

# Why Vista

The Vision of New Vista High School ---



is to create a better world by inspiring students to become lifelong learners who actively participate in their education and community, while passionately pursuing their individual paths. We work to realize this vision by partnering with students to create a school on a human scale with a focus on authentic education in a community setting.

## What makes New Vista Non-Traditional?

- New Vista High School was created in 1993 and approved by the Boulder Valley Board of Education
  to "break the mold" of conventional secondary school practice and to offer students another option
  for the high school experience.
- New Vista reinvented high school so that all students: Acquire strong skills in core academic subjects, identify
  and develop individual talents, gifts and interests that give unique meaning and purpose to their lives, develop a
  set of self-advocacy, organizational and interpersonal skills to effectively negotiate our complex society,
  experience membership in a values based community.
- New Vista provides rigorous learning in a supportive culture. The school is designed to cultivate the
  unique talents, gifts, and interests of students who are ready to be more responsible for their own
  learning. We give students real choices in the program they take and the work they do in classes.

### Matching the School and the Students

#### Is New Vista for You?

- New Vista works well for students who want more responsibility for their own learning
- show that they can handle the responsibility
- and want to consistently produce high quality work



Experience has shown that New Vista does not work well for students who do not
usually make appropriate behavior choices, who need a great deal of adult supervision
to do their school work, or who just want to "get by."

# What are Quads?

- Within each advisory, these are the groups within the group!
- Typically made up of multi-age students, ideally four, one from each grade.
- Students have regular time in their quads to establish and grow their leadership and self directed skills.
- Overtime, juniors and seniors begin to take and increased amount of ownership for helping their peers navigate the New Vista processes and procedures.
- From annual Path projects to the senior Culminating project, this group will be there for each other every step of the way!

# What is the Advisory program?



**Advisory** serves as the primary source of guidance and support for each student from the time he/ she enters the school until graduation, as well as where we explicitly teach cultural competency skills.

What is the Culminating Project?



**Every New Vista** graduate completes a Culminating Project that takes a minimum of 120 hours and earns 2 credits over and above the required 48 credits of **Common Learning** and Path requirements.

Every senior is required to design and produce a rigorous Culminating Project (CP) which builds a bridge between high school studies and the student's chosen future. The CP is an opportunity to undertake a major piece of rigorous, original work in an area of great interest and personal relevance to the student. It may involve work directly connected to the student's intended path, or may involve exploration of path alternatives. CP's are self-motivating experiences. The student chooses the project, designs it with input from their advisor and their Panel Team, and is solely responsible for its execution. The project is culminating in the sense that it brings together the student's skills and knowledge in carrying out a significant piece of self-directed learning. More about the CP HERE



### What happens on Exhibition Day and why?

**Exhibition Day:** takes place on the morning of the last day of each quarter. This is a special opportunity for students to demonstrate all of the amazing learning and growth that has taken place during that quarter. With an audience of the whole staff and student body, along with family and community members, Exhibition Day connects student learning to the larger mission and vision of New Vista High School.

- Often, presenting can give a student credit that is above and beyond in a class, which can raise their grade.
- Students can present in a classroom with a couple of other presenters or in the auditorium to the community.
- Parents are welcome to attend.
- Students and parents choose 3 rooms to view usually for 20 minute intervals.
- Such a fun day!



## What is a CE?



#### Community Experience!

Each Wednesday afternoon during the course of the school year, our students can volunteer in the surrounding communities. This time is an opportunity for students to interact with, learn from and give back to their community. Students develop workplace skills, deepen potential career interests and creating positive partnerships between adults and high school youth.

Students earn Path credits for the number of hours spent with the CE.

\*\*Common Learning Credits = core courses in which you must earn a B or better.





Students must demonstrate college or career readiness in English and Math

College Before Graduation classes, Industry Certificate through CTE
