Greetings to the athletes, coaches, parents, and spectators to the 45th Annual Bob Burns Dakota Bowl.




COUNSELING DIRECTOR - KELLY JONES







They followed up that performance with a convincing 62-27 win over Roosevelt in the Dakota Bowl. After dropping a game to Tea on a last second 80-yard touchdown pass, the Knights went on to win six of the next seven games before falling to Harrisburg in the state semi-finals. With an 8-3 record, the Knights, who were runner-up in the Metro Conference, made their 31st appearance in a state semi-final game.

KNIGHTS 2022 SEASON GAME-BY-GAME SUMMARY

WEEK 1: AUGUST 27 O'GORMAN 55 – BRANDON VALLEY 20

The season opener pitted the Knights against the Brandon Valley Lynx in the Pigskin Classic at Brandon. The Knights got on the board early with a 70-yard pass from Bennet Dannenbring to Ryland Satter only a minute into the first quarter. The extra point attempt failed. The Lynx answered to make the score 7-6 at the end of the first guarter. Dannenbring completed two passes to Satter and one to Peyton Hage in the second quarter to help the Knights take a 27-13 lead into the locker room. The second half didn't go well for Brandon Valley. Capitalizing on a Lynx fumble, Dannenbring found Satter for a fourth touchdown pass. Shortly after, Jack Hove turned an interception into a touchdown. Satter added a fifth touchdown and Maverick Jones scored in the fourth guarter to help the Knights soundly defeat the Lynx 55-20.

WEEK 2: SEPTEMBER 3 O'GORMAN 62 – ROOSEVELT 27 (DAKOTA BOWL)

The Knights scored early and often in this Dakota Bowl match-up with their west side rival Roosevelt. Bennett Dannenbring completed two touchdown passes to Jack Hove, and Hayden Groos intercepted two passes returning them for touchdowns to give the Knights all the early momentum they needed. A touchdown pass from Dannenbring to Peyton Hage put the Knights up 35-7 at the end of the first quarter. Maverick Jones added two rushing touchdowns in the second quarter to give the Knight a 49-14 lead at the half. Hage turned an interception into a touchdown early in the third quarter, and Jones added another rushing touchdown to round out the scoring for the Knights. Nate Ratzlaff led the Knights defensively with six tackles while Sam Jacobson and Gabe Tschetter each added five. With 425 yards of offense, the Knights dominated this one from start to finish.

WEEK 3: SEPTEMBER 9 O'GORMAN 41 – Tea 44

The Knights traveled to Tea to take on the Titans in a game that would come down to the wire. Midway through the first quarter, Bennett Dannenbring put the Knights on the board first with a 12-yard touchdown pass to Peyton Hage. The Titans answered, but the extra point attempt failed. O'Gorman would score two more first guarter touchdowns including a 65-yard touchdown pass from Dannenbring to Ryland Satter and a 2-yard touchdown run from Maverick Jones. A second guarter touchdown by Tea led to a 20-12 halftime lead for the Knights. Both teams scored twice in the third quarter. Dannenbring completed a 29yard pass to Jack Hove and an 85-yard pass to Satter to extend O'Gorman's lead to 34-26 after three. The fourth guarter saw Tea picking up a safety at the nineminute mark to pull within a touchdown at 34-28. The Titans then added a touchdown and extra point to take the lead for the first time at 35-34. A blocked punt led to another safety for Tea who then led 37-34. With just over two minutes remaining in the game, Dannenbring found Sullivan Schlimgen on a 26-yard touchdown pass. With the point after attempt good, the Knights retook the lead 41-37. However, Tea answered with an 80-yard touchdown pass to reclaim the lead and seal the victory.

WEEK 4: SEPTEMBER 16 (HOMECOMING) O'GORMAN 49 – RAPID CITY STEVENS 7

Homecoming brought the Rapid City Stevens Raiders to McEneaney Field. The Knights jumped out to an early lead and never looked back scoring four touchdowns in the first guarter. Maverick Jones found the endzone on a two-yard touchdown run with under three minutes gone in the game. Bennet Dannenbring followed with touchdown passes of 64 and 73 yards to Sullivan Schlimgen. A 77-yard pass to Ryland Satter rounded out the first guarter scoring with the Knights leading 28-0. Jones added two more touchdowns in the second quarter and Dannebring connected with Pevton Hage on a 32-yard touchdown pass to broaden the lead to 49-0 at the half. The second half saw a running clock, and the Knights moved to 3-1 on the season with the 49-7 victory.

