

# JOIN THE PACK

(Plattsmouth Activities Complex for Kids)

A couple years ago Plattsmouth High School started a baseball program. While some think it is ludicrous for a school our size to have another sport, others think it is one more way to get kids involved. PHS has a Blue Devil baseball team! They continue to use Memorial Field for practice and games. While most alums hold onto the great memories of this field, it is woefully in need of improvements to meet NSAA (Nebraska Schools Activities Association) standards. The school board and community debated their options of investing over \$600,000.00 into a field that would be owned by the city or develop a plan that would eventually provide the school with their own baseball facility. Investing in a facility the district didn't own was just not good business. When their research found The Community Sports Development Council, Inc (A National Alliance of Sponsors & Funding Partners Supporting the Development of Community Sports Facilities) they couldn't pass up the opportunity. The Plattsmouth application was approved and has a confirmed financial commitment of 70% of the turf portion of the project. This commitment changed wishful thinking into an action plan. The effort to build a better complex became the PACK (Plattsmouth Activities Complex for Kids) Project. It was decided to put turf on the football field as well as a new baseball field. This plan makes it possible to practice on the existing football field, freeing up the practice field for the baseball stadium. (all east of the school) According to Jeff Wiles, PHS Principal and former head track coach, "Synthetic turf can stand the wear and tear (marching band competitions) as well as prove usable eight out of nine months of the school year. The synthetic turf creates a safer playing surface because there are no holes in it and it's always soft. Turf would expand the physical education and wellness programs." The drawing shows that some areas can serve more than one purpose. Turf on the football field will provide a place for band practice (they use the parking lot now) and competitions. Anyone who has ever gotten a band shoe stuck in the mud during competition or half time would appreciate turf. The leveled football field provides a second choice for soccer games in inclement weather or soccer tournaments. The turf on the baseball field will also provide a second choice for the softball team when soggy fields become a problem. According to Dr. Richard Hasty, superintendent of schools, "Annual maintenance costs of the football field alone amount to \$18,000 in watering and mowing The track will be resurfaced, sidewalks will provide a connection between and around the complex, and the fence will be moved to encompass the entire area for added security.



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# 2012 HALL of FAME INDUCTEE Stephanie H. Moline

The high school auditorium was packed with Stephanie's family and friends and the entire student body to hear her words of advice to becoming a successful adult. Stephanie Howland Moline graduated from Plattsmouth High School in 1978. She is the daughter of the late Fred William Howland, Jr. and Jean Lloyd Howland both PHS class of 1947 graduates. Stephanie's maternal grandparents were Anderson and Dorothy Wehrbein Lloyd <sup>27</sup> and her paternal grandfather was Fred William Howland <sup>25</sup>. While in high school, Stephanie was active in Varsity Band, Madrigal, and Chorus. She was the female lead in *Flower Drum Song* as a senior. Stephanie was also a stellar student, being a member of the National Honor Society from 1976 through 1978. She was an honor graduate of the class of 1978. Stephanie was the Kass Kounty King Korn Karnival Queen in 1981 and the Plattsmouth Women's Tennis League Champ from 1978 to 1983.

Stephanie attended college at Nebraska Wesleyan University, graduating with a Bachelor of Science Degree in 1982. Following graduation from Wesleyan, Stephanie started her employment with First National Bank of Omaha in 1982, where she presently holds the title of Executive Vice President, Corporate Banking Group. During her climb up the corporate ladder she experienced many different roles: In 1982 she was part of the Management Trainee Program. From 1987 to

1989 she was a Loan Officer. She served as 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President from 1989 to 1992, becoming Vice President in 1992 until 2001. From 2002 to 2006 Stephanie was Sr. Vice President, Commercial Loan. Since 2006 she has served as Executive Vice President, Corporate Banking Group.

Over the years Stephanie has worked on many different boards and committees in service to the Omaha metropolitan area. Her work for the community has been varied and extensive. #### P.A.C.K Continued...

The school district continues to hone academic practice and offerings to be the best in the state. Most recently they took advantage of Build America Bonds and purchased the John Deere property located to the west of the high school, now known as the PACE (Plattsmouth Academic Curriculum and Equipment) Complex. This group of buildings not only gives much needed space for the copy center and storage for large pieces of grounds equipment, but has enabled the school to expand the vocational education program and the GED Program. Plattsmouth has the only High School Diesel Mechanic program in the state. The Headstart program located in the Early Childhood Center (Central School) continues to be a model program for the region, serving more than 200 children. The elementary special needs services and facilities have been enlarged due to American Recovery and Reinvestment Act funds. Plattsmouth has one of the highest rated elementary Before and After School programs in the state. A new after school program was started this year for Middle School students.

The PACK project will not affect any taxpayer funds to the district. The mission of the Plattsmouth Community School District is: **Working in partnership with the community to ensure academic achievement, responsible behavior, and civic engagement for all of our students.** A plethora of studies will vouch for the importance extra curricular activities plays in the development of a good student and citizen. The PACK Project is one more way the school district is striving to adequately prepare students for their future endeavors in college, work, and life.

The PACK Project is a \$3.8million project. The commitment of the CSDC leaves the PACK committee planning to raise \$1.8million. Any financial support is tax deductible through the POPS Foundation (Foundation for Providing Opportunities for Plattsmouth Schools). The Foundation is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. The web site has a Paypal option, however 100% of donations paid directly to the Foundation will go to the project. (POPS Foundation – P. O. Box 283 – Plattsmouth, NE 68048) In a community where 51% of the students have a free and reduced financial status, the kids need help from outside the community. The PACK committee is hoping the PHS alumni will support this project emotionally and/or financially.
