

"The questions that students take away and that they answer by the lives they lead will be the most important possessions they have.

ere are two aphorisms about education that I often think about: 1) Education is the only thing people pay to be cheated out of; and 2) high schools are storehouses of knowledge because freshmen bring a little in when they arrive—and seniors never take any with them when they go.

The first—that education is the only thing people pay to be cheated out of seems irrefutable— has haunted me as a student and a teacher. No one buys a house and hopes the roof leaks; no one purchases a car and hopes it won't run; no one buys food and hopes it is spoiled. But people buy education privately like DeMatha and publically through their taxes and



every student "buys" education through their time—and then hopes that teachers don't show up or that the classes are easy or that they confirm what one already knows or that they don't have any work to do. I was a poor student for a long part of my education until I vowed not to cheat myself. I was fortunate to be surrounded by people who wouldn't cheat me.


As to the witticism that high schools are storehouses of knowledge where freshmen bring some in and seniors don't take any with them—I think this is true if I can add a codicil that the knowledge the freshmen bring in is a kind of unreflective certainty about things and that seniors drop off knowledge of absolute certainty on their journey and pick up and take with them an enormous amount of questions. These questions are fundamental to a mature life. What am I being called to do? How should I live my life? How will I define the good and practice the good? Will I respond to a call for charity? For justice? What does it mean to be a neighbor, a friend, a husband, a father? What responsibilities are concomitant with my rights?

For all of the importance of the information a student takes—the formulas for the quadratic equation or to determine force, the pattern of the Krebs cycle or the names of the bones, the periods of history or a list of heresies—the questions that they take away and that they answer by the lives they lead will be the most important possessions they have. Here's to not being cheated of one's education or of one's questions; here's to a DeMatha education.

TRINITARIAN PILGRIMAGE Retracing the History of the Trinitarians

very six years, the Trinitarians elect a new General Counsel, and with it comes a Trinitarian assembly. Historically, these assemblies have been stationary meetings, but this year, the Trinitarian leadership decided to partake in a pilgrimage retracing the steps of the original Trinitarians as they traveled along Spain and Morocco ransoming slaves. DeMatha had the honor and privilege of sending seven representatives, including five students, on the pilgrimage this year.

The trip started in Seville, Spain, the center of trade at the height of when the Trinitarian Order was first beginning.

"When the Trinitarians were first gathering money for ransom, they learned very quickly that when they crossed into Morocco, the people that were holding the captives often wanted goods," said Fr. Josh, one of the participants of the pilgrimage. "So Seville was where the Trinitarians would buy goods they knew the slaveholders wanted."

As the Trinitarians' reputation became more well known throughout Morocco and other countries where they frequently visited for ransom payments, some kings began to increase the intricacies of goods they required. One example Fr. Josh shared with us was the King of Meknes, who refused to even entertain ransom conversations unless the Trinitarians could provide a replica of a clock that was owned by the King of France.

So after visiting Seville, they moved south to the city of Algeciras, a large port city that still holds some of the oldest Trinitarian houses to this day. These houses were the original houses the Trinitarians would bring freed slaves back to after returning to Spain. From Algeciras, the pilgrimage boarded a ferry across the Strait of Gibraltar into Morocco, where they first ported in Tangier. From there, they went to Rabat, the capital of Morocco, and then to Fes - all places where Trinitarians visited in order to free captives.

"Some of these cities were amazing to see because they haven't changed in hundreds of years," said Fr. Josh. "The technology was modern, but the layout and the buildings were like stepping back in time."

And at each stop, Trinitarian leaders would split out with small groups and hold Q&As, discussions, and planning sessions for the future of the Trinitarians - not an easy feat considering there were

160 people on this pilgrimage from 22 different countries who spoke seven different languages!

"While every school and order who attended were invited to bring young people on this pilgrimage, DeMatha was the only school to step up to the plate so to speak," said Fr. Josh. "Our young men were the youngest people there but they contributed wonderfully to the conversation and asked tough and important questions."

WINDLEA INTERTRINITARIA ME Fr. Josh reflected that some of what our young men asked was about what the Trinitarian Order was doing about social injustices such as racism, human trafficking, and other social injustices that plague the world today that are not based in religious persecution.

