SUPERINTENDENT

Projects

Many projects have been completed this summer. If you attend volleyball games you may want to bring a light jacket since we now have A/C in the HS/MS gymnasium. We still have a few smaller projects to complete during the school year. We hope to finish all remaining major projects next summer with the biggest project being a wellness center.

Food Service

Breakfast this year is provided free of charge to NBC students through the School Breakfast Program. Jennie has reported that the numbers for breakfast have increased significantly.

Start of School

Every start of school has some issues, but this year was exceptionally smooth. Any issue was resolved very quickly. I applaud the administration and staff for being very thorough in their preparation and planning for the start of school.

PDE

The PA Department of Education sent a letter to all schools last week stating that effective September 5, 2023, all school must communicate with students with disabilities that no longer attend school and offer them the opportunity to return to school until they turn 22 years of age. I applaud Rep. Topper as one of the signatures on a letter to PDE asking by what law they have authority to mandate this to public schools. The current law allows students to attend school as long as they are not 21 by the start of the school year. I hope and trust that he along with other legislators will not let go of this issue. It creates an unanticipated burden on many school districts. Fortunately, it does not immediately impact NBC, but in the future this mandate from PDE will cost NBC an additional \$100,000 for two years and \$50,000 for two years. This is an example of a non-elected body that has no authority to make law, place a mandate on public schools inflating the cost to operate a public school.

ELEMENTARY

Back to School

The first few weeks of school have proceeded very well. Faculty and support staffs have done a great job preparing for and welcoming back our students.

MIDDLE SCHOOL

Orientation & Open House

Students and parents joined us for our 6th Grade Orientation and 7th/8th Grade Open House on Wednesday, August 16th. Students met their teachers and received their schedules, beginning of year packets, and Chromebooks. Sixth graders and their parents attended a presentation in the auditorium as they learned about middle school procedures and expectations. Joe Corbi's Fundraising volunteered to set up taste testing for the evening for the second year in a row. The evening was well-attended and was a positive start to the new school year!

Beginning of Year In-Service

Teachers participated in two days of in-service prior to the start of school. Teachers and staff spent time together the first day during building and district-wide meetings, along with a ViewSonic training session led by their colleagues.

The morning of the second day was spent with guest speaker, Kris John. Kris spoke on the barriers students with ADHD face within the classroom and ways we can help them combat that issue. Many of the suggestions offered are things that are already being done in our classrooms. It was a good reminder and a way to reaffirm with our teachers what they are doing well. The second half of the day was spent with teachers putting some finishing touches on their classrooms and plans for day one with their students.

Class Meetings

Students in grades 6, 7, and 8 annually meet with the principal within the first couple days of school. These class meetings are a way for students to learn (and be reminded) of the expectations in the middle school. This open communication helps address student concerns or misunderstandings up front. The powerpoint used for this session is also posted on the middle school webpage under "Students" so they can refer back to it at any time.

MIDDLE SCHOOL (cont'd)

PRIDE Team/PBIS

The middle school student and faculty PRIDE teams held their first meetings the week of August 28th. Within the first two weeks of school, teachers shared PRIDE videos with their classes. The PRIDE videos were created by students (featuring a variety of students and teachers) and are used to motivate and teach students to demonstrate PRIDE in various settings at school and in the community. These videos are used by both the middle school and high school at the beginning of each school year.

The PRIDE kick-off assembly was a huge success! Students and staff enjoyed participating in a True/False game that revealed some fun facts about their teachers, Musical Chairs, an interesting "find a group" game, and a water bottle rolling game that ended with some whipped cream in the face for several participants! As an added bonus, we have a parent who is submitting an article to the local newspaper regarding Panther PRIDE and what it is all about!

Activity Periods

We are always looking for new ways to engage students, to give them an opportunity to explore their interests, and to develop relationships with people who have common interests. Activity periods provide these types of opportunities. This year's middle school activity opportunities include: Outdoor Club, Reading Competition, Envirothon, Chess Club, Origami/Kawaii Sticker Club, Student Council, FCA, Classic Tractor Enthusiasts, Drama Club, Card Sharks, Ski Club, Yearbook, JH FFA, and Golf Club. We are looking forward to fostering our student interests with this wide variety!

