


'Ad Alta' Scholarships

Our school motto is 'Ad Alta' – 'To the Heights' – and we believe our scholarship programme reflects our ambition for our most able and talented students. At Seaford, we offer 'Ad Alta' Scholarships in Music, Drama and Dance, Sport, Art and Design Technology as well as in the core academic subjects – English, Maths and Science. These scholarships are available at 11+, 13+ and 16+ for all external and internal applicants, with the exception of DT which is only offered at 13+ and 16+.

All scholarships are set at an up to 10% fee remission for students (at the Headmaster's discretion) plus subject-specific provision outlined in this brochure.

All candidates will be interviewed by the Headmaster, Mr John Green, for 13+ & 16+ and Head of Prep, Mr Alastair Brown for 11+.

Bursaries

At 13+ & 16+ only - where potential recipients of Scholarships are in need of further discounted fees - they must make an application through the bursary system and 'means testing'. It should be noted that the College, through its outreach programme, is actively seeking to offer significant financial assistance to outstanding candidates from the maintained sector who would not otherwise be able to attend; this applies particularly to sports scholarships.

There is a limited amount of bursarial funding available, which is awarded at the discretion of the Governors following the recommendation from the Headmaster.

At 13+ and 16+, a completed 'means test' form must accompany all applications and the award may be withdrawn if, in the opinion of the Governors, the student or parent has not complied with the regulations set out in the acceptance letter. Preference may be given to helping current parents who require financial assistance. The College will also give help in obtaining funds from other sources such as charitable trusts, where there is a demonstrable need.

The Ad Alta Academic Scholars at Seaford are encouraged to go beyond the classroom and extend their learning in multiple ways - from research projects to enrichment trips to academic conferences. They are challenged to take their learning to a new level.

All academic scholars are supported by a bespoke programme designed to challenge and extend their thinking beyond the school curriculum. This could be through co-curricular clubs such as debating, chess or extension maths or by starting their own society such as the Economics Club.

Academic scholars have access to the Seaford Scholarship fund (up to £150 per year) which they access to enhance their research. At the end of it, scholars will be expected to present the research and key conclusions to their mentor and the Headmaster in a way of their choosing, for example a written paper, a presentation, or an artefact.



The Application Process at 11+

Applicants will sit four one-hour exams in English, Science and Maths as well as general knowledge. These are developed so that they align with the typical KS2 curricula and are accessible by all students. Candidates must show a strong ability across these papers.

The Application Process at 13+

Applicants will sit scholarship papers in English, Maths and Science with practice specimen papers sent to candidates in advance of the exams. Papers are developed so that they align with the typical KS3 curricula and are accessible by all students. Candidates must show a strong ability across these papers.

Applicants will be interviewed about their reading habits, current affairs and will have to dissect an unseen article. Applicants will be asked to present a piece of work (completed in class or at home) that makes them proud and explain why.

The Application Process at 16+

Academic scholars in the Sixth Form are chosen in September based on their GCSE results. Scholars are expected to show exceptional performance scoring 7-9s across their GCSE subjects.

Art scholars will have access to specialist additional teaching and mentoring in the Art Department which offers a breadth of artistic experience at every level of our students' education. The department is equipped with three subject-specific classrooms, a bespoke Sixth Form facility, its own dedicated computer suite, printmaking studio, a traditional darkroom, a photographic studio and its own gallery space allowing students to play to their creative strengths.

Scholars will also have access to the Seaford Scholarship Fund which they may access (up to £150 per year) to undertake extension activities under their own or the school's direction. Scholars will be expected to present the results of their activities undertaken at the expense of the fund to their mentor, the Headmaster and the Head of Scholarships in a way of their choosing, for example a written paper, a presentation, or artefact.

The Application Process at 11+, 13+ and 16+

The art scholarship application process consists of two distinct elements. Firstly, students should prepare and submit a digital portfolio of their own practical work and secondly students undertake an examination under timed conditions. The testing takes place during November 2023 and February 2024 prior to entry or is aimed at students who are entering Year 7, 9 and 12.



The Digital Portfolio

This should contain a broad variety of the candidate's recent work. This can include work from school and personal studies done at home. The main body of the portfolio should demonstrate the candidate's ability as regards observational drawing and painting. This should contain a broad variety of the candidate's recent work. A variety of additional creative work is also welcomed. Candidates will be asked to submit a digital portfolio containing 10 pages of observational work and 10 pages of other creative work that reflect their strengths in any artistic discipline. Instructions on how to construct and submit the portfolio are contained within this booklet.

