On the field trip, students learned how garbage is converted into electricity and then supplied to over 80,000 homes in the area. Students were excited when they were permitted to ride in a private elevator to see the cranes in action. They saw the incinerator where the garbage is burned and were amazed to learn that the temperature in the incinerator is over 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit. ## Superintendent Joseph Hochreiter Settling in as New Superintendent of Schools

Mr. Joseph E. Hochreiter began his tenure as Superintendent of Schools on July 1st. His appointment in February culminated a search process that began in the fall of 2012, with articulation of goals by the Board of Education, significant community input, and interviews of qualified applicants by a diverse community group and the Board.

"The Board of Education interviewed a number of candidates, and while all had very impressive backgrounds, Mr. Hochreiter stood out as the best leader for our schools," remarked President Mary-Pat Briggi. "We were impressed with his energy and educational philosophy, by his sense of optimism and enthusiasm, and ability to inspire our diverse group of stakeholders. We look forward to working with him in the coming years," she concluded.

Mr. Hochreiter most recently served as Superintendent of Schools in the Elmira City School District. He served in that capacity from 2009. Previously, he held the position of Deputy Superintendent from 2006-2009 in Elmira as well. At Elmira, Mr. Hochreiter saw his district through challenging times and demonstrated leadership in a district with a wide range of diversity, cultures and needs. His leadership focused on implementing the strategic plan, improving the curriculum, and increasing graduation rates. Mr. Hochreiter improved student achievement at Elmira and authored numerous grants. He also spearheaded the development of a multimillion dollar capital project that included more than \$14 million in technology upgrades for all schools, which passed in 2006.

Mr. Hochreiter began his public education career as a special education and social studies teacher at Greece Olympia High School in the Rochester area. He then worked as a Middle School Assistant Principal and then High School principal, both in Dansville, New York. While at Dansville High School, he implemented initiatives such as flexible scheduling, partnerships with post-secondary institutions and effective alternative education programs.

He has published numerous articles on educational leadership and has presented at many national conferences.

Mr. Hochreiter received his B.A. in Inclusion Education and Social Studies from Niagara University and an M.S. from Niagara University in Educational Administration and Supervision. He completed coursework for his doctorate at the University of Rochester and is completing his dissertation. Mr. Hochreiter and his wife Kerry, also a school administrator, look forward to relocating to this area.

"I am honored that the Hendrick Hudson Board has selected me for this important role at such a critical time. The District has an outstanding record of accomplishment in academics and cocurricular areas," said Hochreiter. "In my short time in Hen Hud, I have met with scores of staff, parents and community members. I am in awe of the level of professionalism and excellent work that has occurred here. I am extremely thankful to Dr. Monahan, the staff and Board of Education for spending quality time with me to ensure a smooth and successful transition," Hochreiter concluded.

### Sensational Season for Hen Hud Speech Team!

### Congratulations to Sanford Jones and Noah Ruff who won a combined 12 first place speech championships, including States and Nationals, during the 2012-2013 Forensics season!

The intense rigor involved in preparing for Forensics competitions makes Hendrick Hudson High School's Speech Team's accomplishments this year all the more amazing. "Speech" is the competitive acting/interpretation component of Forensics Speech & Debate. This year, the Hendrick Hudson team competed in four Speech categories, each category having specific criteria and challenges:

- *Declamation (Dec)* The speaker presents, in a personal style, a memorized speech that has already been written and delivered, without imitating the initial deliverer;
- Duo Two speakers perform a memorized selection, portraying characters without touching or making direct eye contact as they move;
- Oral Interpretation (OI) The speaker prepares two pieces, one prose piece and one poetry piece, which are performed alternately in rounds. A coin toss determines whether prose or poetry begins rounds for a tournament. A script is allowed, but the speaker must demonstrate familiarity with the

material by balancing script and audience contact and interpreting the reading;

 Dramatic Interpretation/ Performance (DI) – The speaker presents a memorized selection from a play or literature portraying characters and pantomiming any needed props or scenery elements (props or costumes may not be used). In some tournaments, dramatic and humorous pieces are separated and a category of Humorous Interpretation (HI) is offered.

Each Speech Team member prepares pieces for at least two performance categories. Creating a piece involves finding published material of enough depth and length to craft a unique presentation which will fully engage and transport an audience for 8 to 10 minutes; a presentation that will tell a story, enlighten, and entertain. Once pieces are created, students begin to work on the styles of presentation they need to compete in their categories.

Because the material is so crucial to successfully competing, students continue to fine-tune the structure of their pieces all season.