continued from page 17 WEEK 5: SEPTEMBER 23 O'GORMAN 35 – LINCOLN 28

Week five saw the Lincoln Patriots visiting McEneaney Field. After a slow start offensively for both teams, with just under two minutes left in the first quarter. Maverick Jones rushed 75-vards for the first score of the game. After a successful point after attempt by Peyton Hage, the Knights led 7-0 at the end of the first guarter. Bennet Dannenbring found Rvland Satter on a 14-vard touchdown pass in the second guarter to round out the scoring for the first half. Lincoln got on the board midway through the third guarter, and Dannenbring carried for another O'Gorman touchdown to help the Knights build a 21-7 lead at the end of the third quarter. Lincoln's offense came alive in the fourth quarter scoring three touchdowns and pulling within a touchdown at 28-21. Both teams found the endzone in the final 90 seconds of the game with Maverick Jones rushing for a touchdown to put the Knights up 35-21 with 1:30 remaining. Lincoln answered with 14 seconds remaining, but it was too little too late as the Knights posted their fourth victory of the year 35-28. Nathan Ratzlaff and Joe Niedringhaus lead the defense with 12 and 9 tackles respectively.

WEEK 6: SEPTEMBER 30 O'GORMAN 17 – JEFFERSON 42

O'Gorman got on the board first with a 30-yard field goal by Peyton Hage, but Jefferson answered quickly and went on to score two more touchdowns in the first quarter leading to a 21-3 score after one. Bennet Dannenbring would add a touchdown in the fourth quarter and Hayden Groos completed a 24-yard touchdown pass to Dawson Bauer late in the game, but Jefferson proved too much for the Knights in this contest at Howard Wood Field. Nathan Ratzlaff once again lead the Knights defensively with 13 tackles. With the loss, the Knights moved to 4-2 on the season.

WEEK 7: OCTOBER 7 OGORMAN 31 – WASHINGTON 14

The Knights returned to McEneaney Field to take on the Washington Warriors in this cross-town rivalry. After a slow start offensively for both teams, the Knights finally got on the board early in the second quarter after a 21-yard field goal by Peyton Hage. Only a minute later, Sullivan Schlimgen scooped up a fumble and scored to put the Knights ahead 10-0. With just under five minutes left in the half, Bennet Dannenbring found Maverick Jones on a 14-yard touchdown pass to make the score 17-0 at the half. Washington finally scored in the third quarter, but Dannenbring added a touchdown through the air to Hage and a rushing touchdown to put the Knights up for good at 31-14.

WEEK 8 – OCTOBER 14 O'GORMAN 53 – RAPID CITY CENTRAL 7

In Rapid City, the Knights scored 47 points in the first half on their way to a 53-7 victory over the Rapid City Central Cobblers. With less than two minutes gone in the game, Maverick Jones carried for a nine-yard touchdown. Bennet Dannenbring found Ryland Satter twice and Jones added another rushing touchdown to round out the first guarter scoring. Jones added two more touchdowns in the second guarter, and Peyton Hage forced a fumble that Henry Theobald took in for another score leading to a 47-7 halftime score. With a running clock in the second half, the only score came on a Josh Woelfel 16-vard touchdown run with three minutes remaining in the game. The Knights moved to 6-2 on the season with this 53-7 win.

WEEK 9 – OCTOBER 20 O'GORMAN 24 – HARRISBURG 20

The Knights finished the regular season taking on the Harrisburg Tigers at home in this late October matchup between two ranked teams. Harrisburg took the lead on a touchdown midway through the first quarter. OG answered with a 25-yard field goal by Peyton Hage and trailed 7-3 at the end of one. The Tigers added another touchdown in the second guarter to lead 14-3 at the half. The third guarter brought more scoring from the Tigers as they extended their lead to 20-3. The Knights came alive in the final quarter with Ryland Satter scoring on a four-yard touchdown run with just over nine minutes left in the game. Bennet Dannenbring then found Satter on an 86vard touchdown pass with 4:30 left in the game to pull the Knights to within three. Finally, with just over a minute remaining in the game, Sullivan Schlimgen forced a fumble that Nathan Ratzlaff recovered and took 16 yards for a touchdown. With the extra point by Hage, the Knights escaped with the win, 24-0. The Knights entered the playoffs with a 7-2 record.