HIGH SCHOOL

High School Counselor Update

Sept. 1 and Sept. 5 - Mrs. Swanseen visited eligible classrooms (Government, Public Speaking, A&P II, Calculus, and Statistics) to help interested students register for early college credits through Pennsylvania Highlands Community College, Mount Aloysius College, and/or Saint Francis University. Additionally, 34 students are also currently enrolled in Allegany College of Maryland early college courses this fall either in-house or online.

Youth Leadership Bedford County will begin its monthly meetings on September 14. Students were selected from all Bedford County schools last spring and will be a part of a team who learns about industries and opportunities in our county, meets with area leaders, and completes community service activities. Students participating this year are Alayna Dick, Caitlyn Houpp, and Brandon Reynolds.

Throughout the months of September and October, various college and military representatives will be visiting NBC to meet with interested juniors and seniors (sign-up based). Additionally, the Bedford County School Counselor's Association will hold its College and Career Fair at the Bedford Omni Springs on October 10. Juniors and seniors are eligible to attend and gain even more information/exposure to potential post-secondary options.

October 6 – Manufacturing Day will be held in Bedford County at JLG. Juniors and seniors will be eligible to attend to learn more about careers in manufacturing.

October 11 - PSAT testing will occur on campus for sophomore/junior high school students who are university prep. The College Board has shifted to an all-digital format, so it is noteworthy that this will be the first group of students to take this test via computer vs. traditional paper/pencil. This will prepare students to take the full SAT in a digital format, which will phase in during spring 2024.

Traditionally the financial aid season also kicks off in October when the Free Application of Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) opens to parents of seniors on October 1. This year the FAFSA is undergoing extensive renovations to simplify the process, but as a result the documents will not be available until later in the year (anticipated opening date on or around December 2023). To align with this delay, the fall Financial Aid Night that NBC hosts in conjunction with PHEAA will be held slightly later in the year (November 21) than in the past.

Professional Development Days in August

The days leading up to the first day of school were full of informative professional development.

On Monday, August 21, we held our faculty meetings in the morning followed by viewsonic training in the afternoon. Our teachers did a great job both as trainers and as students.

On Tuesday, August 22, our staff met with Mrs. Kris John to discuss one of the most common diagnoses in students - ADHD. Mrs. John led an in depth discussion on ADHD, sharing personal stories and best practices for helping students.

HIGH SCHOOL (cont'd)

Light Training - August 28

On Monday, August 28, Mr. Mellot and I ran a light training with several individuals who may use the lights throughout the fall season, (football, band, soccer). In addition to reviewing how the lights work, we also discussed when to use them. The lights made their "public debut" on Friday, September 1 when NBC hosted Claysburg and were well received.

High School Graduation Policy

Mr. Beatty and I have discussed the graduation policy and he will follow up with the board as needed. I have been speaking to multiple parents within the community regarding their opinion on changing the NBC graduation policy that states a student may walk at graduation even if he/she did not complete all of the requirements. In short, our teachers, guidance counselor, and I work with students to provide every possible opportunity of support to assist students in reaching the requirements for graduation. Unfortunately, it is evident with some students that they are not motivated to achieve the graduation requirements knowing they may still walk at the ceremony. A change in this policy would still allow students to earn their diploma via summer school. Thus far, the parents to whom I have spoken have said they would support this if the policy changed.

PBIS Kickoff Assembly

We were thrilled to provide our students with a PBIS Kickoff Assembly on Friday 9/1/2023. Students were treated to an afternoon of fun and positive conversation about school, responsibilities, and proper conduct. As always, I'd like to thank Mrs. Ashley Snyder and the student PRIDE Team for their contributions to this event.

Student Acknowledgement

NBC Senior Reagan Grimes was recently selected to participate in SEPA, "Students for Education in PA". SEPA provides nominated students across the state the opportunity to share their experiences and voice their opinions about education directly to the PA State Board of Education student representatives. Reagan will be asked to provide input and contribute to discussions shaped around creating educational policy for PA schools. We'd like to congratulate Reagan for being selected to participate on this committee and thank her for her input and assistance in shaping education within Pennsylvania.

Occupational Advisory Committee

Our Fall Occupational Advisory Committee meeting will take place on Tuesday, October 17th, 2023. Your attendance is much appreciated during these meetings as we will continue to enhance our CTE programs. In addition to a dinner and discussion with local businesses, this year we will begin bringing one student from each class along with his/her parents to highlight his/her accomplishments within their respective CTE course.