> "I was very proud of the young men we took," reflected Fr. James. "They pushed leadership in a respectful way to answer and reflect on some tough questions. Questions they asked were actu-Continues on page 21

nticipation could be felt in the air as the Class of 2023 gathered in the lower level of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception for their graduation day. Graduates shared memories of their high school career, laughed among what will become life-long friendships, and wore their caps and gown proudly as they prepared to become DeMatha Catholic High School alumni. Upstairs, parents, friends, family members, and loved ones gathered in the pews, faces beaming with pride for the young men preparing to process down the aisle of the Basilica, ready to take their first steps into the next stage of their lives.

Whether it be in the arts, sports, academics, or extracurriculars, this class exemplified what it means to be a DeMatha Man.

"[This class] is the embodiment of the concept of brotherhood, which is so central to who we are and which was so challenged by restrictions during the 18 months of their high school years, but they never lost that brotherhood at any time through it all," said Fr. James. "It was a glorious sight for all of us to see because the students are the only reason DeMatha exists."

This class, which were leaders on the field, in the classroom, on the stage, and in the community, displayed what it means to be faith-filled gentlemen and scholars. They welcomed the freshman to campus and showed the young Stags on campus what it means to be a DeMatha Man.

"Even though last year was technically 'normal', this was really this class' first completely normal year of high school," said Senior Counselor, Mr. Andrew Bright '03. "These guys really were challenged in ways they may not have expected as to what it means to be a leader on campus, but they rose to that challenge."

And while their time at DeMatha comes to a close, they move on to a variety of universities throughout the Maryland and DC area, HBCUs, and other prestigious universities throughout the country. This year also sees five students attending military academies, one of the larger numbers DeMatha has seen in the

last several years. This class also received a large number of scholarships, and is one of the largest amounts of scholarship money we have seen in the past few years with \$23,669,468 being offered, not including the sports scholarships as well.

"This year, along with many college acceptances, we are also seeing several students attending trade school, two are directly enlisting in the military, and some are entering the workforce," said Mr. Bright. "Diversity is incredibly important at DeMatha and I think it is great that we have people representing several paths to success."

And we know no matter what path these young men choose to take, we know they will represent what it means to be a DeMatha Stag. With every class that moves on, the DeMatha community becomes stronger, and we wish nothing but the best for the Class of 2023.



f you are looking for new DeMatha swag, the Stag Store is the place to go, and if you've visited recently, you may notice a new display that shows a historic wool blanket with a white DM in the center, made in the '50s or '60s, next to our modern blanket that is available for purchase. This blanket was a donation by Frank Fennell '74, who visited the school to speak with us about what his DeMatha experience meant to him and why he decided to donate the blanket after several decades of ownership.

When Frank first came to DeMatha, he was a transfer and knew no one on campus. As many DeMatha alumni and current students can relate to, it can be intimidating entering a new school. But the DeMatha community did what it does best and made Frank feel right at home.

"I was a little shy and introverted for my first year or so," said Frank. "But as soon as you're at DeMatha, you are introduced to so many interesting people as both your classmates and as your teachers that by the end of my career, I really felt a part of the brotherhood."

Frank recalled one of his first memories being at DeMatha was all the personalities of the teachers on campus.

"As a student, that is what really catches your attention," said Frank. "I had the privilege of being taught by some of the best in Fr. Mike, Ray Smith, Buck Offutt, Morgan Wootten, and so many more."

Frank and his two brothers that attended DeMatha got to know Fr. Mike when he was teaching at DeMatha and recalled working with him over the summer on his Ford he used to keep parked next to what is now St. John de Matha Hall. Back then, the back parking lot and courtyard were not what they are today, and St. John de Matha Hall was a monastery, so Fr. Mike could be found working on cars year-round with his dog, Duchess.

Fr. Mike and Frank's connection did not end as Frank left DeMatha. They actually stayed in touch throughout the years, and when it was time to get married, Frank knew that he would ask Fr. Mike to perform his wedding ceremony. It was through this connection that the blanket that hangs in the Convocation Center was gifted.

"My family and his family actually interacted a lot," said Frank. "He attended mine and my brothers' graduation parties and by the end of our time at DeMatha, he was more than just a teacher. He was a friend to the family and a role model."

