







With so many different options, students could never run out of things to do and places to go for lunch. No matter what people decided to do for lunch, everyone agrees that their favorite thing to do was eat.













When you have a bad hair day, or you're feeling blue, they will be there to see you through. If you are really bored, you can call and talk about nothing. It's all right. That's what friends are for.


















KNOCK DOWN! Senior Derek Hargrave shows his perfect form during a free throw. The result was always a point. (Photo by B. Frawley)
























