Our Mission

Founded by Thomas E. Cahill in 1890 as the first free Diocesan high school for boys in the nation, Roman Catholic continues its tradition of excellence as it strives to offer a comprehensive academic curriculum within a disciplined Catholic environment. Enriched by its cultural, racial, and religious diversity, Roman Catholic provides a community where each young man can learn to appreciate and respect the uniqueness of others, while becoming a man of personal integrity. Roman Catholic High School strives to bring the Gospel values of Jesus Christ to its students, while forming a Catholic community which embodies the Christian spirit of service to all.



Built on the Foundation of Self Reliance

Our founder Thomas E. Cahill was born on May 27, 1828 to immigrant parents. Although he possessed promising academic potential, Cahill was not able to continue his formal education past the 6th grade level. Times were tough, and Cahill's family needed him to work to help make ends meet.

Demonstrating a remarkable entrepreneurial spirit, Cahill would go on to found several small businesses, eventually establishing the Knickerbocker Coal & Ice Company. With self-reliance, determination, and personal commitment, Cahill's hard work eventually paid off. He and his wife, Sophia, became exceedingly prosperous.

After his death at the age of 50, Thomas Cahill bequeathed his entire fortune for the establishment and endowment of The Roman Catholic High School of Philadelphia. It was Cahill's belief that a strong, values-based, secondary education was essential to forming young men capable of protecting and expanding the freedoms enjoyed in this land. As Thomas and Sophia were not blessed with children, students of Roman Catholic have always been known as "Cahillites" – that is, Sons of Cahill.

Welcome to Roman!

In the City where Independence was born, Roman has been a cornerstone of Secondary Education for over 130 years. Construction of The Roman Catholic High School of Philadelphia began in the summer of 1886 on the corner of Broad & Vine Streets. Many Civil War veterans labored over the next four years, crafting a building that would become the first, free diocesan high school in the nation. When it opened in 1890, Roman Catholic was almost immediately recognized as a unique and special place. Now, for well over a century, Roman Catholic High School has been providing a rigorous, engaging Catholic education for young men throughout the Delaware Valley. Located in the heart of Center City Philadelphia, Roman is a true regional high school, not a neighborhood school, but rather a school of neighborhoods. In this diverse environment, Roman provides a quality, college preparatory education to students with aspirations of unlocking their true potential and exploring the world around them. The numerous athletic programs and a wide range of



extra and co-curricular activities allow students to discover, expand, and grow into well-rounded young men. Roman students form a true brotherhood that is unrivaled. As they experience our history and prepare for their future, students develop a unique sense of pride as they prominently display the colors of Purple and Gold. Once a student becomes a part of this great legacy and tradition of excellence, he quickly comes to understand that Roman is the place where he can truly be himself.

- Roman is the oldest archdiocesan high school in the United States.
- Roman has a dedicated fine and performing arts building, The Howard Center for the Arts.
- Roman students represent over 175 elementary schools, coming from 90 different zip codes.
- Roman is located within walking distance of Independence Hall, Carpenter Hall, Reading Terminal Market, City Hall, the Barnes Foundation, Eastern State Penitentiary, The Franklin Institute, and much more!
- Roman athletes practice football, lacrosse, and rugby on River Field, located on the historic Benjamin Franklin Parkway.
- Roman Students participate in La Salle University's Transformational Scholars Program and Saint Francis University's Partnership for Excellence Program, earning transferable College credits during high school.
- Roman has educational partnerships with Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, Philadelphia Museum of Art, The Kimmel Center, Play on Philly, and the Museum of the American Revolution.
- Roman has students traveling by bus, subway, trolley, train, regional rail, car, and Uber!
- World Languages are taught in a state-of-the-art language lab.

In addition to our core-curriculum, Roman offers many diverse and intriguing electives for our students to become truly well-rounded individuals.

