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BOYS VOLLEYBALL WINS THE STATE CHAMPIONSHIP





SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Parkland Community,

Welcome back for the 2023-2024 school year. Our leadership team welcomed back all staff with an Opening Day Convocation Celebration that included Dr. Jarrod Spencer as a keynote speaker who talked about the importance of personal wellness and included performances by the PHS Trojan Marching Band, the PHS Varsity Dance Team, and featured student speakers Tim Saad and Carly Kudryk. We also had surprise food truck treats and Parkland t-shirts for the staff to enjoy.

We thank this year's sponsors for helping us provide items for our staff. They are the Lehigh Valley Educators Credit Union, Service Electric, North Penn Custom Tees, Kades Margolis and the U.S. Army National Guard. We truly value business and community support and thank everyone who helped make Parkland Staff feel important as they start the year.

FEASIBILITY STUDY - A feasibility study, led by RLPS Architects, began in January that was designed to explore options to handle student enrollment that is projected to fill Orefield and Springhouse Middle Schools and Parkland High School to capacity by 2028. After months of building tours and evaluations, public meetings, a community survey and feasibility study work group meetings, our Administrative team presented two solution pathway options to the School Board during our regular public meeting on August 15th.

Pathway A consists of renovations and additions at both Parkland High School and Orefield Middle School that will make both buildings larger. Springhouse currently houses approximately 400 more students than Orefield. This project would make both middle schools of similar size and allow some Springhouse students to transfer to Orefield to create more space within Springhouse. An addition to Parkland High School will alleviate crowding, help set up more efficient hallway traffic patterns and allow us to use space within the building in more creative ways. RPLS estimates that Pathway A will cost between \$160 million to \$183 million.

Pathway B entails building a new middle school on a property that is yet to be determined and renovating Orefield Middle School with the intention of it either remaining a middle school or becoming a ninth grade center. Pathway B has been estimated by RLPS to cost between \$216 million to \$250 million.

The School Board could vote on the first step of whichever construction pathway it decides to pursue within the next two months. Pathway A could be fully completed by mid-2028, whereas Pathway B would take until mid-2031.

SCHOOL SAFETY - In August, our administrative team worked with South Whitehall Township and our local police departments and emergency response agencies to conduct an active shooter drill at Orefield Middle School. We were able to practice our roles to re-unify students with their parents by following a detailed plan that was constructed last summer. I wish to thank all who were involved in the drill that day and I am proud to say that while we never hope to have to implement the plan, it is essential to rehearse drills that are designed to keep staff and students safe as well as practice communication protocols that are involved during an emergency.

ACTIVITIES/ATHLETICS - Our fall sports teams have already started competing. Don't miss a home event! The Parkland Education Foundation has made it possible for all Parkland students to get in FREE to turf and gym events. You can also watch many of our home competitions via livestream at [YouTube.com/ParklandTV](https://www.youtube.com/ParklandTV). Our Performing and Visual Arts programs are also gearing up for another wonderful season. NEW HERITAGE SPANISH CLASS A SUCCESS



Heritage Spanish courses were offered for the first time in 2022-23 at Parkland High School and are being expanded to include a level 2 course this school year. These courses are designed for students who have experience speaking Spanish at home or in a community setting. The courses focus on expanding and building upon Spanish language skills to develop individual reading and writing literacy. Students continue to achieve their communicative competence in the areas of listening, speaking, reading and writing. The class comes out of a need in the District and specifically is geared toward a growing Latino and Hispanic population. Dr. Holbrook, the teacher of the classes, who received her educational doctorate from Kutztown University in transformational teaching, explained, “Parkland has a lot of bilingual students who were raised in a Spanish-speaking home. This class allows for those students who are interested in exploring their own culture and other cultures of those who speak Spanish in a unique project-based learning environment.”

