We urge all students to get involved in their school above and beyond the classroom. This could be through sports, G2M, drama, academic competitions, music, and so much more.

In order to continue offering a safe drop-off, we would like to review our procedures. - If more time is needed for drop-off/pick-up or you need to enter the building, please park in the parking lot and proceed to a crosswalk.

When I think of the character traits I want my children to develop. I think of strength resilience. kindness. happiness. bravery. independence. balance. community. and gratefulness. Being a director. I see how band helps students learn and develop these qualities every day in the ensemble room.

### Strength

In music, children learn to take on something difficult. In today's world so many things are instant; So many things are fast and easy; so many things are disposable. But learning to play an instrument is just challenging as it has always been. Students learn delayed gratification, they learn not to give up, they learn that strength takes time and dedication and work. There are no shortcuts -- which develops strength.

### Kindness

Students in a musical ensemble are given frequent opportunities to express kindness to others. A smile to a neighbor who performed better today than yesterday. A thumbs-up to a friend who just nailed a solo, or a hug for a friend who just bombed one. A five-minute help session with a younger band member who needs some experience. Constant encouragement and kindness can be found in music rooms every day.

### Bravery

Playing an instrument helps children learn to be brave. Trying something new that is a physical as well as a personal risk can be scary. Performing by yourself for the class can be intimidating. Performing on a stage with, or without, your band friends can be terrifying. But these experiences can also be satisfying. And exhilarating. And empowering. Learning to perform and step outside your comfort zone develops bravery.

### gratefylness

Watching students at final concerts is a chance to see the gratitude they have developed because of music. I see students who are grateful for the opportunity to show their parents their hard work; Students who are grateful for the technique and skill that they've mastered. Students who are grateful for the life-long friends who are sitting beside them. Students who are grateful that - for the rest of their life - music will be a part of them.

### Independence

From learning to assemble their instrument to performing a senior recital, students learn independence in music. Students grow in independence every day in the music room. Learning to take care of their equipment; learning to have their supplies; learning to come prepared to rehearsal for your own sake and for the sake of those around you; learning that what you do affects the group... All of these opportunities to grow in independence are constant in the ensemble room.

### Resilience

The music room is a place of expected mistakes. Students will make hundreds if not thousands of mistakes in a given class period. Millions over the course of their musical journey. Mistakes in music are not only expected; they are signs of growth. And because we know that mistakes and areas of improvement will never end, we know that student's resiliency will never stop growing.

### Happiness

Children find happiness in many different activities. Music is one that lasts a lifetime. It allows them to put aside their worries, forget their troubles and find moments of pure joy. Whether this is happiness over an individual achievement, a perfect moment of musicality, or just having a place to call home, music can provide happiness when children most need it.

### Community

The ensemble is a community. Members learn that the part that they play may be different from the person who sits next to them, but both parts are equally important in creating beautiful music. They learn precision - that accuracy of their own part is not enough- it is equally important that they be able to play in rhythm, in sync and in tune with those around them. They learn to listen to the director, to the leaders in the ensemble, to the musicians around the room. And to thrive as a community.

### Balance

They learn that they are not always the most important part, but they are always important. They learn that there is a busy-season in life, a time to buckle down and work before a concert, and there is a time to breathe, to take it easy and enjoy time with their friends.





#### IMPORTANT POLICIES/PROCEDURES FROM THE ATTENDANCE OFFICE

Communication between home and school is of utmost importance for the Attendance Office. The following is a list of acceptable reasons your student may miss school:

- Personal illness
- Funerals and religious services as requested by the parent(s) and/or guardian(s)
- Professional appointments that could not be scheduled outside of the regular school day
- Serious personal or family crisis
- Student is not in proper physical and/or mental condition to attend school in accordance with Wisconsin Statute 118.15(3)(a)
- Suspension from school

Students will be excused for the above reasons only when a parent/guardian gives an explanation for the cause of the absence. Please call the Attendance Office at 715-261-0735 by 9:30 am on the day of the absence. You can leave a message 24-hours a day. If this is impossible, please call or send a note with your child on the day of his/her return to school.

Parents/guardians are allowed to excuse their child for part of or the entirety of ten days per school year without at medical note. If your child is absent from school for more than 10 days, you will be asked to furnish a medical excuse. Absences excused with medical note are excused without using the ten days previously mentioned. Family vacations or activities must be pre-arranged through the Attendance Office prior to leaving. In such cases, the student must complete an anticipated absence form.

