## MESSAGE FROM The Head of School

Reversal a community of friendship, respect, love, shared Jewish values, and learning. Bruce Feiler in his book *The Secrets of Happy Families* writes, "Study after study confirms that the number one predictor of life satisfaction comes from spending time with the people you care about and who also care about you. Simply put, happiness is other people." For us, the other people are our Brawerman community, where we are surrounded by those who share a collective passion around a common purpose. At Brawerman, our *kesher*, our connection, is at the heart of who we are. We are a community of learners focused on academic excellence and joyful Judaism in a caring, compassionate, and safe environment. And Brawerman's existence has never been more important in its history than it is today.

We live in a time when antisemitism is in the news on a daily basis. Antisemitic tropes are used by mainstream public figures and politicians as part of their everyday rhetoric. When highly regarded author and speaker Ben Freeman visited the Temple to give a talk early in the school year, he was clear about how we can combat Jew hatred. He said we must arm ourselves with Jewish knowledge and pride. At Brawerman, we do just that. Our students graduate with deep knowledge of their Jewish roots, our Jewish history, and their connection with Israel. They are proud of who they are, as Jews, as good people, as stellar students. This is why Brawerman is so critical in the fight against antisemitism.

It is of course not enough that Brawerman be a safe place that builds a strong Jewish identity. We have to be an outstanding school, and the state of the Brawerman educational program is as strong as it has ever been. We have an exceptional faculty of passionate, dedicated, and experienced educators. Every lead teacher across the grade levels last year was a returning Brawerman teacher from the year prior, and this kind of stability is rarely seen among schools especially during a year when schools nationally saw unprecedented attrition in the teaching profession. This faculty is stellar. They work tirelessly to get to know your children, challenge and support them, make them feel seen and heard, and help them build the skills to navigate the social and emotional hurdles that are part of growing up. And under the leadership of our administrative team, we continue to lean into our mantra of "no limit to better" – for our faculty and our students.

I am frequently asked about what kind of school we are... Are we progressive? Are we traditional? Truthfully, it would be easier to define ourselves if we were all one

or all the other. Brawerman is a school that is focused on being just right for each student. We do what will most effectively intellectually engage our students and teach them the skills necessary for their learning journey. Sometimes that may look non-traditional, where students work on projects in groups, problem solve solutions that can be presented through a choice of modalities, and it can look quite messy in the process. Sometimes that learning may look more traditional, where students receive direct instruction, take notes, annotate text, create flash cards, and prepare for a multiple choice test, and it can look quite formal in the process. They will also experience everything in between, and that is what is powerful for our students. They know how to learn differently according to the situation in front of them, and this prepares them for what lies ahead for them in middle school, where they go on to thrive. They are prepared academically, they have the social and emotional skills to navigate the complexities of adolescence, and they have a strong Jewish identity. When they leave middle and high school, they continue to do great things.

Being a part of Brawerman is being part of so much more. Part of Brawerman's strength comes from being a part of Wilshire Boulevard Temple, which provides us the leadership and resources to perform at the highest levels. I have the pleasure of working closely with the Temple leadership team that includes Senior Rabbi Steve Leder, Executive Director of Education Naomi Reem, Executive Director Donna Nadel, Associate Executive Directors Doug Lynn and Jodi Berman, Wilshire Boulevard Temple Board President Scott Edelman, Chair of the Education and School Governance Committee Claire Goldsmith, and the chair of our Brawerman Head of School Cabinet Jessica Lewensztain. Their leadership not only serves our school and Temple well, it also pushes me and the Brawerman administrators to be better leaders, and I am grateful to be part of such a powerhouse team.

Part of that Temple strength is the clergy who are involved in the schools. In our clergy in residence program led by our Rabbis and Cantors, students are provided an opportunity to not only connect with a clergy member, but also connect with *Torah* and text study in a powerful manner. This is where those Jewish roots are being grown, where the knowledge is being expanded, and where the pride is blossoming. This is the work at the core of what it takes to fight against antisemitism. When you think about sharing your family's history, the story of *Torah*, and the stories in *Torah*, are a part of it. For us at Brawerman, these stories are what give our students a strong, clear, confident core Jewish identity. They know who they are, as Jews, and they are proud of it.

Brawerman's existence has never been more important in its history than it is today, and I am deeply grateful for your support and belief in our community. In the pages of this Annual Report you will see the excellence of our school. ### ATHLETICS

The 2022-2023 school year was a huge success for Brawerman Blaze athletics. Our fall, winter, and spring seasons had over 200 student athletes representing Brawerman. Our athletics philosophy fostering good sportsmanship, skill development, and fun shined throughout all seasons. The fall season had our Grades 4, 5, and 6 co-ed flag football teams go a combined 25-3. The winter season saw our three basketball teams go a combined 28-5. ### DEBATE

Led by Coach Courtney Edson and Assistant Coaches Sapir Riskovich and Anna Hugo, our debate team ended the year with an internal debate where students argued their side, while simultaneously working together to create strong rebuttals. ### MATHLETES

We also saw the addition of the Brawerman Mathletes! These 24 students from grades 4-6 met once a week after school to practice problem solving, explore logic puzzles, and learn advanced mathematics concepts and skills. Led by their Math Coach Oriana Horowitz and Assistant Coach Rozita Farahdel, the Mathletes competed in both individual and team contests. Many of our students qualified for the Math League Southern California state championships!

