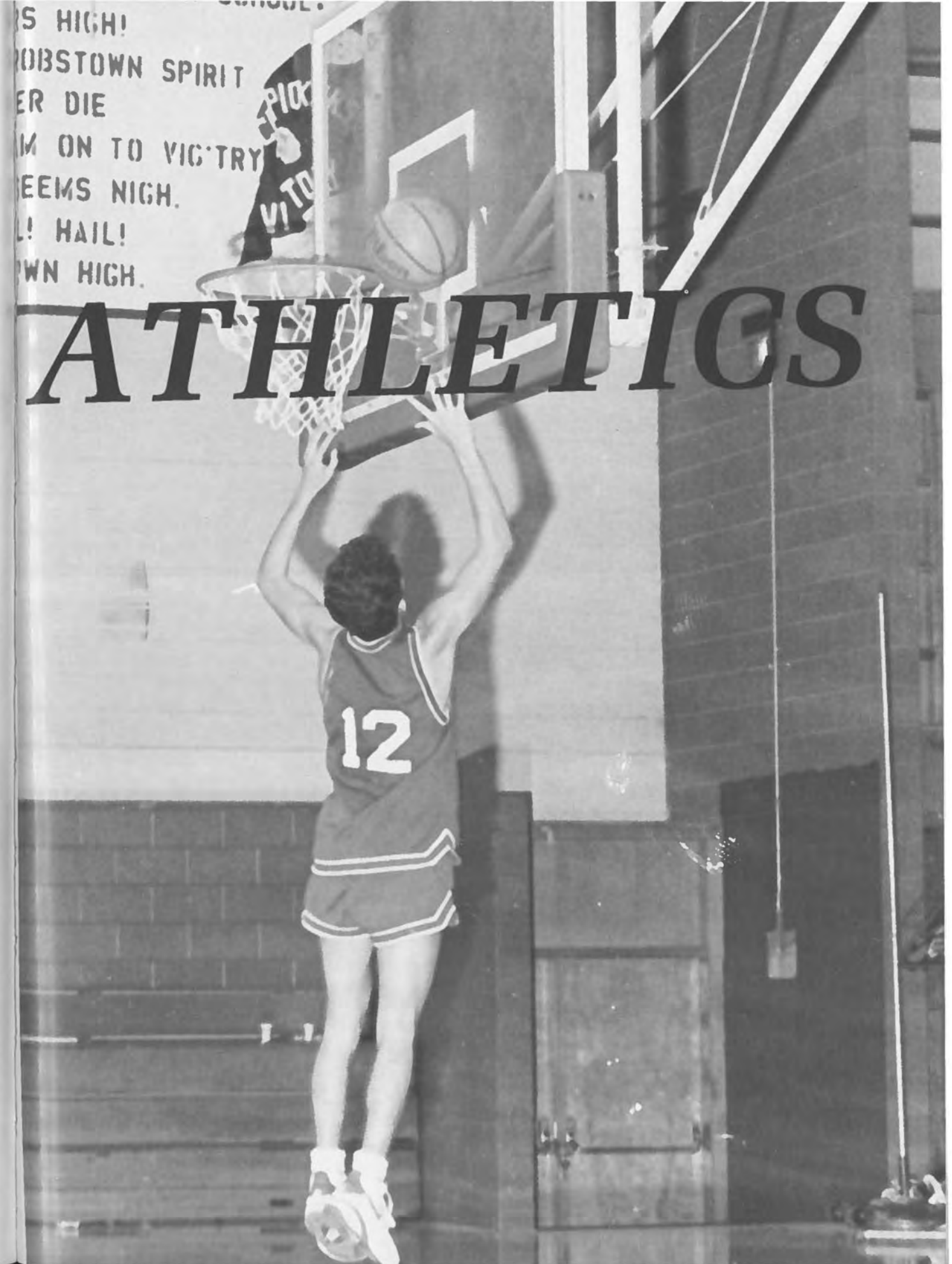

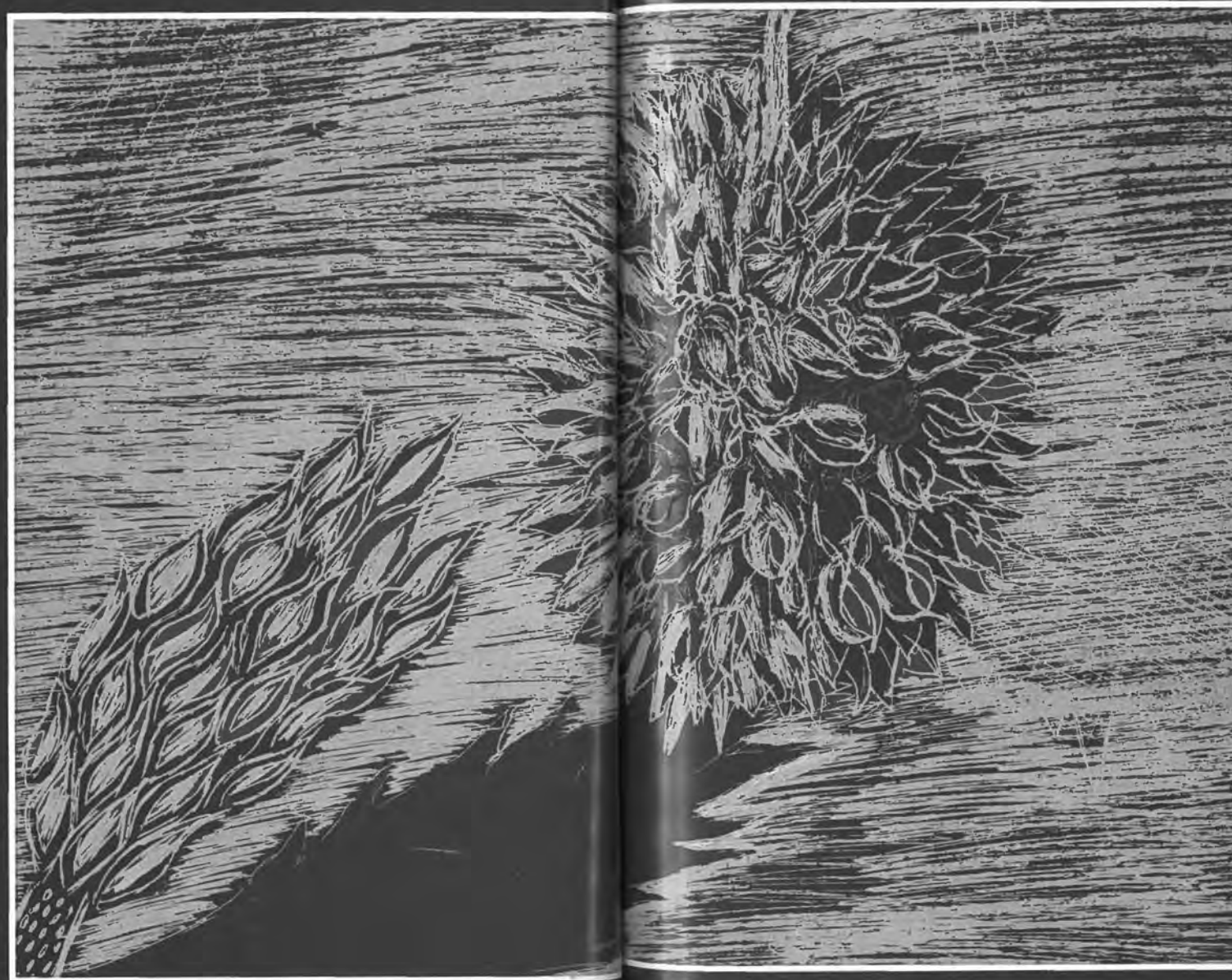
Spiritual Awareness

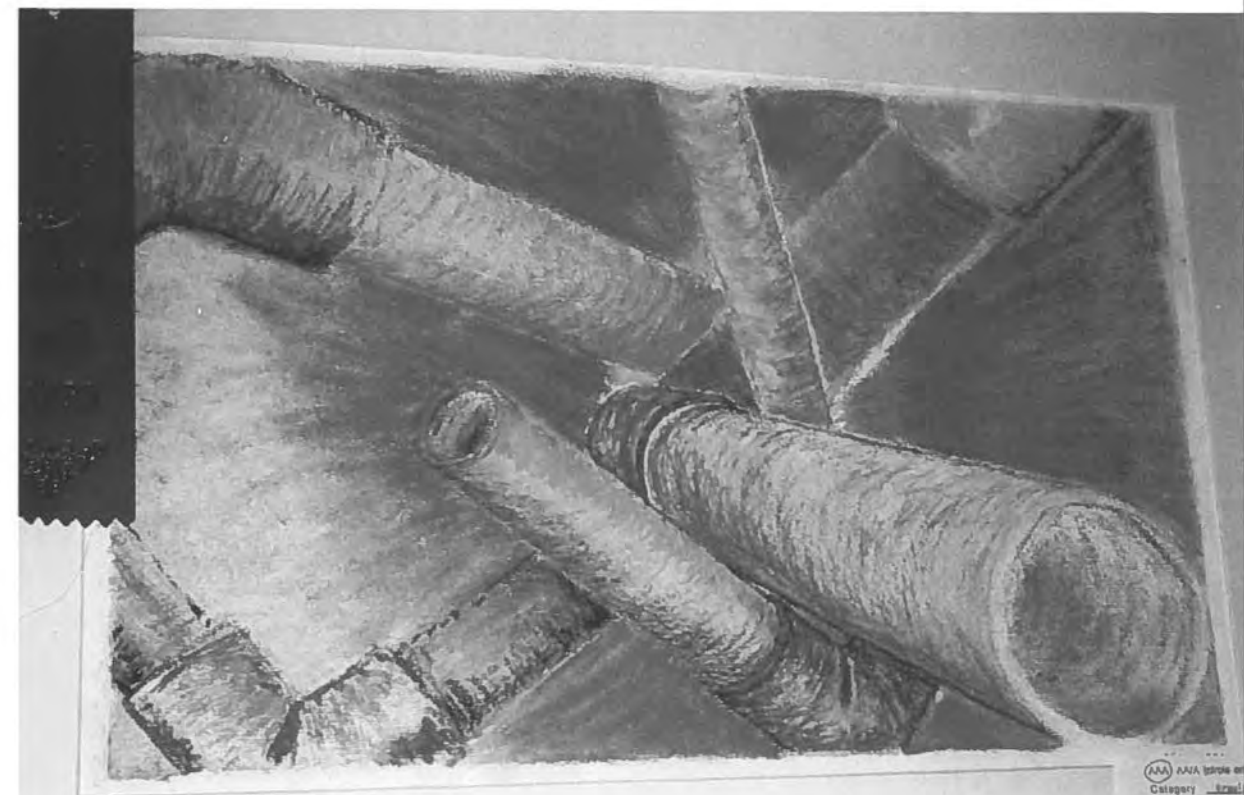

The Winner Takes It All



On January 20, 1993 at noon, William Jefferson Clinton took the oath of office and became the 42nd president of the United States. While cannons thundered in salute, George Herbert Walker Bush stepped into history after a four year term in office. Clinton, a former Rhodes Scholar at Oxford University and a graduate of Yale Law School, was the governor of Arkansas when he chose to run in the national race. Clinton selected Al Gore as his running mate. Gore was elected to the House of Representatives in his first campaign for public office at the age of 28 and was elected to the Senate in 1984.

Choose Or Lose

Bill Clinton stepped into a national spotlight and won the Democratic convention on a sizzling July week in New York City. Clinton was the governor of Arkansas