English: Advanced Placement Language & Composition, Advanced Placement Literature & Composition, Public Speaking

Undergraduate Programs: Qualifying students are eligible to earn transferable college credits through the partnerships Roman has established with La Salle University's Transformational Scholars Program and Saint Francis University's Partnership for Excellence Program

Strength in Athletics

Growing strong in mind and body enables a young man to become self-reliant, self-possessed, and ready to take on the world. Roman's athletic program consists of 17 Varsity sports, offered at three levels – including many freshman teams. As the City is our Classroom, the City is also our playground, as our athletic teams use facilities located throughout the Philadelphia region.

With over 55 percent of the student body engaged in team sports, Roman's athletic program is specifically designed to help student-athletes develop their skills physically, mentally, and socially while fostering a sense of personal accomplishment and autonomy.



Roman Reigns Supreme

- In 2023, the basketball team was crowned as PCL Champions
- In 2021, the Golf Team captured the AOP Championship
- In 2021, the Track and Field Team was home to the PCL MVP, the District 12 Champ in the 400 meters, and had four 1st Team All-Catholic members.
- In 2021, the Crew Team had two quads compete in the Scholastic National Crew Championships.
- In 2019, Bowling won the PCL Championship.
- In 2018, a Roman wrestler placed 7th in the PIAA State Tournament.
- In 2018, the indoor 4x200 relay team won the PCL Championship and in 2019, the Track and Field Team won the 4x100 and the 4x800 at the PCL Championships. Roman's 4x100 track team had the 3rd best time in the state, two years in a row.
- In 2018, the basketball team won the Philadelphia Catholic League and the State Championship finishing nationally ranked at 26!
- The soccer team has competed in the last seven consecutive PCL Championship games and in 2018 a Roman soccer player was named a National All-American, as the team won the District 12 Title.

Located just off the Avenue of the Arts – North, The Howard Center provides space for Roman’s Fine and Performing Arts Programs. The Center hosts rehearsal space for music and choral students, along with private, individual lesson rooms. The Howard Center is also home to our Digital Media lab for our Digital Photography and Video programs, as well as a Black Box Theater which hosts a variety of assemblies and theatrical performances. All of the Performing Arts, Music, Choral, and Drama Programs practice, perform, and exhibit their artistic works in this intimate setting. Advanced technologies are integrated throughout the Howard Center, providing students with creative support for developing and refining their artistic abilities.

- Roman currently has the largest Mock Trial Program in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Nationally ranked and recognized, our team has also won the Mock Trial City Championship for the past eight consecutive years. The teams practice in the James McGrannery Courtroom, a fully functioning courtroom designed by architects of leading Law School facilities. Unique to High

School programs, the McGrannery Courtroom enables team members to practice in a “real-life” setting, while developing their public speaking abilities, refining courtroom etiquette, and further developing their legal skills.

- The McSherry Annex is home to Roman’s Wellness Center. Comprised of two separate facilities, one for free weights and the other for cardio workouts, the Center contains state-of-the-art workout machinery and weight equipment. All athletic teams use this facility for agility and strength-training. The Wellness Center offers the opportunity for both athletes and non-athletes to focus on their fitness and well-being during the school year.

The most recent addition to the Wellness Center is a dedicated erg room. Designed specifically for Roman’s award-winning Crew Program, this new facility allows for year-round conditioning of our student-athletes, improving their flexibility, mobility, and performance on the River.

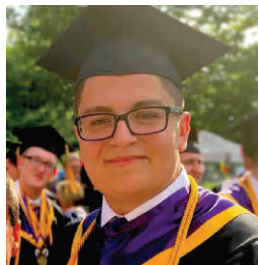
Determining your Path

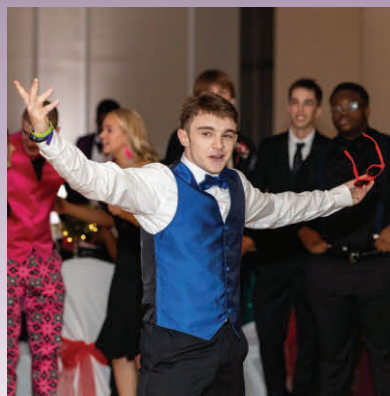
