














From there it went downhill as more and more girls found out swimming was not their thing, and quit, like the domino effect. They couldn't handle the pain of a "real" work out.







# RAIN TO EASE THE PAIN

The A-Squad aids injured athletes back to good health

Most people don't realize that without the help and assistance of the Skyview Athletic Trainers, it would be virtually impossible to tend to all injured athletes at any given time. 











Skyview was definitely a diversified school which provided ample opportunities to learn and succeed in many ar-