So when it was time for Fr. Mike to move on from DeMatha, he gifted that blanket to Frank, who has held onto it for over 30 years. And while cleaning out his house, he stumbled upon that blanket again which he had used for football games, tailgates, and more.

"When I thought about what to do with the blanket, I knew that I wanted to donate it back to DeMatha and return it home where it belongs," said Frank.

We'd like to thank Frank for this piece of DeMatha history! As a school, DeMatha is always looking forward, so it is a privilege to be able to take a step back and pay respects to the history that made DeMatha what it is today.

THE ROAD TO CIVIL RIGHTS DeMatha's Mission Takes Education Beyond the Classroom

n June 25, Dr. Daniel McMahon '76, Mr. Pat Smith '82, and a group of 11 DeMatha students gathered at DeMatha for an early morning Mass and with a week's worth of clothes packed, ready to begin class. But unlike a typical class, this one would take them across 9 states, 2000+ miles, to 5 cities and multiple museums.

This was the "Road to Civil Rights", a summer class offered to rising juniors and seniors. The students who participated in this trip found themselves in areas of importance to the Civil Rights Movement, with the goal being to reflect on American history and show a different perspective to what students have read in their history and literature classes.

"A lot of these places we read about but actually being there hits you deep," said Kai Blackman '24, a student who participated in the trip. "It's crazy to think we know this history, but when you're actually there and go more in depth, you learn so much more. It's the best way to learn about what my ancestors went through."

The class began in Nashville, where the students visited Fisk University. Nashville was the first major city in the South to desegregate lunch counters, and Fisk students, such as John Lewis and Diane Nash, played a large part in that movement. From there, the class went to the National Civil Rights Museum, which is at the Lorraine Hotel in Memphis - the location where Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated. From Memphis, they traveled to Selma, AL where they walked the landmark Edmund Pettus Bridge before departing to Montgomery, AL to see the Legacy Museum and the National Memorial for Peace and Justice before resting for the evening. The next day, they visited The City of St. Jude Parish, who welcomed the participants of the Selma to Montgomery March to camp on its athletic fields. The final stop for the day was in Atlanta, where they explored the National Center for Civil and Human Rights. The final day saw a trip to Morehouse College before resting and preparing for the long trip back.

"Even as chaperones, Pat and I learned a lot," said Dr. McMahon. "This was a class so we had the students journaling every day, but even then we have so many new ideas of how we can improve things going forward."

Dr. McMahon also reflected on the importance of the DeMatha connections and how they helped to make this trip such a success. Mark Jefferson '87 was able to get DeMatha in touch with two exceptional college professors who accompanied the class in Memphis and Atlanta, giving short lectures and discussions as they traveled. James Santivanez '91 and his wife hosted the whole group for dinner. And even looking forward,

two more alumni have expressed interest in helping out next year, including Kevin Rust '78 who was an FBI agent in Jackson, Mississippi and offered to give insight into federal investigations of crimes that the states ignored during that time.

Dr. McMahon also wanted to thank Montgomery Catholic School in Montgomery, AL for hosting our students and providing discussion spaces during their time in Montgomery.

"The fact that we were able to make this connection with another Catholic school and for them to be such gracious hosts was truly special," reflected Dr. McMahon.

After such a successful inaugural year for this class, Dr. McMahon is hoping to return to many of these sites (and maybe add a few more) next year. One of the school's main goals is to be able to provide this experience to anyone who is interested, so any wishing to donate in any capacity, there is a separate fund set up called "RtCR" and donations can be made to that fund if interested.

"I think all students could benefit from this trip," reflected Kai. "As an African American I really felt connected to this history, but this opportunity gives everyone a chance to challenge their prior understanding and learn something new."

The 11 students who participated in this trip were: Chase Alexander '25, Aidan Ankrah '24, Kai Blackman '24, Kevin Carey '25, Nicholas DeLeon '25, Reuben Ezi '24, Henry Lawrence '24, Devin Lewis '25, Henry Rutz '25, Daren Pefok '24, and Daniel Smith '25. All involved spoke most favorably about Mr. Smith and Dr. McMahon for planning and chaperoning this trip. As Rafael DeLeon, father of Nicholas sent to Dr. McMahon in an email, "Words can not express the deep respect and appreciation we have for your efforts."