when he made his big decision to enter the national race. As his running mate, he chose Al Gore, who was elected to the House of Representatives at the age of 28 in his first campaign for public office. He was elected to the Senate in 1984.



THE THIRD PARTY

Texas billionaire H. Ross Perot earned his fortune when the computer company he owned began selling stock. When he abruptly quit the presidential race in July, his candidacy came to a halt. With five weeks to go before Election Day, he re-entered the race and chose James Stockdale, a decorated former Navy fighter pilot and POW, as his vice-presidential running mate. Perot spent millions of dollars on his campaign and, with the help of an army of "volunteers", earned himself participation in the presidential debates, as well as the support of many American citizens.



NEVER SAY GOODBYE

After eight years as vice-president under Ronald Reagan, George Bush entered the presidential race in 1988 and won. He chose an unknown and untested Senator from Indiana, Dan Quayle, as his running mate. Bush kept Quayle on the ticket in 1992, yet at the GOP convention in Houston, they remained the underdogs to Clinton and Gore. For the Republicans, Bush was the true agent of change and Clinton was slick and unreliable. To the Democrats, Bush mishandled the economy and needed to be relieved by a better leader. After the Democratic convention in New York City, the Clinton/Gore ticket was far ahead in the polls. George Bush and his wife Barbara now reside in Houston, away from politics and out of the public eye.

SOMALIA

The United States Marines arrived in Somalia on December 9, 1992. The starving African country was ravaged by famine, disease, and widespread looting of food from international relief agencies. The Marines offered a security of force to insure safe food distribution and protection to the citizens of Somalia.

