A lot has happened since the last day of school in June. At our reorganization meeting in July, three new Board of Education trustees were sworn in. Please join me in welcoming William Ball, Christina Bellarosa, and Scott Polston. Also during that meeting Robert Thomann and James Mooney were unanimously re-elected Board President and Vice President, respectively.

Looking back at the past few years, I must say that I am very proud of what we have accomplished as a District. When I was first hired as superintendent back in 2019, the Board of Education tasked me with helping to improve the District's financial stability and student achievement. Through various initiatives the District has implemented, I'm pleased to share that we have been able to do just that. Today, Saugerties is in a much better place financially, and our graduation rate has jumped from 87.9 percent in 2019 to 90.5 percent in 2022. We are also continuing to expand our academic opportunities for students through the addition of 15 new courses this year.

This is a wonderful sign of our District's progress. I want to commend the hard work of every graduate of the Class of 2022, as well as their teachers, parents, grandparents, school board members, principals, school counselors, and community leaders for their efforts in supporting our young people in completing high school and going on to the next stage of their life. This effort was monumental and it deserves to be celebrated. When the pandemic hit in March 2020, Saugerties didn't just set a goal to survive, instead we set out to thrive.


The unique circumstances these graduates experienced in their lifetime will hopefully prepare them for what lies ahead post high school in college and/or work.

SCHOOL MEAL CHANGES FOR THE 2022/23 SCHOOL YEAR

This is an important reminder to all Saugerties families. The United States Department of Agriculture program that provided free school meals to all students during the COVID-19 pandemic ended on June 30, 2022. This means that unless qualifying families turn in a free/reduced price meal application, they will need to pay full price for meals when school starts in September.



The Saugerties Central School District will return to policies that were in place for free/reduced price lunch and breakfast prior to the pandemic. Income guidelines and application packets will be made available prior to the start of school. Eligibility for free/reduced price meals will be determined by income verification or by direct certification lists provided to the school district.

Here are some essential facts about the program:

- Only one application per household is needed.
- A new application must be completed each school year.
- If your child receives SNAP or Medicaid, you do not need to complete an application.
- All applications must be received and processed by October 20, 2022.

I am excited about this school year, students will now benefit from having access to full-time librarians and social workers in each of our elementary schools. We are also strengthening our literacy and math programs through the addition of instructional coaches, reading specialists, and the use of research-based approaches to both of those curriculums.

My hope is to continue building upon our successes and see a graduation rate of 95 percent by next year. Ambitious? Yes. But I am confident that we can achieve this goal by staying steadfast and keeping our students at the center of all that we do.

While there is much to be proud of, we also need to realistically recognize some of the fiscal challenges that are before us created by the current global economic conditions. Inflation, the cost of fuel, supply chain issues and delays, and lack of product availability (such as paper and equipment parts) will surely impact our expenses, but thankfully we are fiscally in a better place to absorb these unexpected increases than we were just a year ago.

I am looking forward to seeing everyone in September and continuing the great work we've started!




and announcements, as well as a redesigned events calendar that will feed into individual school and program calendars. Information will be at your fingertips.


Saugerties Students Benefit from Summer Enrichment Program

The Saugerties Central School District launched its Summer Enrichment Program with great success. The purpose of the program was to provide hands-on opportunities for students that were fun, creative, and sparked a sense of wonder.

A total of 14 courses were offered for students in Grades K-9 to choose from. The courses were designed and facilitated by Saugerties teachers, who were encouraged to focus their workshops on STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math) or humanities topics.

Some of the courses offered included Music, Creative Movement, Chinese Writing, Intro to Spanish and French, Gardening, and Drama.

In total, 189 Saugerties students enrolled in the program. Here, you can either opt-in or opt-out of voice or SMS/text notifications.

Make sure you select Save if you make any changes. In addition to updating messaging preferences, you can also update your email and phone number.

Please note that although the District does not charge you for this service, it does not pay for any charges that may be incurred by you for receiving text messages. Please check with your wireless carrier for possible charges.

CAPITAL PROJECT IMPROVEMENTS ARE UNDERWAY

Work is progressing on the December 2020 voter-approved \$22 million Capital Project. The District has awarded the roofing contract for Phase 1 and plans have been submitted to the New York State Education Department for approval of Phase 2. Roof replacement has started at Cahill Elementary School; the Hildebrandt building will follow. In September, resurfacing the High School track will begin.

Supply chain issues, labor shortages, and inflation resulted in higher than anticipated bids this past spring for Phase 1 work. As a result the District, in consultation with the construction management company, is reevaluating its top priorities to determine the best course of action to accomplish the much-needed infrastructure improvements. Superintendent Kirk Reinhardt says, "The project cost cannot exceed the amount the voters approved, so we are diligently evaluating our options to ensure we address the highest priorities in the most fiscally responsible way possible."
