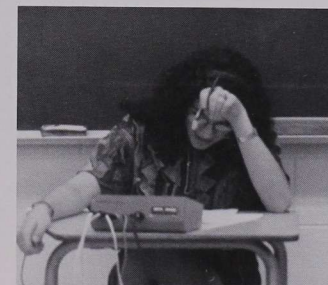