BORIS YELTSIN

In 1991, Boris N. Yeltsin was elected president of the Russian Federation. One of his top priorities was economic reform. But the gloomy economic condition reflected the grave difficulties that he and his government faced in trying to build a market economy on the ruins of the failed Soviet Communist system. While attempting to establish economic and political ties abroad, Yeltsin's reforms at home increased prices by as much as 1500 percent during the first part of 1992. Many Russians felt that the reforms had damaged their standards of living significantly.

Croatian Civil War

Civil war spread across Yugoslavia, a nation of six republics and two provinces that had been plagued for centuries by historic, ethnic, religious, and economic differences. Nationalist, anti-Communist parties won elections in 1991 in all republics except Serbia, the largest, and Montenegro, the smallest. Then Croatia and its neighbor, Slovenia, declared their independence. Traditional rivalries were strongest between the Serbs, who belonged to the Orthodox church, and the Croats, who are Roman Catholic. Tens of thousands of people became refugees and the killing continued.

Industrial Pollution

Clear cutting was one way of clearing timber that the environmentalists wanted to eliminate in 1992 and 1993. Environmental groups want to protect the prime sanctuaries for many threatened species . . . The Environmental Protection Agency issued rules aimed at curbing industrial air pollution. The new rules outlined when businesses must obtain state pollution control permits under the Clean Air Act. Under this act, states issue pollution control permits and the EPA monitors state programs to make certain they comply with federal rules . . . An oil tanker carrying nearly 25 million gallons of crude oil lost power and was blown onto the rugged coastline of the Bay of Quendale, 100 miles north of Aberdeen, Scotland. The 100-island Shetlands group in the North Sea is sparsely populated but abound with birds, seals, fish and other wildlife.

Natural Disasters . . .

Hurricane Andrew carved its way through the Bahamas and hit south Florida with a powerhouse intensity before moving into Louisiana. The hurricane's 54-hour rampage, the most expensive natural disaster to ever hit this country, left an estimated 180,000 homeless in Florida alone. Hurricane Iniki dealt a direct blow to part of the Hawaiian Islands in September. Winds gusting up to 160 miles per hour and torrential rain hit Kauai, causing enormous damage. It was the most powerful hurricane to hit the Hawaiian Islands this century.



and National Disasters



When Rodney King was stopped by police on a Los Angeles freeway, police say he resisted them and was beaten. But when a jury found the officers innocent of any wrong-doing, three days of rioting hit Los Angeles. When it ended, 52 people were dead, 2,383 were injured, 18,807 were arrested, and the amount of property damage was estimated at 785 million dollars. Unemployment was another major issue during 1992. The unemployment rate had risen from 5.2 percent in 1988 to over seven percent in 1992. That meant 9.7 million Americans were out of work and according to the Labor Department projections, there will be thirty percent more college graduates and college-level jobs from now until the year 2005.



ENTERTAINMENT

---THIS YEAR---

The hottest entertainment acts of the year included Garth Brooks and the Red Hot Chili Peppers. Brooks, whose introspective songs and rousing concerts lifted country music to new heights, was voted top entertainer for the second year in a row in 1992. The Red Hot Chili Peppers' second album, "BloodSugarSexMagik", which features a quieter, more thoughtful side of the Chili Peppers, hit the top of the charts as soon as it was released ... at a Guns N' Roses extravaganza in St. Louis, 40 concert-goers and 25 police officers were injured in a brawl that erupted after the singer, Axl Rose, leaped from the stage to take a camera from a fan, abruptly ending the show. He was arrested in July, 1992, and charged with four misdemeanor assault counts. Rapper Ice-T ignited a furor with his song "Cop Killer". The singer later removed the song from his "Body Count" album after law enforcement officials and others criticized Time T for allowing the song to be distributed on the company's record label ... Vocalists Vanessa Williams and Mariah Carey still hold the pop princess titles after launching very successful careers in the music world.

WHERE THE ACTION IS

Basketball great Larry Bird retired from the Boston Celtics after a 13-year career. "When I played, I played as hard as I could. That's what I want to be remembered for." The 35-year-old Bird was plagued by back problems for the last two seasons of his career. His brilliant passing, pinpoint shooting and rebounding made him the consummate team player ... Barcelona, Spain, hosted the Summer Olympics in 1992 and it proved to be a bonanza for the United States - a total of 108 medals. A record 10,000 athletes, professional and amateur, from 183 countries, gathered in this rapidly modernized metropolis. Carl Lewis may not make it to the next Olympics — he'll be 35 by then — but he won two gold medals this time, one for the long jump and one for the 400-meter relay. In diving, Mary Ellen Clark won the bronze from the 10-meter platform.
