

The Curriculum – Key Principles







GCSE English Overview

- All students sit both GCSE English Language and GCSE English Literature these are two separate GCSEs.
- They are graded 9 to 1.
- The exam board is AQA.
- 100% exam no coursework.
- Students complete a spoken language assessment as part of the GCSE English Language course. This is compulsory but does not count towards their final grade.



- 1. Encourage them to read 2-3 non-fiction articles weekly
- 2. Help them to choose challenging fiction as part of their reading diet (suggested reading in our KS4 reading list).
- 3. When reading with your child, ask them how the writer feels about the topic they are writing about, and how you can tell this.
- 4. Ask your child to read their homework aloud to you so that they can spot mistakes and sections that are unclear more easily.



GCSE Mathematics Overview

- All students sit GCSE Mathematics
- They are graded 9 to 1
- The exam board is Edexcel.
- Students sit three equally weighted papers. (1 non calculator, 2 calculator)
- 100% exam no coursework

- All students sit GCSE Science
- They are graded 9 to 1
- The exam board is Edexcel
- 100% exam no coursework

Combined Science

- 2 GCSEs in Science
- Higher or Foundation Tier
- 6 exams @ 1hr 10min

Separate (Triple) Science

- 3 GCSEs in Biology, Chemistry & Physics
- Higher Tier only
- 6 exams @ 1hr 45 min

- 3. Write notes and questions on the pages if still confused by a topic.



Learning and Memory



- Learning is building knowledge in our long-term memory
- When we first learn information, we hold it in our working memory, but this can only hold small amounts of information
- To learn, we need to keep knowledge in our long-term memory
- Retrieval Practice helps us to do this
- This is when we deliberately recall information to see what we know
- Retrieval Practice is key to learning at Sydenham School



Studying and revising



- Reading over notes is not an effective form of studying
- A more effective technique is for students to put everything away and test themselves on what they know
- This builds a stronger working memory
- This is a blank paper exercise or brain dump

Quiz your daughter or son using their flashcards. Give them plenty of time to answer. The more they struggle, the better for memory.



Make a list of all the important information you need to know from a particular unit or chapter.