PLAYOFFS: QUARTERFINALS – OCTOBER 27 O'GORMAN 29 – RAPID CITY STEVENS 20

Rapid City Stevens made the trip across the state to face the Knights in the opening round of the playoffs. O'Gorman took the lead on a 35-yard Bennet Dannenbring pass to Nathan Ratzlaff. The extra point attempt failed. Later in the first guarter Rapid City scored, but the Knights answered when Dannenbring found Peyton Hage with a 29-yard touchdown pass. The Knights led 13-7 after one. The second guarter opened with Dannenbring connecting with Hage for a 4-yard touchdown. Near the end of the half Dannenbring found Ryland Satter to put the Knights up 26-7. With just seven seconds left in the half, the Raiders scored from one-yard out to close the gap to 26-14 at the half. The only score in the third guarter came on a 24-yard field goal by Hage with just over four minutes remaining in the guarter. Taking a 29-14 lead into the fourth guarter, the Knights held on to win this guarterfinal game 29-20. Sam Marsh led the Knights defensively with seven solo tackles and two assists. They would move on to face Harrisburg in the semi-finals in what would be a rematch of the final game of the regular season.

PLAYOFFS: SEMI-FINALS – NOVEMBER 4 O'GORMAN 21 – HARRISBURG 42

In a game that was much closer than the final score indicated, the Knights scored the first touchdown of the game when Bennet Dannenbring carried the ball from the one-yard line six seconds into the second guarter. Harrisburg answered with eight minutes remaining, but the Knights regained the lead on a 36-yard touchdown pass from Dannenbring to Henry Theobald. The Knights took a 14-7 lead into the locker room at the half. but Harrisburg scored early in the third guarter to tie the game. Maverick Jones answered with a 12-yard run with just over two minutes in the guarter to regain the lead 21-14. The Tigers returned the ensuing kickoff to tie the game once again. The fourth guarter belonged to Harrisburg as they scored three times to seal the victory 42-21. Harrisburg would go on to fall to Jefferson in the state championship game.

DAKOTA BOWL GAMES: 45 Years- of Highlights-

DAKOTA BOWL I

O'Gorman 35 Fargo-Shanley 12 For the first ever Dakota Bowl game, Head Coach Bob Burns chose a team from neighboring North Dakota that had won 32 games straight and 15 state football titles. But it was soon clear that this Dakota Bowl idea was going to be special for the Knights. They scored on three of their first four possessions enroute to winning 35-12. Knight fullback Steve Lukens scored three touchdowns. Jamie Kiley carried the ball 13 times, gaining 81 yards and scoring one touchdown. Quarterback Dave Viger completed 7 of 8 passes for 93 yards as a crowd of 7.113 looked on.

DAKOTA BOWL II

O'Gorman 6 Washington 13

In one of the more controversial Dakota Bowl contests, Washington scored on its first and second possessions and held on to win. The first score came out of what O'Gorman coaches thought was an illegal formation. No flag was thrown, however and the touchdown stood. O'Gorman's only score came after Dave Flicek knocked down a Warrior punt. John Weisensee picked up the ball and ran it to the Washington 25. Tim Rooney passed to Doug Brown for the touchdown two plays later.

DAKOTA BOWL III

O'Gorman 10

Pat Weisensee did all of the Knights' scoring, kicking a field goal and running for a touchdown as O'Gorman lost its second straight Dakota Bowl contest. Weisensee ended the night with 142 yards on 24 carries. Two other O'Gorman drives ended without scores inside the Patriots' 15-yard line. The Knights went on to win the Class 11 AA state championship later that year.

DAKOTA BOWL IV

O'Gorman 12 Washington 13 (OT) In this overtime game, Washington stopped Knight quarterback Scott Jones short of the goal-line on a two-point conversion to seal the win. A crowd of 7,684 watched the low-scoring contest. Fullback Tim Lorang scored the Knight's only touchdown in regulation. In the overtime, Jones hit wide receiver Jeff Spriggs for a touchdown to pull within one of Washington, but the Knights failed on the two-point attempt.

DAKOTA BOWL V O'Gorman 14

O'Gorman 14 Lincoln 13 Steve Kueter's first Dakota Bowl as head coach proved to be one of the most memorable as the Knights' Jeff Meinen stopped the Patriots' fake extra-point attempt at the oneyard line for the win. Tim Jurgens led the charge, scoring both of O'Gorman's touchdowns. But Meinen's hit on Lincoln's Jon Peterson at the one-yard line preserved the victory with less than 5 minutes to play in the game.

DAKOTA BOWL VI

O'Gorman 7 Washington 6 For the third straight year, the Dakota Bowl game was decided by one point as the Knights prevailed over Washington. Tim Jurgens scored on the first play on the fourth quarter, then kicked the extra point to give O'Gorman the advantage. A crowd of 8,021 watched the game which was scoreless at halftime. Jon Harris scored Washington's touchdown in the third period.

