




# My Two Border Towns By David Bowles (Ages: 4 - 8)

# **The Way to Río Luna**By Zoraida Córdova (Ages: 8 - 12)



By Melissa Cristina Márquez (Ages: 5 - 8)


Blending the autobiographical with the fantastical, this Puerto Rican author and marine scientist reveals the wonders of the ocean and teaches the importance of shark conservation.

# Hispanic Star: Roberto Clemente By Claudia Romo Edelman (Ages: 8 - 12)



By Nadja Spiegelman (Ages: 8 - 12)



By Gary Soto (Ages: 8 - 12)



By Maria Hinojosa (Ages: 8 -12)



(Ages: 12 - 18)



By Anna-Marie McLemore (Ages: 12 - 18)



As Yolanda enters her senior year of high school and prepares to be initiated into her family's bruja traditions, the arrival of a new student brings troubling visions of danger for her family and community.