## **STEAM NIGHT**

The 2022-2023 Steam Night featured Brawerman teachers, UCLA's Tau Beta Pi Engineering Honor's Society students, Bubble Mania and Co., and Parker Anderson. The courtyard was filled with short burst science activities while the chapel displayed creation stations with bubbles, light sabers, hexbugs, and more. The music room was transformed into a light and glow party. Students also got to participate in a *tikkun olam* project making bracelets for children in the Ukraine. ## HONORING ISAI GERMAN

This year, Brawerman East was selected to partner with Honored to celebrate outstanding teachers. Honored is a national nonprofit organization dedicated to honoring teachers and elevating the teaching profession. Honored invited current and alumni students and families to visit **Honored.org/nominate** to share the story of teacher impact. Innovation and Science Teacher, Isai German was selected as the January 2023 Honoree. The Honored National Teacher Award included a \$5,000 prize, a profile by LA Times writer Jorge Castillio, and national recognition.

Grade 5 student Malin Scott was also featured in the article. Malin nominated Isai to celebrate his impact on students in the field of technology and for amplifying one of Brawerman's core values: to build bridges throughout the community. Malin said Mr. German inspired her through his involvement with The Karsh Center. As Malin wrote, "For me inspiration isn't from heroes with special powers. The people that inspire me are real heroes not because they fight bad guys, but because they are always finding new ways for us to change the world. Thank you, Mr. German, for always believing in me."

## **SACRAMENTO**

Grade 4 had an exciting time watching history leap from their textbook to real life with a trip to Sacramento. Students donned their hard hats and explored the mines of the Mother Lode in the Gold Bug Mine, watched the hammer hit the anvil at a blacksmith shop, panned for gold, and learned that gold was extracted from quartz. Students explored Old Town Sacramento, including an underground archaeological site that showed how the streets were raised to protect the city from devastating flooding. The Sacramento trip is the first overnight trip at Brawerman, which marks a critical turning point in students' development, maturity, and independence.

## BOSTON

Grade 5 spent five fulfilling days learning, growing, and exploring the historic city of Boston. One of the trip's highlights was visiting Plymouth to explore the Plimoth Patuxet Museum. These spaces are a living museum of colonial times. Another student favorite was our visit to Salem! We visited the Gallows Hill Museum, where students were transported back in time for a theater performance inspired by the Salem Witch Trials.

Other experiences included walking up to the Bunker Hill Memorial, visiting Paul Revere's house, Quincy Market, Edward M. Kennedy Institute for the United States Senate, and the USS Constitution. We even got to experience a Boston Red Sox game at Fenway Park! We ended our jam-packed week with an emotional class *Kaddish* at the New England Holocaust Memorial. The Grade 5 Boston trip was an incredibly memorable experience for all who participated.

**BRAWERMAN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL** 

Israel turned 75 this year and our Grade 6 students traveled on their capstone trip to see and feel our Jewish homeland. We extended our learning in the classroom as we explored the archaeological discoveries at The City of David and entered the deepest excavated tunnels along the Temple Mount. Hikes and jeep rides through the Golan Heights taught us about Israel's strategic importance, canoeing down the Jordan river and floating in the Dead Sea with mud spread on our skin felt like the pictures we have seen for so many years finally coming to life, and *Shabbat* at the *Kotel* and in Herzliya showed us the traditional and modern embrace of Judaism. The newly remodeled Museum of the Jewish People concretized many lessons we have learned since Kindergarten. This trip deepened our sense of pride in Israel's history and strengthened the Jewish identity of each participant.

From the music festival that kicked off with the headliner leading the entire arena in *Chanukah* blessings as he lit the *chanukiah* to training in F-16 flight simulators with former members of the Israeli Air Force, this trip was filled with once-in-a-lifetime experiences. And yet, if you ask the 32 students about the trip, most of them will say their favorite part was picking up right where they left off with their old Brawerman classmates.

Everywhere we went, from the *Kotel* to the Bedouin tents to the *Hapoel* Jerusalem basketball game, our alumni had their arms around each other like they were singing the last *Hashkiveinu* of the school year. Watching our alumni interact with the same seamless familiarity they first learned on our campuses was a special reminder that even when they graduate, they never really stop being Brawerman students. No matter where they go, they still bring their warmth, curiosity, and *menschiness* to everything they do. The values they learn at Brawerman are like a *menorah* that never goes out. When we made it to Jerusalem, Rabbi Ben-Naim reminded our alumni, "Our people have been coming here to pray for thousands of years, and now, after a great deal of patience and faith, you are taking your rightful place as the next link in the long chain of our tradition."