DAKOTA BOWL VII

O'Gorman 14 Lincoln 0

The Knights' defense smothered the Patriots enroute to a 14-0 O'Gorman victory. Gene Elrod and Tom Schnetter scored for the Knights. Troy Soldatke and Todd Lamberty led the defense. The Knights went on to win the state Class AA football crown later that year.

DAKOTA BOWL VIII

O'Gorman 21 Washington 0 The Knights completed their second straight Dakota Bowl shutout by topping Washington before a crowd of 9,081 at Howard Wood Field. Steve Mislinski, who finished with 124 rushing yards on 26 attempts, scored the first O'Gorman touchdown. Quarterback Jon Olson scored the second and Jim Dougherty added a third touchdown on a 38-yard run. O'Gorman held the Warriors to just 46 yards of offense in the game. The Knights went on to win their second straight Class AA title.

DAKOTA BOWL IX

O'Gorman 40 Lincoln 14

Brad Salem led the O'Gorman offense passing for 156 yards and one touchdown as the Knights trounced the Patriots. Ryan Cahalan returned a second-half interception for a touchdown and scored another on a 19-yard catch. Rob Lowe scored the game's first touchdown. The Knights led 26-6 at halftime.

DAKOTA BOWL X

O'Gorman 42 Brookings 6

The Knights rode four first-half touchdowns to victory over Brookings in the Bobcats' first Dakota Bowl appearance. Chris Sitzmann scored three touchdowns in the game, Jay Hollenback scored another and quarterback Chad McConnell added another. Sitzmann had 126 yards rushing in the game. O'Gorman completed the school's only undefated season that year, capping it off with another state title.

O'Gorman 14 Lincoln 12

The Knights won their seventh straight Dakota Bowl game, but it wasn't easy as they held on to top the Patriots. A crowd of 8,929 attended. Senior quarterback Scott Bickett ran for one touchdown and hit Scott Honner for another to tally O'Gorman's scoring. Lincoln had taken the lead in the game 6-0. Ryan Folsom had three sacks to lead the defense.

DAKOTA BOWL XII

O'Gorman 35 Brookings 17

O'Gorman took a 21-0 first half lead in the game before a crowd of 9,190. Steve Molohon intercepted a pass and Tom Jackson blocked a punt – both turning into touchdowns for the Knights. Mike Bunkers hit Chris Moran on a 13-yd. pass for another score. Matt Hart added a one-yard run. Steve Statzer carried the ball 21 times for 129 yards.

DAKOTA BOWL XIII

O'Gorman 35 Lincoln 6

Before a record crowd of 10,954, O'Gorman rolled to its ninth straight Dakota Bowl victory. Josh Lien rushed for 149 yards and three touchdowns for the Knights. O'Gorman had 259 yards rushing by halftime. Matt Hart also scored on a 4-yard run. The Knights won the school's fifth state title later that season.

DAKOTA BOWL XIV

O'Gorman 29 Brookings 6

Led by an 85-yd. punt return by Dennis Schoenwald and a 74-yd. interception return for a touchdown by Tony Breck, O'Gorman upped its Dakota Bowl record to 11-3. Josh Pierce scored on a 4-yard run and Jason Green on a oneyard run in the game.

DAKOTA BOWL XV

O'Gorman 49 Lincoln 0

The game he founded started bearing his name this year as the Bob Burns Dakota Bowl unfolded before a crowd of 8,843. The Knights blanked the Patriots for their 11th straight Dakota Bowl victory. Jason Green gained 121 yards and scored three touchdowns. Matt Carlson scored twice; and Jeremy Butterfield once in the game. O'Gorman went on to win the State Class AA title that year.

DAKOTA BOWL XVI

O'Gorman 20 Brandon Valley 7

The Knights spoiled Brandon Valley's first appearance in the Dakota Bowl. Kevin Klempka got into the end zone three times as O'Gorman won another Dakota Bowl contest. Klempka ended the game with 91 yards and quarterback Pat Burke added another 44 yards on the ground. Ed Schumann rushed eight times for 60 yards.

DAKOTA BOWL XVII

O'Gorman 16 Lincoln 8 Alex Butterfield took the opening kickoff and rambled 95 yards to launch the Knights into the lead in the Dakota Bowl. But Lincoln played tough and O'Gorman lost three

O'Gorman set up the Lynx first score on a botched punt giving Brandon Valley possession on the Knights 4 yard line. Casey Hillman scored O'Gorman's only touchdown on a reverse and Ross Winkels added a field goal. The Knights led 9-6 at halftime.

Senior Greg Billion caught six passes for 80 yards and three touchdowns from senior guarterback Tony Viger. Viger added two rushing TDs in the game. With the win, O'Gorman moved its record to 24-7 in the annual contest, including victories in the last six games. The victory marked the 30th consecutive win against Sioux Falls Lincoln.

