

# 6 Syllable Types

<p><b>Closed</b></p>	<p>One vowel Ends in a consonant</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• in</li> <li>• map</li> <li>• jump</li> <li>• rab bit</li> </ul>
<p><b>Silent e</b></p>	<p>(vce) Vowel consonant –e Silent e makes previous single vowel long</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• snake</li> <li>• gene</li> <li>• com plete</li> <li>• in vite</li> <li>• wire</li> </ul>
<p><b>Open</b></p>	<p>Syllable ends in a single vowel Vowel is long</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• o pen</li> <li>• men u</li> <li>• fu ture</li> <li>• i o dine</li> </ul>
<p><b>Vowel team</b></p>	<p>Two or more vowels or vowel + consonant combo representing one sound Long, short, or diphthong (ou / ow and oi / oy)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• rain</li> <li>• eight</li> <li>• out</li> <li>• boil</li> <li>• head</li> </ul>
<p><b>Consonant -le</b></p>	<p>Final stable syllable Consonant + le</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• sta ble</li> <li>• vis i ble</li> <li>• gig gle</li> <li>• mar ble</li> </ul>
<p><b>R controlled</b></p>	<p>Any vowel followed by an “r” Syllable with er, ir, or, ur, ar</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• car pet</li> <li>• go pher</li> <li>• stir rup</li> <li>• for ward</li> <li>• mur mur</li> </ul>
