



has enough SPIRIT to go around.












## A REAL TRAGIC COMIC









The puzzling question is, will chaos take over the world or will the up-coming generation learn from the past to gain the answers to the problems of today?






## Wishing for Pennies From Heaven

Even though teenagers never have money, they never let that stop them from having fun. The typical sophomores can almost always find something to occupy them, regardless of their budget.

































