Dear Friends of Gesu School.

A Gesu education is a map to a bright future. Our dedicated community comes together to mold well-rounded, engaged students with strong character. Co-directed by the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary (IHM) and the Jesuits, Gesu School provides quality education to 450 students to enable them to break the cycle of poverty and violence.

Our curriculum abides by the IHM tenet that "every child can learn," meeting the needs of remedial to advanced learners. In the Jesuit tradition of *cura personalis*, Gesu cares for the whole person. Our unique soft skills MAGIS initiative, woven into Pre-K–8<sup>th</sup> grade, fosters Motivation, Awareness, Grit, Independence, and Social Competence.

Gesu alumni demonstrate that these approaches to education work. They are confident and poised to overcome challenges on their journeys to success. In a city where approximately 65% of public high school students graduate from high school in four years, 90% of Gesu alumni graduate high school on time, and of those graduates, 86% go on to college or post-secondary education.

Pat and Brad Cannon's dedication to the Gesu community spans nearly 20 years across three states. Since 2011, they have supported students via Gesu's Sponsor a Child Program. Now in Boston, they remain closely connected, even meeting alumni visiting colleges. For the Cannons, sponsoring Gesu students intentionally paralleled raising their two daughters and allowed them to pass on their philanthropic spirit.

### WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO GIVE TO GESU, PARTICULARLY THE SPONSOR A CHILD PROGRAM?

Brad: Pat and I were living in the Philadelphia area and had been looking for a charity focused on education. One parent for each of us had gotten out of extreme poverty through faith, family, and education. On an airplane, Pat read an article about Gesu in *USA Today*. We took a tour a short time after

Two things really sold us. First, there was a young teacher who had been at an exclusive private school. He realized it wasn't his mission. It was to go back to Gesu. Those kids adored him. Second, the young lady who gave our tour was a graduate. Throughout her life, she explained that everyone made excuses for her. At Gesu, people were the first to believe in her and didn't cut her any slack. These were

lessons that resonated with us from our family about getting out of poverty—accountability and people believing in you. We recognized those things in Gesu. We wrote a check that day, probably for more than we could afford. We never regretted it.

Pat: Every classroom we went into, the kids stood and greeted us. There was a mutual respect among the teachers, students, and leaders. What a sense of community we felt. If you set high expectations, it's amazing how people find a way to achieve them. Gesu set high expectations. We just loved that standard.

### WHAT HAS FUELED YOUR LONG-TERM COMMITMENT TO GESU?

Pat: Gesu is raising future leaders with a solid foundation of opportunity and faith in a loving, caring community. It's just a special place with all that it encompasses. To teach kids those values and see the results, it's inspiring for us.

Brad: We wanted to see a positive impact and contribute to an organization that actually demonstrates that consistently. We've never hesitated for 20 years. We have such confidence that the money not only goes to the right cause, but that it will be delivered

and that it counts. We like to give over time, and it's good to have an organization we can trust with a mission that we can believe in.

### WHY DO YOU FEEL IT IS IMPORTANT TO REMAIN PART OF THE GESU COMMUNITY, EVEN FROM BOSTON?

Pat: Through all those years, what would shine through were hope, optimism, respect, community. We felt a connection, and our family felt a connection. We would put up students' pictures and letters in our kitchen and talk about them with our kids.

The alumni we met in Boston were so engaging and charismatic. They were excited about the world. They felt a sense of opportunity that some kids don't find right now. We could sense it. They had an esteem that only Gesu can instill.

Brad: You can tell they are going places and that they will get something good done when they get there. Gesu hasn't lost its ability to make an impact on kids' lives. They were impressive and so warm, too, full of hope and optimism. Their communication skills were impeccable.

Giving children an opportunity where they can feel like they can do anything in this world is a gift.

# EVERYONE AT GESU BELIEVED IN ME. THEY KNEW MY JOURNEY WAS UNIQUE AND CHALLENGING, BUT WITH THE RIGHT PEOPLE IN MY CORNER, THAT I COULD SOAR.

During my elementary years, I began to struggle with homework. I couldn't spell or sound out vocabulary words and consistently tested below grade-level in language arts. I was drowning in science and social studies because I couldn't remember information from the multiple chapters I had read. I spent countless, grueling hours at my kitchen table trying to retain everything, but something wasn't clicking. I knew there was a roadblock on this path that was bigger than I could have expected.