DAKOTA BOWL XXXII O'Gorman 9

Roosevelt 12 The Riders scored with 46 seconds left in the game to give them the win in front of 8,200 fans at Howard Wood Field. The Knights outgained the Riders 261-210 and dominated the third quarter after the game was tied 6-6 at halftime. O'Gorman drove deep into Rider territory twice in the third quarter but only ended up with a field goal to go up 9-6 at the end of the guarter. Kelby Tague had 104 rushing yards and Sam Steffl rushed for 102 for the Knights. It was only the third win in 27 tries for the Riders against the Knights.

DAKOTA BOWL XXXIII

O'Gorman 24 Washington 7

The Knights blocked three kicks on special teams in route to a 24-7 win over the defending state champion Washington Warriors in the 33rd Annual Dakota Bowl at Howard Wood Field. Sam Steffl carried the ball 33 times for 149 yards to lead the Knights who did not complete a pass. While the Warriors scored first, the Knights defense owned the evening holding Washington scoreless after the first drive of the game. With the score tied 7-7, Nic Steffl blocked a punt and Austin Pharis scooped up the ball and ran it in to give the Knights a 14-7 lead. Flynn Donelan scored from nine yards out to make the score 21-7 at the half. The Warriors moved the ball well throughout the second half but were never able to find the end zone.



DAKOTA BOWL XXXIV

O'Gorman 7 Roosevelt 19

In a defensive battle, Roosevelt clung to a 9-7 lead at half and went on to add the only points in the second half to pull out the victory. After losing quarterback Tanner Schulte in the first quarter to injury, the Knights struggled with a limited offense. The Riders had their own problems offensively, and mistakes set up the scoring opportunities for both squads in the first half. Nic Steffl rushed for 65 yards on 18 carries. Blake Hilmoe hit Austin Pharis with a 16 yard touchdown pass for the only Knights touchdown.

DAKOTA BOWL XXXV

O'Gorman 28 Sioux Falls Washington 10 The Knights got back on track with a win over last season's state champion Washington Warriors. Luke Fritsch led the Knights offense scoring three touchdowns on runs of 52, 47. and 12 yards. Matt White scored first on a Washington fumble taking the ball in from 1-vard out late in the first guarter. Fritsch scored to put the Knights up 14-3, but the Warriors answered to keep the game close with a 14-10 halftime score. The third guarter saw neither team score, but Fritsch broke the drought early in the fourth quarter with his 47 yard run which put the Knights up 21-10. After a Washington turnover, Fritsch added the final touchdown with a little over four minutes left in the game. O'G had 266 total yards of offense and made the Warriors pay for their five fumbles.

DAKOTA BOWL XXXVI

O'Gorman 29 Lincoln 34

Lincoln returned the opening kick-off 92 yards for a touchdown to take an early 7-0 lead in Dakota Bowl XXXVI, but the Knights fought back with a touchdown run by Dodi Makwinja. Early in the second quarter, Colin Zimprich added a field goal to give the Knights a 9-7 lead. The Patriots managed to add another score late in the first half to take a 14-9 lead into halftime. Both teams came to life in the second half with the Knights scoring three times in the fourth guarter. Fritsch went 8 of 13 for 163 vards and three touchdowns hitting Jack Peery twice and Ben Johnson once to cut the lead to 34-29 with 1:29 to play in the game. Lincoln recovered the onside kick and hung on to take the win.

DAKOTA BOWL XXXVII

Roosevelt 24 O'Gorman 14

Roosevelt got on the board first in Dakota Bowl XXXVII, but the Knights fought back with a 65-yard drive capped off with Luke Fritsch taking the ball in for the score. Roosevelt went on to lead 21-7 at the half and hung on to win 24-14. Fritsch found Jack Peery late in the fourth guarter, but two interceptions and two fumbles were too much for the Knights to overcome in this Dakota Bowl loss. Peery led the Knights with 104 yards, five catches and a score. Makwinja had 17 carries for 65 yards.

DAKOTA BOWL XXXVIII

Brandon Valley 22 O'Gorman 34

The Knights marched to a victory in Dakota Bowl XXXVIII largely by combining the talents of Hunter Thompson at quarterback and sophomore Canyon Bauer at wide receiver. Bauer ended the night with 234 receiving yards on nine catches with three touchdowns. His scoring started early when he caught a short pass in the first quarter and went 73 vards for the touchdown. More was to follow as Thompson ended the night with 352 yards through the air and one touchdown run. Bauer scored on a catch followed by a 29-yard run in the third. Andrew Reuter followed with a reception and a 65yard run to put the Knights ahead for the first time. With just over three minutes left in the game, Bauer caught a 28-yard pass to seal the victory. Kristin Jakowicz was 4-4 on extra point attempts.

