Course Title: AP Macroeconomics Content Area: Social Studies Grade Level: 11th/12th Grade Date Developed: May 2023

COURSE OVERVIEW:

The main goal of the AP Macroeconomics course is to introduce students to the principles that apply to an economic system as a whole. The course prepares students to think like economists by using principles and models to describe economic situations and predict and explain outcomes. Like economists, students do so by using graphs, charts, and data. The AP Macroeconomics Course and Exam Description defines concepts, skills, and understandings required by representative colleges and universities for granting college credit or placement. This outline is the basis for the course at Danville Area High School.

ANCHOR STANDARDS:

- ECONOMIC MEASUREMENTS (MEA) Economists construct measurements to monitor the state of an economy and evaluate its performance over time. Governments, firms, and citizens often use these measurements to help inform policy, business, and personal decisions.
- MARKETS (MKT) Competitive markets bring together buyers and sellers to exchange goods and services for mutual gain. The simple model of supply-demand can be applied in different market contexts.
- **MACROECONOMIC MODELS (MOD)** Macroeconomic models are simplified representations that depict basic economic relationships and can be used to predict and explain how those relationships are affected by economic shocks.
- MACROECONOMIC POLICIES (POL) Government taxation and spending policies and central bank monetary policy can affect an economy's output, price level, and level of employment, both in the short run and in the long run.

Course Title: AP US Government & Politics Content Area: Social Studies Grade Level: 10th Grade (11th/12th) Date Developed: June 2023

COURSE OVERVIEW:

AP U.S. Government and Politics provides a college-level, nonpartisan introduction to key political concepts, ideas, institutions, policies, interactions, roles, and behaviors that characterize the constitutional system and political culture of the United States. Students will study U.S. foundational documents, Supreme Court decisions, and other texts and visuals to gain an understanding of the relationships and interactions among political institutions, processes, and behaviors. They will also engage in disciplinary practices that require them to read and interpret data, make comparisons and applications, and develop evidence-based arguments. In addition, they will complete a political science research or applied civics project. The AP US Government & Politics Course and Exam Description defines concepts, skills, and understandings required by representative colleges and universities for granting college credit or placement. This outline is the basis for the course at Danville Area High School.

ANCHOR STANDARDS:

- **CONSTITUTIONALISM (CON)** The U.S. Constitution establishes a system of checks and balances among branches of government and allocates power between federal and state governments. This system is based on the rule of law and the balance between majority rule and minority rights.
- LIBERTY AND ORDER (LOR) Governmental laws and policies balancing order and liberty are based on the U.S. Constitution and have been interpreted differently over time
- CIVIC PARTICIPATION IN A REPRESENTATIVE DEMOCRACY (PRD) Popular sovereignty, individualism, and republicanism are important considerations of U.S. laws and policy making and assume citizens will engage and participate.
- COMPETING POLICY-MAKING INTERESTS (PMI) Multiple actors and institutions interact to produce and implement

possible policies.

METHODS OF POLITICAL ANALYSIS (MPA) Using various types of analyses, political scientists measure how U.S. political behavior, attitudes, ideologies, and institutions are shaped by a number of factors over time.

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Course Title: AP US History Content Area: Social Studies Grade Level: 11th/12th Grade Date Developed: July 2023

COURSE OVERVIEW:

AP U.S. History is designed to be the equivalent of a two-semester introductory college or university U.S. history course. In AP U.S. History students investigate significant events, individuals, developments, and processes in nine historical periods from approximately 1491 to the present. Students develop and use the same skills, practices, and methods employed by historians: analyzing primary and secondary sources; developing historical arguments; making historical comparisons; and utilizing reasoning about contextualization, causation, and continuity and change over time. The course also provides seven themes that students explore throughout the course in order to make connections among historical developments in different times and places: American and national identity; migration and settlement; politics and power; work, exchange, and technology; America in the world; geography and the environment; and culture and society. The AP US History Course and Exam Description defines concepts, skills, and understandings required by representative colleges and universities for granting college credit or placement. This outline is the basis for the course at Danville Area High School.

ANCHOR STANDARDS:

- (NAT) American and National Identity focuses on how and why definitions of American and national identity and values have developed, as well as related topics such as citizenship, constitutionalism, foreign policy, assimilation, and American exceptionalism.
- (POL) Politics and Power focuses on how different social and political groups have influenced society and government in the United States, as well as how political beliefs and institutions have changed over time.
- (WXT) Work, Exchange, and Technology focuses on the factors behind the development of systems of economic

exchange, particularly the role of technology, economic markets, and government.

- (CUL) Culture and Society focuses on the roles that ideas, beliefs, social mores, and creative expression have played in shaping the United States, as well as how various identities, cultures, and values have been preserved or changed in different contexts of U.S. history.
- (MIG) Migration and Settlement focuses on why and how the various people who moved to and within the United States both adapted to and transformed their new social and physical environments.
- (GEO) Geography and the Environment focuses on the role of geography and both the natural and human-made environments on social and political developments in what would become the United States.
- (WOR) America in the World focuses on the interactions between nations that affected North American history in the colonial period and on the influence of the United States on world affairs.

Course Title: Psychology Content Area: Social Studies Grade Level: 11th/12th Grade Date Developed: June 2023

COURSE OVERVIEW:

Psychology is the scientific study of behavior and mental processes that seeks to describe, predict, understand, and control maladaptive (patterns that can hurt self and others) thoughts and behavior. Psychology is a one-semester social studies elective presented on an introductory or survey course level. Throughout this course students will focus on the integrated themes of psychology and the five main pillars of psychology. Course components include an introduction to the history, perspectives, and research of psychology, learning and cognitive development; the stages of human development; aspects of personality and intelligence; the classification and treatment of psychological disorder; and psychological aspects of social interactions.

Sociology is the systematic and scientific study of human behavior and social structures. Sociologists investigate people as they form groups and interact with one another. Sociology places special emphasis on studying societies, both as individual entities and as elements of a global perspective. Sociology is a one-semester social studies elective presented on an introductory level suitable for all students. The course serves as an introduction to the field of sociology and will provide students with a general understanding of basic societal characteristics.

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Course Title: US History Content Area: Social Studies Grade Level: 9th Grade Date Developed: July 2023

COURSE OVERVIEW:

The primary content focus of US History is the era of the Industrial Revolution to the present. Major objectives beyond content include accessing and utilizing information in various forms, as well as developing communication (written & oral) and cooperative skills.