With the help of my aunt, my teacher, and Sr. Ellen Convey, IHM, Principal, I was tested and diagnosed with a tracking problem comparable to dyslexia. I was devastated. I felt defeated. But Gesu stepped in and restored my belief in myself and my abilities. They wasted no time placing me in learning support and giving me the personal attention that I needed to find ways to combat my learning disability. Gesu's Counselor, Mrs. O'Neill, even worked with my aunt to hand select a high school, The Woodlynde School, to provide the type of support for learning differences that I was accustomed to.

# Award-Winning Learning Support Teacher Inspires Students for 10 Years

#### Thanks to your generosity, Gesu provides outstanding education for remedial to advanced learners.

A quiet, yet fierce advocate for student success, Dana Gilbert exudes endless positivity in her English Language Arts classroom. Her students tackle learning disabilities in reading. Many bring some frustration and a propensity to quit. Once she hooks them in with her unwavering encouragement and books like *Wonder*, their attitudes shift. "They come begging to read," she says.

After school, she teaches reading to 2<sup>nd</sup> graders in Gesu's Youth Education for Tomorrow (YET) literacy program. Alumni flock to her classroom. In 2018, Ms. Gilbert's colleagues awarded her the Knetzger Teaching Prize.

#### I BELIEVE IN BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS WITH STUDENTS AND USING STORIES AS THE CENTER OF OUR LEARNING.

I spend a lot of time finding books that will appeal to my students. People have a much easier time reading when content is interesting to them. Hove helping kids who hate reading to find a love for reading. Most of school is a struggle for them. The issue is they quit easily. Once they do something and see it's possible, that starts to diminish. In my eyes, a great teacher does both—understands the students and teaches the content.

## I TRY TO MAKE MY CLASSROOM A WELCOMING PLACE, A SAFE SPACE. I WANT MY STUDENTS TO KNOW THAT MY ROOM IS HOME FOR THEM.

My students find themselves sprawled across the floor, standing at a bookcase, or sitting in the big, comfy chair, just as long as they are working. My bulletin boards are collaborative to help students take ownership of our classroom. I like for them to see pictures of themselves and work that they have done posted around the room, so they remember that they are part of this space. We are a unit.

GESU IS HOME FOR ME AND HAS BEEN FOR MOST OF MY ADULT LIFE. I TEACH MY STUDENTS YEAR AFTER YEAR. I FEEL AN OBLIGATION TO THEM. ALUMNI VISIT AND LET ME KNOW HOW THEY ARE. IT ALWAYS GIVES ME PURPOSE.

They still see me as a support. One comes to talk about books; I didn't even teach him. Others come for recommendation letters. I go to current and past students' sports games or anything I'm able to attend. It's not to be impressive. I want them to know that somebody cares about them outside of the classroom and beyond their family.

### I HOPE MY STUDENTS WILL TAKE PERSEVERANCE AND GRIT WITH THEM WHEN THEY LEAVE.

They all experience challenges. I never deny that to them. I approach them in an upfront and honest way about their difficulties, while helping them to realize that they can overcome anything with a good support system and the fight to keep pushing.

The Knetzger Outstanding Teacher Award, endowed by a gift from Jay and Kathy Sherrerd in memory of Gesu Board Member Edwin Knetzger, is presented annually to that faculty member demonstrating the highest quality of teaching ability and commitment.

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

### Pierre Toussaint Society \$50,000 & Above

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Gesu School recognizes our leadershiplevel donors who have made gifts of \$50,000 and above with membership in the Pierre Toussaint Society. Venerable Pierre Toussaint, the society's namesake, is a hero from our Catholic heritage. Born into slavery in Haiti in the early 19th century, Pierre Toussaint was brought to New York City, where he became a successful hairdresser. He used his earnings to free many slaves and finally himself. Once a free man, he performed many acts of charity, including the establishment of an orphanage and a school for black children. When most fled the city during a yellow fever epidemic, he stayed to nurse the sick. His dedication to the well-being and education of the poor makes Pierre Toussaint a fitting patron for Gesu and our donors.

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