DAKOTA BOWL XXXIX

Harrisburg 26 O'Gorman 35

Harrisburg's inaugural performance in Dakota Bowl XXXIX saw a talented Tiger squad giving the Knights all they could handle for four quarters. The Tigers jumped out to a 14-0 lead early in the second quarter and led 14-7 at the half. Sporting their new grey uniforms, the Knights staged a comeback in the third quarter with Isaac Struck finding Canyon Bauer for an 81-yard touchdown pass 48 seconds into the second half. Bauer finished with three catches for 175 yards. Harrisburg refused to go away as they quickly retook the lead on the next possession. The back and forth scoring continued when Struck threw to Nick Billion for a 47-yard touchdown regaining the lead 21-20. The Tigers scored with a little over nine minutes to play coming within two points of the Knights (28-26), but the two-point conversion attempt failed.

DAKOTA BOWL XL O'Gorman 42

Washington 33 Dakota Bowl saw No. 2 O'Gorman taking on No. 3 Washington in a rematch of last year's semi-final game. The Knights scored on their first play from scrimmage with Zach Norton finding Canyon Bauer with a 73-yard touchdown pass. The Warriors turned the ball over on the kickoff allowing the Knights to score their second touchdown less than a minute into the game. After stopping Washington on the next drive, OG took the ball 69-yards with Bauer scoring. Norton found Evan Wittry just before half to push the lead to 28-7 at the half. The Warriors mounted a comeback in the second half scoring on an interception to pull within two points. The twopoint-conversion attempt failed, and the Knights drove the field for a final score making it 42-33 with under five minutes to play. Norton completed 18 of 27 passes for 294-vards with three touchdowns. Bauer led the Knights scoring with 9 catches for 162 vards and two touchdowns. Alex Kowalczvk led the defensive effort with 10 tackles and assists.

DAKOTA BOWL XLI

The second game of the season saw the Knights taking on the returning 11AAA state champion Brandon Valley Lynx. The Knights opened the game on a scoring drive capped off by Tate Wishard's touchdown run. Tied 7-7 midway through the second quarter, the Lynx capitalized on a Knights' fumble and went 99 yards to take the lead 13-7. An interception on the next Knights' possession led to another Brandon Valley touchdown to put the Lynx up 19-7 with a minute left in the half. Connor Pavelko's 49-yard field goal at the end of the first half led to a 19-10 score at the break. The Lynx scored on the opening drive of the third quarter to go up 26-10 followed by an 81-yard punt return to lead 33-10 late in the third quarter. Both teams traded touchdowns in the fourth to lead to the 40-16 final.

DAKOTA BOWL XLVII O'Gorman 0

Roosevelt 27 The Knights scored early and often in this Dakota Bowl match-up with their west side rival Roosevelt. Bennett Dannenbring completed two touchdown passes to Jack Hove, and Hayden Groos intercepted two passes returning them for touchdowns to give the Knights all the early momentum they needed. A touchdown pass from Dannenbring to Peyton Hage put the Knights up 35-7 at the end of the first quarter. Maverick Jones added two rushing touchdowns in the second quarter to give the Knight a 49-14 lead at the half. Hage turned an interception into a touchdown early in the third quarter, and Jones added another rushing touchdown to round out the scoring for the Knights. Nate Ratzlaff led the Knights defensively with six tackles while Sam Jacobson and Gabe Tschetter each added five. With 425 yards of offense, the Knights dominated this one from start to finish.

The 2023 boys track team accomplished something that had never been done in O'Gorman history. While O'Gorman has won 120 team championships, the Knights had never placed higher than third in boys track. And the Knights claimed their first title in dramatic fashion.

Coach Strand commented that after the first meet and a few weeks into practice the coaches began talking about #undertheradar. Coming off a twelfth-place finish in 2022, the Knights certainly flew beneath the radar this season. At the state meet, the Knights were tied with Brandon Valley at 90.5 points going to the final event of the meet, the 4x4 relay. Since the Lynx didn't have an entry in the final event, and neither did Rapid City Stevens, who was sitting at 88 points, even an eighth-place finish would give the Knights the title.


But, Kellen Askew, Kyle Konechne, Ashton Bierma and Sam Castle had their sights set higher. The group not only placed, they won the final race of the track meet in 3:20.18, breaking the school record and the meet record and edging Aberdeen Central by 0.45 seconds.