The Timed Examination

The examination itself consists of a series of timed observational drawings in a variety of drawn media. Work is assessed on quality of drawing produced and how students have observed and interpreted the subject matter.

Examination Duration

11+1-1.5 hours of drawing 13+1.5-2 hours of drawing 16+2-2.5 hours of drawing

During the timed examination, students have the opportunity to discuss their portfolio of artwork with the Head of Art. Students should be prepared to talk succinctly about the work in their digital portfolio, these one-to-one interviews usually take about 10 minutes.

The statement only needs to be a short body of text and should be no more than 400 words

What work to include in your portfolio

Part 2 - Observational Work

Please include 10 examples of your observational recording. This can include work produced in any artistic media but should reflect your abilities to record the world around you accurately.

Part 3 - Other Creative Work

Please include 10 examples of other work you have created. Work could include examples of drawings, paintings, textiles, three-dimensional work, photography, graphics, printmaking, digital work, mixed media studies or any work of other creative disciplines.

Please do not bring physical portfolios or other work to the test.

During the test, you will be asked to complete a selection of different drawn studies in different drawn media. There is no requirement for you to bring in any art materials as everything needed will be in the classroom.

During the test, you will have an opportunity to briefly discuss your digital portfolio with the Head of Creative Arts.

Submission of your completed Digital Portfolio

Your completed digital portfolio should be composed of 21 slides as follows:

- Slide 1 Your name, your current school, and a short supporting statement
- Slides 2 to 11 Examples of your observational studies
- Slides 12 to 21 Other relevant creative work

We would advise that you build your portfolio in PowerPoint and 'when completed' please save your digital portfolio as a 'PDF' file (please compress the images in the file so it is small enough to add to an email). Ensure you name your file with your full name and scholarship level for which you are applying.

Design & Technology Scholarships

The 13+ and 16+ Design and Technology Scholarship is aimed at students who show exceptional promise within the areas of design and manufacture. Our DT Department is equipped with knowledgeable staff and cutting edge technology including 3D printing and CNC machines.

DT scholars will have access to specialist additional teaching and mentoring in the DT Department. They will also have access to the Seaford Scholarship Fund which they may access (up to £150 per year) to undertake extension activities under their own or the school's direction. Scholars will be expected to present the results of their activities undertaken at the expense of the fund to their mentor, the Headmaster and the Head of Scholarships in a way of their choosing, for example a written paper, a presentation, or artefact.

The Application Process at 13+ and 16+ only

Applicants will be invited to display a portfolio of their work and undertake some practical activities during their visit.

The Portfolio

Students will be expected to provide a detailed portfolio evidencing previous designing, sketching and practical achievements.

The practical element can be presented as photographic evidence but students are also welcome to present a small range of physical outcomes

The Seaford Music Department is full of opportunities for the aspiring musician with a dizzying array of choirs, ensembles and bands to join. In our fully equipped music block, students can practise, perform and record their music in dedicated practice rooms, a recital space, recording studio and Mac suite.

Seaford College offers music scholarships to students who demonstrate enthusiasm and commitment and are willing to make a full contribution to the musical life of the College, including participation in the wide range of choral and instrumental activities on offer.

Music scholars will receive a 50% reduction on any music lessons undertaken within school.

Music scholarships are available for students who demonstrate potential in one or more areas of musical activity. Awards are made on the basis of an audition and an interview with the Director of Performing Arts and the Head of Music.

The Application Process at 11+, 13+ and 16+

During the audition, candidates will be asked to:

- Perform two contrasting pieces if more than one instrument is offered, only one piece need be played on each
- · Sing or play at sight
- Answer questions relating to the pieces performed
- · Participate in appropriate aural tests

The interview will be conducted in a manner that will allow candidates to demonstrate their experience and commitment to developing their musicianship within the life of the College.

It should be noted that music scholarships are awarded and maintained on the basis of ongoing involvement in the musical life of the College.

Successful candidates will be expected to:

- · Take Music as an option subject
- Participate in activities relating to their instruments including choir

These scholarships are available for students who demonstrate potential in one or more dance styles.

Scholars will receive a 50% reduction on any dance classes received in school.

The Application Process at 11+, 13+ and 16+

Awards are made on the basis of an audition and a short interview with the Head of Dance. Candidates should arrive in appropriate dance attire, ready to audition and participate in a technique class.

