


## What's Up For The Weekend







field at night with your friends **HAS** to be one of the best times they have had during their career of high school. All that attended the


Pep Assembly agreed, there was **NO** comparison of the electric waves felt in the gymnasium as this event took place. Although the

has enough **SPIRIT** to go around.







# A REAL TRAGIC COMIC



All in all, this was one of Skyview High School's best marching seasons during all six years of Skyview's existence as a school.






# UNFORGETTABLE MUSIC MEMORIES











As representatives of Skyview's brightest students, the Knowledge Bowl team and the Honor Society stood in high respect.











## Pranks Again


says Tommi Eagan. Alison Sorber also enjoys fine note writing and anything else to help avoid work.



Freshman Jessica Kralicek says, "Like when someone or a friend tells you that they'll call you later, but don't end up calling you for a week, when you think later means that same day later."


Sophomore Celina Sanchez says this happens to her with her mom. "I was building something and I said, 'Where is that last piece of ship?' and she understood another word."


