According to Strand, "We knew we had a great team, but we didn't want anyone else to know. We kept it low key, and it turned out great."







Jim Clark '68



The fourth child of Florence and Clayton Clark, Jim immediately became a Northender! He graduated from O'Gorman High School in 1968 where he participated in sports and choir. He achieved his BA and MBA from the University of Sioux Falls.

During college Jim toured on a fivemonth Global Semester around the world. He was captivated with the sculptures throughout Rome, Italy. It was this experience that lead to the creation of the much-heralded Sioux Falls SculptureWalk. Jim founded the program in 2004 and was the director until his retirement in 2021. During this time, over 1,000 world-class sculptures were featured in downtown, and similar programs were launched at Avera McKennan Hospital, University of Sioux Falls, University of South Dakota, Vermillion, Watertown, Sturgis, and De Smet, SD.

Two of the most impactful projects for Jim are the "Potato Man" sculpture, located on the southwest corner of McKennan Park and the "Arc of Dreams" sculpture in downtown Sioux Falls. Jim felt the need to honor the Irish immigrants who endured the Potato Famine, coffin ships, and oppression here in the U.S. The "Arc of Dreams" sculpture required a \$3 million fundraising campaign and six years of construction. The sculpture's mission is to recognize dreamers of the past, present, and inspire future dreamers. Since stepping away from Sculpture-Walk Jim has continued consulting with eight community sculpture programs in the Midwest and Texas, and has enjoyed creating acrylic paintings and glass fusion art.

The SculptureWalk kept Jim busy, but wasn't his fulltime career. Jim found success with his 23-year banking career, his community service involvement, being an educator instructing bankers for five years in the AIB program, and as an evening adjunct professor for six years in the University of Sioux Falls MBA program. He and his wife, DeAnn, have been married for 44 years and are blessed with Adam, who is married to Lindsey and have 3 children, and Alex married to Kelly.

Kevîn Kîng ' 69



Kevin King has performed music internationally with some of the biggest stars of rock music. He paved his future at O'Gorman High School through participating in All-State Chorus, playing a 12-string guitar, and singing with The Knight Singers, one of the first Contemporary Liturgical groups in the United States. After graduation in 1969, Kevin went to Sioux Falls College as a vocal music major until an opportunity came up to join a band from Los Angeles called The Closer Ties.

Kevin has been inducted into the South Dakota Rock and Roll Hall of Fame with three bands and into the Iowa Rock and Roll Hall of Fame with two bands. Most of Kevin's success happened in the 1980's and 1990's as one of the founding members of Hot Rod-Chevy Kevy, a band he formed with Rod Jerke. Besides traveling extensively on their own, they were called upon to be the backing band for some of the biggest names in classic rock and roll including: Chuck Berry at the Metrodome in Minneapolis and The Tokens (The Lion Sleeps Tonight) at the Chicago Theater. Hot Rod-Chevy Kevy continue to perform today. He was also a founding member of the popular rock group Ma's Boys.

Kevin has played guitar for: Del Shannon, Tommy Roe, Bobby Vee, Lou Christie, The Coasters, The Shirelles, The Marvelettes, The Dixie Cups, The Drifters, Peter Noone (Herman's Hermits), Lesley Gore, Brian Hyland, and Freddy Cannon. Music has allowed Kevin to travel the world and see the stage of over 5,000 live performances. He is a published songwriter and has recorded a number of albums with many of the groups he has played and some independently.

Kevin's parents, Clement and Jean King were active members of St. Lamberts Parish and instilled a belief in Catholic education that has been passed down through generations. They had seven children, many of whom graduated from O'Gorman - Norma (Reidmann) '65, Mary (Nelson) '73 and David '78. His daughter, Harmony (Dalgleish) graduated from O'Gorman in 1996. She earned her Ph.D. in Ecology, and is currently a research scientist and professor at William and Mary in Williamsburg, VA. Harmony is married to Chris Dalgleish and has two children, Perrin and Ellery. Kevin and his wife Sheila live in Des Moines, IA, but love to visit Sioux Falls as often as possible.

Dave Alpers_ Jr. '92

During his high school career at O'Gorman, Dave earned a total of 13 letters between football, wrestling, and track. In football, Dave played nose guard and right tackle. His junior and senior year the football team played in the Class AA State Championship games. As a senior he helped his team win the 1991 Championship title. That team was honored and inducted into the O'Gorman HOF in 2015. He was named to the Class 11AA All-State Team as a defensive lineman and was selected to play in the State's All-Star Games.