If your child needs to leave during the day, they must obtain a pass from the Attendance Office before leaving. Please send a note with your child or call the Attendance Office. Any student who does not obtain a pass before leaving will be marked unexcused. Do not hesitate to contact the Attendance Office at 715-261-0735 with any questions or concerns.

#### Wisconsin parents and caregivers,

The Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) Office of School Safety (OSS) is thrilled to announce the launch of the SPEAK UP, SPEAK OUT Resource Center (SUSO). SUSO is a comprehensive, one-stop place to turn to with your concerns regarding school safety. A facet of the Resource Center that we are particularly pleased to share with Wisconsin students and parents is the threat reporting system.

#### The SUSO threat reporting system is available 24/7 and is free to all.

Students, parents, school staff and community members can submit a school safety concern, beginning in early September, by downloading the SUSO app (Android and iOS), visiting speakup.widoj.gov or by calling 1-800-MY-SUSO-1. Resource Center staff work around-the-clock to respond to reports and to deploy a response locally by communicating directly with school administrators, law enforcement and counselors.

Nationwide, more than half of public middle and high schools now operate a tip line.

Threat reporting systems - or tip lines - are recommended for use by the United States Secret Service when developing comprehensive school violence prevention plans. Tip lines are used to identify threats to schools, and other daily safety concerns students encounter, such as bullying, drug use, suicidal thoughts and more.

Of school administrators who participated in a recent survey surrounding the use of school tip lines, 77% believed that their tip line made them more aware of safety issues at their school, 73% reported that their tip line had prevented incidents of self-harm or suicide, and more than half believed their tip line had prevented violent incidents.<sup>1</sup>

#### It's time to break the code of silence.

Who knows more about what's going on, in or out of school, than students themselves? Individually and collectively, they play an essential role in keeping Wisconsin schools safe. It's crucial for students to understand that there's a clear difference between tattling or "snitching" and disclosing concerning information to a trusted adult to keep themselves and their classmates safe. The SUSO threat reporting system aims to empower students to share their concerns safely and confidentially without fear of retaliation. We encourage you to talk to your students about the importance of letting a trusted adult know about their safety concerns.

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# **Setting Up An Observer Account**

### What is the Canvas - Learning Management System (LMS)?

Canvas LMS allows courses to be created and learning resources, assignments, and assessments to be posted online. Teachers can post coursework for online learning or complement face-to-face instruction. In Canvas, students have quick access to course content, course calendars, homework to-do lists, messaging, student to student collaborations, assessments, rich and effective teacher feedback, video conferencing, and grades.

### What is an Observer?

An Observer is the name which describes the users in a course who can view the content and follow a particular student's progress. They can not interact with or participate in the course's content or materials.


### ign up as a Parent Observer

- 1. Go to wausau.instructure.com/login/canvas
- 2. Click on the upper right hand corner: Parent of Canvas User? Click Here For an Account
- 3. Complete the account information
- 4. Use the Pairing Code you get from your child's Canvas account or teacher.
- After setting up your account, you will be taken to your account and you will be able to see all of your child's information.
- 6. If you have additional students, you will need those pairing codes. Once you have those codes, follow these steps: Click on the Account Icon (top left), Choose "Observing", add Code and hit +Student Icon. Repeat this step for additional students.
- 7. If you want to have more than one parent to be an OBSERVER of a child's account, REPEAT steps 1-5. Each account you set up for a child will require a Student Pairing Code. A Student Pairing Code can only be used ONE time and only valid for 7 days.

  - e. This will open a new window with a specific student pairing code. Enter this code into the student pairing code box during the parent sign-up. This code can only be used ONE time and only

# Are your kids ready?

Please look at the box below to see what "shots" your child may need to attend school in the fall.

Incoming kindergarteners usually need "boosters" of DTaP (diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis), polio, MMR (measles, mumps and rubella), and varicella (chickenpox).

Incoming sixth graders need a Tdap vaccine unless they had one less than five years ago.

State law requires all public and private school students to present written evidence of immunization against certain diseases within 30 school days of admission. These requirements can only be waived if a properly signed health, religious or personal conviction <u>waiver</u> is filed with the school.

### Clinic appointments fill up early in the summer! Schedule your appointments soon.

The <u>Marathon County Public Health Department</u> gives immunizations, and local pharmacies do as well.

A: If you qualify for F/R meals based on an application, we will send you either an email OR a paper letter. If you qualify for Free or Reduced and If you provided an email, we will use that method of communication first, so please check your SPAM.
