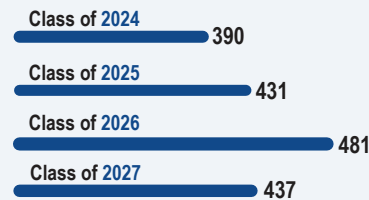
OVERVIEW

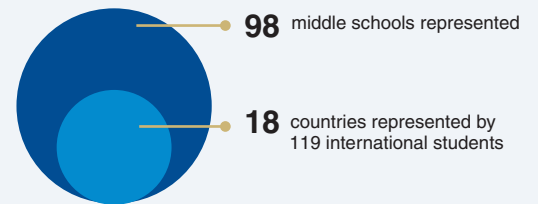

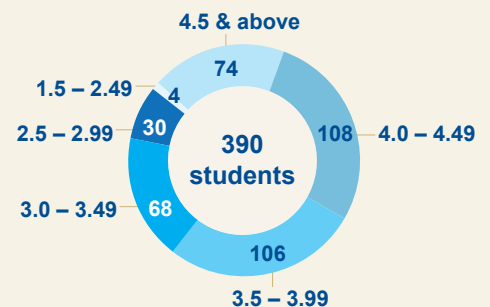

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE PROGRAMME

SMCHS is one of four Catholic high schools in California to offer the International Baccalaureate Programme. SMCHS students must meet academic prerequisites to enter the full diploma programme or courses.

Full IB diploma candidates, in addition to their coursework, take:

- A Theory of Knowledge seminar course to apply thinking and inquiry across all subject areas
- Research and write an extended essay of over 4,000 words on a student-generated inquiry/research question
- Independently engage in creative projects, physical activity and service (CAS)



UNIQUE IB PROGRAMME FEATURES AT SMCHS INCLUDE:

- IB students are often co-enrolled in AP courses and sit for both the IB and AP exams.
- Historically, SMCHS students earn an average of 31.26 full diploma points, qualifying them for advanced standing at many universities/colleges.
- Philosophy HL 1 & 2 replace the SMCHS requirement for Theology 3 & 4. Since all SMCHS IB full diploma candidates also enroll in English HL, they develop the critical literacy skills necessary for high level contributions to their future university learning.
- Extracurricular CAS activities intentionally leverage technology for global collaboration and virtual participation (Climate Action Project, Smithsonian and Boston Public Library, etc.)
- IB full diploma students take an advanced academic load of **seven classes per semester**, where many IB schools require five to six.

The IB Full Diploma Programme attracts a diverse group of learners committed to challenging themselves with a highly rigorous curriculum that expects in-depth critical thinking that balances perspectives, design thinking, global-mindedness and effective multimodal communication. IB full diploma learners transfer these skills to mutual responsibility for self, others, and the planet growing in compassion, reflection and resilience.

SERVICE LEARNING IN THE SPIRIT OF THE GOSPEL

In living out the school's charism of Caritas Christi, the love of Christ, SMCHS Campus Ministry offers its students a robust service learning program throughout all four years. Freshmen and sophomores participate in class service projects, uniquely designed within the theology curriculum to serve an underserved or vulnerable population. Sophomores partner with Second Harvest Food Bank and serve in a variety of capacities to the Orange County community. Juniors and seniors complete their projects by participating in direct service work with a number of approved nonprofits in areas and issues they are interested in. Christian service at Santa Margarita is integral in forming young women and men of Caritas Christi. Completion of grade-level service projects is a graduation requirement.



LEADERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Over 90% of SMCHS students participate in extracurricular and/or co-curricular activities, giving ample opportunities to develop leadership and management skills. Leadership roles include Peer Ministry, Associated Student Body, Link Crew, Student Ambassadors, Speak UP! peer advisors and team managers.



MODEL UNITED NATIONS Santa Margarita's award-winning MUN program catapults students into the world of diplomacy and international relations with students participating in mock UN meetings worldwide. Student participation is an extracurricular commitment but also integrated into the honors social studies curriculum. Since 2000, the program has won over 10,331 individual awards and 109 delegation awards.



ROBOTICS/ENGINEERING The school's award-winning robotics teams, SMbly Required and SMbled, function like startups with students learning CAD modeling, welding, marketing and project management. Students design, build, program and test competition-ready robots.



ARTS Visual and performing arts classes provide diverse opportunities for students to learn and express their artistic talents. Through regional and national competitions, international performances, and award-winning productions, SMCHS students share their talents with the community. The Talon Academy of Performing Arts offers an after school conservatory program.



ESPORTS The world-champion Eagle esports team plays different games each season and competes in several different arenas. Students learn how to shoutcast while streaming on a production crew, run their own live stream, and train to play like professionals, strengthening communication, collaboration, critical thinking and creativity.



EDUCATIONAL TECHNOLOGY

As one of 34 Microsoft Showcase Schools nationwide, SMCHS is a leader in utilizing technology to create collaborative student-centered classrooms and improve learning outcomes.



ATHLETICS

Since the school opened over 36 years ago, SMCHS has earned more championships than any other school in Southern California, with 12 state championships, 79 CIF championships, and 245 league championships. SMCHS offers 27 CIF and seven club programs.



AUXILIARY STUDIES PROGRAM

The school's ASP program offers a comprehensive support program giving students with diagnosed learning differences the tools to succeed alongside their non-learning disabled peers.



EAGLE ONLINE ACADEMY

SMCHS offers a fully asynchronous online school with UC approved courses taught by Santa Margarita faculty. Students have access to SM support services and can participate in all school activities and athletics.



NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

NHS membership at SMCHS is highly selective. Students must demonstrate how their actions meet the four NHS pillars of scholarship, character, service, and leadership, along with a GPA requirement of 3.5. Only 15% of each class earns this distinction.



MEDIA

Students produce a daily news broadcast show (Eagle Television), a news website (SMCHSEagleEye.com), and the award-winning Eagle Eye student newspaper. Using state-of-the-art production equipment, ETV students edit, film, write and produce content.



WELLNESS

SMCHS offers a comprehensive student support program comprised of mental health education, training, resources, and referrals to meet the challenges of adolescence. Four wellness counselors offer on-campus resources for the school community.

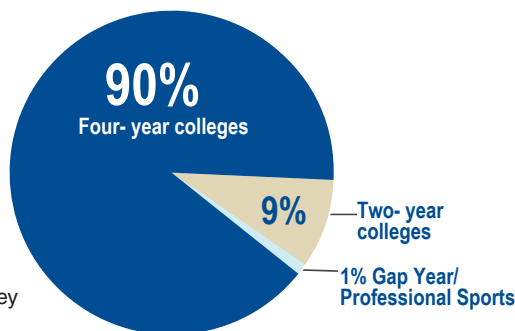