Dave's freshman football coach, Mr. Gordon, convinced him to come out for wrestling once football was done. Wrestling in the heavyweight division he was a varsity starter all four years. Making the state tournament all four years, he fell short of the placing rounds as a freshman, placed fourth as a sophomore, and runner up both his junior and senior seasons. As a junior and senior, Dave was undefeated entering the state championship matches.

Dave would go on to spread his joy of sports through coaching. He sat on the South Dakota Junior Football board from 1999 through 2013. He also coached in the junior (5 & 6 grades) and senior (7 & 8 grades) divisions. In 2008 he was hired onto the football and track coaching staff at Sioux Falls Lincoln. In 2009 he joined the wrestling team for a year as the middle school head coach. In 2008 helping as an offensive line coach Lincoln won their first ever football title in Class AA. Changing



to the defensive side a few years later Lincoln went back-to-back undefeated seasons in Class AAA. As a track coach Dave coached shot put. Several of his throwers would go on to compete in college. One of his throwers was able to break a 30-year-old record. His throwers help combine for five boys, three girls, and four combined state titles in track and field. While at Lincoln, Dave was a part of 15 state title teams.

Today, Dave works for a software company that provides services to the millwork industry. He is married to Carol who is an elementary teacher in Sioux Falls. Dave and Carol have two children, David and Abigail. David graduated from O'Gorman in 2022, he attends South Dakota State University majoring in exercise science. He also is a member of the football team as a tight end. Abigail is in eighth grade at O'Gorman Junior High. She participates in basketball and track.

Mallory Cicmanec (Peck)'05

Mallory Cicmanec (Peck) '05 was a multi-sport athlete competing in Cross Country, Cheerleading, Gymnastics, and Track and Field with 15+ state titles between those sports.

As a seventh grader she competed on the high school gymnastics team and continued through her high school career. Mallory was state champion on the balance beam and floor exercise, two-time State Vault Champion, twotime State Bar Champion, two-time State All-Around Championship, part of the State Champion Team from '02-'05, and was part of the team scoring record for the state of South Dakota. In her senior year she won the Sarah Nitz Award for the athlete who best exemplified her sportsmanship, gymnastics ability, academics, and character.

In eighth grade Mallory joined the track and field team for O'Gorman High School as a pole vaulter. She was a state champion in the triple jump and two-time pole vault state champion. She won the silver medal at the USA track and field junior Olympics, she has held the state women's pole vault record, and still holds the O'Gorman women's triple jump and pole vault record. She is third on the all-time women's high jump list and fourth on the all-time women's long jump list.



Mallory went on to compete at Purdue University for pole vault. There she was a two-time NCAA All-American, two time Big Ten pole vault champion, placed three other times at the Big Ten Championships and placed ninth at the 2006 USA Outdoor Track and Field Championships. During her collegiate career she was named Big Ten Athlete of the Week as well as being named to multiple deans lists, and academic all-American teams.

Mallory received her undergraduate degree from Purdue in General Health Sciences with a minor in Psychology. She went on to dental school at University of Nebraska Medical Center. She lives in Sioux Falls with her husband Sean and two children and practices as a general dentist at Prairie Dental Center.


DON BARNES RETIRES AS OG TENNIS COACH





Ryan Soukup, head coach for the Knights through the inaugural season, looks back on the season as a definite success. Led by Karsten Schlimgen and Kira Mentele, both college softball recruits, the Knights were excited to reach the state tournament during their first season.

While overall a young team, including seven of the eighteen players being junior high students, the Knights were able to string together eight straight wins with seven-run-rule victories in May and three wins over top five teams in the state. Soukup believes, "The strides the younger players made by playing against girls three or four years older will strengthen them tremendously as they continue to grow as softball players and eventually become upperclassmen themselves."

One of the challenges for the sport in its first year was finding regulationsized fields for all of the teams in the city for both practices and games. Soukup said, "It was tough going from games played on fields designed for slow pitch to regulation-sized fields and back constantly throughout the year." The Sioux Falls schools shared practice fields that, according to Soukup, weren't big enough for high school athletes making it difficult to get consistently good practices accomplished. Senior Kira Mentele, in a news story on KELO television last spring, spoke of the excitement that having the sport sanctioned would bring to the sport. "I think it will definitely bring some awareness, like 'hey, softball is here. We're here to stay and definitely have fun with it." Soukup felt the media did a nice job of covering the sport and giving the girls the coverage they deserved. He is looking forward to seeing the game continue to grow and seeing even more O'Gorman students in the stands cheering on their classmates.

Looking ahead to the 2024 season, Soukup says, "It will be fun to expand our schedule a bit and play some new teams. We will be a little bit younger in 2024, but we'll have a staff full of talent and potential, and it'll be a great time working with them in greater depth next spring."
