WHAT IS CTE

CTE stands for Career and Technical Education. These are programs of study that involve multiyear sequence of courses that integrates core academic knowledge with technical and occupational knowledge to provide students with a pathway to postsecondary education and careers. California's Department of Education identifies 15 industry sectors that contain anywhere from three to seven different pathways. Pathways have an occupational focus including aspects of the industry which leads to high-skill, high-wage, or high demand jobs identified as sustainable and viable over the next 10 years.

Live Oak High School is proud to offer 17 courses from these five industry sectors: Agriculture and Natural Resources, Arts, Media, and Entertainment, Building and Construction Trades, Hospitality, Tourism and Recreation, and Information and Communication Technologies. All courses are part of a pathway sequence that includes completion recognition with students receiving a blue chord upon graduation.

Live Oak FFA students brought home the fashionable hardware from the 2023 Santa Clara County Fair. 19 Acorns participated as exhibitors in the annual county fair and returned home with 20 first place finishes, 3 round robin winners, as well as a Grand Champion, and a Reserve Supreme Champion.



Sydney Stutzman had a fair to remember winning, Reserve Supreme Champion, Champion FFA Lamb, Reserve FFA Champion Lamb and 1st place finishes in both market



classes for her two lambs. She also took first place in Advanced Showmanship and Master Showmanship in both the Sheep Show and the Dairy Cattle show as well as a first place in the Beef Show's Jumbo Class. Sydney additionally took home a buckle for being the Advanced Large Animal Round Robin Champion.

Benjamin Ellingson was named the FFA Grand Champion Market Hog and was awarded first place in Class 7. Abby Ellinsgon, Jessie Weisz, and Addison Styczynski also took home first place honors in