Our Speech Team competes in local, northeast regional, and college tournaments. Each tournament has preliminary and advanced rounds, the number of which depends on the number of entrants. For preliminaries, all of the students entered in a category are divided into smaller Sensational Season *continued on page 5* 

# HHHS Music Students Enjoy HUGE Success at Regional Competition

The Hendrick Hudson High School Choral groups Concert Choir, Harmonizers and Treble Makers, led by Choral Director Erica Denler, and the HHHS Band and Wind Ensemble, led by Band Director Benjamin Acrish, competed against other high school choirs and bands at the *Music in the Parks* adjudicated competition in Massachusetts on Friday, May 24th. The result – HHHS took home more awards than any other school!

The Wind Ensemble earned 2nd place with a rating of "Excellent." Concert Choir earned a 1st place distinction with a rating of "Excellent." Harmonizers also earned a 1st place distinction with a rating of "Superior." Treble Makers received 1st place with a rating of "Superior" as well as the honor of being the highest overall scoring choir. Senior Rafiq Taylor was recognized as Outstanding Soloist. In addition, our students brought home the *Esprit de Corps* award, which is given to the one school out of all schools competing whose students demonstrated the most maturity, poise, decorum, spirit, cooperation and talent. Mrs. Denler remarked, "Congratulations to all the students for their hard work and dedication! YOU DO US PROUD!!!"

competition groups of five to eight, with at least one judge for each small group. The judge completes a ballot for each student with written notes for improvement and ranks the performances of the students in the group. For each subsequent preliminary round, students rotate into different smaller groups with different judges and perform again. In larger 2-day tournaments, our speech team double-enters, which means a student will perform in one category event, ask to be excused to another round, cross campus and perform in a second category event. This is a continuous process until the 8 to 10 preliminary rounds are finished. Not only does this take tremendous physical energy and a love of performing, but also tremendous discipline, focus and talent. For OI, there's the additional challenge of keeping track of whether one is going to perform one's poetry piece or prose selection. And students are required to compete in formal attire!

At the end of preliminaries, rankings are added to determine which students advance, or "break." A student needs to rank in at least the top three in every round to advance, so breaking is difficult. Advanced rounds use panels of judges, adding to the difficulty of breaking. In local contests, there are six to nine judges. In college and regional contests, students typically experience sixteen judges ranking them.

Students qualify to compete in State and National tournaments by advancing in prior tournaments during the season, or by placing in qualifying competitions. At States, not only did we have seven students qualify, but Sanford Jones and Noah Ruff double-qualified and doubleentered - and had double wins! Nationals elevates students to another level by its sheer number of "the best" who are competing and by the number of judges involved in rounds over a period of two days. Noah Ruff placed in the top 24 in the country in Dramatic Performance! Sanford Jones competed in four preliminary rounds and four advanced rounds with twenty-six judges ranking him, and won First Place nationwide in Dramatic Performance!

# APPR Ratings: What are they, and will they affect my child? Alice Gottlieb, EdD, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum, Instruction and Professional Personnel

The APPR, formally the Annual Professional Performance Review, is not new. Teachers and principals have received annual evaluations for as long as we've had schools. The stakes have become much higher this year, with new requirements from the state, both in how the evaluations are written and how results are available to families.

Teacher and principal ratings are based on student scores on state and local assessments, and on teacher/principal effectiveness as measured using state-approved instruments such as the Danielson rubric (see table below). All of these scores are then combined to gain a "HEDI" rating out of 100 points; HEDI stands for "Highly Effective, Effective, Developing, and Ineffective."

How are the HEDI ratings compiled? Of the 100 possible points, 20 are based on either a state assessment or other test that measures student growth, 20 are based on a local measure of student achievement, and the final 60 are based on administrative observations. Specific examples follow:

Because this is the first year for the new APPR in New York State, we are not completely sure what the scores will mean. What we do know, however, is that effectiveness is more than a number on a scale. When we receive the results from the state in late August, we will analyze them carefully. Obviously we'll need to study each professional's effectiveness score, but we'll also need to study the efficacy of our measures. In other words, are our assessments measuring what they're supposed to measure? This will certainly be a learning experience for all of us. The APPR plan is subject to an annual review process by New York State, so the district will have an opportunity to refine the plan based on the results.

New York State law allows parents and legal guardians of a student to request the effectiveness scores and final ratings of teachers and principals to which the student is assigned for the current school year. Requests for this information have to be in writing, using a form that will be available on our district website.

In a perfect world, all of our teachers would be highly effective, and our children would not even know that such a process exists. However, our current APPR environment is highly stressful for teachers, our students are taking more tests than they ever have, and the community will undoubtedly be talking about teachers, principals, and HEDI ratings. At this point, we need to see how the process works, learn as much as we can from the first year, and keep our eye on the target: ensuring the best possible education for our children.