One of the main goals is for students to expand upon linguistic abilities in meaningful ways. So often when children speak a home language, there is a divide. They communicate in a certain way at home and leave that behind when they come to school. This class serves as a way for students to bring their whole bilingual selves to school to study. Some of the assignments have included autobiographical poems or essays on what it means to be bilingual. In one assignment, students wrote an entry for an international cookbook about a dish that has been important to them and included the history behind the dish. The classes allow them to use their Spanish in ways they would not normally do so in school by drawing upon a student’s knowledge, history, family tradition and strength as a bilingual person.

Students are able to enroll in a heritage Spanish class after taking a placement test to ensure that the class meets their needs. Some may be best served by starting out in the traditional world language program and then taking heritage classes. Students who have learned Spanish at home and who are bilingual to some degree are eligible to take the placement exam.

Dr. Holbrook stated, “Seeing students flourish in the class last year was a wonderful experience where we emphasize what students know and what they can do by assigning projects associated with culture, language, and the surrounding community. The students feel validated for the Spanish skills that they have grown up learning and apply their skills to successfully complete projects. They feel a true sense of pride and belonging in the class.”



CLASS OF 2023 RECOGNITION

WHAT LIES AHEAD FOR THE CLASS OF 2023?

This fall, many Parkland graduates will head off to schools across Pennsylvania and beyond. Enrollment at Penn State University’s Main Campus is 73 students, while 27 students will attend a Penn State branch campus. Locally, college enrollment includes Cedar Crest (5), DeSales University (14), Kutztown University (46), Lehigh University (12), Moravian University (22), Muhlenberg College (11), Lehigh Carbon Community College (105) and Northampton Community College (13). Some other popular choices include East Stroudsburg University (8), West Chester University (30) and Temple University (25). Three students are attending Ivy League schools at Dartmouth, Cornell and Princeton. One student was appointed to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. Parkland students from this class are also attending Georgia Tech, Duke, UNC Chapel Hill, and Northwestern.

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SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES AND PROGRAMS, SERVICES FOR PROTECTED HANDICAPPED STUDENTS, AND SERVICES FOR GIFTED STUDENTS

In compliance with state and federal law, notice is hereby given by the Parkland School District (PSD) that it conducts ongoing identification activities as a part of its school program for the purpose of identifying students who may be in need of special education supports and services (PA Code Chapter 14), services via section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (PA Code Chapter 15), and/or gifted education services (PA Code Chapter 16).

Special Education Services: If your child is identified by the District as possibly in need of such services, you will be notified of applicable procedures. Individualized services and programs are available for children who are determined to need specially designed instruction due to the following conditions: Autism; Deaf-blindness; Deafness; Emotional disturbance; Hearing impairment; Intellectual disability; Multiple disabilities; Orthopedic impairment; Other health impairment; Specific learning disability; Speech or language impairment; Traumatic brain injury; Visual impairment.

Section 504/Chapter 15 Services: Parkland School District will provide each protected handicapped student, without discrimination or cost to the student or family, those related aids, services or accommodations which are needed to provide equal opportunity to participate in and obtain the benefits of the school program and co- and non-curricular activities to the maximum extent appropriate to the student's abilities. In order to qualify as a protected handicapped student, the child must be of school age with a physical or mental disability which substantially limits or prohibits participation in or access to an aspect of the school program. These services and protections for "protected handicapped students" are distinct from those applicable to all eligible or exceptional students enrolled (or seeking enrollment) in special education programs.

Chapter 16: While gifted is not included as one of the disabilities categories under the IDEA 2004, the Pennsylvania State Board of Education's regulations as set forth in Chapter 16, Special Education for Gifted Students, provide that gifted students are considered to be children with exceptionalities and are in need of specially designed instruction. If you believe that your school age child may be in need of special education services and related programs, Section 504/Chapter 15 services, Chapter 16 services, screening, and evaluation processes are available to you at no cost, upon written request. Whether or not your child is enrolled in the district's public school program.

Consent: School entities cannot proceed with an evaluation, or with the initial provision of special education, Section 504/Chapter 15, Chapter 16, and related services, without the written consent of the parents. 
Requests for school-age evaluation and screening should be made in writing to the Director of Student Services, 1210 Springhouse Road, Allentown, PA 18104.