During the audition, candidates will be asked to:

- Perform two contrasting pieces each 1 to 1:30 minutes long (please bring your music with you on a CD or on a memory stick)
- Participate in a technique class which will include some improvisation

The interview will allow candidates to demonstrate their experience and commitment to developing their dance skills. It should be noted that dance scholarships are awarded and maintained on the basis of ongoing involvement in dance at the College.

Successful candidates will be expected to:

- · Take Dance as an option subject
- · Participate in all activities involving dance

The Application Process at 11+, 13+ and 16+

Candidates for a drama scholarship should be prepared to learn and perform an extract of their choice from a published play lasting between 2-3 minutes. Additionally, those applying at 16+ will also learn and perform an extract from the list of classical set texts below.

As well as the prepared scripts, the candidate will be directed on one of their speeches and will be asked to perform a piece of sight reading.

There will be an interview with the Head of Department during which the candidate will be required to demonstrate a proven interest in drama/theatre.

Successful candidates will be expected to:

- · Take Drama as an option subject
- · Participate in at least one Seaford production each year

Sports Scholarships

Sports scholarships are awarded to those individuals who will bring excellence and dedication to Seaford through sport and their contribution to the overall school community. While students may well have a particular sport they excel in, the Ad Alta Sports Scholarship is about participation in the full range of sports available at Seaford.

The College enjoys an excellent reputation both for achievement in sport and for its extensive range of facilities, including an allweather hockey AstroTurf pitch, eight rugby pitches, seven tennis courts, five netball courts, a covered swimming pool, a nine-hole golf course with driving range, indoor golf studio, 8 cricket squares, outdoor 8 lane cricket net system, 6 indoor cricket net system, indoor Cricket Performance Centre (October to Easter) and a double-sized indoor sports hall that allows tennis, netball, hockey, and many other sports to be played all year round. The Johnson Centre also has three training areas, incorporating a spin room, a lifestyle gym and a performance gym. This state-of-the-art facility supports the sporting development of all the students at the College. The Johnson Centre has the latest and most up-to-date equipment available on the market and has significantly aided the sporting development of all of the students at Seaford.

At 11+ and 13+ we offer an all-round sports scholarship. Sports scholars will be expected to compete for the College in all of our major team sports throughout the year.

16+ Performance Athlete Programme

At 16+ we offer all-round and individual sports scholarships. There will still be an expectation for all of our sport scholars to support the wide range of team sports throughout the year.

All sports scholars will be encouraged to play for the College in as many sports as possible across the three terms. Sports scholars will be encouraged to have a secondary and possibly a tertiary sport as they move through the Senior School. As part of the mentoring process, all sports scholarships will be reviewed annually. Specialisation will be allowed and managed during Year 11 as students transition into the Sixth Form

What does the Assessment Day look like for the 16+ Performance Athlete programme?

Potential sports scholars are invited into woollege to meet the Director of Sport & Co-curricular and to take part in a core sport specific session led by the respective Head of our core sports. athletics, hockey, rugby, netball, cricket, tennis, golf.

How do we support our sports scholars?

- 6 guest sports/lifestyle specific lectures per year
- · Strength and conditioning support
- · Physiotherapy support when necessary
- Prep scholars receiving mentoring from senior scholars
- Senior scholars mentored by key staff and senior scholars
- · Academic mentoring when needed

Specialist Sports at 13+ and 16+d

The College will also consider specific scholarships in more specialised areas such as Golf, Equestrian and Sailing for candidates able to demonstrate exceptional talent and potential.

Seaford College have very strong and successful equestrian teams competing in National Schools Equestrian Association (NSEA) Show Jumping, Dressage, Arena Eventing and Combined Training. We regularly qualify at area and county level to compete at the nationals and won the National Team Final in both 2022 & 2023 at the prestigious interschools' competition at the Royal Windsor Horse Show as well as being NSEA Show Jumping National Champions at 95cm and 110m. We train with Olympic Three-Day Event rider Kristina Cook at Coombelands, Pulborough.

To be considered for an equestrian scholarship, your child should be regularly competing successfully in show jumping or eventing at 80-90cm for 13+ and 100-110cm for 16+.

- Qualifications (if relevant)
- Two references (one club, one zone squad)
- A short video diary including some race footage

Upon receipt of the CV, information and video diary, it will be reviewed by the team at Seaford College and if 'successful' an interview will be arranged.

The interview may include watching a club/local race or RYA zone squad training session.
