

Home Learning – How to learn/revise vocabulary

All the vocabulary you learn each term is on class Charts. Your teacher will let you know which section to revise. You will have regular vocabulary checks in class so you can monitor your progress. Your teacher will award you with a 'Great homework HAP' if you score 100% or are able to show evidence for your revision.

Here are 15 ideas to learn new vocabulary. It is important to try new strategies and see which one works best for you.

1

Create your own learning flashcards and quizzes on paper or online: [Quizlet](#) or [Memrise](#).

2

Write the word out over and over.

3

Look, say, cover, write, check is a great technique to learn new words. You can ask your teacher for a template. There is also one saved on Class Charts

4

Create a word search on paper or online: <https://tinyurl.com/zhn33dyc>

5

Create a poster with pictures to help you memorize the vocabulary

6

Record the new words/sentences you are learning in French and English and listen to it over and over. You can record on your phone or online: [Vocaroo](#) | [Online voice recorder](#)

7

Write the new vocabulary in French and English on a post it note and stick it around your room, or your house?

8

Say the new words outloud as you walk around the room. When you are physically doing something whilst learning new words it can stimylates your memory.

9

Create a set of dominoes. When you play the game you have to match a French word with its translation.

10

Put the key words in sentences and create a comic strip

11

Use the words/sentences to create a song.

12

Revise with a member of your family and ask them to test you!

13

Revise with another classmate, either face to face or online. You could reate a whatsapp group and communicate French

14

Teach a member of your family and test them 🤔

Use Linguascope to practise/revise vocabulary

Also useful:

YouTube videos. There are lots of language learning videos on YouTube. For example, [Comme une Française](#) offers some free videos including vocabulary, quizzes and pronunciation.

Download an app. You can download [Duolingo](#) or [Home - golvingo](#) on your phones to practise the language you are currently learning. As well as picking up new vocabulary, the app will improve your listening and pronunciation skills, with daily reminders to keep going.

News videos. Watching the news in a foreign language can be surprisingly accessible. Look for news clips with subtitles or those designed for language learners. For example, [Illini](#) offers French students five free videos a month, with bilingual subtitles, an online dictionary and a slow motion option.

Foreign films. You can watch films on [Netflix](#) or [Amazon Prime](#). Both these streaming sites are currently recommending collections of various foreign language programmes and films suitable for years 7-13, as well as for family viewing.

Seneca learning. The [Seneca](#) website offers lots of free learning resources for secondary languages. If your teacher wants you to use this site, he/she will share a link via email with you.

BBC Bitesize. This [revision site](#) hosts a wealth of resources for modern foreign language learning at home, including reading, listening, vocabulary, grammar notes and more. Select the correct topics to make the most of your revision time.