Preschool Services and Programs: Children age three through the age of admission to first grade are eligible for Early Intervention services if they have developmental delays and, as a result, need Special Education and related services. A child is considered to have a developmental delay when one of the following exists: (i) The child's score, on a developmental assessment device, on an assessment instrument which yields a score in months, indicates that the child is delayed by 25% of the child's chronological age in one or more developmental areas; or (ii) The child is delayed in one or more of the developmental areas, as documented by test performance of 1.5 standard deviations below the mean on standardized tests. Developmental areas include cognitive, communicative, physical, social/emotional and self-help.

Parents of young children with concerns about their child's seeing, hearing, learning, talking, moving about, manipulating objects, understanding, showing emotions, getting along with others, playing with toys, taking care of himself/herself, should contact the Carbon Lehigh Intermediate Unit - Project Connect at (610) 769-4111. Project Connect can provide information to parents about evaluations, programs, therapy, parent supports, and referral to community agencies at no cost to the parent.

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FOUNDATION AWARDS 107 CELEBRATE INNOVATION GRANTS TOTALING \$207,000 FOR THE 2023-2024 SCHOOL YEAR PROJECTS

THIS IS THE MOST AMOUNT AWARDED TO DATE FOR A SINGLE YEAR OF GRANTS

The Parkland Education Foundation raises money all year to be able to fund as many grants as possible for Parkland staff who apply for them. It was thrilled to be able to fund \$207,000 worth of grants for the current school year. Their goal is to give opportunities that enhance a traditional public school education. Some examples of this year's grants include:

- A coding robot at Schnecksville Elementary will teach children how to code and understand concepts like computer sequencing, events, loops, algorithms, operations, and variables through self-directed play and guided challenges.
- Indoor hydroponic gardens at both Springhouse and Orefield Middle Schools, that can each harvest up to 3,400 plants annually via a vertical technology system, will help students learn about STEM, nutrition, and how to be sustainable global citizens through hands-on learning.
- A sideline medical tent for the Athletic Department will provide privacy for athletes who may get injured or need treatment during games.
- A Layout Lab, complete with several iMac stations, will be made available to the PHS Par Key yearbook and Trumpet newspaper students so that editors can create layouts for the two publications. Editors will collaborate with staff writers/page designers to simulate an industry-standard workshop.
- PHS students will be able to sign up for teacher-run nighttime observations via new vision adapter systems. Star parties will allow students to get a more in-depth understanding of stars and constellations by observing them through the new systems.

Funding for grants is made possible by generous donors and fundraising events. In May, the Distinguished Alumni Celebration raised \$84,000 in support of the Foundation's mission. The Parkland Education Foundation has given more than \$1,745,702 to the Parkland School District since 2011 for innovation.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNUS GIVES BACK TO PARKLAND STUDENTS

Bryan Knouse is the CEO of Project OWL. He is also a Parkland graduate and a 2022 Parkland Education Foundation Distinguished Alumni Wall of Honor Award recipient. He chose to give back to our Parkland community by visiting the 4th grade classroom of his former teacher at Parkway Manor, Mrs. Jen Schmoyer, and presented his amazing work to the students there. His company designs devices called "ducks" that seamlessly connect to each other generating an encrypted, wireless network with a single click of a button. It uses radio signals to communicate with each other in a mesh network. This technology has been able to provide connectivity over long distances. It has been used all over the world to help in disaster situations. During the hurricane in Puerto Rico, Bryan's company launched an entire Duck Network to provide necessary network communication to the severely damaged country. They have been able to help prevent disasters on oil rigs and connect people in war-torn regions. Project Owl is changing the way disaster areas are able to communicate. The Parkland Education Foundation loves creating connections with alumni who want to inspire students. A special thanks to Bryan who helped to show our students that the sky is not the limit, but just the beginning, to making dreams a reality.
